



First edition of the French translation of an important account of the Virginia colony in America, translated from the first English edition, which was published by R. Parker in London in 1705 with the title *History and present state of Virginia. Vigorous, honest, and not without humour,* his history was an immediate success. Reprinted numerous times (including modern editions: 1947, 1968, ed. by L.B. Wright), it served to attract many immigrants to Virginia. The work, subdivided in four parts, tells of the history of the first settlement and the government to 1706 (I), the natural productions and conveniences of the land before its settlement by the English (II), the indigenous peoples and their religion, laws and customs in war and peace (III), and the present state of the country regarding the police and government as well as the improvements to the land.

Robert Beverley, jr. (1673–1722) was an important historian of early colonial Virginia. In the first edition Beverley combined shrewd insights into the Virginia of his day, sharp comments about the colony's leaders, and vivid descriptions of the natural world, all written with an engaging enthusiasm for his native land. Many consider his work the most important and accurate history of early life in the Virginia colony. It also gives a favourable account of the slave society that had developed in Virginia by the beginning of the eighteenth century.

First edition of a translation of the New Testament into the indigenous American Ojibwe language. The preliminaries are in English, the text otherwise entirely in Ojibwe. The translation is ascribed to Reverend Henry Blatchford, who was Ojibwe himself (Darlow & Moule). The Ojibwe (Chippewa) are centred mostly in Canada, in the regions on the north side of the Great Lakes, but their territories also extend into the United States. They are the second largest group of indigenous Americans in Canada and fifth largest in the United States. The Ojibwe language is a branch from the Algonquian languages.

Autograph letter by Joseph Napoléon Bonaparte (1768–1844), the elder brother of Napoleon 1 of France, who made him King of Naples and Sicily (1806–1808), and later King of Spain and the Indies as Joseph 1 of Spain (1808–1813). After the fall of Napoleon 1, Joseph styled himself "Comte de Survilliers" and fled to America in 1816.

In the present letter Bonaparte thanks the politician Pierre François Réal (1757–1834) for his messages on the recent July Revolution (27–29 July 1830, called "Les Trois Glorieuses"), the overthrow of the French Bourbon monarch Charles x at Paris. Bonaparte shows himself disappointed in the role of the Marquis de La Fayette (1757–1834), the famous French general and political leader who had played such a great role in the American Revolution.

First Dutch translation of the accounts of two travels to Virginia in 1603 from Samuel Purchas' *Purchas his pilgrims*, here published as part of Van der Aa's *Nauwkeurige versameling*. Written by Thomas Canner. Another Dutch edition from the same year was published in folio as part of Van der Aa's *Wijdberoemde voyagien na Oost – en West-Indiën*. The first is an account of the second English voyage to New England (only after that of Bartholomew Gosnold) by Martin Pring. In 1603 he reached the coast of Maine then known as Virginia. The second is the account of Bartholomew Gilbert who was sent by Sir Walter Raleigh to search for the lost colonists of the Roanoke settlement in North Carolina, then known as Virginia, but was killed by Indians. First edition of the Dutch translation of a travelogue of North America by the English-American colonial captain Jonathan Carver (1710–1780). "In 1766 Carver was employed ... to explore to the west of the Great Lake in an attempt to contact the Sioux Indians. ... After wintering with the Indians on the Ste Croix River, Carver set out to return to Mackinac, but at the mouth of the Wisconsin met Captain James Tute, in command of a party send out to explore a route to the Pacific Ocean" (Howgego). The folding map shows the midlands of North America, the folding plate the St. Anthony waterfall in the Mississippi River and the hand-coloured engravings show different native American Indians.

Lacking one of the engraved plates showing native Americans, otherwise in very good condition, only a few small spots. Binding slightly worn along the extremities, but still good.



First edition of a travel book on North America by Martinus Cohen Stuart (1824–1878). Cohen Stuart, a prominent minister of the Remonstrant Church, visited the United States in 1875 at the invitation of the Evangelical Alliance, an international Protestant missionary society. With contagious enthusiasm he gives a very positive depiction of American society. He praises the United States for its democratic foundations and the advancing ecclesiastical and social state of affairs. In vivid imagery, interspersed with lithographed plates and small wood-engraved illustrations, he expresses his interests in its people, cities and countryside. In describing the cities, public buildings and places of interest especially, he shows himself a keen observer, though he does not neglect to stress their historic Dutch roots. The plates are by the leading lithographers Emerik and Binger in Haarlem, and the wood-engravings finely executed by Édouard Vermorcken (1820–1906) of Antwerp and Brussels.

Interesting work discussing the theory that the Iroquois chief and Indian missionary Eleazer Williams (ca. 1789–1858) was really the lost Dauphin Louis xVII. It was written by Augusta de Grasse Stevens (1852–1894), novelist and correspondent of various New York newspapers.

The Canadian born Eleazar Williams was the son of a St. Regis Mohawk Indian, Thomas Williams, and his wife, Mary Ann Kenewatsenri. He served as a missionary of the Episcopal Church to the Oneida Indians. "The Indians eventually repudiated his leadership, however, and as early as 1839 Williams began his pretensions that he was the Lost Dauphin of France, Louis XVIII. … Williams promised his friends many royal favors when his wrong had been righted; but, doomed to defeat, he died in poverty and obscurity at Hogansburg, NY" (*Dictionary of Wisconsin History*).

Lacking half-title but otherwise in good condition. Hinges weak and endpapers browned. Important work for the history of Wisconsin and the Oneida.

First edition of Lambrecht's account of the Dutch colony in America up to its cession to England in 1674, as well as an account of the fate of the Dutch settlers after the British takeover. It covers the discovery and exploration of the regions around present-day New York, the Dutch relations with the English colonies in Virginia and Massachusetts Bay, and the English takeover. New York was beginning to establish itself as America's leading city in the early nineteenth century, and a growing interest in its history made the history of the Dutch colony topical. The folding map, entitled "Kaart van Nieuw-Nederland" combines an up-to-date cartographic image based on Aaron Arrowsmith's 1804 Map of America, with historical data from maps in Arent Roggeveen's 1675 sea atlas and Arnoldus Montanus's 1671 atlas of America.

In 1817 Lambrechtsen (1752–1823) was made an honorary member of the New York Historical Society, which published an English translation of his book in 1841.

With occasional minor foxing, but otherwise in fine condition with the final integral blank leaf and virtually untrimmed. The sprinkled paper wrappers, covering only the sides, remain in very good condition, but the spine retains only tattered parts of the original paper spine with the printed title, leaving the sewing and the folds of the quires partly visible. One of the first French accounts of the American Revolutionary War for independence

First edition (volume I in the present copy with the title-page in a variant state (with the year "1785" misprinted, the numbers I and 7 are tilted to the right and the 8 is on its side)), printed and published in Paris, of a famous and important history of the American Revolution, by Pierre Charpentier de Longchamps (1740–1812).

Although the title promises the description of all the wars raging in the four parts of the world, the work concentrates on the American Revolutionary War, or American War of Independence. The larger part relates to the military operations in North America, primarily the French and British activities.

In addition to the war in the North American colonies, the book describes the French attacks on the English in the Caribbean, India and Gibraltar. Variant issue (with the year '1785' misprinted on the first title-page) of the original Paris edition of this famous and important history of the American Revolution by Pierre Charpentier de Longchamps (1740–1812). Another page-for-page reprint appeared in Amsterdam in the same year, followed by several other editions and translations, including a Spanish translation in 1793.



First edition of the Dutch translation of a brief biography of Benjamin Franklin (1706–1790), translated from the popular French edition by the historian François Auguste Marie Mignet (1796–1884). It chronologically describes Franklin's life, starting with his parents and his youth, paying special attentions to his religion and virtues, and furthermore describing his scientific and political activities. The first chapter, however, informs the reader on the lessons that can be drawn from Franklin's life.



First and only edition of the Dutch translation of a travel account by the German traveller, artist and writer Heinrich Baldwin Möllhausen (1825–1905) translated by Hendrik Carel Michaëlis (1818–1896). "Möllhausen, in the capacity of artist and naturalist, accompanied the expedition sent out under Amiel Weeks Whipple ... for the preliminary survey of a railway route to the Pacific Ocean. He particularly devoted himself to a study of the Indians and their antiquities. The route followed was from Forth Smith in Arkansas across New Mexico and the Indian territories to the California coast at San Pedro" (Hill). The preface is written by Alexander von Humboldt, a friend and patron of Möllhausen. The plates show views of buffalo around column-like sandstone buttes in the northwest Texas prairie and hunters with mules in the petrified forest in New Mexico's Rio Secco valley. The views (drawn by the author) and map (drawn by Henry Lange) were printed for the German edition and retain their German captions.

Modern bookplates on paste-downs. With some mostly marginal foxing in the plates and adjacent leaves, but otherwise in very good condition. Binding with minor traces of wear. Dutch edition of the "experiences and observations of the author while with the Whipple expedition, of which this is the best account" (Howes).

First English edition of a part of De Montulé's *Voyage en Amérique, en Italie, en Sicile et en Egypte, pendant les années 1816, 1817, 1818 et 1819*, which was written in the form of series of 77 letters and which was also published in 1821. Of the original collection of 77 letters, the present translation comprises 19 letters in which the author relates of his visits to New York (with a very nice view of the city seen from the West with a steam-boat in the foreground), Philadelphia (including the aquatint plate of the mammoth, exhibited in the Philadelphia National History museum), St. Thomas (2 letters), St. Domingo (2 letters), Port Royal, Jamaica, Kingston, Jamaica (3 letters), the Mississippi (on board the ship *Vesuvius*, 3 letters), Louisville (on the Ohio), Pittsburg, Buffaloe (with the plate depicting Niagara Falls) and Albany. On his travels, the author studied the culture of tobacco, sugar, cotton and wheat. Spine restored; occasionally slightly foxed; binding rubbed. First edition of the Dutch translation of Parry's account of his voyage in search of the Northwest Passage. Having sailed to the Arctic under John Ross, the English naval officer William Edward Parry (1790–1855) believed that Lancaster Sound could provide the opening to the western sea. Equipped with two ships, the *Hecla* and the *Gripper*, he set out to confirm his suspicion in 1819. Parry discovered Prince Regent's Inlet, Melville Sound, and Banks Island, and surveyed the south shores of Barrow Strait. He reached 110° West longitude, but ice halted further westward advance. Parry commanded two further expeditions to the Arctic. "The immediate achievements of these voyages were the charting of hundreds of miles of coastline in the Canadian Arctic archipelago and the collecting of valuable data on Arctic natural history" (Hill).




First edition of the Dutch translation of Portlock's account of "the first commercial voyage to the northwest coast [of America] and the first English voyage to visit Hawaii after that of Captain James Cook" (Forbes). The object of the voyage was to trade furs between China and the northwest coast of America. The expedition was fitted out with two ships, the *King George* commanded by Portlock and the *Queen Charlotte* by George Dixon: both commanders had accompanied Captain Cook on his last voyage. They rounded Cape Horn and sailed for the northwest coast of America by way of Hawaii. The expedition cruised Cook Inlet and the Gulf of Alaska and the *King George* called three times at Hawaii, visiting Kealakekua, Aohu, Niihau, Kawaihae, Waimea and Kauai. The plates include an illustration of Hawaiian artefacts and a portrait of Hawaiian chief Kiana (here spelled "Tijaana") in feather cape and helmet.

First and only edition of a zoology textbook written for the German youth in Pennsylvania. The author, John Adam Reubelt (1819–1902), was concerned by the absence of an up-to-date introduction in zoology in German, thus he compiled the present work based on new English and German studies. The *Kurzgefaßtes Handbuch* deals with man, mammals, birds, amphibians, fish, vertebrate and invertrebrate animals, of which some are depicted in the numerous woodcuts.



First edition of an account of a voyage to the Arctic in search of John Franklin's expedition, led by John Richardson (1787–1865). He had joined John Franklin's Arctic expeditions of 1819–1822 and 1825–1827 as a surgeon and naturalist. Franklin left Britain again in 1845 to find a northwest passage, but he and his crew never returned. Richardson set sail in 1848 and returned late 1849, without result. They did, however, gather much new and very useful geographical information, and he gives an extensive description of various Inuit tribes and native inhabitants, especially from the Gwich'in (Kutchin) tribe, which are shown in most of the plates. The second volume contains an extensive appendix devoted to the physical geography, climatology, flora, insects and "the eskimo vocabulary", listing some words and brief sentences with the translation into two similar languages.

Text leaves in very good condition, only occasionally a small spot, some offsetting to the tissue leaves protecting the plates, and the map mounted on cloth. Binding rubbed along the extremities, hinges weak and partially cracked.



Rare first and only edition of a Dutch adaptation for children, of the account of the second voyage of captain John Ross (1777–1856) to the Arctic regions in search of a northwest passage. The plates depict Eskimos and other polar scenes. The original English edition was first published in 1835 as *Narrative of a second voyage in search of a North-West passage*; a German edition appeared in the same year. In the present Dutch edition, the journals of Ross, his companion William Light and several other accounts have been adapted into one narrative.



Extremely rare first edition of a list of Dutch data concerning the whaling trade in and around Greenland, compiled by Gerrit van Sante (1728–1779). The book was designed with blank spance to add new data in the years following 1753. The present copy has been updated, probably by the first owner, till the year 1761. Besides the names of the commanders for every Dutch voyage to Greenland and the Davis Strait and the names of the directors for whom they sailed, it also includes an annual record of the number of whales caught, tonnes of blubber and barrels of whale oil, both for each commander individually and for the industry as a whole. "Van Sante understood completely the enormous economic importance of whaling for the Netherlands, and mentions the results of every voyage of every ship" (Catalogue library of G.J. Honig). "Greenland" is broadly interpreted to include the waters around Spitsbergen and Jan Mayen Island, and the Davis Strait fleets (fishing between Greenland and America) are not separately recorded until 1719.

Dutch translation of an extensive description by the Scottish James Stuart of his three year-travel to North-America from August 1828 to April 1831. In three volumes, translated from the third English edition of 1833, he describes several cities and other important sites in North America. He begins at New York City and travels on to, among others, Albany, Auburn, Buffalo and the Niagara Falls, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Alabama, New Orleans, the Mississippi River and the state of Ohio. Stuart describes his travel and the places he saw along his way in all their facets, discussing American education, agriculture and commercial trade, but also governmental issues, religion and slavery. This account is riddled with fascinating historical events that happened during his stay.

Rare second edition of "the first general (as distinguished from hospital) 'pharmacopoeia' compiled by an American" (Cowen), first published at Paris in 1798. The first part of the book is a classification of diseases, and is taken word for word from the influential 1769 nosology by the Scottish physician William Cullen. The second part is a pharmacopoeia, divided into materia medica and composite medicines. The introduction notes that it is based on the author's notes made at the University of Edinburgh, the London pharmacopoeia and Joseph Townsend's *The physicians' vade mecum* (1794) (p. x). Between the two parts can be found a list translating the Latin names of the chemical preparations, "which not all readers will view as sufficiently legitimate" (p. 77) into the modern English and French nomenclature.

William Tazewell (d. 1832) was an American physician who had studied in Edinburgh and in 1797–1800 was secretary to Elbridge Gerry in Paris. After returning to the United States, Tazewell set up a medical practice in Williamsburg and later moved to Virginia. In 1803 he presented copies of his *Vade-mecum* to George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, the latter writing that "it has really brought the whole science of diseases & remedies within the shortest compass possible, and, not meddling with the details of the science himself, it presents exactly such a general view of every part of it, as [Jefferson] often wishes to take" (Cowen).

First edition of the German translation by Johann Friedrich Wilhelm Herbst of George Vancouver's famous account of his exploration of the northwest coast of America and east coast of Asia. "This voyage became one of the most important made in the interests of geographical knowledge" (Hill). George Vancouver (1757–1798), who had participated in the second and third voyages of James Cook, was commissioned by the English monarch to continue the exploration of the northwest coast of America. He was made commander of a grand-scale expedition to reclaim Britain's rights resulting from the Nootka Convention, at Nootka Sound, to thoroughly examine the coast south of the 60th parallel in order to find a possible passage to the Atlantic. Vancouver put an end to the delusion that the subarctic seas in the direction of Greenland could be reached from Nootka Sound or any of the inlets in its vicinity and his description of the Port of San Francisco and the coasts of California in Spanish hands is most interesting. "This work ranks with the voyages of Cook and La Pérouse among the most important of the 18th and 19th centuries" (Cox). In very good condition, only slightly browned. Second French edition of an early description of Canada and the eastern part of the United States. The Irishman Isaac Weld (1774–1856) spent over two years in North America researching the suitability of the countryside for large-scale immigration of Irish citizens. Departing from Philadelphia in 1795 and guided by Indians he made his way through dense woodlands and along rivers. On the way he visited several cities where he saw much of the best society, and made the acquaintance of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. In 1799 he published his travel book, which went through several English editions and was translated into French (An 8 [1799/1800]), German and Dutch. The present edition is illustrated with 11 plates by the Paris engraver Louis François Mariage (active 1785–1811), chiefly depicting natural scenery, including Niagara Falls. Also included is an interesting early map of Canada and the northern part of the United States showing Weld's travel route. Although his book met some opposition in North America itself – mainly because of his general lack of sympathy with the American patriots – his descriptions were influential because they were relatively early and were long included in compilations of travellers' reports on the United States in this period.
