


The thing I love most about dealing with rare and collectible books is that they come with stories. Stories of being a treasured first edition, or having plates or a binding that make them unique. We are most entranced by those that have an interesting association or provenance, books with notes in the margins, with interesting inscriptions, with ephemera loosely laid in that contribute to our knowing something about the particular copy we hold in our hands.

It has been a pleasure to include such books in this year's winter catalogue. The headline above was whimsically drawn from our first edition of *Dead Man's Ghost* by E. J. Atkinson (p.2). Not only does this copy come with a signed personal note in the form of a review of the work from Jack Lindsay, but it also contains an amusing note by Hugh McCrae describing an incident of attempted book theft. Visit us at the Melbourne Rare Book Fair to view the note and discover how the "predatory collector" was foiled.

These days we avoid books with library stamps, but when the book is gifted to The Working Man's College Library by the daughter of Charles Darwin and wife of the college founder, we take note. When the same book is inscribed to Darwin's daughter by the poetess whose husband lectures at the College, and when the poetess and the lecturer are grandparents of two more well known British authors, we get giddy and decide the library stamps are an important part of this book's history. You will find the *Poems of Henrietta A. Huxley: with three of Thomas Henry Huxley* on page 16.

Most of the items in this catalogue are first edition literature & poetry, several are signed or inscribed and some, such as the two above, have unique stories to tell.

We also include a selection of Situationist and Paris







The Dead Man's Ghost

A blank-verse tragedy in one act. Melbourne: Edward A. Vidler, 1925. First Edition, First Printing. Softcover: [iv] [5] 6-55 [56] [2]: tan paper covers with french flaps, lettered in brown to top cover between parallel double ruled borders in brown: ALS from Jack Lindsay and AN from Hugh McCrae (to whom the book is dedicated) tipped in at the first two blanks. Half the paper spine missing; edgewear to covers. Good.

Atkinson was well regarded by Jack Lindsay whose autograph signed letter acknowledges a copy of the book and provides a positive review: "...It seems to the best of your blank verse...certain lines and phrases struck me as particularly felicitous... the whole description of the murder - but piecemeal criticism does not get very far, and the whole dramatic conception of the possession of the murderer is psychologically profound. The murderer is really the victim of the murdered..."



The autograph note by Hugh McCrae, to whom the book is dedicated, recounts an amusing story which concerns Atkinson's copy of "Theocritus" and its attempted theft by a predatory collector.

E.J. Rupert Atkinson (1881 - 1961) was the son of Victorian surgeon and landowner Dr Harry Leigh Atkinson. After his father passed away he inherited a large estate and, abandoning his own medical studies, he became a gentleman of leisure and of letters. Atkinson wrote mainly poetry and plays, was a friend of Hugh McCrae's, and was associated with E. A. Vidler (who published most of his plays). (ADB online) (14285) \$750.00





One of only 200 printed at the Experimental Art Foundation, Adelaide. The AEAF (1974–2016) was founded in Adelaide by a small group of artists, curators and theorists, with a mission to promote art that interrogated the status quo, was only incidentally aesthetic, and, by definition, was radical.

This literary magazine emerged during the latter part of Joh Bjelke Petersen's premiership of the state of Queensland. A time when artists were censored, and many talented creatives made for Sydney and Melbourne. The purpose



of Chimera was to be supportive of and actively encourage local Brisbane writers and artists. Possibly a complete run of this early 1980's Brisbane publication. Only two institutional holdings (QLD and NSW), neither of which run past Vol.9.

Note: The name changed slightly at the double issue 5&6 from "Chimera Literary Magazine" to "Chimera Brisbane Literature & Art Magazine". This changed again at No. 7 to "Chimera Brisbane's Literature, Art, Humour Magazine" and then at No.9 it dropped the "humour" to become "Chimera Brisbane's Literature, Art, Magazine".



Robert Crawford was a minor poet of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. He was held in some regard by A.G. Stephens who once suggested he might find his audience in the twenty-first century. This remains to be seen, but as yet there has been no resurgent interest in his verse.

The Leafy Bliss is Crawfords second collection. Although issued as No.1, subsequent issues appear non-existent and this issue held by only two institutions worldwide [Worldcat]. (14782) \$330.00

A complete run of the early issues of this annual in original decorated wrappers. After the appearance of these five pre-war issues the literary annual of the University of Adelaide Union was suspended between 1940 and 1945 after which a further four issues appeared. Phoenix is seen as a precursor to the Angry Penguins magazine that started in 1940.

These five issues contain verse and short stories and





Emerald 1925". Nettie and her writer husband Vance lived in Emerald between 1915-17 and 1919-1925. There is also the poem 'In May' by William H. 




Billy Jones (1935-2012) was a Queensland based poet and artist who often marked his copies of books with copious underlining, symbols and marginalia. He was less inclined to do so with poetry collections that had been inscribed to him, such as this one from Sharkey. (3692) \$20.00

Printed in England, this was Melbourne-born Williamson's first poetry collection. Purple and Gold were the colours of Wesley College in Melbourne where Williamson spent a good portion of his teaching career.

The verse penned to the front free endpaper does not appear in the text and is signed and dated 1914. Nor do the lines on the verso of the postcard appear in the text. This would appear to have been inserted later as it anticipates his 60th birthday which he would not celebrate until January 1925. Williamson appears to have dashed off the lines in anticipation of reaching "three-score", initialled the verse, and then subtitled





it, "Verses expected from Maries Pitt and Bernard O'Dowd on my 60th Birthday". The three of them, Williamson, Pitt and O'Dowd, had all belonged to the Melbourne discussion group "The Heretics".

This copy inscribed to John Garibaldi Roberts, a book loving public servant who, together with his wife, maintained a country home, "Sunnyside", set among the hills at South Sassafras (now Kallista) about 40 kilometres from Melbourne in the Dandenong Ranges. They were in the habit of inviting members of Melbourne's literary and artistic circles to Sunnyside for the weekend. C.J. Dennis finished writing the Sentimental Bloke there and Hal Gye was another regular visitor. [Miller/Macartney, p.394]. (14733) \$500.00

At the time of publishing these poems Jane Harris was a writer, reformist and Christian Spiritualist with a growing reputation in New Zealand. She was also a widow and a bereaved mother having lost two children in infancy (she was to lose a third son in a factory incident when he was only sixteen).

"John Rous" is McCrae's only novel. Better known for his poetry and sometimes called 'the father of Victorian poetry' (ADB online), he was an early member of the Yorrick Club, Victoria's literary club founded in the late 1860s for the mutual encouragement and support of its members.









This copy is inscribed to Evelyn John Rupert Atkinson and dated 1923 in Hawthorn. Atkinson was a close friend of George's poet son Hugh McCrae. This copy was likely inscribed to Atkinson around the time he and Hugh were devising a theatre/cinema project titled The Ship of Heaven.

A single correction is to be found on p.109.

McCrae has struck out the word "spanker" in the phrase, "...the lazy guy of the spanker boom" and written in the margin "latteen-" (sic). The corrected phrase reads "...the lazy guy of the latteen-boom". A lateen is a triangular sail set on a long yard mounted at an angle on the mast, and running in a fore-and-aft direction. The very scarce true first printing of this major Australian writer's seventh novel. Although Stead's work was received enthusiastically overseas, especially in America, she was initially largely ignored in her home country Australia with none of her

she was initially largely ignored in her home country Australia with none of her works being published here until 1965. Her outstanding work was eventually recognised formally and she was created a Fellow of the Australian National University in 1969 and in 1974 she was the first recipient of the Patrick White Award. In 1982 she won the NSW Premier's award for services to Australian Literature and was elected to honorary membership of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters. (6260) \$200.00



The author's last novel published before her death was marketed as a story about a "liberated" woman although most critics have not viewed it in that light and see the heroine as a rather misguided individual. Despite being fairly critical of the novel, Lidoff in her biography states that "it shows in flashes some of that singular Stead genius." The copy is in excellent condition. (11620) \$150.00




White's fourth novel and the winner of the Australian Literature Society's Gold Medal. The first UK printing published in April 1956 some eight months after the American printing. According to Hubber/Smith the British publication was a photolithographic reprint of the American edition. (14267) \$200.00

Dudley Raymond Barker (1910-1980) was a British journalist, editor and author of fiction, nonfiction, and literary essays. He was born in London and educated at Oxford and served in the RAF during WWII. He married Muriel Griffiths in 1935 and worked as a journalist and literary agent before becoming a full-time freelance writer in 1965. As well as writing under his own name he penned a series of crime fiction novels under the *nom de plume* Lionel Black and a few as Anthony Matthews.
