



Very rare album with four beautiful hand-coloured aquatint views to Alberti's ethnographic monograph on the Xhosa people ("Kaffers"), of South Africa, together with both the first edition, in Dutch, as the first edition of the French translation of this monograph. Even though the plates are mentioned in the preface of the text volume, they are rarely found together. All the plates are brightly coloured and remarkably fresh and lively, evoking the beauty of the African landscape and the culture of the Xhosa.



Lodewyk Alberti (1768–1812) came to the Netherlands in 1784 as lieutenant in the Dutch army, and left for the Cape in 1802. He successfully kept the peace between Xhosas, Khoisan and European colonists, but conflicts flared up soon after he left in 1806. He describes the situation and climate of Caffria, as well as the appearance and physical strength of the Xhosa, but mainly focuses on their culture.

Ad I: small tear in the text leaf of atlas, but restored, plates fine except for a tiny blemish on the first plate; ad 2: slightly browned, and recased, as noted; ad 3; some sentences marked in pencil the margins and an occasional annotation, plates slightly browned and binding rubbed along the extremities. Very good set.

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

Rare early edition of a popular book of botanical, mineralogical, and zoological wonders, with a large woodcut of the author among his books



Rare early edition (one of perhaps four or five early editions with the main text set in a roman type) of two works written ca. 1300 by an unidentified follower of Albertus Magnus concerning the extraordinary properties (magical, astrological, medicinal, etc.) of 16 plants, 45 minerals or gems and 18 animals (including many birds), and concerning the "wonders of the world". The first includes means to become invisible, feel no pain, arouse love, interpret dreams and make prophesies. The second includes mental manipulation of matter, cures for diseases, magic made with fire or light, means of breaking charms, and seeing the future in dreams. The woodcut is remarkable for its depiction of both numerous books with bosses, clasps, etc., and numerous accoutrements, such as a wedge-shaped book stand, a copy stand in the form of a four-sided pyramid on a pedestal, pens, ink wells and penknives. Senna used it again in 1504 on the title-page of John Pecham's Perspectiva communis. Though this edition, like many others, attributes the works to Albertus Magnus (ca. 1194?–1280) on the title-page and at the end of the texts, the attribution is believed to be spurious. An attribution to his follower Henry of Saxony (d. ca. 1378) has also been challenged.

With a faded inscription in red ink below the colophon, in a 16th-century italic hand. With the engraved armorial bookplate of James, Earl of Southesk, on the front pastedown. With a short worm trail at the head of the last 2 leaves, and a small marginal chip (repaired) and tear, neither approaching the text, but otherwise in very good condition. The binding shows some small minor blemishes and its spine is slightly faded, but it is otherwise fine. A rare early edition of a popular book of botanical, mineral and zoological wonders.

Album amicorum of a settler in Australia and his family, with rare photographs of Queensland (Australia) and India in the 1870s. The photographs in the album are extraordinary, especially those of the small town of Springsure. In 1841, the first photograph was taken in Australia, of Bridge Street in Sydney. While explorers and early colonists quickly became a subject of interest for Australian photographers, photographs of early settlements are quite rare. The photographs of the government house in Calcutta and the crew of the H.M.S. Narcissus in the album are also of historical interest. Together with the numerous drawings, paintings and poems, the


album offers a fascinating insight into life in Queensland in the late 19th century.

Charles Shortt Dicken (1841–1902) was born in India. He was a lieutenant for the Royal Irish Fusiliers, before he settled in Queensland in 1864. He

Charles Shortt Dicken (1841–1902) was born in India. He was a lieutenant for the Royal Irish Fusiliers, before he settled in Queensland in 1864. He entered the mounted police in 1866 and worked as a police magistrate until he was appointed secretary in the office of the Agent-General for Queensland in London in 1880. When he retired from this position in 1891, he received the title C.M.G, Companion in the Order of Saint Michael and Saint George. This is awarded to those who render extraordinary or important non-military service to the United Kingdom in a foreign or Commonwealth country. In the final years of his life, he contributed to *The British Empire series*, a series of four volumes which aimed to offer trusthworthy information about the colonies and settlement of the British Empire. Dicken was a co-author of *volume IV – Australasia*, published in 1900.

The cloth is worn at the head of the spine and shows a few small holes on the boards, revealing the leather album beneath. The illustration of the "execution of Mary, Queen of Scots" is missing on leaf [12]. Some of the dried plants are falling off. The edges and corners of the leaves show some signs of wear, the leaves slightly browned. Overall in good condition, the photographs, artworks and other decorations are very well preserved.

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

First Spanish edition of the first emblem book, expanding the earlier editions to the nearly definitive form, with 200 woodcut emblems

Rouille issue of the first Spanish edition of the first emblem book, by the legal scholar Andrea Alciato (1492–1550) in Milan, first published in Latin at Augsburg in 1531 with only 104 emblems (97 with woodcuts), but greatly expanded up to the author's death. The present edition has more emblems and more woodcuts than any earlier edition, also more than the French and Italian editions by the same publishers in the same year and more than the competing editions by De Tournes. It brings the work nearly to its definitive form. Alciato not only produced a work that was to continue through hundreds of editions over the centuries, he invented a whole new genre, the emblem book, which combines allegorical images with a brief motto that aims to give the core of the idea and explanatory text (here in verse), the combination of text and image intended to give more meaning to both and to encourage contemplation by the reader. In most respects, the present Spanish edition follows the 1548 Latin edition but Bernardino Daza who translated it into Spanish claimed to have followed a printed copy with corrections in Alciato's hand, making the present Spanish text an essential source for the author's intentions, rather than just a translation. With several early owners' inscriptions, some struck through; a ca. 1815 bookseller's engraved on salmon-coloured paper; and an engraved armorial bookplate. Lacking the final blank leaf R4. As in many copies, the descender of the 9 in the imprint date "1549" has not printed, so that the date looks like "1540". Occasional and mostly marginal stains and a few marginal reinforcements. In spite of these defects, most leaves are in good or very good condition.

Contemporary(?) black, red and gold painted and lacquered leather over paper and cloth. The painted sides show floral designs in black and gold on a red background, in a black border with red wave designs. With remnants of leather on the brown cloth spine. € 38 000

An extremely rare early 17th-century Turkestani example of the famous Sunni prayerbook "Dala'il al-khayrat": an Arabic manuscript written in what is today Xinjiang, China. The *Dala'il al-khayrat* ("Waymarks of benefits" or "Proofs of good deeds"), an extensive book of poems in praise of the Prophet Muhammad, was compiled by the Moroccan Sufi scholar Muhammad ibn Sulaiman al-Jazuli (807–870 AH / 1405–1465 CE) and was quickly received throughout the Islamic world, functioning as a kind of Muslim catechism. The present manuscript, written in so distant an Islamic community as that of Eastern Turkestan, a territory dominated throughout by Mongols or Chinese, where Muslims were commonly viewed as strangers, gives striking evidence of the range and scope of a tradition lasting for almost six centuries: the utopia of Islam as the religion of oneness, aiming to unite all the Muslim peoples in a single community reaching from Europe to the Far East. Occasional notes and/or corrections in the margins. With 4 leaves (pp. 12–19) that



were not originally part of the manuscript, consisting of Arabic text written on lilac-lined (printed) white paper with Chinese characters in the head margins of the pages. The numbering in Western Arabic numerals is most likely not contemporary, since the inserted pages are included in the consecutive page-numbering. With some annotations, some in Chinese characters on the front paste-down. The spine is worn, without affecting the integrity of the binding, the boards are somewhat worn but the painted designs remain clearly visible, edges somewhat frayed, the leaves are somewhat browned and stained, mainly finger staining in the bottom outer corners, showing the manuscript's popularity in extensive use. Otherwise the text is still very clearly legible and the whole is altogether well preserved.



A complete copy of an extremely rare astrological work, with all 5 astrological models with volvelles, here in the expurgated third edition. The models with volvelles show the positions of constellations and zodiac signs in different months and/or years. The accompanying text explains how to use and interpret them. According to Brunet, the volvelles in the present edition are more accurate than the earlier ones. The first edition of this work, published in 1654, contained predictions for the fate of various empires, kingdoms and religions of the 17th century, including controversial predictions that a quarter of the world would be Islamic by 1703 and that England would be wiped out in 1884. After some pressure by the



English ambassador, the work was forbidden by the Breton government and the majority of the copies were burned. Nevertheless, a second edition appeared in 1654 and a third in 1658. These were heavily edited and purposefully omit the 7 pages of predictions and 5 additional volvelles. Instead, a short introduction is added, in which the first astrological model is explained in detail. Franciscus Allaeus (1588–1678), a Capuchin friar, used astrology to try and predict the future, instead of explaining the past and present. In doing so, he contradicted the important principles of free will and divine providence, making it a problematic publication.

With a small library label on the front pastedown, two owner's inscriptions and a library stamp on the title-page and a library stamp on the first page, manuscript annotations in the margins of pages [1], [4] and on the final page. The edges of the boards are scuffed and the paste paper is somewhat rubbed, the foot of the spine is slightly damaged. With a water stain in the top outer corner of the first 6 and last 13 leaves, slightly affecting the engraving in the text, very slightly browned throughout, a small tear in the middle of the first leaf of ad 2, without loss of text, figure 2 in ad 1 lacks the red string, the outer edges of the models with volvelles have been folded inwards and reinforced with light blue paper, the final leaf of ad 3 is stained and worn and lacking the outer corners, with some loss of text. Figure 1 is mis-bound at the start of ad 3, lacking the final blank leaf. Otherwise in good condition.

Ad 1: First edition of an encyclopaedic work by the German theologian Johann Valentin Andreae (1586–1654), who called it a Christian fable book. It is divided into three "books" which are divided into several "manipuli". Each "manipulus" combines longer essays with shorter pieces or sentences on various subjects and historical figures, arranged alphabetically. For example, the first manipulus contains brief texts on alchemy, antipathy, the Arabic language, Johann Arndt, astrology, oppression, Tommaso Campanella, cardinals, illiterates, kabbalah, patience, symbols, weeds, etc.

Ad 2: First edition of a theological work by the Dutch Remonstrant Timan van Gessel (Timannus Gesselius, ca. 1591–1664). It contains five chapters, the first dealing with the holy scripture, the second with the "modern" church, the third and fourth with the creed, the fifth with peace.

Ad 1: the engraved title-page is slightly damaged at the fore-edge margin, slightly browned; **ad 2:** with the name of the author added in ink on title-page, s small stain at the foot of title-page, a few faint marginal water stains in the last few leaves. Some faint stains on boards. Otherwise in very good condition.

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Very early manuscript treatise about the fatwa

Lengthy and well preserved 13th century Arabic manuscript law book on the fatwa, produced in the Levant by an anonymous author. A fatwa is legal advice given by a Muslim authority on request, with the purpose of resolving a religious or legal problem that has arisen among members of Islam. The person who gives the legal information is familiar with Islamic jurisprudence (*fiqh*) and is referred to as a *mufti*; the one who

asks for legal advice is called


Mustaftī. According to the famed 13th-century Islamic jurist Ibn al-Qaayyim al-Jawziya mufti were "God's agents". The present anonymous work seems to treat the jurisprudence of the fatwa itself, rather than declaring fatwa on something. The title means "The book of (kitab) analisys or understanding (al-waaqi) of the fatwa (fi'l-Fatawi)". As described in the book itself this is the first volume of an unknown total.

Fatwas were produced by jurists from the 10th century onward and in the 13th century, when the present copy was made, several important Islamic lawbooks were compiled in India at the Sultanate of Delhi.

Binding a bit short. Shelf marks on the front pastedown. Later annotations on the 19th century front endpapers. First leaf repaired. A few minor holes throughout, paper browned, 2 quires in the middle detached. Otherwise in remarkably good condition for its age.

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
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Very important collection of essays and other texts marking the establishment of archaeology and philology as serious scientific disciplines. While still drawing from the experience and works of "antiquarians" who studied antiquity in a more amateurish and occasional way, the authors of the present works attempted to work more methodically towards greater discoveries. This renewed interest in antiquity and the move to studying it in a more scientific way came as a result of several major 18th-century discoveries like the Herculaneum (1709), Pompeii (1748) and the Rosetta Stone (1799, see ad 4). Naturally, Egyptology is also a well-represented subject in the present work. It includes a fabulous depiction and detailed description and explanation of the Nile mosaic of Palestrina (ad 5), a floor mosaic depicting the flow of the river Nile from the Blue Nile in Ethiopia to the Mediterranean Sea. Additionally, the study of hieroglyphs and differing views on deciphering the Ancient Egyptian scripts can be found in ads 3 and 4. Philology, in this case the study of language in written historical sources (not in oral ones), is a returning subject in many of the essays in the present work, including the Christie's auction catalogue, since it comprises a list of written historical sources in the form of oriental (especially Ethiopic) manuscripts collected by James Bruce. Four works by the abbot and scholar Jean-Jacques Barthélemy (1716–1795) are also included. He was the first to decipher two alphabets of ancient extinct languages: Palmyrene and Phoenician. His works also include descriptions, depictions and explanations of Phoenician medals and the collection of texts in the present volume ends with an engraved example of the Phoenician alphabet.



The monogram on the binding (based on Louis xIV's but with a count's crown instead of the royal crown) suggests that the collection was bound for a (Bourbon?) Count (Louis?) in the mid-19th century. First edition of the extraordinary coloured plates of quadrupeds by the well-known French-American naturalist and painter John James Audubon (1785–1851), who, for this publication, worked together with his sons John Woodhouse and Victor Audubon. The plates are considered the finest animal prints published in America to this day. Unlike the *Birds of America*, it was produced entirely in the United States, making it the "largest successful color plate book project of 19th-century America" (Reese).

After the publication of his highly acclaimed Birds of America, Audubon settled on the Hudson River and began working on the present series to document the animal life of North America. The plates were first published in 30 parts of 5 plates each and three separately published accompanying text volumes, written by John Bachman, appeared between 1846-1854. A second edition was published in 1856, but "the first edition is by far the best" (Sabin). Title-pages with some small scuff marks, a few plates with minor unobtrusively repaired tears along the edges. Binding skilfully restored. Complete set, with most plates in fine condition.



First edition of this beautifully illustrated Dutch translation of the influential Luther Bible, with the engraved title-page, all plates and a large tailpiece expertly contemporary hand-coloured and strikingly highlighted in gold. This edition is also known as the "Visscher Bible", after its translator. It is certain that Visscher based his translation on Luther's original bible and the two known Dutch translations: the "Lotter Bible" by Bugenhagen (1554) and the "Biestkens Bible" (1560). Apparently, Visscher did not use the new and by then already renowned Dutch States translation and did not want to change Luther's original translation, which unfortunately resulted in a difficult to read work. Nevertheless, this became the standard Bible of the Dutch Lutherans. (Darlow & Moule). The present work was illustrated with engraved maps by Nicolaes Visscher (1618–1679) after his father Claes Jansz. Visscher (1587–1652) and a complete series of Mattheüs Merian the Elder's (1593–1650) reduced scenes engraved by Cornelis Danckerts (1603–1656). These two sets of engraved plates were published separately for the purpose of being added to Bibles such as the present one, or the Dutch States Bible for example. The illustrations are expertly hand-coloured and all highlighted in gold.

With the small bookplate of Jan Willem Six de Vromade (1872–1936) on the front paste-down. 

First separately published edition of Boothby's description of Madagascar and its opportunities for trade and colonization, detailing the trade with India, Persia (including Ormuz, captured in 1622 by a joint Anglo-Persian force) and other countries along the Arabian Sea and touching on a large variety of subjects including Saint Augustine's harbour, culture of the natives, opportunities for plantations, natural resources, pearl fishery and trading practices of the English, Portuguese, Spanish and Dutch.

The British merchant Richard Boothby had reinvested his capital in the East India Company around 1615, after which he sailed to India where he was jailed as a result of a dispute with company officials. Upon his release he returned to London by way of Madagascar, which inspired his enthusiasm so much that he wrote the present book advising the East India Company's rivals to take advantage of it as the ideal location for a European colony.

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

Very rare first edition of the first emblem book, written and compiled by a Spanish author in Spanish with Latin mottos, the first work of this kind to be printed in Bohemia. Juan de Borja y Castro (1533–1606) was a Spanish noble from the renowned House of Borja (Borgia). Borja was a distinguished diplomat, first acting as a substitute for the Portuguese ambassador and in 1576 moving to Prague as the Spanish ambassador to Emperor Rudolph 11 of the Holy Roman Empire, where he stayed until 1581. Upon his return to Spain, he was named head "majordomo" of Maria de Austria, acting as the head of her household staff until 1603. The Empresas morales is Juan de Borja's only known literary work. A second edition was published in Brussels in 1680 by Borja's grandson, Francisco, who added 124 emblems claimed to have come from among the original author's papers. At the end of the 17th century, in 1697, a Latin translation by L. Camerarius was published in Berlin, while a German translation by Georg Friedrich Scharff had appeared a few years earlier (1693), also in Berlin.

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




The present copy contains only one cancel engraving on leaf 91, instead of the 8 cancels noted by Landwehr in the Glasgow University copy and instead of the 6 different cancels noted in the description of the Getty Research Institute copy. The emblems in this very rare first edition of the first Spanish emblem book remain remarkable, especially these hand-coloured examples in the present work. With the bookplate of Arthur & Charlotte Vershbow on the front pastedown, a crossed out (owner's?) inscription on the engraved title-page and a crossed out IHS stamp on ll. AIT, A2T, and IT (= BIT). The vellum binding is slightly dust soiled and the manuscript title on the spine is slightly faded. The first blank flyleaf is missing, the gutter between the front paste-down and the engraved title-page is fragile, leaves I and IOI are nearly detached, the gutters of leaves B3–4 and B4-CI are reinforced, and some leaves are restored/reinforced in the margins without affecting the text. Leaves 3 and 84 show a hole in the centre of the leaf, affecting text and image and leaf 80 shows a large horizontal tear in head margin, slightly affecting the red frame, otherwise with some small tears in the margins of several leaves, barely affecting the text. Slight browning throughout, mainly to the first few leaves and the last 2/3rds of the work, and leaf 91 contains a cancelled illustration, with its correction mounted over it. Overall a remarkable copy of the very rare first Spanish emblem book, in contemporary colouring.

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

Rare first edition of the French translation of an important Jesuit account of the Far East by Antonio Francesco Cardim and an important account of the Malabar region in India by Francesco Barretto. Originally published in Italian, also in 1645, they here published together, translated by François Lahier.

Although the title of Cardim's work might suggest it discusses only Japan, it is especially important for its extensive accounts of Thailand and Vietnam, among the earliest we have, and also describes St. Paul's College in Macau, China, the first Western University in the Far East, where Cardim served as rector from 1632 to 1636. It covers the history, religions (notably Buddhism) and customs of the regions.

Barretto's account of Malabar "begins with a brief but informative discussion of conditions in Malabar, followed by a review of affairs in the missions to the St. Thomas Christians and to Cochin, Ceylon, Jaffna, Madura, Mannar, the Coromandel coast, and Bengal" (Lach & Van Kley). With some mostly minor and marginal water stains in the last quires, more serious in the last few leaves, leading to some damage and an old restoration in the last leaf with no loss of text. Binding a bit soiled and slightly wrinkled. Still a good copy of a rare work on the Far East and India.

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

First edition of a rare work about the Orient and the crusades

A rare and detailed 16th-century overview of the history of the Orient and the crusades. It consists of two parts. The first contains a geographical description of the far East, a short account of Muslim military history, and a history of the Mongols. As Centeno mentions in the introduction, this part is a translation of *La flor des estoires de la terre d'Orient* by Hayton of Corycus from 1307, which had never been printed in Spanish before. The second part details the history of the crusades and was written by Centeno himself. Hayton or Het'um, born in the 1240's, was the nephew of the king of Cilician Armenia. Little is known about his early life, except



that he was a general and fought extensively in the East. His work, written by request of Pope Clement v, became popular all over Europe. *La flor des estoires de la terre d'Orient* ends with a letter to pope Clement v with suggestions for a crusade to retake Jerusalem and parts of Cicilian Armenia. However, Centeno did not include this in his translation. Instead, he writes that it is important to know the history of the Holy Land before trying to recover it. The second part of the book therefore, is a short but complete account of the crusades, from the death of Godfrey of Bouillon until the deafeat of the crusaders in Egypt, including the reign of Baldwin, the fights against the Turks, Emperor Frederick's death, the battle of Arsuf, and the Baron's crusade from 1239–1241. Together with the first part, Centeno's work offers a fascinating and detailed history of the east, especially of the Holy Land, written from multiple perspectives.

With a manuscript owner's inscription ("D. Pedro Romer Conde") and a round stamp on the back of the title-page. The binding shows slight signs of wear. 


Extremely rare German account of Captain Cook's death, published in Tallinn in Estonia, "undoubtedly the first account of Cook's death to be published in book form" (Beddie), together with a letter concerning the 1775 Spanish voyage to the west coast of North America by Bodega y Quadra (1744–1794), also in German, with many references to Cook. The first work opens with a short poem on the death of the English navigator and hydrographer James Cook (1728–1779), who died during a scuffle with the Hawaiian natives on 14 February 1779, after his relations with them had deteriorated. It is followed by a foreword and short biography, also in German. Much of the information in this small booklet comes from a letter, which "includes paraphrases of passages in Captain Charles Clerke's letter to the Admirality, written at Kamchatka on June 8, 1779, announcing the death of Cook at Hawaii" (Forbes). Beyond the book's importance as the first published account of Cook's death, it also includes many passing references to the Hawaiian Islands. It ends with a laudatory poem on Cook's death, in English and German. In addition to the present edition in the original German, Albrecht published a French translation more or less simultaneously. The author of this account is uncertain, though it has been attributed to Georg Forster (1754–1794) or Johann Reinhold Forster (1729–1798), German natural scientists who accompanied Cook on his second voyage.

The second work in this volume, by the same publisher in matching format in the same year, is a letter concerning the 1775 voyage to the west coast of North America by the Spanish voyager Juan Francisco de la Bodega y Quadra. It contains many references to the voyages of Cook and is even rarer than the *Nachrichten*. Both works on Cook and the Pacific are rare, the *Briefe* (with only 1 copy in WorldCat) even rarer than the *Nachrichten*. We have found only one other copy of either in auction record (in fact the two works bound together).

A collection of 18 mostly unnumbered volumes of printed transcriptions of diplomatic correspondence, correspondence to and from British commissioners in the various courts, letters sent and received by judges in British vice-admiralty courts and naval officers at various South American, West African and Cape stations. Part of the reason for Britain's campaign to abolish the transatlantic slave trade in the 19th century was the establishment of several international tribunals of a continuing and more-or-less permanent nature to adjudicate upon vessels seized on suspicion of trading in African slaves after the trade had been declared illegal in the British Empire in 1807 (though slavery itself remained legal in most of the Empire until 1833). For all or part of the period from 1819 to 1871, mixed or joint commissions sat in Rio de Janeiro, Boa Vista (Cape Verde Islands), Suriname and Havana under treaties for

the suppression of the slave trade that Britain had signed with Portugal, Spain, the Netherlands, Brazil, the United States and several Spanish-American republics. Courts of mixed commissions were responsible for the condemnation of over 600 slave vessels and the liberation of nearly 80,000 slaves.

At least many of the volumes were issued both alone, without a volume number, and as part of two different series, with the volume numbers for both series on the title-page. 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

First edition in French, published one year after the first German edition, of the first work attributed to David Cranz, missionary in the Moravian United Brethren, best known for his 1765 description of Greenland. The present work gives a history of the United Brethren, their beliefs and their practices, both in Europe and in their missions in America. The church was established in 1457, but the book concentrates on its history since its establishment in Herrnhut (Saxony, near the Moravian border) under Count Nikolaus Ludwig von Zinzendorf in 1722. Under his guidance the church set up their mission in Greenland in 1733, and a 1747 act of Parliament under George 11 granted them permission to practice their religion freely in the British colonies in America. The illustrations show



ordination, induction, baptism, communion, marriage, exorcism, an agape feast and other activities in the Moravian Church, as well as their missionary work among black slaves in the West Indies (2 plates), American Indians (probably in Pennsylvania) and native Greenlanders.

With the gold-stamped leather armorial bookplate of Noé de Salvert. In very good condition, with occasion light marginal foxing. The beautiful binding by the deluxe binder Louis Guétant (active in Lyon ca. 1895—ca. 1920?) is in fine condition, with only a couple scratches on the back cover. 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

Very rare first edition of a Croatian translation of the popular comic novel *Le sottilissime astuzie di Bertoldo* by Giulio Cesare Croce, first published in 1606. Based on oral traditions, this highly popular novel told the story of the farmer Bertoldo, who is sometimes cunning and at other times stupid. In this Croatian version the translator "localized" the name of the main character to Nasreddin, thereby establishing a link with the famous 13th-century Turkish satirist Nasreddin Hodja, whose stories were well known in the Balkan region.

The translator, Nikola Palikuca from Prokljan (near Šibenik) was probably the pseudonym of a friar or nun. A second edition of the book was published in 1799 in Venice.



First edition of an interesting and detailed account of the first overland journey from Spain to the East Indies (1671–1680) by the Spanish missionary Pedro Cubero Sebastian. After spending time in Italy where he was appointed as a missionary to Asia and the East Indies, Cubero travelled by way of Istanbul and Moscow, to Iran, visiting Isfahan ("Hispaham") and Bandar Abbas, after which he finally arrived in India. After crossing to Malacca he was thrown in into prison by the Dutch and later banished from the city. He then proceeded to the Philippine Islands and then, by way of Mexico, back to Europe.

"By circumnavigating the globe in his travels, he was recognized in his own time to be another Magellan, Drake, or Cavendish" (Noonan).



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

This chronicle of the province of Madre de Deos in Goa is exceptionally rare and spans around 100 pages covering China, Macao, Cambodia and Ceylon. The text includes commentary on religion, including miraculous images, as well as the missionary activities



of the Capuchins in Asia and Goa. This makes the book all the more valuable since although there is a wealth of literature on the Jesuits in the region, much of the Capuchins' work remains relatively unknown. Furthermore, the book contains a yearly chronology from 1623 to 1679, which lists the names of the "guardians". The Capuchins established schools wherever they went, wrote books in vernacular languages, sought exchange with pagan scholars, and faced opposition from European traders, including the Portuguese.

The account commences with the arrival of the Franciscan missionaries in Goa in 1540 and provides comprehensive information on Kochi (Cochim), Damão, Chaul and Diu. The fourth chapter focuses on Capuchin activities in China and Macao, and provides an account of the Chinese empire, including commentary on construction, navigation, language, government and industry. Chapter 5 covers Malacca and Siam, and chapter 6 delves into Cambodia. In chapter 8, there are segments on Mozambique and Ceylon, along with a biography of a Capuchin who had travelled to Kaffir. Civezza describes the work as "the whole book is full of very interesting news and documents from our Missions in the Portuguese Indies, China, Concicina and Tonkin: a very rare and highly sought-after book".



Rare Fischer issue of the first edition of the surgical works of the surgeon, physician and professor of anatomy at the University of Padua, Girolamo Fabrici (1537–1619), his first published work, edited by his student Johann Hartman Beyer, who also contributed a seven-page preface. The book is divided into five numbered "libri" covering tumors, wounds, ulcers and fistulas, fractures and dislocations respectively, still influenced by the classic works of Hippocrates and Galen. Beyer apparently published these surgical works based on his notes of Fabrici's lectures and without his permission, and Fabrici was not pleased, but he tacitly acknowledged them with the publication of an addendum in 1619, the year of his death.

In 1594 Fabrici also built the University of Padua's anatomical theatre, which still survives. He studied under Gabriele Falloppio and published his own work on foetal development and especially the placenta in 1600. The English anatomist William Harvey came to Padua and studied under Fabrici, whose 1603 publication describing the valves of veins influenced Harvey's seminal work on blood circulation. Fabrici was also a celebrated surgeon, treating many Italian noblemen, including Carlo de' Medici, grandson, son and brother of the Grand Dukes of Tuscany.

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

First edition of a rare set of three biographies of João de Barros (1496–1570), Luís de Camões (ca. 1524–1580) and Diogo do Couto (ca. 1542–1616). Since it was written relatively shortly after their deaths, it is one of the earliest biographies of each of them. However, this work is most notable because it contains the first known portrait of De Camões. This portrait is very rare and often missing from other copies. João de Barros was one of the greatest Portuguese humanists and historians. He was a captain on a failed mission to colonise Brazil before he dedicated himself to writing the Décadas da Asia, a multi-volume work about the history of the Portuguese in India and the rest of Asia. Luís de Camões is often considered to be Portugal's greatest poet, primarily because of his epic The Lusiads, a long poem about Vasco da Gama and the conquests of the Portuguese. Manuel Severim de Faria (1584–1655) was a priest, historian, numismatist and writer. He is also considered to be Portugal's first journalist. De Barros, De Camões and Do Couto have travelled extensively through in different parts of the Portuguese Empire. In these biographies, De Faria describes in detail how their travels influenced their own works. With the bookplate of Miquel Boix Carreras and a white and gold label from the bookstore "O mundo do livro" mounted on the front pastedown, and bookbinder's label of Augusto Ferin mounted on the verso of the first free flyleaf and a manuscript annotation in Portuguese(?) on the second free flyleaf. Further with two crossed out owner's inscriptions on the title page and a small manuscript addition to the text on the last page of the "licenças" in the preliminaries. 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



First and only separately published edition of a detailed account of the geography, history and especially diplomacy of the northwest American region that the United States called Oregon Country, written and published during the negotiations to divide the region between Great Britain and the United States. The British called it the Columbia District. The folding map shows the "ligne proposé par les Etats-Unis" at the 49th parallel, which was the final dividing line in the 1846 treaty except that the whole of Vancouver Island went to Great Britain. In 1848 the United States part officially became the Oregon territory and was later the States of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and parts of two others, while the British part became the southern part of what is now British Columbia in Canada.

The map has some irregular folds and several tears, some repaired, but all are marginal. The book is otherwise in very good condition.

First edition of one of the earliest studies on Australian orchids, by Robert Desmond Fitzgerald. Fitzgerald (1830–1892) was an Australian deputy surveyor-general and botanical artist of Irish birth, who lived in Sydney from 1856. He is best known for his present *Australian orchids*, containing descriptions of Australian orchid species, some described here for the first time. Although some sources give his middle name as David or Douglas, Desmond seems to be correct. The work was issued in 12 parts from 1875 to 1894, the last completed posthumously from Fitzgerald's notes by Henry Deane.

The present copy is Fitzgerald's presentation copy for Miss Macpherson, the colourist of a large number of the plates, with an inscription by Fitzgerald addressed to her on the first leaf of the first part of volume 1: "Miss Macpherson, from Robert Fitzgerald with thanks for assistance". Also included are two letters, written by one of Miss Macpherson's heirs to a prospective buyer.

Most quires have come loose from the sewing supports some dark spots in the gutter margin caused by the cords. Some plates in parts 4 and 5 of vol. 2 are trimmed a little shorter than the others, some foxing and staining (especially vol. 1, part 1), but overall a set in good condition. The book remarkable not only because it is a presentation copy for Miss Macpherson, the colourist, but also because it is complete: "complete copies of the book are now very rare" (Stafleu & Cowan).

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

A physician's account of the slave trade

First edition. While in Egypt Bonaparte employed Frank as a physician to the occupying French army; during his five years there, he became involved in the Cairo sanitary commission and so was able to compile relevant information for this work. It commences with a discussion of the common ways people became enslaved: war, kidnapping, and trespass, where a perpetrator's child would be enslaved as punishment. He gives a vivid description of slave caravans and disproves many of the prejudices held by Europeans on the Cairo slave trade. The medical section describes seven common afflictions suffered: colds, eye problems, smallpox, skin diseases, diarrhea and dysentery, the plague, and Guinea worm. There is also a five-page section on female genital mutilation, as well as a list of prices for women, children and eunuchs. - "The value of Frank's brief treatise on the slave trade in Cairo lies in two aspects. The first is the purely descriptive account that he offers about the slave trade, the attitudes and prejudices of slave owners and dealers, and his review of the diseases and problems encountered by slaves as they moved from the limited biological environment of the Sudan to the more disease-prone Mediterranean world. On a second level, Dr. Frank's mémoire provides a glimpse into the attitudes of an early nineteenth-century European observer of slavery in the Islamic world" (Le Gall, 70). Ludwig (Louis) Frank (1761-1825) was a nephew of the famous physician Johann Peter Frank and was educated at Göttingen and later Milan. A peripatetic soul, he moved to Malta, Rhodes and Egypt, before travelling to France and eventually settling in Parma, where he was made personal physician to Duchess Marie Louise.









Magnificent copy of one of the rare 1608 editions, with the German title, English dedication and note to the reader and text in English, French, German and Dutch. Known in English as *The exercise of arms*, it was written and illustrated by Jacques de Gheyn and quickly became a famous pictorial army manual for use of officers to teach the young recruits how to handle their weapons: the arquebus (part 1), musket (part 2) and pike (part 3). It gives an excellent picture of the successful army of the Dutch Republic after its reform by Prince Maurits, who (re)introduced exercises and discipline. It also immortalizes Prince Maurits as a military thinker and commander of the most disciplined army of his age. The book met immediate success and makes a considerable contribution to our knowledge of military history. Fully coloured copies like the present were produced largely for princes and other important persons and were probably coloured by De Gheyn himself who was certainly responsible for the high standard of the colouring.

In the 18th century our copy was owned by and bound for Charles Philippe Theodore Count Palatine de Sulzbach (1724–1799), Duke of Bavaria, Jülich, Kleve and Berg, Prince of Mörs, Count of Veldentz, Lord of Ravenstein and last Margrave of Bergen op Zoom (1733–1794), with his and his wife's coat of arms on each board.

The slips on the title-page have browned slightly and there is occasional minor soiling, mostly in the lower right margin, but the book is in very good condition. A magnificently coloured copy of a work of major importance in military history.



Arents identified the author as Felipe Gobrantes, but it seems more likely that the author was Felipe Maria de Govantes, who published several historical studies on the Philippines. The treatise comments on the proper soil and appropriate areas for planting tobacco, describing the Philippine island Luzon and other fertile provinces. Other sections deal with irrigation, fertilization, pesticides, sowing, harvesting, preparing the tobacco, etc.

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

The 56-page issue, plus index, of the first edition of Hawaii's last constitution as a sovereign country, containing 103 numbered articles.

When in 1893 Queen Liliuokalani of Hawaii was overthrown, she was replaced by a provisional government consisting of members of the American Committee of Safety, striving to achieve annexation of Hawaii to the United States of America. When annexation was not forthcoming they set up a constitutional convention and adopted the present constitution for the Republic of Hawaii. The annexation was finally ratified four years later, the transfer of sovereignty taking place in August 1898. "The present constitution is among the more important pieces of literature pertinent to these times" (Streeter).

Forbes notes that page 56 is unnumbered and blank ("[56] blank"), but in this copy it is numbered and contains the last names of the members of the constitutional convention. The present copy includes the 6-page index, often lacking.

First edition of the first book printed with Roman letters in Turkey. Holdermann's *Grammaire Turque* is the first French-Turkish grammar, printed on behalf of the French embassy to the Porte, at the first printing press established in 1726 by Zaid Aga Effendi, son of the Turkish ambassador to France, and Ibrahim Müteferrika. The type apparently was sent out from France especially for this work. Words and phrases are given both in Arabic type and in roman transliteration. The engraved alphabetic table displays the phonetic values and names (in the Latin alphabet) for the letters of the Arabic alphabet, with the shapes of the unconnected letterforms for seven different styles of Turkish writing for different uses: nesghi (naskh) for the qur'an, divani (divani) for business, tealik (taliq) for law and poetry, kyrma (qirma) for public registers; sulus (thuluth), like capitals, is used for book titles and imperial patents, jakuti and rejani. One letterpress table in the text shows the letters of the Arabic alphabet with various vowel points and another shows the

Arabic number system.

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

The work is bound with Blesdijk's famous biography of the Anabaptist leader David Joris, edited by Jacobus Revius. It remains the most important source for the life and teaching of David Joris.

by Johannes Terentius (also known as Johannes Schreck and Deng Yuhan Hanpo, 1576–1630). Terentius was a prominent Jesuit scholar, specialised in natural science and mathematics. Before joining the Jesuits as a novice in 1611, he already enjoyed a great reputation in Germany as a scholar. In 1621, Terentius left for China to join the Jesuit mission. The original letter by Terentius was written in Hangzhou, China on 30 August 1621 to the rector of the Jesuit College in Munich Jakob Keller (1568–1631). He discusses his journey to China, which he started in 1618, his intentions to participate in the planned calendar reform in China, and his impressions of the city of Hangzhou, which he reached in 1621. Johann Chrysostomus Gall (1586–1643) was a German Jesuit and scholar. He left Ingolstadt, Germany to teach astronomy, mathematics and navigation in Lisbon from 1620 to 1627, before leaving to work in the Jesuit missions in India. The Colégio de Santo Antão benefitted from the arrival of many foreign mathematicians and other scholars, as Lisbon serves as a gateway for all missionaries departing for Asia. The original letter by Gall was written in September 1623 and concerns a newspaper-style description various events, including details of the persecution of Christians in Japan, particularly the execution of large numbers of Christians in Nagasaki in 1622.

The blank paste-downs and endpapers are late 18th-century, since they contain a clear "lion / vryheit / pro patria" watermark (with a crowned GR countermark), which resembles Heawood 3148, 3149 and 3154. The paper used for the manuscript contains a (faint) double-headed eagle watermark and it has been reinforced in the gutters. The edges are very slightly browned and the wrappers show slight signs of wear. Overall in very good condition.



This particular account on Chinese cults, known as the De cultu sinensis, was authored in 1668 and published posthumously. It was written by Prosper Intorcetta (1625–1696), who embarked on a journey to China in 1656 alongside Father Martini and a group of fifteen other priests who were engaged in missionary work in the province of Jiangxi. Intorcetta, who assumed the Chinese name of In-to-tsé and the nickname of Koi-ssé, was imprisoned in Canton in 1664. After his initial release, he managed to travel to Rome in 1671 to witness the fate of his fellow missionaries, before being arrested again in 1690. Alongside his work on the translation and study of Confucius' classics, for which he proposed a complete translation, the present work played a crucial role in the establishment of the subject of sinology in Europe, as it dates back to the early years of missionary presence in China. Furthermore, it contributed to enhancing understanding of the Chinese language. The De cultu sinensis was a response to the concerns raised by Domenico Navarette, a Spanish Dominican archbishop and missionary who served in Mexico, the Philippines, and later in China. Navarette strongly opposed certain Chinese rituals, and Intorcetta's book addresses this contentious issue.

A beautiful and fabulously ornate jewelled 17th-century binding, its boards, spine and clasps adorned with turquoises, amethysts, garnets, and (simulated) sapphires. It contains a popular French prayerbook entitled La journée du chrétien, which was added long after the completion of the binding itself. The prayerbook, published in numerous editions during the 19th century, is reminiscent of medieval and early modern books of hours. The work specifies the daily duties of Christians and includes devotional prayers.

It was for a long time part of the collection of the princes and rulers of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen in what is now southwestern Germany. Their collection was exhibited in the Städel museum in Frankfurt in 1928 and the present binding is listed in the exhibition catalogue. The French prayer book was at one time part of the collection of the Stadtbibliothek Frankfurt, according to the blue stamp on the verso of the title page. The whole – binding and prayer book – were part of Cornelius John Hauck's bibliophile collection during the second half of the 20th century, which subsequently appeared at Christie's auction house New York in 2008.

With the bookplate of Cornelius J. Hauck on the verso of the first flyleaf, and a blue stamp of the "Stadtbibliothek Frankfurt am Main" on the back of the title page. 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

The list of plates is rather difficult to follow: it seems to suggest that some of the plates should be cut up and their figures inserted facing various pages, moreover it calls for Garoet figs. I—4, while the present copy and all others we know have only Garoet fig. no. I (together with other figures in a folding plate). Widaï fig. I and Diëng fig. 3 are also never present, as far as we know. Otherwise, the present set includes all plates called for in the list. Bastin & Brommer note two different states for five of the colour plates, but the present copy adds a sixth: Kawa Patoeha in the present copy is unnumbered, while Bastin & Brommer record it only with the number XIV. With a large tear into the image of I black and white folding plate, a small drop of glue(?) near the foot of the image in one colour plate, and a few small marginal tears or stains. Many of the plates are discoloured on the back of the image area, not affecting the images themselves. The double-page title-page for the plates volume (rarely present) has had its margins cut away to leave the text on a large oval, which has been mounted on plain paper. The front hinge of the atlas volume shows some cracks and the bindings generally show minor wear or small scuffs around the extremities but are otherwise in very good condition, with the tooling clear. 

The third, last, best and only folio edition, much enlarged, thoroughly revised and with the engraved and many other illustrations newly made for it, of one of the major scientific works of the famous German Jesuit scholar, Athanasius Kircher (1602–1680), a truly encyclopedic work on magnetism. Kircher published his first major work, *Ars Magnetica*, in 1631. Only 63 pages in length, it extensively reports on his invention of a method for measuring magnetic power by means of a balance. The present work on magnetism was for Kircher an omnibus of scientific and also phantastic theories. He researched and measured magnetism in numerous situations and applied it to numerous fields of study, including cosmology, astronomy, geography, optics, electricity, medicine, metallurgy, animals, music, love, etc. He was the first to propose using magnetic declination to determine longitude.



First edition of an important account of the circumnavigation of the world under command of Cyrille Pierre Théodore Laplace (1793–1875). In May 1829 Laplace was appointed commander of the ship *La Favorite*, to make a journey around the world for scientific and commercial purposes. He departed from Toulon, followed the coast lines of Africa past the Cape Good Hope and visited Pondichéry, Madras and Surabaya. He explored the coasts of Cochinchina and Tonkin and set sail to the Philippines and after that Australia, Tasmania and New Zealand. He crossed the Pacific on his return to Toulon, past Valparaiso, Cape Horn and the coasts of Brazil. On 20 April 1832 he touched ground in Toulon again. The journey was a considerable success and added many important details to the scientific knowledge of the areas explored. Some small tears, a few slight stains in the views volume. Very good set.

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

First and only complete edition, containing about 2800 pages of official reports of one of the most important 19th-century circumnavigations of the globe, especially valuable for its information on Tahiti and Hawaii, and for its detailed view of the political manoeuvrings of the various colonial powers with each other and with the indigenous populations, both in the Pacific and elsewhere. The 31 stunning steel-engravings ("fine quality": Forbes) enrich the account greatly. Besides the well-known Pacific views (Hawaii, Tahiti, Tasmania, the Philippines, Vietnam) they include mosques at Karikal and Kolkotta in India and views of Oman, Mocha, Brazil, Peru, California and much more. Laplace also provides valuable information about trade on the coasts of the Arabian peninsula (including Muscat, al-Muka and Bandar-Abbas) and Iran. This was Laplace's second circumnavigation of the globe, sailing in the ship *l'Artémise*, beginning in 1837, five years after he returned from his voyage in *La Favorite*. The world map shows the routes of both voyages (the second map shows the Indian subcontinent and surroundings in more detail).



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

A pioneering "lift-the-flap" book complete with all movable parts, created as a moral instructor for young women at the beginning of the 19th-century, by father and son William and Stacey Grimaldi. The work was published with the goal of drawing young women away from toiletries and cosmetics and guide them towards virtue, by implying that virtue could have the same affect on one's appearance as cosmetics. 



beautifier", "superiour rouge", and "fine lip salve", each with a hinged flap which – when lifted – reveals the name of the virtue displayed. These illustrated plates are accompanied by short verses explaining their meaning.

It was written by Stacey Grimaldi (1790–1863), an English lawyer and antiquary decended from the renowned House of Grimaldi. Stacey was the second son of William Grimaldi (1751–1830), an English miniature painter, with whom he created the present work. Together they were pioneers of the interactive book, designing "lift-the-flap" books in the 1820s. Stacey and his father William were the (great-) great-grandsons of Alessandro Maria Grimaldi, who had settled in England after the bombardment of Genoa in 1684, and who was the son of Alessandro Grimaldi (1621–1683) the 121st doge of Genoa and king of Corsica. With an owner's inscription on the first free flyleaf, the first free flyleaf is pasted

onto the blank recto of the engraved title-page, partially separated again, uncovering another owner's inscription. The binding shows very slight signs of wear, the engraved title-page is water stained, slight foxing and browning throughout. Otherwise in good condition.



Dedicated to Wilhelm Dunker, who had published his small but pioneering work *Mollusca Japonica* eight years earlier. Before this publication little was known of the rich Japanese shellfish, what was known was based on the publication of Dunker, the shells described by Martens from the collection of Siebold and the shells described in Perry's *Narrative of the expedition... to the China Seas and Japan*.

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

Forty-six autograph letters written by the young Comte de Lorge, Paul de Durfort Civrac (1828–1872) during his voyage around the world, 1847–1851, and giving a detailed account of the sights and his adventures, addressed to his father, Emeric Duc de Lorge (1802–1879), in Paris and at the family estate, Chateau de Fondspertuis in Beaugency, near Orléans. He set off with three friends on



21 October 1847 and joined a group of missionaries travelling to the Far East. They crossed the Atlantic and sailed around Cape Horn then up the Pacific coast of South America to Valparaiso (near Santiago), crossing the South Pacific and sailing around the Philippines to reach Macao on 21 June 1848. They then went on to Shanghai, where they explored the Chinese interior. There and in Hong Kong, the group split up and Lorge went on to Batavia (Djakarta) in the East Indies, where he explored the interior of Java and hunted rhinoceros. In the summer of 1849 he went on to Ceylon (Sri Lanka) and in November to Calcutta (Kolkata). After a couple months there he again went inland, exploring the Ganges river valley as far as Murshidabad, then along the foothills of the Himalayas to Agra, Delhi and Kashmir (climbing as high as 12,000 feet, before turning south again and reaching Bombay (Mumbai) in the summer of 1850. Lorge returned home via Alexandria, reaching Marseille in January 1851.

His letters describe his voyage in detail, with accounts of hunting rhinoceros on Java, elephants in Ceylon and India, wild boar, tigers and other animals; his survival of a typhoon. He also describes the topography, European and native settlements, mosques and temples and other sites, and gives accounts of his encounters with other voyagers and officials from Europe's high society, with local rulers and with the general native population. He also relates the most recent political events. These letters, relating the events of the voyage month by month as they unfolded, gives a more intimate view, a more exact chronology and probably a more reliable record of the facts than a memoire written after the fact.



Early undated Latin edition (the first, by the same anonymous printer, was produced around 1470) of the *Sophologium* of the French Augustinian preacher Jacques Legrand (1360–1415). This is a collection of moral maxims and wise passages from poets, orators, philosophers, and theologians, well selected and arranged in three books, containing ten treatises. The collection reflects on human virtue and vice, excerpting passages on morality – as well as the natural sciences – from authors as wide-ranging as the Persian astrologer Abu Mashar (Albumasar) and the Arabic philosophers Ibn Sina (Avicenna) and Ibn Rushd (Averroes), but also Terence, Saint Paul, and Chaucer. The *Sophologium* was extremely popular and was reprinted and translated several times, including by William Caxton, who published an English translation (titled *The Book of Good Manner*) in 1487. The name "R-Printer" is derived from the peculiar majuscule R in type 103. This printer is now generally identified with Adolf Rusch of Ingeweiler, who married Johann Mentelin's daughter Salome and is said to have succeeded to Mentelin's printing business.

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

Autograph letter in Latin, signed by Melanchthon to the Protestant theologian Sebastian Boetius in Halle, to recommend the young priest Christian Hertwig junior. Boetius (1515–1573), who had studied under Luther and Melanchthon at Wittenberg, succeeded Justus Jonas as superintendent of Halle and founded the famous Marienbibliothek, still in existence. In his letter, Melanchthon reminds his former student that their minds often run in the same channel, as their letters show, and describes the role of the ideal pastor. First edition of a famous (or infamous) treatise by Anton Mesmer (1733–1815) on the medical and healing use of magnetism and the healing magnetic power in his own hands, which he called "animal magnetism". His theories gave us the English word "mesmerize". Mesmer was an Austrian physician who believed that a magnetic fluid pervades the universe, is present in every living being and affects the nervous system. A blockage in this system, could prevent the magnetic energy from flowing throughout the body, which would provoke illnesses. Mesmer thought that he could redress the energetic imbalances with the use of magnetism. Mesmer did not produce any proof of his theory or describe his experiments so they could be scientifically replicated by others. Mesmer and his imitators relied on an extensive collection of case studies, which they used as propaganda for their theories. Mesmerism became a controversial issue that attracted a great deal of public attention. In the present pamphlet *Memoire sur la découverte du magnétisme animal* (1781), Mesmer first outlined his ideas on magnetism and especially animal magnetism with only limited polemics. The present book therefore gives Mesmer's first account of his theories.

The notion that Mesmer's techniques did bring benefits due to his patients' suggestibility made Mesmer an unwitting pioneer of psychotherapy: Freud carried out his first experiments on hypnotic patients and Jung's belief that consciousness could transcend time and space brought him quite close to mesmerism.

First edition of an essential and richly illustrated classic work on America and especially Brazil. It presents a general survey of everything known about the new continent and is one of the few works that describes Brazil during the short period it was in Dutch hands. The main attraction of the work is the abundant amount of maps and illustrations. This, combined with Montanus's lively writing style, made this book a great success, and it gave many Europeans their first detailed view of the Americas. The single volume



is divided into three "books". The first is about the origins of the Americans and the discovery of America, the second describes North America and the third – and longest – part is about South America, with most of it devoted to Brazil. The last chapter, in nine pages, is the first published narrative of Tasman's famous 1642/43 voyage to Australia and Tasmania. The work is appropriately dedicated to Johan Maurits, Prince of Nassau-Siegen (1604–1679), also known as "The Brasilian". He spent many years in Brazil and promoted the scientific study of the region. A large portrait of him is included on the first page. It is missing from many other copies, but present in this. The maps are partly copied from De Laet's *Nieuwe wereldt*, but they were re-engraved and adorned with large cartouches. A few new maps of the American continent, made by G. van Schagen, were added. The work contains numerous views, including the one it is famous for: the first ever view of New York. The section on Brazil is also quite extensive, with a map and 15 double-page views, and another 15 views in the text. It makes up almost a third of the whole work. 

Fine copy of an interesting and very extensive prospectus, by André Morellet (1727–1819), announcing a new commercial dictionary in 5 folio volumes and calling for subscriptions. He first explains why a new dictionary is needed, extensively describing the first commercial dictionary in Europe of Jacques Savary des Brûlons. He also mentions English dictionaries of commerce. He found all these dictionaries far from complete, omitting many interesting details and says they are not as universal as they claim. So in the present prospectus Morellet proposes a new, complete, universal commercial dictionary, and describes the differences between his planned dictionary and the existing ones. The prospectus is very detailed and well organised, no doubt because he needed to convince his public of the need for such an extensive and therefore probably expensive dictionary. Morellet worked on his dictionary for 20 years before the French Revolution interrupted him, but never published the dictionary itself.

With a couple rust spots in the paper and occasional very minor foxing, but otherwise in fine condition. The binding shows a few scrapes and scratches on the boards and is slightly worn at the hinges, but still very good. A remarkably detailed record of a project that unfortunately never came to fruition.

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

Dutch translation of *The British Empire in America* (London 1708) by John Oldmixon, containing an account on coffee and coffee plantations that is not present in the English edition. In the first part, the author describes North America and part two deals with the British colonies in Central America. The author discusses the discovery, history, geography, population and economy of each of these regions. He is very well informed, providing many interesting details.

The maps show New Foundland, New England, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, Virginia and Maryland, Carolina and Bermuda (two maps on one plate), North America (depicting California as an island!), Barbados (showing the names of the plantation owners), Antigua, St Christopher and an overview of the Caribbean (three small maps on one plate) and Jamaica.



According to the text on the maps, they have been made by Herman Moll and engraved by J. Kyser (Tooley, Dict. of Mapmakers, p. 366; not in V.d. Krogt, Bibliografie). Tooley merely lists Kyser in connection to Moll's map of Carolina. We were unable to find information on the production of these particular maps, with exception of the map of North America, depicting California as an island which is recorded by McLaughlin (200). We presume that Kyser engraved the maps on a smaller scale and changed some of the geographical names into Dutch after existing maps by Moll.



Original ornate "carte de visite" album containing 26 carte de visite photos and illustrations of 2 members of the first Japanese embassy to Europe in 1862, European Royalty and other prominent figures. The "cartes de visite" in the present album are a combination of original albumen prints and reproductions of engravings and other drawings of people and places. Most notably, the present album contains two photos of members of the first Japanese Embassy to Europe in 1862, published by the firm of photographer R. Severin in The Hague. This embassy was a diplomatic mission dispatched to Europe in 1862, by the Tokugawa Shogunate, to negotiate the

deferment of the opening of Japanese cities and ports to foreign trade. Despite the name, it is more accurately the third Japanese embassy to Europe, being preceded by the Tenshō embassy (1582–1590) and the expedition led by Hasekura Tsunenaga between 1613 and 1620. These two Japanese men were probably part of the support staff of the embassy to Europe. The photo to of the first of these men to appear in the album is presumably of Fuchibe Tokuzo, who was one of the two interpreters who joined the mission at a later moment. The subsequent photo is of Mashiju Shunjiro, who is mentioned in a list of Japanese participants of the embassy as a 36-year-old construction worker. This album is a rare and original edition of one of the first albums on China featuring 43 photographs and images, many of which are original portraits. Few copies of this rare work survive, one being held by the Getty Museum. The album is one of the first on China and is described as "very curious" by Chadenat. The text sheet, which is bound in the beginning, explains that the album is intended to showcase the costumes of the inhabitants of the Celestial Empire. The photographs depict individuals from all classes of society, from the Emperor to the simple worker. The album was created as a propaganda work to the glory of the Jesuits, who had returned to China in 1841 after an absence of nearly seventy years. The emphasis of the album is on the protection enjoyed by the order in the 17th- and 18th centuries, particularly during the reign of Emperor Kangxi, whose portrait begins the album. The photographs showcase the civilizing and cultural actions of the Jesuits, addressing all social strata, from the poorest to Mandarins. The album was created in an extremely troubled period of persecution of Christians and armed rebellion, and in the historical context of the Second Opium War, during which all missions in the region were destroyed, except those in Shanghai.

The album may have been made in 1860, when the Beijing Convention recognized the civil rights of Chinese Christians and strengthened the diplomatic protection of missionaries by France, following the murder of twenty-four missionaries in the area. The death of father Auguste Chapdelaine, which was one of the pretexts for the entry into the war of France and England against the Celestial Empire, is also referenced. 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Some of the images were modelled after the etchings of Isidore-Stanislas-Henri Helman ("Amour-Sana" Made King of the Eleuths") and Charles-Nicolas Cochin ("The Battle at Oroi-jalatu") and illustrate the conquests of the Qianlong Emperor. Between 1767 and 1774, the finest printmakers at Louis xv's court etched and engraved prints in France based on reduced-scale copies of paintings by Jesuit artists working in Beijing, under the direction of Charles-Nicolas Cochin (1715-1790). The Chinese merchants of Canton financed the production of two hundred sets of prints and the copper plates, which were then shipped to China. Only a few sets were retained in Paris. These prints demonstrate the combination of Eastern and Western styles that were encouraged in the Qing imperial painting academy. Although the European technique of chiaroscuro, which involves the use of light and shade to create a sense of depth, is apparent, it has been modified to reflect Eastern sensibilities. The scenes are presented from panoramic views and with strongly up-tilted ground planes. At the same time, the prints reflect European preferences for anatomical accuracy, a single light source, and mathematically correct scaling to create a sense of depth.

The present copy includes a photograph of the fathers ("Les peres de la section"), not present in other copies of this work. The portraits of the missionaries of the Society of Jesus, like all the other photographs, are captioned to black ink with handwritten annotations in Latin and Chinese characters. Rebacked, occasional slight foxing and browning. Otherwise in very good condition.

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

First edition of one of the main sources for authentic information on central Africa. Filippo Pigafetta, a relative of Antonio Pigafetta, Magellan's companion on his first circumnavigation of the world, based his work on the information he collected from the Portuguese traveller Duarte Lopez, who sailed to the Congo in 1578 and stayed in Loanda until 1587. Pigafetta's important and beautifully illustrated account deals with the geography of the country, its animals, the inhabitants and their customs, the Portuguese trade, missionary activities, etc. Of special interest are his history and descriptions of Congolese tribes and their kings. It remained the main source for information on the Congo and central Africa up to the middle of the 19th century.

The fine and decorative map of Africa includes the Red Sea and parts of the Arabian Peninsula.

With the maps repaired and mounted on cloth, and a tear repaired in I folding plate, slightly foxed, margins of the plates frayed (without affecting the images, but in one case reaching the border). 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

Rare first edition of a history of the persecution of Christian missionaries in Japan and Japanese converts to Christianity, written in Spanish by the Portuguese Jesuit Luys Piñeyro (1560–1620). The history is in five books followed by lists of martyrs, a table of chapter titles, etc.

Initially the religious activities of the Jesuits, who arrived in 1549, were tolerated by the Japanese government. Upon seeing the brutal converting methods and the destruction of Japanese temples outside the metropolitan provinces, Shogun Hideyoshi changed his policy towards the Christians in 1587. Churches were demolished, and priests were ordered to leave the country. In 1616 a new edict was issued, ordering not only the expulsion of foreign priests but also demanding the death penalty for Japanese Christians who refused to renounce their beliefs. Many of the deported priests simply defied the Japanese government and returned to Japan, but only few were actually executed.

The present work describes the background to the deteriorating relations between the Japanese rulers and the representatives of Christianity. Piñeyro also deals with the determination of the Jesuits to continue to preach their religion even in the face of persecution. Early ownerships inscription at foot of title-page. 

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

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Promoting Catholicism through missionary work as the Jesuits lost power: a manuscript from the Sir Thomas Phillipps collection

large collection of about thirty 18th-century transcriptions of letters and other documents from Catholic missionaries writing from or concerning the missions in Africa, Greece, Italy and Japan. The exact number depends how one defines "one" document. Most of the letters transcribed here were originally written at the time of the Portuguese, French and Spanish efforts to suppress the Jesuits in their territories, both at home and in their colonies, beginning around 1750 and leading to the banning of Jesuits from the Portuguese empire (1759), France (1764) and Spain (1767). The Pope finally dissolved the Jesuit order in 1773, but it was re-established in 1814. The documents from this period, some explicitly about attempts to suppress the Jesuits, were clearly transcribed when they were still new, but the collection also includes transcriptions of older letters and documents.

Nearly all concern the Sacra Congregatio de Propaganda Fide, "the department of the pontifical administration charged with the spread of Catholicism and with the regulation of ecclesiastical affairs in non-Catholic countries" (*Catholic encyclopedia*).

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
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While the Jesuits, prior to their suppression, were a highly evangelical branch of the Catholic Church, the Propaganda Fide was the papal office that coordinated the missionary activities of all the orders. The letters provide good evidence both of the relations between the Catholic Church as a whole and the Jesuit Order, and of the Church's efforts to continue their evangelical missionary activities at a time when the Jesuits were no longer able to lead them.

The manuscript belonged to Frederick North (1766–1827), 5th Earl of Guilford, and was bought for Sir Thomas Phillipps (1792–1872) at the 1830 Guilford sale. It was sold in the 1919 Phillipps sale. In very good condition, with a few documents showing minor foxing or small stains, but most leaves fine. The binding is somewhat rubbed, most of the sewing supports have broken at the joints and the cover has come loose from the bookblock at the inside of the front hinge, but the sewing and case remain structurally sound. Many of the 30 documents no doubt transcribe originals that have since been lost, so the present collection forms an important source for the history of Catholic missionary work in the period, for information about the regions where they operated and for the relations of the Church as a whole with the Jesuits.

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



Extremely rare work on the sailing routes in the Caribbean, including the coasts of the Guyanas and Venezuela by the expert English hydrographer John Purdy (1773–1843). Purdy's work and influence extended beyond hydrography: he coined the term "pharology", the study of modern lighthouses and their design. Purdy does not seem to have taken part in hydrographic expeditions himself, and his work consisted in writing works and constructing charts based upon the reports of others; but eventually he became a leading authority of his time on hydrography. He was mainly instrumental in bringing *Rennell's Current* before the notice of navigators.

A note on the same page suggests that the present work is a shortened version of a more comprehensive work to be published in the same year: "The whole of the Directory, with additions, will be included in the third volume of the 'Colombian navigator' ...". In the same year 1839 the second edition of that work appeared: The Colombian navigator, or Sailing directory for the American coasts and the West Indies (London, printed for R.H. Laurie, 1839; 8°, xxiv, 338 pp.).

With a library stamp on the buckram of the front board, which is part of the binding: an anchor with "Marin. Bibl" and "1839", and also a manuscript paper piece pasted on the front board with the text "New Sailing Directions". Also with three owner's stamps on the title-page, two from the Marinens Bibliothek, Copenhagen (the library of the Danish royal navy). In good condition.

Very rare first edition of Jacob van Reenen's journal of his overland journey (in wagons pulled by teams of oxen, with excursions on horseback and on foot) to search for survivors of the 1782 wreck of the 3-masted East Indiaman, the Grosvenor, a 729-ton ship of the English East India Company stranded off of the coast of the Pondo Kingdom on the east coast of South Africa on 4 August 1782 with 150 people on board (including 12 adult passengers and 6 children). Captain Edward Riou, who had himself famously survived a shipwreck off the coast of South Africa in 1789, edited the present first edition of Van Reenen's journal and supplied additions to the text. He also included a map of the journey, which covers the South African coast from Cape Town all the way to Maputo in Mozambique. Van Reenen's journal runs from 24 August 1790 to 7 January 1791. Only one Grosvenor passenger and a few dozen crew members died in the shipwreck itself, but they mistakenly supposed they were little more than two weeks' walk from the closest Dutch

settlements of the Cape colony, when in fact they were about 500 kilometers away.

The story of the remarkable journey nevertheless tells of finding various other castaways, most notably a Christian community of supposedly 400 children and grandchildren of three old white sisters (taken as wives by a native chief) who had been castaways at such a young age that they could no longer remember what country they came from. Van Reenen offered to take them with him, but they preferred to stay than to leave any of their family behind.



The rare first missal for the Roman rite to be printed or published by the great Paris printing and publishing family Kerver, best known for their luxurious liturgical and devotional printing, especially their books of hours. There appears to be no copy in any French library. Kerver's first missal, in 1501, was made for the Paris rite. Kerver's early missals, including the present one, are extremely rare, the USTC recording no more than five copies of any edition printed before 1520.

With an inscription in the head margin of the title-page, partly shaved and difficult to read; the engraved publisher's device of the Antwerp printer and publisher Jean Baptiste III Verdussen (1698–1773) on the front and back paste-down, serving as his bookplate. Also with an 1831 owner's inscription on a free endleaf facing the title-page. The rubricator or an early owner has added several notes in red in the calendar. Further with an occasional early marginal manuscript note, some shaved. Four words in the Canon have been deliberately erased as an editorial revision. With an 8 cm tear into one leaf, the running heads of a few others shaved, the title-page slightly soiled, a 3 mm hole in leaf 232 (E4) affecting 2 or 3 words, some tiny marginal wormholes in a few leaves and some water stains in the endpapers, otherwise in very good condition. The binding shows a few small defects, one slightly affecting the gold lettering on the front board, but is also generally very good. A rare and beautifully produced missal, and the second major display of Kerver's stunning criblée initials, all coloured by a contemporary hand, as are the woodcut and Kerver's device.

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

Complete set of all the articles published by the Royal Asiatic Society of Great Britain and Ireland in the years 1824-1834 under the name "Transactions". In 1835 the journal would continue under the name Journal of the Royal Asiatic Society. The society was founded in 1823 and received its Royal Charter in 1824 for "the investigation of subjects connected with and for the encouragement of science, literature and the arts in relation to Asia" (website Royal Asiatic Society). The set consists of three volumes, published in two or three parts, each containing several articles on a wide variety of subjects: archaeology, religion, philosophy, languages, scripts, coins, inscriptions, and occasionally natural history and medicine. The areas covered are China, India, Southeast Asia and Indonesia. The lithographed plates illustrate temples, statues of gods, inscriptions, scripts, coins, maps, etc. Some half-titles slightly browned, but overall in very good condition, wholly untrimmed and mostly unopened. Paper wrappers slightly frayed along the extremities.

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
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Outstanding botanical manuscript in perfect condition

Wonderful mid-nineteenth century French work on botanical classification. Salleron's catalogue mentions several thousand plants, coming from France and far abroad. The present manuscript, dated 1848, can be placed between the first edition of Brongniart's catalog, published in 1843, and the second edition of 1850. The Table of classes of the vegetable kingdom that it contains is a copy of Brongniart's work; however, Louis Salleron largely completed the work of the latter by providing, in the form of a table, additional information. Salleron understood his catalogue as a practical guide through botanical classification. It is possible that this manuscript was produced with the intention of being published. Louis Salleron, of whom no biography is available, was probably a collaborator of Brongniart, whose name appears on the back of the binding and on the slipcase. Adolphe Brongniart (1801–1876) is a botanist considered the father of "palaeobotany". In 1833, he obtained the chair of Botany within the Natural History Museum of Paris. The School of Botany

having been enlarged at the beginning of the 1840s, he had to renew the plantations during the winter of 1842–1843. On this occasion he published, in 1843, a catalogue entitled *Enumération des genres de plantes cultivés au Muséum d'histoire naturelle de Paris, suivant l'ordre établi dans l'Ecole de botanique*, followed the order established in the School of Botany (Paris, Fortin Masson), in


which he presented a new system of classification of the vegetable kingdom. A second edition, revised and enlarged, was published in 1850 (Paris, J.-B. Baillière). Louis Salleron therefore took up this classification system by developing it with the indication of the species concerned and by providing important details on the plants.

The wonderful moroccan binding is the work of Charles-François Capé (1806–1867). His signature can be found on the spine. Established first at the Louvre where he worked for the library, he eventually became Empress's bookbinder and one of the greatest French bookbinders of his time.

First and only edition of "the most important recent publication with wonderful reproductions of the best known carpets" (Ettinghausen 1936), here in very good condition, rebound in 4 high quality half calf volumes. The project was initiated by the Austrian Museum for Art and Industry, that previously published two other works on carpets: *Orientalische Teppiche* (1892) and *Altorientalische Teppiche* (1908). The present work by Sarre & Trenkwald has far more and better illustrations than the earlier works, with 120 fine collotype plates. The authors were highly regarded authorities in the field of Islamic art, especially Friedrich Sarre (1865–1945), "without doubt,

one of the most influential figures regarding the scholarly formation of Islamic art" (Kadoi & Szanto). He was the director of the Museum für Islamische Kunst in Berlin and responsible for the formation of the "most comprehensive collection of Islamic art outside the Islamic world".

The work is characterized by an emphasis on the technique of production. The plates that depict carpets in colour and black & white are preceded by a descriptive page that is sometimes illustrated with a schematic explanation of the knotting technique used for making the carpet. The first part, by Hermann Trenkwald, with 60 plates, is entirely devoted to carpets in the world-renowned collection of the Austrian Museum,. The second part, by Friedrich Sarre, also with 60 plates covers the greatest carpets in other collections throughout the world, including private collections such as that of Baron Maurice Rothschild.

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

First edition of the most splendidly illustrated incunable ever: an important document of early German book design that recounts the story of the world from creation to the 15th century. The present Latin edition was published half a year before the German one and is printed on superior paper. "The Schedel Chronicle very rightly became famous because of its illustrations, its extraordinary graphic design, its printing, and for its woodcuts and descriptions of cities. The Nuremberg Chronicle remains one of the great works in graphic art of the fifteenth century" (Wilson, p. 28). According to Sydney Cockerell, the 1809 woodcuts in the text (counting repetitions) are printed from 645 different blocks. Among the illustrations of highest artistic quality are not only the two maps, but also the beautiful city views - frequently the first topographically exact depictions ever. Some of the woodcuts are probably the work of the young Albrecht Dürer, who lived next door to Wolgemut's workshop and had been learning the trade with him since 1486. For the alleged Pre-Columbian discovery of America by Martin Behaim from Nuremberg, an account contained only in this Latin edition (fol. 290v), see Sabin 77523 and Church 7.

From the library of Dr. Louis Versturme (1758–1833), Inspector General of Hospitals, with his armorial bookplate at the lower edge of the title-page. Subsequently in the library of his relative, the Belgian collector Pierre-Joseph Versturme-Roegiers (1777–1846), with his handwritten ownership to the title-page.

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Auctioned by Verhulst of Ghent, in 1847, to the Ghent bookseller Adolphe van der Meersch, for 40 francs. Acquired by the banker James Mayer Rothschild (1792–1868), founder of the French branch of the prominent Rothschild family (armorial bookplate of the Château de Ferrières to front pastedown). The binding is somewhat rubbed, the extremeties more so, and the spine a bit faded. The title-page is rebacked, insignificant paper flaws to a few leaves, scattered browning and foxing. The last four leaves remargined without loss; foregoing leaves show some dampstaining to upper corner. Several leaves trimmed rather closely at the top edge, sometimes just touching the page header. Occasional underlinings and ink annotations from the 16th and 17th centuries; the word "theotokos" for the Virgin Mary supplied in an early 16th-century hand on fol. 145r.



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
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German Reformed congregations in America, with the baptism of a freed slave and report on the Iroquois

Very rare first edition of the report of a mission to aid and bring order to the German Reformed congregations in Pennsylvania and neighbouring areas, prepared by Michael Schlatter at the request of the Holland Synod of the Dutch Reformed Church. King Charles II granted the Pennsylvania territory to the English Quaker William Penn in 1681 and German-speaking Quakers from the Palatine settled there already around 1685. Penn's strong advocacy of religious freedom encouraged numerous Germans of various faiths to follow. While many Quaker congregations had no designated preachers as a matter of principal, many Reformed congregations simply had no ordained preacher available, and the Dutch synod was particularly concerned about these "shepherdless congregations". Schlatter's report, including excerpts from his diaries, gives a detailed account of the state of the German Reformed congregations in America a quarter century before the United States declared its independence. The emphasis on the "shepherdless", moreover, means that it preserves a great deal of information about the smallest and most remote congregations, which

are usually poorly documented compared to those in major cities. He also reports his 1747 baptism of a freed slave and devotes two pages to the Six Nations (of the Iroquois Confederacy), giving a more favourable picture than most Europeans of his day, though inevitably viewing them as pagans to be converted and later adding another two pages about helping these "blind heathen". With a signed artist's proof of Wim Zwiers's 1946 etched bookplate for Henri Johan (Hans) de Koster (1914–1992), Dutch entrepreneur

and Dutch minister of Defense 1971–73. With some small stains and a small scrap of printed waste paper in the gutter margin of the first quire and a single small worm hole running straight through the foot margin of the entire book and the original wrappers, but otherwise in fine condition and with nearly all deckles preserved. The morocco turn-ins have given the facing endleaves a 1 cm browned border, the original marbled wrappers show minor wear and there is one small scrape on the front board, but the binding is otherwise fine. A beautiful copy of a remarkable piece of Americana.

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Extremely rare first translation of Macbeth into Ottoman Turkish


This extremely rare work marks the inaugural translation of *Macbeth* into the Ottoman language, also known as Osmanli. The translator behind this milestone was Abdullah Cevdet (1869–1932), an Ottoman medical practitioner with Kurdish roots. The work – printed in Cairo – is extremely rare, with only two other known copies worldwide. This translation reflected Cevdet's stance

against Hamidian despotism and his fervent advocacy for liberty. He was renowned for his progressive ideas regarding women's liberation and the modernisation of Islam. Cevdet faced multiple trials for his beliefs. In 1908, he embarked on the translation of Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar* and *Hamlet*, followed by *Macbeth* the following year. These works were prohibited by the Ottoman government, primarily due to their portrayal of rulers meeting moral defeat. Cevdet's Shakespeare translations were seen as threats by political authorities since they revolved around the assassination of monarchs and heads of state. From Cevdet's perspective, Macbeth was renowned as a drama centred on the "ambition for status" (hirs-i cah). Consequently, these works found publication in Cairo, far from the censorship reach of Istanbul.

Abdullah Cevdet (1869–1932) played a significant role in the Committee of Union and Progress (CUP). In 1908, he joined the Democratic Party, which later merged with the Freedom and Accord Party in 1911. Cevdet, initially a devout Muslim, was influenced by Western materialistic philosophies and came to oppose organized religion. Nevertheless, he believed that Islamic principles should be preserved in Islamic society despite the obsolescence of the Muslim God in the modern era. He published the periodical "Ictihat" from 1904 to 1932, using its articles to disseminate his modernist ideas. Due to his political activities, he faced arrests and expulsions from his homeland on multiple occasions, residing in European cities. His poetry was associated with the Symbolist movement in France, earning him accolades from prominent French authors like Gustave Kahn.

With a previous owner's inscription on the first free end leaf and the title-page, both crossed out, the original publisher's pink wrappers were bound in, but the front wrapper is lacking and the back wrapper is detached. Slightly browned throughout, otherwise in very good condition.

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

Rare first and only edition of an important, comprehensive and influential history of the almost always disastrous Christian missions to Japan, by José Sicardo (1643-1715), mostly an account of the European and native Japanese Christian martyrs of the late 16th and early 17th centuries, stopping around 1638. It is divided into three books, the first giving a general account of Japan and of the Augustinian mission there, with detailed information about the exchange of embassies between Japan and the Philippines, and including a chapter on the history of the mission in India (pp. 17-30). Books two and three cover the martyrs in chronological order, with a list in the last chapter of book 3. The work closes with an extensive table of contents and an index. Sicardo was a Spanish Augustinian who was appointed professor of theology at the University of Mexico in 1688. Although he never visited Japan, he had extensive contact with other missionaries and drew extensively on the publications of earlier missionaries in Japan. Since the Japanese excluded most of Europe from their trade and other contacts at this time, Sicardo's account gave most Europeans their primary view of the country.

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

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
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Incunabular Arabian Nights: The Book of Sindbad in Western European disguise

Very rare Cologne edition of "The Seven Sages of Rome", a popular mediaeval cycle of stories about wise counsellors and wicked women which has its ultimate roots in the Middle East, where it is usually known as "The Book of Sindbad". This Latin edition (the seventh altogether) further boasts a series of woodcuts which count among the earliest illustrations of any version of Alf layla wa-layla.

The frame narrative tells the story of prince Diocletian, who is falsely accused by his jealous stepmother, but is finally set free by the seven wise men (corresponding to the Seven Sages of Greece). These seven masters tell a story each, over seven successive days.

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
The narrative's oriental elements are derived partly from the the Old Testament (Joseph and Potiphar), but principally from its Arabian sources: the present version shares four stories with "The Book of Sindbad", the main difference being that "the sages tell only one story each instead of the two or more in the Eastern tradition" (Runte, p. xiii). The first printed edition was also published in Cologne, by J. Veldener, in 1475. The popularity of these stories proved to be immense, inspiring Boccaccio and Chaucer, among others.

The style of the 23 fine woodcuts which illustrate this edition is reminiscent of the Dutch Bellaert Master. They were first used in the Low German edition published by Claes Leeu (and printed by his brother Gerard) in Antwerp on 11 April 1488. The Leeu brothers lent them to Koelhoff, and re-used them in Antwerp Latin edition by Gerard Leeu of 6 November 1490 under the new Latin title "Historia calumnie novercalis".

Binding slighty rubbed, with old wormholes to covers. Very clean throughout; a contemporary touch of light red colour has been applied to the second woodcut. Extremely rare: no more than 16 copies known in public collections, many of which are incomplete. The only other copy ever to appear on the market was part of an incunabular sammelband (the Dietrichstein copy, first sold through Gilhofer & Ranschburg in 1933).

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On the suppression of slave trade in Arabia, Africa and America

Official document, as presented to the British Houses of Parliament, containing letters and reports from British commissioners and officers, written in 1867, concerning the suppression of slave trade in Arabia (Aden, Mukalla, Muscat), Africa (Sierra Leone, Cape of Good Hope, Luanda, Zanzibar, Madagascar, Somalia, Mozambique), Asia (Bombay), and America (Havana, New York). The majority of the commissioners briefly state that there hasn't been any activity in the slave trade in their region. However, at Africa's east coast, especially around Mozambique and Zanzibar, the reports regularly mention captured dhows with slaves on board, mostly heading for Mukalla, Muscat, Persia or the Red Sea: "a greater part of the slaves exported from the coast of Africa find their way into Persia" (p. 71). Sometimes new laws against slavery and slave trade are included. The reports from the naval officers also deal with commerce, rebellions, politics, etc. In very good condition.

First edition of the account of the three very important explorations by the Hungarian-born archaeologist Marc Aurel Stein's (1862–1943) and of his researches carried out in Chinese Turkistan and adjacent parts of innermost Asia in 1900–1901, 1906–1908 and 1913–1914. Stein travelled through Pamirs, Khotan and Niya to Dunhuang, Suchou, Turfan and Kashgar to Samaskand and the northern and southern silk roads. In the present work, he describes his archeological and topographical discoveries, by showing artefacts like documents, art objects and describing buildings and landscapes (all with photographic illustrations), showing the eastern and western influences. Highly interesting summary of this important archeological expedition to Chinese Turkistan and its adjacent areas.

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

Very rare first and only edition of an illustrated description of 13 Jamaican plants (13 illustrated with 1 plate each, but only the first 9 described) by the Swedish botanist Olof Peter Swartz (1760–1818), who had drawn some 200 plants during his travels through the West Indies. 71 of these drawings were destroyed in WWII. J.F. Volkart made 13 engravings after some of these drawings for the present publication (all showing Jamaican plants): in the present copy they are delicately hand-coloured with a subtle gradiation of tones. It was intended as part of the first fascicule of a much larger publication that would have contained engravings after all of Swartz's drawings, but the rest still remains unpublished today. Swartz studied under Carl Linnaeus the younger and graduated with a doctoral thesis in 1781. From 1784 to 1786 he traveled via North America to Jamaica, Puerto Rico, Haiti and Cuba and made a special study of the flora of parts of Jamaica that western botanists had not yet visited.

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Introducing Dutch medicine into Japan

Extremely rare original edition of a highly influential Japanese medical text book, the *Ihan Teiko*, (*General outline of medical precepts*). The work contains the 3 parts summary of the *Ensei Ihan* (*Medical precepts of the West*), compiled by the celebrated Japanese physician and successful Rangaku-sha (Scholar of Dutch learning) Udagawa Genshin (1769–1834, or 1824/5?), first published in 30 volumes in the same year and containing translations and excerpts of imported Dutch books on anatomy and physiology. Owing to the vast volume of this book, his pupil Fujii Hohtei summarized it to the present 3 volumes. With these procedures, the book became widely known and read among physicians who had an interest in Dutch style medicine, especially the function of the organs, and tissue. Although this book shows some classical immaturities, it had great influence on Japanese physicians in promoting the level of knowledge




from pre-modern to modern medicine, even in the time of the closed-door policy. The work has been of great service in diffusing Western medical knowledge. The atlas-volume contains a foreword in which the engraver Aodo Denzen is praised. It is the first engraved anatomical atlas published in Japan. The engravings were printed on rice paper, and mounted on thick paper, with explanatory text on the opposite page. In 1808 a second, revised edition of the *Ihan Teiko* was published.

First and only edition of a beautifully illustrated work on the cephalopods of the Mediterranean by the famous French naturalist Jean Baptiste Vérany (1800–1865), this copy with the plates printed on heavy coated paper. It's the first and only published part of a larger series on the molluscs of Mediterranean *Mollusques Méditeranéens*.

This copy has 45 lithographed plates instead of the usual 43 and includes in addition to the 41 numbered plates, three "bis" plates (7, 12 and 13) and a variant of plate 39, with a few different details. The plates are printed on heavy coated paper, instead of the normal paper of other copies, which makes the illustrations stand out very well.

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


Rare first and only edition of the first English grammar of the Sindhi language, the principal language of the province of Sindh in Pakistan, but also spoken by a large Sindhi minority elsewhere in Pakistan and neighbouring parts of India. In addition to the standard elements of grammar it includes handy phrases and dialogues with translations from Sindhi to English and English to Sindhi, and extensive vocabularies also translating in both directions, with an emphasis on commercial transactions. Although the book nowhere mentions the author's name, he has been identified as William Henry Wathen (1794/95–1866), chief secretary to the British government at Mumbai (Bombay) and a member of the Mumbai branch of the Royale Asiatic Society since 1821. The lithographic pages include 32-character "alphabets" (to some degree syllabaries) of the "Multàni" or "Sarài" (Multani) and the "Khudàwàdi" (Khudabadi) script, each character with the Devanagari equivalent below and a transcription in the English pointed-pen script next to the Devanagari.



These parts are especially interesting because the British government largely ended the use of these scripts by supporting the use of Arabic scripts for Sindhi in 1853, so they are generally omitted in later grammars.

With a manuscript name & letter in the fore-edge margin of p. 1, and 2 owners' inscriptions on the title-page. With (near-) contemporary manuscript corrections and annotations in ink and possibly later pencilled notes. 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

Extremely rare issue of the first edition of Witsen's incredibly influential work on 17th-century Dutch shipbuilding techniques and styles. The other issue appeared in the same year with the impressum of C. Commelijn and J. Appelaer, instead of C. Cunradus. Both contain the same engraved title-page by Romeyn de Hooghe, but the principle difference can be found in the letterpress title-page, with ours being printed in black and showing a different vignette. Notably, Witsen's work contains more than 110 meticulously detailed engraved plates based on drawings by the author himself. Considered the definitive work on shipbuilding, it was the product of Witsen's passion as a wealthy enthusiast and future regent. Only someone connected to regent circles would have had access to the exclusive information contained within its pages. The book, a precious item that required a deposit of twelve guilders, would primarily have graced the libraries of affluent members of Dutch society.

Nicolaes Witsen (1641–1717) served as mayor of Amsterdam for 13 separate terms and held important administrative positions in the Dutch East India Company (voc). The present work brought him in contact with tsar Peter the Great, who enlisted Witsen's assistance in modernising the Imperial Russian Navy. This connection also led to the tzar placing orders for warships from Amsterdam shipyards. In 1697, Witsen arranged a four-month training period for the tzar at the voc shipyards.

In 1682, Nicolaes Witsen assumed the role of mayor of Amsterdam. He was reelected to this influential position every other year until 1706, serving a total of thirteen terms, the maximum allowed. However, at the time of the publication of his great book in 1671, Witsen had yet to hold any official office. From a young age, he dedicated himself to research and acquiring knowledge, particularly in the fields of mathematics and natural sciences.

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
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Although his true passion lay in the realm of science, his family responsibilities and obligations pushed him toward a career in city administration. Eventually, he managed to combine his passion with his responsibilities. Between 1664 and 1672, he embarked on several journeys, including an eleven-month stay in Moscow as part of an embassy, a grand tour of Italy, and multiple visits to England. These travels served not only to enrich his personal growth but also to explore and establish potential diplomatic and trading connections. Witsen documented his experiences in diaries, sketches, and notes. These records formed the basis for the present work and other works like *Noord- en Oost Tartarije* (published in 1692).

With a small 18th-century manuscript note tipped in before the letterpress title-page, a small black stamp on the front paste-down and the printed coat of arms of Ortt pasted on the front paste-down next to the stamp. The binding is slightly scuffed, the front hinge has been reinforced and new brown leather ties have been added. The engraved title-page is slightly damaged in the gutter, not affecting the engraving and with some small tears in some pages, not affecting the text or plates, the edges and outer margins are very slightly browned. Otherwise in very good condition.
