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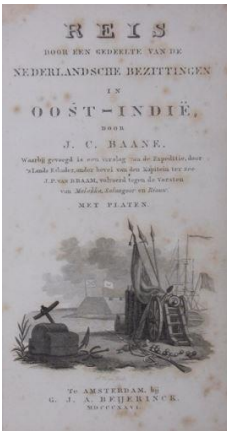
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TRAVELLING THROUGH  
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We offer a representation of the Dutch East Indies seen through 19th century eyes, told in words and illustrated by contemporaries. After the fall of the VOC, the Dutch East Indies became a real colony of the Netherlands for the first time. From that moment on, travelers set out to explore the interior of Java, Sumatra and the outer regions by naturalists, preachers, missionaries, linguists, civil servants, military personnel, fortune seekers, artists and tourists. Several of them wrote a report of their journey or stay in the Indies. The great inspiration for a renewed interest in the Dutch East Indies was Thomas Stamford Raffles with his book *History of Java* from 1817.

Included are also a biography, a bibliography, a report of his illness and death in 1865 and his zoological notes and his notes on birds of paradise and parrots.

First published in English *Travels in the East Indian Archipelago*. London 1868. - The American professor in natural history Bickmore (1839-1914), sponsored by the Boston Society of Natural History, arrived in 1865 in Indonesia to study the natural history. Besides the flora and fauna he also devoted a great deal of attention to the physical geography and the population. The concept of a Western and Eastern division between the Indonesian peoples was initiated by him. Batavia, Semarang, Surabaya, Celebes, the Moluccas, Sumatra and Singapore were visited. 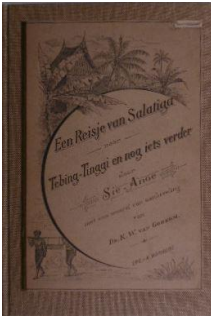

de gebruikelijke royale wijze gastvrijheid genoot, heeft op Ten Brink grote indruk gemaakt. Hij was verrukt en opgetogen ('een onafgebroken feestdag') door alles wat hij zag, de natuur, de feesten en het grand-seigneurale gebaar. .. In 1861 verscheen

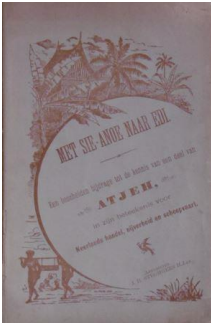

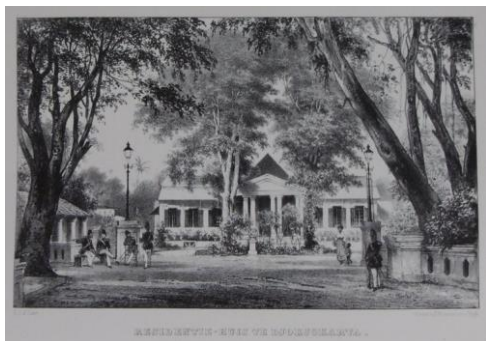

Second edition, first published in 1859-1861. - Steven Adriaan Buddingh (1811-1869), Minister at Batavia, was charged with the inspection of the Protestant churches and schools in Indonesia in 1851, he spent a total of five years (1852-57) completing the assignment. He visited Java, Madura, Celebes, the Moluccas (Ternate, Batjan, Banda, Amboina, Haroekoe, Saporoea, Noussalaut, Ceram), Floris, Timor, Banka, Sumatra and Borneo. The fine coloured plates by C.W. Mieling represent a variety of views in the archipelago. 'This is more than a travelogue, containing as it does information on a wide range of subjects skilfully interwoven into the narrative. .. The combination of an interesting and informed text with so many coloured plates makes Buddingh's Neêrlands-Oost-Indië *'one of the handsomest of Dutch nineteenth century travel books'* (*Bastin-Brommer p.37-38*). - Library stamp on titel-pages, otherwise fine.

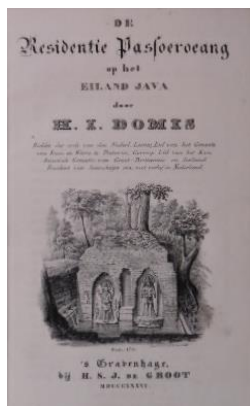

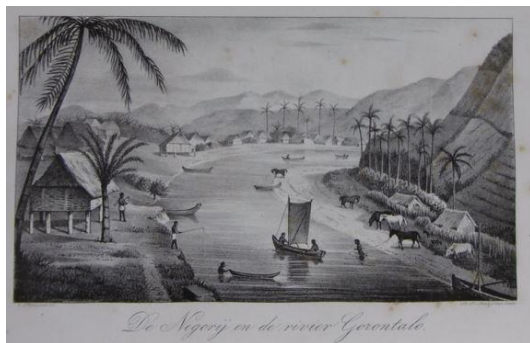

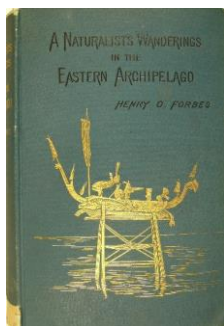

*First book edition*, first published in *De Globe*. - A sequel to his book *Fragmenten uit de reizen in den Indischen archipel* (1854). Reminiscences by a military officer of his travels through the Moluccas and other islands between 1836-1839. Dealing with his journey from Java to Ambon (1836), a visit to Hila (information on population, housing and buildings, education and the cultivation of cloves, cinnamon and sago) and a journey from Hila to Larike, and the town of Ambon. A description is included of an Ambonese wedding. Also visited Wahai, Boeroe, Manipa, Seram and Ternate, adding information on flora and fauna, food and the cultivation of rice, religion, taboos, rites, etc. - *A rare description of a journey through the Moluccas*. 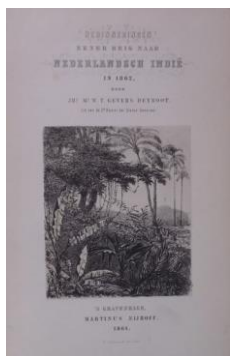

First edition, second issue. The first issue was published in the same year by K.  
Fuhri. - In 1855 Fuhri had complete copies of the work bound up. Judging by their  
rarity it is likely that these were mainly subscribers' copies. The Sythoff edition is  
also very scarce, and it cannot be supposed that many copies were published. Ernest  
Hardouin (1820-1854) came to Jakarta in 1842 as a stage designer with a French  
theatrical group. When the group dissolved he stayed and went travelling through  
West Java. He made many water-colours and pencil drawings during his stay. These  
drawings were reproduced in the book: Java, scenes taken from life, character

sketches and costumes of the inhabitants of Java. It is one of the most delightful 19th century colour plate books on Indonesia, depicting the life of the Asian community, especially in the urban regions of Java. Wilhelm Leonard Ritter (1799-1862) was one of the most popular nineteenth century writers on Indonesia. The elaborate cloth binding is one of the most ornate trade bindings of any book on Indonesia (*Bastin-Brommer* p.30-34). - *Some marginal foxing, otherwise a fine copy.*

*First edition;* with bookplate of Bibl. Doctrina & Amicitia. - Baron van Heerdt (1819-1878) travelled in 1846 from Indonesia to the Netherlands, as route he chose the little known 'landmail' or 'overlandweg'. via Egypt. Fragments of his travel experiences were first published in i.a. *De Gids*,

*Warnaserie* and *Indisch Jaarboekje*, after recasting these fragments, this book was published. Heerdt can be considered as one of the predecessors of the just rising Dutch Indonesian literature. - (Age-browned). - *Scarce.*

*First edition.* - 'I have brought together in this volume some extracts from the journal of my wanderings in North Celebes, the Sangir and Talaut Islands, a more detailed account of the fauna of the small islands called Talisse,

situated in the Straits of Banka, and a summary of our knowledge of the ethnology of the district of Minahassa' (*Preface*). The book concentrates specifically on the northern coast of the island of Celebes (Sulawesi). Sydney John Hickson (1859 -

1940), was a British zoologist known for his groundbreaking research in evolution, embryology, genetics, and systematics. He travelled in the Malay archipelago in 1885-1886. - *With handwritten dedication, dated 1896 and fine bookplate of J.G. van Marle.* - *A fine copy.*

First edition published in 1860. - Van Hoëvell asked for a voluntary discharge because he had been branded as 'suspect' in the Dutch East Indies. He wrote a pamphlet dealing with these events, but also based one of his novellas on them. It is called 'The Suspects', written in 1858, and was included in his volume *About life in the Indies* (*Uit het Indische leven*, 1860). It is one of his best works, and has remained relevant to this day. At once recognizable is the pattern it describes of an authoritarian society (*Nieuwenhuys, Mirror of the Indies*, p.62).

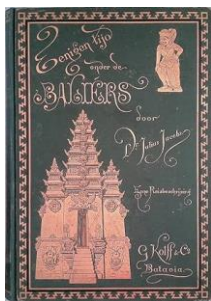

*First edition*; with the very rare third volume, part 1 (1854), all published. - Wolter Robert Baron van Hoëvell (1812-1879) was a minister of the church in Batavia. In 1847, about a year before his departure for the Netherlands, he made a trip which he

reported on as *Journey through Java, Madura, and Bali*. He had started writing it while still in the Indies when his problems with its government were reached a critical stage. This explains the vehement tone of its first part. He forwarded the manuscript to P.J. Veth, an expert on the Indies in Holland. By the time part one was published, Van Hoëvell himself had already returned to Holland. There he continued writing about his trip. The work was first to consist of two, then three volumes. As it turns out, he only wrote two, which appeared respectively in 1849 and 1851. The account concerning his trip to Bali began to appear in 1854 but was never completed. Paul van't Veer is right in saying in a recent essay about Van Hoëvell that this travelogue is one of the best to have come out of the Indies (*Nieuwenhuys, Mirror of the Indies*, p.65). - *A fine copy*.

*First edition.* - Julius Jacobs (1842 - 1895), health-officer, accompanied the resident of Banjoewangi during his expedition through Bali and Lombok (Lesser Sunda Islands) in 1881. He wrote a vivid description of Bali and Lombok providing much of interest on Balinese life and customs. He was highly critical of missionaries.

He is best known as a collector of ethnographic objects, and recruiter of indigenous peoples for the ethnographic shows organized by Carl Hagenbeck, founder of Tierpark Hagenbeck, a zoo in Hamburg. He visited islands between Flores and the Kei islands, by order of the Museum für Völkerkunde in Berlin between 1887-1888. Important ethnographic study with descriptions of houses, utensils, clothes, ornaments, weapons, etc.

In his four journeys, the writer visits almost all areas of Java, with the exception of the coastal area west of Batavia, modern-day Jakarta. - One of the few non-Western travelogues that offers a unique Javanese perspective on Dutch colonialism.

He became the author of the most disillusioning book ever written about the Indies. It was a big tirade against the colony and its inhabitants. 'A contemporary accused him of

having 'dipped his pen in vitriolic acid'. Indeed, no book on the Indies so unreasonable and so rancorous as this has ever appeared before or since' (*Nieuwenhuys, Mirror of the Indies*, p. 134).
