


The majority of the books in this catalogue hold the Josceline Grove bookplate as well as a typed catalogue description (many of which have been made use of in this catalogue) and acquisition note

First edition, 4to (280 x 215 mm), 8pp., 67 engraved places, a last few plates a little foxed, gutta-percha binding with a couple of leaves working loose, original blind-stamped cloth, spine and upper cover faded.

A scarce compilation of two earlier titles originally issued by the architectural specialist publishing firm of J. Taylor and here reissued by Taylor's successor, John Weale. The first 31 plates are from of Edmund Aikin's *Designs for Villas and other Rural Buildings, 1808*; plates 32-55 are of C. A. Busby's *Series of Designs for Villas and Country Houses, 1808*; and plates 56-67 (woodcuts) are original and previously unpublished, they are more recent designs for houses in Italianate or Gothic styles in Harwich, Brighton and London.




First edition,18 vols., bound in 25, 8vo (220 x 130 mm), 25 additional engraved title pages, each with a vignette view from one of the counties described in the volume, 714 engraved topographical views of buildings, ancient monuments, country seats, churches, scenery, &c. occasional foxing as usual, uniformly bound in contemporary full smooth russia, gilt fillet either side of spine bands, second and fourth compartments gilt lettered direct, boards with gilt multi fillet border, central armorial stamp to centre (see below), marbled endpapers and edges, some light wear to extremities, upper joint to final volume split.

Provenance: Armorial gilt stamp on upper covers of William Alexander Macfarlane-Grieve (1844-1917) of Penchrise and Edenhall in Roxburghshire, and Impington Park in Cambridgeshire.

"The work describes and illustrates many Country Houses (or Seats) so that of the 727 plates [including the engraved title pages] included in the publication there were 197 plates, which relate to Country Houses. This is a considerable number and makes this work important to the Country House enthusiast... Quite a few houses do not appear to be illustrated in any other published work."—Cooper.

Originally published in 1819 under the title 'Lines written at Ampthill Park', the descriptive poem is followed by notes on the house and park.

An account of an eighteenth-century house near Reading, much altered and "improved" until the father of the author decided to demolish it with an undistinguished French nineteenth-century chateau.



6. **BILLINGS (Robert William)** The Baronial and Ecclesiastical Antiquities of Scotland, Illustrated by Robert William Billings, Architect, F.R.S.E. *Edinburgh: William Paterson*, 1846-52. £295.00

First edition, 4 vols., 4to (274 X 212 mm), 240 engravings on 219 plates, numerous woodcuts, this copy with 26 extra illustrations bound in and itemised by a former owner at the front of each volume, marbled endpapers, bound in contemporary half red morocco by Edmond & Spark, Bookbinders, Aberdeen, joints and corners rubbed.

A work of considerable influence on the Gothic revival and the first to bring to the attention of the public the medieval antiquities North of the Border.

First edition, 8vo, viii, 147, [13]pp., engraved plate of a view of the New Gallery, Cleveland House and one engraved plan of the suit of rooms, original boards, spine and printed paper label a little chipped, untrimmed.

The Stafford Gallery, named after its owner the 2nd Marquess of Stafford (1758–1833), was the most celebrated collection of Old Masters in Regency London. He inherited the most important part in 1803 from his maternal uncle, the Duke of Bridgewater, but Stafford had himself been a major buyer at the Orléans sale in 1798 and continued to add to the collection for the rest of his life, particularly in his later years, as he planned to divide it between his two sons.

Second edition, 8vo (209 x 130 mm), additional engraved title-page, frontis., and 12 copper engraved plates mostly showing the landscaping of the grounds at Weston, some light water-staining and age toning but attractive nevertheless, half calf, rebacked, marbled boards, rubbed, green leather spine label lettered in gilt. The post-sale annotated catalogue which was published to commemorate the great event, it includes an historical introduction, notes on the important lots, and prices and names of buyers. Holmes, p.239.



Provenance: Presentation inscription from the author "A Monsieur De La Martine Mebbre de l'Academie Française, Hommage de Captaine Smyth & de Dr Lee, Hartwell, April 28, 1853."

A book of addenda was issued in 1864 and a separte catalogue of Egyptian Antiquities in the museum, was produced by John Lee in 1858. This Buckinghamshire house in now in the custody of the National Truest and is used as a hotel. Holmes, p.125; Cooper II, p.128.

Albert to Stowe in August 1840, marbled endpapers, cont. marbled boards, neatly re-backed, spine tooled in blind with green morocco label lettered in gilt.

The Seeley's, both father and son both produced guides for visitors to Stowe which gives a history of the house and gardens and is full of architectural and artistic interest. This edition, with 24 new elegant views drawn and engraved by Thomas Medland, retaining only the two ground-plans from the earlier set of plates.



Buckden Towers, originally known as Buckden Palace, was an important residence belonging to the powerful Bishops of Lincoln.

14. **CARDIGANSHIRE. CUMBERLAND (George)** An Attempt to Describe Hafod, and the Neighbouring Scenes about the Bridge of the Funack, commonly called the Devil's Bridge, in the County of Cardigan. An Ancient Seat belonging to Thomas Johnes, Esq. Member of the County of Radnor. *London: Printed by W. Wilson, 1796.* £1,450.00

First edition, 8vo (208 x 130 mm), viii, 50, [2]pp., with a large folding plan of part of the estate engraved by William Blake?, front endpapers have contemporary notes referring to the book, a large and crisp copy bound in contemporary mottled calf, neatly rebacked.

First edition of George Cumberland's very rare description of Haford, the estate of the local M.P. Thomas Johnes. Cumberland stayed there in 1794 and this charming little book was the result. It gives a detailed description of the many natural beauties of Hafod and its surrounding area. Even though there is a contemporary inscription which refers to the engraved plan as being by William Blake with his eccentric 'g' with a leftward serif, more recent research has shown that Cumberland who was well acquainted with Blake, also signed his own plates in his "Thoughts on Outline" published in 1796, with a similar 'g', and doubts have been raised whether it was indeed Blake, rather than Cumberland, who engraved the plan in this work.

The inscription also mentions a second edition which would have contained Cumberland's plates but it never appeared. The house burnt down in 1807 and was rebuilt, but Johnes's only child died in 1811 and Johnes became bankrupt. On his death it was sold to the Duke of Newcastle and finally demolished in 1955.



Both buildings have been ruinous for centuries but an interesting topographical history of the local landmarks.

A handsomely produced catalogue of the Old Master paintings and engravings in Ralph Brocklebank's collection at Haughton Hall, with descriptive and biographical notes.

Scarce catalogue of the collection of 158 paintings arranged alphabetically, and given to each painter a brief notice as to his life and death and schools in which he studied. "In consulting the catalogue the visitor is required to observe the artist's name on the frame, and turn to the same in the catalogue, or the number in right hand bottom corner of each

frame (generally), and consult the number at end of catalogue, in which will be found the page indicated wherein the particular picture described... The photographs of the paintings have been most ably carried out by Mr. T. Birtles, of Warrington."






NEW BIBLIOGRAPHY OF THE COUNTRY HOUSE

19. **COOPER (Kenneth)** The Country House Book Collector. A Catalogue of the Books which Illustrate Country Houses in Great Britain and Ireland by region [and monographs]. *Chetwode Priory: Fountain Lake Press, 2022-23.* £50.00

First edition, 2 vols., 8vo (234 x 155 mm), xxv, [1], 215, [1]; xv, [1], 306pp., coloured illustrations throughout, original cloth, d.w's.

A detailed bibliography of the author's own collection of published books up to 1900 which primarily contain images of the country houses in both the United Kingdom and Ireland. The first volume is confined to regional books with views of country houses and the subsequent volume covers monographs devoted to a single country house.


First edition, 5 vols., oblong 4to (204 x 280 mm), engraved title page to each volume, 250 engraved plates, each with an accompanying letterpress leaf of descriptive text (except for plate number 238 which lacks text leaf), individual advertisement and index leaf at end of each volume, volume 5 also includes an additional cumulative index, some intermittent foxing, contemporary half calf, marbled boards, flat spines tooled in gilt with contrasting gilt lettered labels, some light wear to spine ends and corners but overall a very nice set.


Provenance: Bookplate to each volume of Charles William Dyson Perrins (1864–1958) English businessman, bibliophile, and philanthropist.

A scarce set, rarely found complete. The finely executed plates of views of country seats and towns include the earliest engraved designs of

Turner and Girtin; plate VII of Windsor being the first by Girtin (dated May 1st 1792) and plate LV of Rochester the first by Turner (May 1st 1794). Originally issued in parts over a ten year period from 1792-1802, the text leaves include the issue number and plate number in roman.

Conishead Priory is a large Gothic Revival building which was built in 1821 with strong resemblance to Fonthill. Dr. Philp was on the staff of the "Hydropathic summer and winter residence" which then occupied the building.

22. **DENBIGHSHIRE. ROBERTS** (Askew) Wynnstay & the Wynns. A Volume of Varieties. Put together by the Author of "The Gossiping Guide to Wales." *Oswestry: Published by Woodall and Venables, 1876.* £45.00


Wynnstay Hall is a country house within an important landscaped park south-east of Ruabon, near Wrexham, Wales. Wynnstay, previously Watstay, is the family seat of the Williams-Wynn baronets.

First edition, 4to (280 x 215 mm), [12], 60, [2]pp., all leaves ruled in red, 6 platinotype plates, 10 wood-engravings, some light spotting, a couple of leaves working loose, orig. cloth-backed printed boards, a little soiled.

This book is more concerned with the house, which was built 1440/3 by Ralph Lord Cromwell, Treasurer of England in the time of Henry 6th, page 49 and 50 refer to its destruction, and the erection with the materials, of Imanuel Halton's replacement residence "a plain and excessively ugly-looking structure on the opposite side of the valley". The "platinotypes" are early photogravures and very clear and distinct.



First edition, royal 8v0 (242 x 144 mm), viii, [2], 380pp., additional lithograph title page and frontispiece (both slightly spotted), 20 further lithograph plates (mostly of country houses and churches, contemporary half calf by Norris & Son, Uttoxeter, with their ticket, marbled boards, small dent to upper joint otherwise a very good copy.

A substantial work of Derbyshire and Staffordshire topography with an emphasis on country houses and their contents, including Tissington Hall, Ilam Hall, Okeover Hall, Snelston Hall, Calwick Abbey, Wootton Lodge, Alton Towers, Crakemarsh Hall, Sudbury Hall and Doveridge Hall.



25. **DERBYSHIRE. BLORE (Thomas)** An History of the Manor, and Manor-House, of South Winfield, in Derbyshire. *London: Printed by D. Brewman*, 1793. **£145.00**

First edition, 4to (283 x 225 mm), [2], 100, [2]pp., 5 engraved plates, 2 folding engraved genealogical tables, a very good ex-library copy with several unobtrusive blind-stamps, contemporary half calf, marbled boards (a little rubbed), neatly rebacked, contracting morocco lettering-pieces.


A description of this famous ruin, mainly about its owners who were in turn, the medieval Lords Cromwell, the Earls of Shrewsbury from 1426 until the death of the 7th Earl in 1617, when it passed to William 3rd Earl of Pembroke and on his death in 1630, to the Saviles. Ultimately ownership of the manor was split into numerous different parts until it was awarded to Imanuel Halton who pulled most of it down.

A detailed catalogue by the local vicar who describes some of the more interesting pictures as well as providing information of the other contents of the house. Holmes, p.123

The plates are taken from Rayner's *The History and Antiquities of Haddon Hall* published 30 years earlier which Cattermole had helped to produce.





The castle passed through several hands before being bought by the Whig politician Sir William Ashurst in 1713. After his death Hedinghamn passed to his daughter, the wife of Lewis Majendie, author of this work. Finally when the last representative of that family died, it was inherited by her cousin, The Hon Thomas Lindsay, brother of the Earl of Crawford and Balcarres, whose son is he present owner.







Colvin comments that "the house represents a serious attempt to adapt to domestic purposes... sufficiently remarkable to give [Sudeley] a place in history of the Gothic Revival."





They passed in 1929 with the rest of the estate to Edward Spencer-Churchill, on whose death in 1964, they were disposed of, by private sale and at auction, a large number of the pictures and antiquities being transferred to the national collections in lieu of death duties. Phillips also bought heavily, acquiring ultimately no less than ninety-five pictures. The facetious tone in which he announced this to his wife can have done little to allay her disquiet. 'My dear Wyfy', he wrote on 16 August 1859. 'Poor Tippy ruined at the Northwick sale!!! What a pity his careful prudent Wyfy was not with him. Could not help it! Such beautiful Pictys!
