First edition. The Shrimad Bhagavad Gita, 'The Song by God', is a 700-verse Hindu scripture that is part of the epic Mahabharata, dated to the second half of the first millennium BCE.

Mohini Mohun Chatterji was a Bengali attorney and scholar who belonged to a prominent family that for several generations had mediated between Hindu religious traditions and Christianity. He joined the Theosophical Society in 1882 and became Assistant Secretary of the Bengal branch. Later that year, he claimed he became a "chela" in probation of the Mahātmā Koot Hoomi, and saw apparitions of Mahatmas on five or six occasions. According to Theosophists, he eventually failed as a chela, and resigned from the Theosophical Society in 1887, after only five years of membership. [Wikip.].

Jakob Böhme was a German philosopher, Christian mystic, and Lutheran Protestant theologian. He was considered an original thinker by many of his contemporaries within the Lutheran tradition, and his first book, commonly known as *Aurora*, caused a great scandal."

"The publication caused another scandal and following complaints by the clergy, Böhme was summoned to the Town Council on 26 March 1624. The report of the meeting was that:"

"Jacob Boehme, the shoemaker and rabid enthusiast, declares that he has written his book *To Eternal Life*, but did not cause the same to be printed. A nobleman, Sigismund von Schweinitz, did that. The Council gave him warning to leave the town; otherwise the Prince Elector would be apprised of the facts. He thereupon promised that he would shortly take himself off." [Wikip.].

Alexander Balmain Bruce was a Scottish churchman and theologian. He was a minister of the Free Church of Scotland. "The boldness of Bruce's views was not, however, entirely pleasing to his colleagues in the Free Church. In 1889, he published *The Kingdom of God; or, Christ's Teachings according to the Synoptic Gospels* (Edinburgh, 8vo), a work which gave rise to considerable criticism owing to his treatment of the inspired writings. In 1890, the tendency of his views and those of Dr. Marcus Dods was considered by the general assembly, but that body came to the conclusion that while some of their statements had been unguarded, their writings were not at variance with the standards of the church." - [Wikip.].

From 1860 he worked as superintendent and pastor in Rochlitz.

Andrew Ewbank Burn was an English clergyman in the Church of England, Dean of Salisbury (1920-1927). He won a wide reputation for his researches into the origin and history of creeds. Burn worked for the re-union of Christendom, establishing close contact with leading Lutheran scholars. He was a delegate of the English Church at the Lausanne Conference.

Frederic William Farrar (Bombay, 1831–1903, Canterbury) was a cleric of the Church of England (Anglican), schoolteacher and author. He was a pallbearer at the funeral of Charles Darwin in 1882. He was a member of the Cambridge Apostles secret society. He was the Archdeacon of Westminster from 1883 to 1894, and Dean of Canterbury Cathedral from 1895 until his death in 1903. Farrar's religious writings included *Life of Christ* (1874), which had great popularity, and *Life of St. Paul* (1879). He also contributed two volumes to the commentary series *The Cambridge Bible for Schools and Colleges*, on the Gospel according to St. Luke, and on the Epistle to the Hebrews. His works were translated into many languages, especially *Life of Christ*.

Second edition. First issued in 1910. A medical doctor, Churchward here considers human anatomical and physiological characteristics, as well as various types of worship, beliefs, customs and symbols. Churchward was a Mason, thus offering a great deal of the history of symbolism. He writes, "I fear nothing for this book [from his critics], because it is written from

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decipherments of existing monuments, which are hidden mysteries to the masses owning to their having not yet learned to read the Sign Language written on the walls; notwithstanding real gleaners of truths will know that I am correct in these translations."



"In writing the explanation of the *Signs and Symbols of Primordial Man*, I have gone back to the foundation of the human as a beginning, and traced these signs from the first Pygmies, and their then meaning, up to the latter-day Christians, and shown the evolution and meaning of the same, back to the Primordial Signs and Symbols and Sign Language, which have never been studied or taken into account either in Freemasonry, the Christian doctrines or the Eschatology of the Egyptians, and without which it is impossible to form a true conception of how these later doctrines came into existence." – Introduction.

Jacques-Auguste-Simon Collin de Plancy was a French occultist, demonologist and writer. He published several works on occultism and demonology. In 1818, his best known work, *Dictionnaire Infernal*, was published. In 1822, it was advertised as:

"Anecdotes of the nineteenth new century or historiettes, recent anecdotes, features and words little known, singular adventures, various quotations, bringing together and curious parts, to be used for the history of customs and the spirit of the century when we live compared with the last centuries."

It is considered a major work documenting beings, characters, books, deeds and causes which pertain to the manifestations and magic of trafficking with Hell; Asmodeus, Azazel, Bael, divinations, occult sciences, grimoires, Lucifer, marvels, errors, prejudices, traditions, folktales, the various superstitions, and generally all manner of marvelous, surprising, mysterious, and supernatural beliefs. Already in his school days Schütz learned many of the common European languages. He expanded his vocabulary to over 300 languages and dialects. He attributed his ability, which earned him the reputation of a linguistic genius (called the "King of the Polyglots"), to his family's talent for languages. His grandfather, a Sanskritist, as well as his father, a teacher at the Ffter Lessing-Gymnasium, and other family members also spoke several languages.

"One of his best-known works is *Myth, Magic, and Morals* from 1909, later reissued under the title *The Origins of Christianity*. This has been read both as strong criticism of the Jesus myth theory, making Conybeare a supporter of the historical Jesus; but also as an attack on aspects of orthodox Christianity itself. He returned later in 1914 to make a direct assault on leading proponents of the time of the Jesus-myth theory." – [Wikip].

Frederick Cornwallis Conybeare, FBA (14 September 1856 – 9 January 1924) was a British orientalist, Fellow of University College, Oxford, and Professor of Theology at the University of Oxford.

Darwin first published, *The Descent of Man, and Selection in Relation to Sex,* in 1871. Darwin applied his revolutionary theory to human evolution, detailing his theory of "sexual selection," and concluding that humans are descended from a lower form of species. In the process Darwin compares the biological evidence and draws comparisons with various members of the animal and insect kingdoms.

First edition. This is Eisler's significant comparative study of the symbolism of pre-Christian religions ("Orphic") and those of early Christianity.

Robert Eisler (1882-1949) was an Austrian Jewish polymath who wrote about the topics of mythology, comparative religion, the Gospels, monetary policy, art history, history of science, psychoanalysis, politics, astrology, history of currency, and value theory. He lectured at the Sorbonne and Oxford, served briefly on the International Committee on Intellectual Cooperation in Paris after World War I, and spent fifteen months imprisoned in Dachau and Buchenwald, where he developed heart disease. He is best remembered today for advancing a new picture of the historical Jesus based on his interpretation of the Slavonic Josephus manuscript tradition, proposing a dual currency system to control inflation, and arguing for a prehistoric derivation of

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human violence in Man into Wolf: An Anthropological Interpretation of Sadism, Masochism, and Lycanthropy.

Fontane was Secretary General of the Universal Maritime Company of the Suez Canal, directed by Ferdinand de Lesseps in 1854, then secretary of the latter, he was compromised in the Panama scandal. He was arrested on December 16, 1892, and sentenced to five years in prison for fraud and breach of trust and, in the *Cours d'Assises de la Seine*, to two years in prison and a fine of 3,000 frances for corruption.

First edition. A second edition was issued in 1922.

"In 1897 Herbert Giles became only the second professor of Chinese language appointed at the University of Cambridge, succeeding Thomas Wade. At the time of his appointment, there were no other sinologists at Cambridge. Giles was therefore free to spend most of his time among the ancient Chinese texts earlier donated by Wade, publishing what he chose to translate from his eclectic reading in Chinese literature. Giles published over sixty books, lectures, pamphlets, journal articles, book reviews, and

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newspaper articles. During his long life he completed a comprehensive Chinese-English Dictionary which took over fifteen years to compile and became a standard reference for many years. Giles also published the first history of Chinese literature and art, which also became a reference work. Some of his translations have stood the test of time and are still among the best available. Giles was not afraid to be controversial and outspoken on numerous topics. To quote his great grandson, "Most of his enemies were people whose work he had criticized. Such people included E H Parker, a sinologist at Manchester University; Sir Walter Hillier a sinologist from London; and Sir Thomas Wade, Minister to China (1870-76 and 1880-82) and therefore Giles's superior in the Consular Service. Wade was later Professor of Chinese at the University of Cambridge (1888-95). Giles was to succeed him in this position in 1897.""

George Grimm (1868-1945), Bavarian judge, philosopher, intellectual and Pali scholar. After completing his theological studies, George Grimm (1846-1945) devoted himself to jurisprudence and was characterized as 'Bavaria's most benevolent judge'. His interest in philosophical problems led him to study Schopenhauer's works, which in turn led him to Indological studies. In 1921 he founded the 'Altbuddhistische Gemeinde', (Old Buddhist Community). He spent the last twelve years of his life in the rural stillness of Upper Bavaria.

"*The Doctrine of the Buddha* is the fruit of George Grimm's intensive studies and practical realization of the Buddha's teaching on the nature of reality and the self. First published in German in 1915. With abundant references to the Pali Nikayas, the oldest Buddhist scriptures, the author masterfully lays out the core of the original Buddhist doctrine, showing how key ideas like Anatta or "not-self" have been grossly misunderstood and misinterpreted by subsequent generations. The Doctrine of the Buddha is essential reading for students of Buddhism and for all seekers of Truth." – [Amz.]

"His study *Buddhistische Weisheit Das Geheimnis des Ich* (Munich 1918) is mainly concerned with the analysis of the anatta doctrine and its intrinsic value lies in the author's genuine search after the eternal truths of Buddhism. The main concern of G. Grimm was with the practical realization of the Buddha's Dhamma und towards that end he founded in 1921 in Utting a.A. the "Altbuddhistische Gemeinde" (Old Buddhist Community). At the same time he devoted himself to an intense study of the Pali anon and evinced keen insight into the humanistic message of the Lord Buddha's teaching." – *Archiv Orientalni* 52, 1984, Book Reviews and Notes, p. 418.

Emmanuel Swedenborg led one of the most remarkable careers in the history of science and philosophy. He mastered natural science and

mathematics in his youth, writing some 150 works on scientific subjects. He rigorously sought a comprehensive physical explanation of the world based on mathematical and mechanical principles. Gradually his inquiries turned toward philosophical matters and after a profound mystical experience in 1745 he devoted his reasoning almost entirely to the interpretation of religion. In these later treatises, Swedenborg gives vivid descriptions of his experiences in the spiritual worlds beyond space and time which he was able to enter by consciously suspending bodily sensations. Despite its bizarre aspects, his theosophical system is characterized by logic and is obviously rooted in his previous concern with the sciences. Swedenborg attempted to explain reality in terms of psychic energy, in which matter, intellect, and spirit emanate from the world soul.

This work responds to the question as to whether the last judgment coincides with the final destruction of the world. It also collects reports from various sources of experiences of the next world. Hobart prints the content of a letter from Kant relating to Swedenborg's beliefs of the spiritual world, which he denotes it is "sound reason to incline to the negative side" meaning that there is no proof of spirits and there is also numerous cases of deceit, "proofs of deception, that I have never [considered] if necessary to suffer fear or dread to come upon me, either in the cemeteries or the dead, or in the darkness of night. This is the position in which my mind stood for a long time, until the accounts of Swedenborg came to my notice." But having stated as much, he relates in detail an account involving figures of high repute, namely the Austrian ambassador, etc., and then relates, at great length, a proof of psychic feats by Swedenborg relating to the Stockholm fire of 1763, which was written in letter form to Charlotte von Knobloch, and another relating to the queen's secret. -- Hobart, p. 68.

Underhill has little use for theoretical explanations and the traditional religious experience, formal classifications or analysis. She dismisses William James's *The Varieties of Religious Experience* (1902), and his "four marks of the mystic state" (ineffability, noetic quality, transience, and passivity). James had admitted that his own constitution shut him off almost entirely from the enjoyment of mystical states, thus his treatment was purely objective. Underhill substituted mysticism is practical, not theoretical, mysticism is an entirely spiritual activity, the business and method of mysticism is love, and mysticism entails a definite psychological experience. Her insistence on the psychological approach was that it was the glamorous science of the pre-war period, offering the potential key to the secrets of human advances in intelligence, creativity, and genius, and already psychological findings were being applied in theology (i.e., William Sanday's Christologies Ancient and Modern). / She divided her subject into two parts: the first, an introduction, and the second, a detailed study of the nature and development of human consciousness. In the first section, in order to free the subject of mysticism from confusion and misapprehension, she approached it from the point of view of the psychologist, the symbolist and the theologian. To separate mysticism from its most dubious connection, she included a chapter on mysticism and magic. Mysticism has been associated with the occult, magic, secret rites, and fanaticism, while she knew the mystics throughout history to be the world's spiritual pioneers." [Wikip.].

There he reorganized the museum and organized the first ethnographic conference (1914).

Wilke was baptized and brought up as a Protestant, and after attending high school in Zeitz, he studied philosophy and theology in Leipzig. In 1814 he became a field chaplain in the Saxon Landwehr and later a pastor in Hermannsdorf in the Ore Mountains. In 1838 he settled in Dresden, where in the same year he published his work *The Urevangelist*, or the critical exegetical study of the relationships between the first three Gospels . In this work he claimed that the evangelist Mark was the "original evangelist" and served as the source for the Gospels of Matthew and Luke (Wilke hypothesis, Synoptic problem). In the same period, the philosopher Christian Hermann Weisse , independent of Wilke, came to the same conclusion. From 1838 he worked in Dresden, among other things on his dictionary of the New Testament [this item].

The dictionary was first released in 1858: Lexicon graeco-latinum in libros Novi Testamenti : usibus scholarum et iuvenum s. theologiae catholicae studiosorum accommodatum. Manz, Regensburg 1858.

Benjamin Wilson (1817–1900) was an autodidact Biblical scholar and writer of the *Emphatic Diaglott* translation of the Bible (which he translated between 1856 and 1864). The original 1865 Fowler and Wells edition of the *Emphatic Diaglott* was one of the earliest interlinear Greek-English New Testaments published in America and thus had considerable influence.

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
