CHAMBERLAIN, BASIL HALL / BATCHELOR, JOHN The Language, Mythology, and Geographical Nomenclature of Japan Viewed in the Light of Aino Studies. Including An Ainu Grammar by John Batchelor and A Catalogue of Books Relating to Yezo and the Ainos. First edition of the first substantial work on the Ainu language in English. Rare in the trade.

Chamberlain, born in England, first arrived in Japan in 1883 and was later appointed professor of Japanese at the Tokyo Imperial University. He lived among the Ainu in the mid-1880s and was involved in pioneering research on the Ainu and Ryukyu cultures of Japan. He believed that the Ainu language had no affinity with Japanese, based on his analysis of word structure and numbers. He concluded: "Ainu is a completely different language from Japanese, Korean, and Altaic languages and is an isolated language of the world". Later several linguists have disagreed with Chamberlain, but research has still not arrived at the true origin of the language. (Fitzhugh and Dubreuil).

The Reverend John Batchelor came to Hokkaido in 1877 where he lived amongst the Ainu for more than 60 years. His definitive Ainu grammar was first published in 1903.

First edition. An important and rare account of the Ainu people. The author was a medical doctor sent by the Tokugawa government on a three-year journey to Ezo (Hokkaido) to treat the Ainu (1856–9). His report vividly describes the people's everyday life, customs, flora and fauna, and folk tales.



Contains six nautical maps and forty illustrations including many bird's-eye views, dwellings, rituals, bear hunting, cooking, etc. Many depict coastal views, including one with "Ainu attacking foreign ships from Kunajiri Island" (Sakhalin) according to pencil annotation. The beautiful woodcut prints are made by the famous artists Utagawa Sadahide and Tazaki Sōun. The wrappers have some stains but overall, a fine set.

3. BATCHELOR, JOHN


First edition of Batchelor's most comprehensive work on the Ainu, aboriginal people of Japan. The Reverend John Batchelor (1854–1944) was a British missionary who came to Hokkaido in 1877. He lived among the Ainu for more than sixty years. During this time, he became close to the people and knowledgeable about their culture, religion and language. A great copy.

4. BERGMAN, STEN

In Korean Wilds and Villages. London, Travel Book Company, 1938. € 580

Sten Bergman, Swedish zoologist and explorer, who led major scientific expeditions to the Far East. In 1935, Bergman and a conservator, Harald Sjöqvist, travelled via the Trans-Siberian Railway to Korea. The aim of the expedition was to study the birds found in the northern parts of Korea. Bergman also collected specimens for the Natural



History Museum and the Ethnographic Museum in Stockholm. This is the travel diary with fascinating stories about Korean life, hunting, fishing, festivals, temples, etc., richly illustrated after Bergman's photographs. A very good copy of a scarce title, especially with the dust wrappers.

5. BERGMAN, STEN

Handwritten letter and travelogue of the Swedish Kamchatka expedition. Letter dated Klutchi (Kliuchi), Kamtschatka June 20, 1921. € 750

Contains a signed letter with envelope addressed to the editor of Falu-kuriren, Falun, Sweden, Europe via Amerika. Franked and postmarked in Tokyo. Includes a travel narrative of seven handwritten folios on verso titled "Från Berings hav till Kluchefskaja Sopka", also signed by Bergman. Housed in modern paper covers.

Sten Bergman, Swedish zoologist, led the Swedish Kamchatka expedition 1920-22. He travelled together with his wife Dagny, botanist Eric and Elsie Hultén, René Malaise and Ernst Hedström. The travelogue begins in May 1921 with an adventurous boat trip from Petropavlosk up the Kamchatka River to Ust-Kamtchatsk where they spent eight harsh winter months. Later, they continued their journey to Klutchi, located at the foot of the active volcano Kljuchevskaja Sopka. There they settled down and made excursions to study the fauna in the area, including sea eagles. A few parts of this letter are included in Bergman's book "Kamtchatka skildringar från en treårig forskningsfärd" (Stockholm 1923). Provenance: Bertil Gustafsson, Swedish book collector.

6. BILIBIN, IVAN (Artist)

Byliny, Volga. Petrograd, I.I. Bilibin, 1904. € 800 First edition. Ivan Bilibin, Russian illustrator and stage designer, is famous for his illustrations of Russian fairy tales. He was a member of the Mir

iskusstva (World of Art), contributed to the Ballets Russes, and member of the Artists' Union of the USSR. This work about the mythic hero Volga is one of the most beautifully designed and printed publications of the Silver Age. The stunning plates demonstrate Bilibin's deep knowledge of Russian and Ukranian folk art.


First edition, first trade edition. The manuscript of Nizami's Poems contains the miniatures here reproduced. Fredrik Martin, a renowned Swedish orientalist, calls this "the finest sixteenth-century Persian manuscript in existence". The text includes Shah Tahmasp and his Painters, the Life of Nizami, the Five Poems, Painting in Persia, etc. A beautiful copy.

8. BLUNT, LADY ANNE & BLUNT, WILFRID SCAWEN (Ed.)

Bedouin Tribes of the Euphrates. Edited, with a preface and some account of the Arabs and their horses, by W(ilfrid) S(cawen) B(lunt). Two volumes. London, John Murray, 1879. \in 1500

First edition. Lady Anne Blunt was the grand-daughter of Lord Byron and the wife of the famous Arabic scholar and poet Wilfrid Scawen Blunt. The couple travelled extensively in Arabia and the Middle East from the late 1870s, normally without guides or the usual caravans. During this period Lady Anne became fluent in Arabic and she gained insights into the inhabitants and their customs. Her journals provide a comprehensive view of desert life.

Scarce first edition of this groundbreaking work to trace the common origin of the grammatical forms of Sanskrit, Greek, Latin and German. Concentrating on a historical analysis of the verb, Bopp provided the first reliable material for a history of comparative languages.

"He thereby established the science of comparative linguistics [...] Bopp's importance lies in the fact



that he was no mere grammarian but considered philology to be an essential part of the history of civilization: out of their vocabulary he drew an accurate picture of the material and intellectual life of the earliest Indo-European people" (PMM).

A complete run of nine numbers. With texts by Laurence Whistler, Cecil Beaton, Ivor Brown, James Agate, etc. With numerous illustrations. In the original decorated wrappers. Housed in two slipcases with paper covers, title labels on upper covers, lightly rubbed. First edition.

The Masque periodical was a Post-War publication dedicated to theatrical plays, designs for the theatre and developments in the French theatre. Some very minor wear to the issues and slight rusting to staples, but overall, a lovely set.

12. [COOK, JAMES]. HAWKESWORTH, JOHN (Ed.)

An Account of the Voyages undertaken, for making Discoveries in the Southern Hemisphere, and successively Performed by Commodore Byron, Captain Carteret, Captain Wallis and Captain Cook. [First Voyage]. Three volumes. London, W. Strahan and T. Cadell, 1773. €10 500

Second edition, considered the best, of Cook's first voyage in Endeavour in the years 1768–71. The purpose of the expedition was to observe the transit of Venus at Tahiti and secondly to search for a large southern continent. The expedition entered the Pacific Ocean around Cape Horn and sailed to Tahiti where observations of Venus were made, the voyage continued, and the Society Islands were discovered. Furthermore, they made a circumnavigation of New Zealand and the charted east coast of Australia (New South Wales). The plates contain, in addition to maps and plans, sea views, native people, tools, weapons, etc. One plate restored in the margin, one map with a tear at the fold.



Hawkesworth's account was an immediate success and evoked great interest in the Pacific throughout Europe. Captain Cook was promoted to commander, and in the following year he set out for the Pacific again in command of the Resolution. The first volume of the Hawkesworth account covers the voyages of John Byron, Captain Wallis, and Captain Carteret. A beautiful copy with a remarkable provenance, from Ericsberg castle, Sweden. (with bookplate).


Scarce first Swedish edition of Cook's third voyage between 1776 and 1780. Translated from English (first 1784). This is the first Scandinavian publication relating to Cook's final voyage including the discovery of the Hawaiian Islands. Published anonymously but has been attributed by Rolf Du Rietz to Samuel Ödmann of Uppsala.



16. FAVRE, PIERRE FRANCOIS

First edition. An important work containing letters with impressions and experiences of French missionaries in Indochina, who opposed the Jesuit mission. Favre, a Swiss priest, strongly criticised the practices that Jesuit missionaries established in the area, especially their tolerance of certain pagan rites practised by the Christians. As a result, this work was put on the Index and publicy burned in Fribourg in April 1746.

This is an interesting collection with original designs from the heyday of modern textile design from a renowned German textile company. It shows excellent examples of vibrant, bold and innovative patterns, blending both graphic and organic elements. Among these are the iconic flower power designs that emerged in the 60s, as well as large-scale, often geometric patterns created in the 70s.

The pattern sizes vary between 50–65 cm x 40–50 cm. Six are mounted. Stamps by Schnitzer & Vogel and manufacturer's note in ink on the verso. Two have stamps of "Adolf Altmann Dessins, Krefled".

20. GESSAI, FUKUI (Ed.)

Aselection of "bijin" (beautiful women) after paintings by Katsushika Hokusai, Hosoda Eishi, Maruyama Ōkyo, Ogata Kōrin, Shunshō Katsukawa, Tosa Mitsuoki and other famous artists. The prints are in good condition with a printed signature, seal and number with matching description on the back of the envelope. This set is part of a series of works by great masters reproduced and edited by Fukui Gessai (1852–1935).

Complete in two volumes. Contains 24 coloured woodblock prints (20.5 x 27.5 cm). Housed in the the original decorated paper envelopes, partly split along the edges.

First edition of this impressive work on women's costumes from around the world. The plates depict, in addition to various kinds of clothing, hats, shoes, jewellery, textiles, hairstyles, ornaments, etc. Several of the wrappers are slightly worn along edges (one with marginal tear) and some of the plates have minor wear at the outer edge, but overall, a very attractive, well-preserved copy with clean and crisp plates.

A very attractive collection of stunning prints in the very best Art Nouveau style. Mary Golay (1869-1944) was born in Geneva and worked in Paris in the early 20th century. She participated in the Salon de femmes peintres et sculpteurs and was famous for her representations of floral motifs in the Art Nouveau style.

23. GONÇALVES, JOAQUIM AFONSO

... Arte China constante de alphabeto e grammatica comprehendendo modelos das differentes composicoens. Macao, impressa com licença regia no real Collegio de S. Jose, 1829. €5,500

First edition of this rare Chinese grammar, published for the use of Chinese Portuguese students. Father Gonçalves (1781–1841) was a Portuguese missionary and significant sinologist of his time. He moved to Macao in 1812 and worked as a Lazarist priest until his death in 1841. He dedicated himself intensely to research and teaching Chinese at the Colégio de S. Joseph and he was the teacher of several future sinologists, such as J.M. Callery.

This work "Arte China" provides a thorough and very practical introduction to many aspects of the Chinese language. The appendix is a comparative phonetic study of the pronunciation of Mandarin and Cantonese Chinese. It was printed at the College by Portuguese priests on a press which had been lent to them in 1827 after the "Gazetta de Macao" had been closed.

With an interesting provenance: Frederick Stewart (1836–1889) was a British colonial administrator, who served as the Colonial Secretary in Hong Kong from 1887 to 1889. He is considered "The Founder of Hong Kong Education" for integrating a modern western-style education model into the Colonial Hong Kong school systems. (With his signature on title).

First edition of a narrative about the Ainu people. Edward Greey was a member of the English naval expedition to Japan in 1855–6. He spent six years in the country and wrote three books about Japan, of which this is one.

25. GRELLMANN, HEINRICH MORITZ GOTTLIEB

Histoire des Bohémiens, ou tableau des moeurs, usages et coutumes de ce peuple nomade; suivi de recherches historiques sur leur origine, leur langage et leur première apparition en Europe. Paris, Chaumerot, 1810. € 950

First French edition of one of the earliest scholarly works on the Romani people, originally published in German (Dessau & Leipzig 1783). A comprehensive and highly esteemed work on the life and customs of the Roma, especially devoted to their language. Grellmann deduced the Indian origin of the Roma because of the many similarities between their language and Sanskrit and Hindi. This has later been confirmed by other scholars. Includes a trilingual dictionary of Romani, Hindi and French.





Daimyo flags. They are presented as horizontal flags mounted on flagpoles in the Western style, and not in the Japanese manner. The paper is very fragile, with some tears and expertly repaired at the joints, silk string. Housed in a specially made wooden (kiri) box. The scroll depicts the flags of 29 daimyo of Japan and lists their family name, wealth in terms of annual revenue (= amount in kokus of rice), and the name of the province (han). It was probably issued in the 1860s because the old names of the provinces have been used.

Daimyo was a powerful territorial lord in premodern Japan from the 10th century to the mid 19th century. At the beginning of the Edo period (1603 - 1868), Shogun Tokugawa Ieyasu reorganised the clans and their territories, so that previously provinces called "kuni" were changed to "han", based on their production of rice. The period of Shogunate rule ended in 1863 and a few years later the "han" was abolished and prefectures were established, effectively ending the daimyo era in Japan. This work, published anonymously, was probably given to foreigners to inform them of who controlled each province in Japan. We assume that only a small number were made, perhaps for a group of Japanese diplomats or dignitaries visiting Europe or the US to give to officials they met.





Gountei (1807–73) was a pupil of Kunisada I, known primarily for his Yokohama ukiyo-e prints but was also one of the leading artists of "Ichiranzu", the panoramic view, at this time. He was selected as one of the artists to represent Japan at the Paris Exhibition of 1866, for which he received the Lé-







In 1787, De Lesseps left the expedition at Kamchatka to return to Paris overland through Siberia with documents, views and maps of the first two years of the voyage. He thus became the only survivor of the ill-fated expedition which was revealed only recently to have ended in shipwreck and massacre.

This narrative contains detailed observations on the customs and traditions of the inhabitants along the route as well as descriptions of plant and animal life. Volume two includes short vocabularies of Russian and four Siberian languages: Kamchatkan, Koryak, Chukchi and Lamut.

Anders Ljungstedt (1759–1835), a Swedish merchant and historian who was employed by the Swedish East India Company in 1797. The following year he moved to Guangzhou (Canton), which was then the centre of Chinese trade with the outside world. He was a successful businessman and made a great fortune. Later he moved to Macao and in 1820 he was appointed the first Swedish consul general for

trade in China. The last twenty years of his life he devoted to study the history of Macao. Based on many old documents from the Macao Archives, other official works, and with the help of a Portuguese priest named Dom Joaquim de Sousa Saraiva, he wrote this comprehensive historical account of Macao. It was pioneering because he presented his work through the eyes of the Chinese. He claimed that, based on historical documents, Macao had always been Chinese territory and that the emperor had never given it to Portugal. In addition, his work comprises interesting information about foreign trade, commodities, customs and duties, and the Canton factories.

Medhurst's principal work for many years was in the translation of the Bible into Chinese, together with Charles Gützlaff, Elijah Coleman Bridgman, and John Robert Morrison. The missionaries compiled grammars and dictionaries to learn the Chinese language and adapted the Latin alphabet to represent Chinese pronounciation, and arranged the dictionaries accordingly. The printing of this rare dictionary started as early as 1831 but was delayed several times and was finally completed in 1837. A handsome copy of a remarkable work.

It contains an abridgement of Reinius' diary which was kept during the voyage. He writes briefly about the stops in Cadiz and Mauritius. In more detail, he describes the trading conditions in Canton including information on trade regulations, procedures for unloading the commodities, etc. He gives a good description of the European factories (foreign quarters) outside the city walls of Guangzhou. Reinius complete diary was first published in 1939.


51. SCHÜTZENBERGER, PAUL

First edition. Thomas Shawn was chaplain at the English factory in Algiers from 1722 to 1733. During this period, he travelled to Egypt, Palestine, Cyprus and around North Africa. "These travels have been universally esteemed, not only for their accuracy and fidelity, but on account of the illustrations they contain of natural history, of the classic authors, and especially of the Scriptures." (Lowndes). A supplement was published in 1746.

53. SHUCK, JEHU LEWIS (Ed. & Transl.)

First edition. This collection of Chinese documents relating to the outbreak of the First Opium War (1839–42) includes the edicts against the taking and trade of opium, as well as Governor Lin's rigorous edicts against English traders following the British failure to control the importation of raw opium. It's preceded by an introduction with information about poppy cultivation, preparation and use of the drug, a brief outline of the history of the import of opium into China, an epitome of the High Commissioner's efforts for the suppression of the traffic in 1839.

The sale of opium had been made illegal in China in 1800 but there was still a huge flourishing black

market for opium trade in 1838. Most of the opium was grown in British India where the drug was a legal commodity. The opium was brought to China and sold on the Lintin Island in Canton Bay. In 1839, Lin Tse-hsu, the governor of the Chinese province of Hu-Hu and appointed Imperial Commissioner, launched his anti-drug campaign and stopped the foreign smugglers of opium in Canton. But then British merchants anchored at Macao and Hong Kong instead. This was followed by British warships attacking and damaging Chinese junks that attempted to stop their ships in Hong Kong. Governor Lin Tse-Hsu was dismissed from his post as Imperial Commissioner.

John Lewis Shuck was the first American Baptist missionary to China. He arrived together with his wife in Macao in 1836 and lived and worked in Hong Kong, Canton and Shanghai. The Chinese text is printed with wooden blocks and the English with metal types that are entirely new and used here for the first time.

First edition in book form. Mary Lester, born in the Pyrenees, of British parents, was falsely promised a position at a foreign school in San Pedro Sula. The book begins in San Franscico where Mary, after some consideration, decided to travel on horse-back from the Pacific port of Ampala across the mountains of Honduras. It is a vivid and humorous account of an adventurous journey written under the pseudonym Maria Soltara. The position at the school never materialised and she returned to England. Originally published in Blackwood's Magazine (1884).

The journals cover a wide range of interesting articles, many first-hand accounts, in anthropology, archaeology and geography. The name Ymer (in English Ymir) originates from the giant Ymer in the Viking creation myth. From his body, Oden created the earth. A few examples: A.E. Nordenskiöld writes about expeditions to Greenland and Siberia including the Vega expedition; A. G. Nathorst's about Spitzbergen; Gutaf von Düben on Central Africa; Hjalmar Stolpe's famous lecture on Easter Island; E.W. Dahlgren on the Palau islands, Mexico and the Swedes in Kongo; O. Montenius on Sardinia and Egypt; C. Bovallius about the Talamanca indians; F.R. Martin's journey to Siberia; E. W Dahlgren's comprehensive account of the French voyages to the Pacific; S.A. Andrée's accounts of the preparations for the balloon expedition, equipment and trials; several accounts by Sven Hedin about his expeditions to Asia; G. De Geer on Spitzbergen.

This impressive, large collection contains strikingly elaborate wallpaper patterns, many in typical Art deco style. Featuring eye-catching floral, geometric and tropical patterns including stylised and two-dimensional plants (for example leaves of palm trees, ferns, flowers heads of roses, etc.). Rendered in bright, intense colours, often with striking contrasts, and some with gold and silver accents. Some samples are accompanied by images of rooms decorated with the corresponding design, while others have been given a narrow matching border. Palateries de Genval was founded in 1904 by Auguste Lannoye. The company specialised in the production of wrapping paper, wallpaper, especially balatum, which is a smooth material of felt soaked in bitumen and gutta-percha, similar to linoleum.

Contains many traditional French elaborate designs with floral motifs, damask patterns and several inspired by wood and tile. Others are more contemporary with "modern style" patterns. These are in the Art Deco style with geometric forms, intense colours and stylised decorations. Many plates have matching wallpaper borders attached. Small samples cut from four plates and a few plates with minor tears otherwise in excellent condition. An impressive collection in tune with the style and taste of the time.

Consists of four parts: 1. Qazaq Turki text with English translation. 2. Tartar Turki text with English translation. 3. Uz Bek Turki text with English translation. 4. An example of Stanbul Turkish [Head title].

George Hunter was one of the last great pioneer missionaries. He got to know Turkestan like no other Westerner at that time. He translated the scriptures into dialects of remote tribes. We believe that this work has only been published in a very small number.

A skilled writer, Abdul Kader, transcribed the Turki text onto the waxed stencil sheet while Hunter

wrote out the English translation. "Here we call the reader's attention to the fact that the Kirghese & the Qazaqs are quite distinct. The Qazaqs are a numerous race numbering some ten millions & extend from the Caspian Sea ... to the Alti & Kobad mountains in western Mongolia. The Kirghese are only a small tribe on the Russian Chinese border in the districts of Ush-Turfan, Kashgar & Osh. We mention this because many writers have failed to make this distinction. It has been our aim not only to give examples of the various Turkish dialects, but also to give an idea of the thoughts that are now occupying the minds of some of these Turki Mohammedans.... "(Preface).



Helmut August Zwick and Johann Gottfried Schill, Moravian missionaries and ethnologists, spent many years at the Herrnhut mission station of Sarepta (in the lower Volga) among the Kalmuc tribes. "The Petersburgh Bible Society, at the time zealously active, had sent to the Brethren at Sarepta, in the year 1822, a considerable number of copies of the Calmuc Gospel of Matthew and other small Christian tracts, with a commission to get them distributed by Brethren sent out for the purpose. This was the origin of the journey, on behalf of the Petersburgh Bible Society, of which the account is now presented to the reader" (Introduction).
