








As always the catalogue is a joint effort. I did a majority of the descriptions with Hannah doing the design and photography. Lesley worked hard to keep us all on track until it all came together.



Sepia toned portrait, plates and illustrations (some full paged) in text from photos and four folding maps and charts. Spines are almost not faded which is unusual for this title. A much superior copy. Housed in an attractive fold over box. *Rosove 8.A2; Spence 14. Account of the 1910-12 Norwegian Antarctic expedition. Amundsen, having learned that Peary*

had made his claim on the North Pole, changed course for the South Pole, crossed the Antarctic Circle on Jan. 2, 1911, and made the first motor passage of the ice pack, arriving at the Bay of Whales on Jan. 14, 1911. Amundsen established depots as far south as 82 S and made a premature bid on the pole on Sept 8, 1911, reaching only 80 S

before turning back; on October 20, 1911 they set out again. On December 14, 1911, Amundsen, Bjaaland, Wisting, Hassel and Hanssen, became the first men to reach the South pole. [ref: 145206] \$1,950 (USD 1,450) (£1,200)






"The British Polar Exhibition of 1930, held at the Central Hall, Westminster, from July 2nd to July 19th, celebrated British polar exploration and scientific advancements. It showcased a collection of relics, pictures, maps, and documents, highlighting both historical achievements and modern exploration methods, particularly aerial techniques. The exhibition also aimed to support the Scott Polar Research Institute and included a special publication, "The Polar Book," with contributions from experts in the field. This catalogue of the Exhibits listed what must have been one of the greatest showcases of polar artifacts, art, Letters etc. ever put on display.



Admiral Adam Duncan (1731-1804) was appointed Commander-in-chief in the North Sea in 1795, and in the most important action of his naval career, defeated the Dutch fleet off the coast near the village of Camperdown on 11 October 1797. For this action he was made Viscount Duncan of Camperdown on 21 October 1797.







Sabin 13796, T.P.L. 428, In a series of 23 letters, Cluny discusses the economic state of all of the colonies in British North America. He discusses the Hudson's Bay Company and is critical of their monopoly on the Fur Trade.

What I think is most interesting is the large folding map entitled "A Map of North & South America with Part of Europe, Asia & Africa". The map shows Baffins Bay and all of the unknown parts to the west and north towards the pole. The map predates Cook, Mackenzie and Hearne and thus there is a lot of speculation regarding Dobbs/ Middleton, Bering Straights and the Straits of Anian. Not in A.B. One of several variant cloth colours with this blue being the most attractive. A detailed history of the Labrador Eskimos from the early period to the late 19th century. The Moravians were among the earliest Missionaries to arrive in Labrador and settled in many areas. The book takes a very religious stand but is a first-hand account of the people in the late 19th century. Scarce.



This copy has 3 interesting letters and 2 envelopes from Edgeworth David to Professor John Read who was at the Department of Organic Chemistry, the University of Sydney. The envelopes are all addressed to Read in St. Andrews in Scotland. The letters are 2 -4 pages long and have interesting content.

Lot Essay

Davis was Second Master on Commander Crozier's Terror and a number of his drawings (probably the first ever of the Antarctic continent) were used by Ross to illustrate his official account of the voyage published in two volumes in London in 1847.

James Clark Ross had reached the northern magnetic Pole in 1831 and was charged by the Government, following the recommendation of the British Association for the Advancement of Science and the Royal Society, to lead an expedition to investigate terrestrial magnetism in the southern latitudes. The expedition was the first British exploration of the southern latitudes since Cook's skirting of the Antarctic circle in 1773-4 and the sealer Weddell's furthest south of 7415'S in 1823. Bellinghausen had probably been the first to sight the Antarctic continent in January 1820 and Dumont D'Urville then discovered Adelie Land and Claire Coast. Their work towards the discovery of an Antarctic landmass was consolidated by James Clark Ross who


penetrated the pack ice in January 1841, sailing into the clear water of the unknown Ross Sea and sighting snow-covered land on 11 January, thereby becoming the first to discover a sea route to the continent. McCormick on the Erebus saw and named an active volcano (Mt. Erebus) and Ross was the first to see and chart the South Polar Barrier which he named Victoria Barrier and which was later named the Ross Ice Barrier. He made two further navigations of the Ross Sea and Wedell Sea before returning to England in 1843.

'Jan. 7. 1843...As we advanced to the southward, two high rugged bluff capes at a great distance appeared, bearing W.S.W. (true); the nearest of them I named, at the request of Captain Crozier, after his friend Captain Nicholas Lockyer, R.N.C.B. (Capt. Sir J.C. Ross, A Voyage of Discovery and Research in the southern and Antarctic Regions, during the years 1839-43, London, 1847, II, p.346).


Spence 388. An interesting copy! The author presented the book to his friend, Johnny Parker. I think this may have been a relative. Then someone else presented the book to another friend. Then there are at least a dozen other individuals who have signed the book including Muriel Dufek, Jack Moss, Jim Murray, Chester Beck etc. I assume these are either relatives or associates from the Expedition.

Sir Edmund Hillary led the NZ party responsible for laying depots for Fuchs' return from the Pole to the Ross Sea. Hillary set up Scott Base on Ross Island, explored the Ross Sea Basin and then via the Skelton Glacier established Depot 700. Meant as his furthest point south, but with a month to wait for Fuchs, Hillary continued on to the Pole, reaching it on Jan 4, 1958, becoming the third person to do so by land. Fuchs meanwhile had left Shackleton Base on Nov. 24, 1957, with the main party reaching the Pole on Jan. 20, 1958 where he was met by Hillary, and continued on to Depot 700 on Feb 7, 1958 where Hillary, who had flown back from the Pole, guided his party to the Ross Sea. Fuchs, while at McMurdo Station, was knighted by telegram for becoming the first man to cross Antarctica by land.

The First edition was published three years after Hearne's death in 1795. "The author will be remembered as the first white man that ever gazed on the dreary expanse of the Arctic of Frozen Ocean from the northern shores of the Continent of America". This day-to-day record of his three trips northwest by land and river from Hudson Bay was printed as a result of the French Explorer, La Perouse, who discovered the manuscript when he captured Fort Albany and as a condition of the surrender, the manuscript was to be published.

Hendrik was hired by the American explorer Elisha Kent Kane for the 1853-55 Second Grinnell Expedition to search for the lost Franklin expedition. He established his worth in the winter of 1854 when participating in a search for four of the men who were lying frozen and disabled somewhere northwest of the ship, which was beset in the ice in Rensellaer Bay. His skills enabled him to find the lost explorers sled track and thus save them.

This is a very special copy with the title page bearing a presentation inscription from Dr. William Osler to Dr. O. (Oliver) C. Edwards and dated XI 8 92. Dr. Edwards has also put his ownership rubberstamp next to the inscription. Dr. Edwards was born in 1850 in Ontario and studied medicine at McGill University. In 1882 Edwards was appointed medical doctor to the Department of Indian Affairs serving in the Qu'Appelle valley of Saskatchewan. In 1885 he became the first President of the Council of the Northwest Territories College of Physicians and Surgeons. It seems Edwards and Osler were long time friends as there is a typed letter, signed and loosely inserted from Olser and dated 1896. There is also a photocopy of a much later letter dated from 1911 to Edwards from Osler after he moved to the UK. The contents of the two letters is personal and interesting. A great item connecting Osler to Edwards and Western Canada.

18 watercolor illustrations on thick card (19.8 X 13 cm.) The illustrations fill most of the middle and top of the cards. About half have a mounted paper label starting with (1). The cards are well worn at the edges. The surface is quite soiled but for the most part the images seemed to have survived the wear of time. There are a couple of closed tears but not into the images. The quality is very accomplished indeed.

The 18 cards (complete?) seem to tell the adventure of a young boy named Olaf and his getting lost in the frozen tundra. The first card shows young Olaf in full arctic garb holding a spear and standing next to his trusty husky and sled! Olaf and his trusty dog are off on the land and encounter a family of polar bears who are cooking their dinner over a fire in a pot!!! Olaf makes friends with the family and there are images of him playing and even one of bears having a tug of war with a walrus. Olaf seems to get homesick but with his polar bear friends encounters a giant snowman with searchlight eyes. One of the polar bears makes a giant snowball and seems to want to eat Olaf. All ends well in the end with Olaf heading home with his husky pulling his sled. The last card seems to be Olaf relating the story to his mother at the dinner table which has mistletoe on it! Most of the images are quite authentic for the clothing, sled and landscape. I am not sure if all the cards are here but what is here certainly tells a fun story. Very uncommon original Arctic artwork.




