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This very focussed working library is dedicated to Ottoman and Turkish history, law, politics, and diplomacy. Spanning several centuries of scholarship, the collection represents a treasure trove for historians.

Anchored in primary sources and essential historiography, it features foundational Ottoman chronicles and biographical dictionaries, including the multi-volume works of Cevdet Paşa, İsmail Hakkı Uzunçarşılı, and Bursalı Mehmed Tahir. Scholars will find extensive resources detailing the intricacies of Ottoman governance, such as provincial administration (*Sancaktan Eyalete*), religious endowments (*Vakıflar*), and legal systems (*Türk Hukuk Tarihi*).

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
