

Dear Customers and Friends,



Lovely 19th Century Gift Book



1. Andrews, James - THE PARTERRE: or, Beauties of Flora. Twelve Highly-Finished Drawings by James Andrews. Cloth quite faded, rear cover partially and lightly stained, spine worn with ends chipped, hinges weak.

One plate chipped along fore-edge. Good.

This title was originally published in 1837 as Flora's Gems, with poetry by Louisa Anne Twamly. The publishers, Tilt and Bogue, issued several folio gift books featuring floral illustrations by James Andrews with accompanying poetry during the mid-19th century. James Andrews (1801-1876) was an accomplished botanical artist and art teacher. His work appeared in



a number of botanical books (e.g., The Illustrated Bouquet 1857-64, Flowers and Heraldry 1851) as well as periodicals (e.g., Florist, Fruitist and Garden Miscellany 1857-1861, The Floral Magazine 1862-71). A nice example of a 19th century gift book. \$1,500.00

Volume 1 with 3 extra color plates tipped in: one, before the half-title, plus two

fruit plates from the 1908 USDA *Yearbook* tipped in Index. A few color plates with some very light

foxing, mainly on verso. Covers scuffed, name of "John Thompson, Clinton, NY" in early hand and another name in more modern hand on half-titles.

This comprehensive and well-illustrated work on apples was part of U. P. Hedrick's "Fruits of New York" series and was the only title in the series printed in an octavo rather than a quarto format. Generally good set of this detailed landmark work. \$200.00

Frederick Orpen Bower (1855-1948) was a British botanist, lecturer and author who wrote a number of books on botany including a three volume work on ferns. He was a



Fellow of the Royal Society, the Royal Society of Edinburgh and several other scientific societies. The first half of this work is an account of the author's life and the history of reform in scientific education following the publication of Darwin's works. Included also is biographical material about the main figures of the age including von Sachs, Thiselton-Dyer, Balfour, Bentham and J. D. Hooker. VG. \$60.00

Covers somewhat scuffed, corners bumped, modern pencil name on front endpaper. Frontispiece, title and last few leaves foxed; foxing at margins elsewhere.

(5 - cont.) Thomas Bridgeman was an Englishman who immigrated to New York City in 1824. He and his two sons, Andrew and Alfred, operated one of the most well established seed houses in New York City. The Young Gardener's Assistant was the first of Bridgeman's horticulture books and was originally published in Brooklyn 1829. It contains three sections: vegetables, flowers and fruits. It was later expanded and issued as The American Kitchen-Gardener, and then revised in 1866 to comprise the first section of his The American Gardener's Assistant. It was a work long popular due to its very practical monthly instructions, running through 14 editions between 1829 and 1872. Bridgeman wrote three other practical and popular works: The Florist's Guide, The Kitchen Gardener's Instructor, and The Fruit Cultivator's Manual. A generally good copy of an early, influential and popular 19th century horticultural manual.

Spine ends and corners chipped, 19th century engraved library label of "Henry B. Curtis" with this book numbered 601, pencil name of H. B. Curtis on title, some leaves dog-eared, light foxing. Erasure marks on inner margin of the lower half of the title page which have gone through 3/4" of inner margin. Good.

Robert Buist (1805-1880) was a Scotsman who immigrated to Philadelphia in 1828, where he apprenticed with D. Landreth and soon thereafter, in 1830, formed a business partnership with Thomas Hibbert as importers of rare plants, with a specialty in roses. When Hibbert died in 1833, Buist continued a seed business under his own name. His business was such a success that in 1848 he purchased land outside of Philadelphia for his 100 acre nursery which he named "Rosedale" and which at the time was the largest nursery in the U.S. Buist was also a prominent horticultural writer. This title, essentially a monthly calendar of work to be done in the flower garden, was published first in 1832 and was co-authored by Hibbert and Buist. His other works included The Rose Manual (1844) [See #5 below], and The Family Kitchen-Gardener (1847). All of these manuals were very popular as they were among the first which were readily usable to gardeners. They were printed in a number of editions.

Fearing Burr, Jr. (1815-1897) was a Massachusetts seedsman and author who was a well-respected and



quite active contributor to horticulture in the mid-19th century. His book, Field & Garden Vegetables of America was first published in 1863 and reprinted in 1865. A condensed version of the book titled Garden Vegetables and How to Cultivate Them, was published in 1866. As Woodburn states in her Addenda to Hedrick's A History of Horticulture in America (Portland, OR 1988), Burr's book, "the most comprehensive examination of the diversity of 19th century food crops, received acclaim when it was published and is sought after today for its listings of now-lost varieties." 

Andrew Jackson Downing (1815-1852) was an American horticulturist and prolific author whose Fruits & Fruit Trees of America (1845) was as influential in the field of pomology as his Treatise on the Theory and Practice of Landscape Gardening (1841) was in the field of landscape gardening. Fruits & Fruit Trees of America was Downing's third book and it quickly became the standard American pomology; it was published in approximately 20 editions through the rest of the 19th century. Good copy of an early printing of this landmark work.



Reginald Farrer (1880-1920) was a plant explorer and author of a number of rock garden and alpine plant books. The Rock Garden, first published in 1907, was his most popular work. The "Present Day Gardening" series comprised 17 titles and was issued under the general editorship of R. Hooper Pearson, editor of Gardener's Chronicle. Nice copy. \$25.00

Bound together in boards with leather back and gilt-decorated raised bands, gilt title in spine panel noting "Felton & Johnson / On Gardening." Hinges cracked, some marginalia in an early hand. An article from "The Garden" magazine Dec. 24, 1887 is tipped in cover discussing horticultural periodicals in 1837. A handwritten notation on verso of front free endpaper stating "This book was given to me by my friend Thomas Spanswick publisher of "The Garden" January 21st 1885. F. W. Burbidge."

The first 84pp. of Felton's work contains an account of 69 early British horticultural writers, arranged chronologically, whose portraits he has not been able to locate. He then discusses the authors for whom he has been able to find portraits and where they are to be found. Brief bibliographic and biographical information is included for all. Johnson's work begins with a chapter on Roman gardens. He then describes in chronological order British horticultural history beginning with an introduction to the period which is followed by an annotated bibliography of British horticultural works.

As a gift from the publisher of a well-known horticultural periodical of the time to a well-known plantsman and horticultural author of the time, this is an interesting association copy, further enhanced by its being a custom bound set of two scarce early 19th century works on English garden history. Frederick William Burbidge (1847-1905) was a tropical plant explorer who collected plants for the Veitch Nurseries. He was also an author of a number of books on plants including Domestic Floriculture (1874), Cultivated Plants (1877), and The Narcissus; Its History & Culture (1875). \$650.00



The D.M. Ferry company was established in 1856 in Detroit, MI. and was known for innovating the use of seed packet for selling seeds as well as for using display racks to show them. D.M. Ferry merged with the C.C. Morse Co. in 1930 to become the Ferry-Morse Co. \$85.00



The frontispiece has been nicely re-margined. One plate has been reinforced on verso. Unobtrusive 1" x 3/4" oval stamp of the Homerton College Society on the title. Moderate offsetting of text onto plates and from plates onto text. Small hole on p.223/224 affecting a few letters on p.224. The Homerton College Society was established in 1730 as a school for educating "Protestant dissenters" for Christian Ministry. It is now a college of the University of Cambridge. Very nice copy.

Sir John Hill (circa 1716-1775) was a physician, apothecary, and prolific writer on many subjects including natural history and the theater. He was a controversial figure and his strong opinions alienated a number of the peri-




edition of The British Herbal in 52 parts between January 1756 and January 1757; it was then bound into one volume, as here. The large paper edition was issued in 52 weekly parts beginning in January 1757. The work contains descriptions of plants with their native location, alternate names from earlier authors, and often some quibbling with Linnaeus about his classification of specific plants. Uses in medicine and cookery

are included as well. Hill was a prolific writer, perhaps most famous for his 26-volume The Vegetable System (1759-1775), which he completed under the patronage of Lord Bute. The British Herbal is noteworthy not only for being one of the first botanical books published after the introduction of Linnaean nomenclature but also for its criticism of Linnaeus' classification system. \$1,500.00

teacher. She was the first person to establish a juvenile department at an American publishing house (Macmillan). She was also an avid book collector and her library contained some 3,500 children's books. **INSCRIBED by the author** on half-title: "to Louise Bechtel if it had not been for her encouragement and helpful criticism the book would not have been published - Gratefully, Helen M Fox." A scarce work on the medicinal plants, trees and shrubs predominantly of France but of other countries as well. It is arranged by disease, and contains brief notes on how the plant is used. Includes an alphabetical index of plants with page references to the diseases for which they are used. OCLC lists a total of six copies held in libraries, only one of which is held in the U.S. Very good. \$400.00



In 1833 the title was changed to Botany for Beginners; a "New edition" was issued in 1864. 
