Former Arktisk Institut copy. Library stamps on the front end papers. Some foxing throughout. Overall in very good condition.

An early Greenlandic book which I believe is a guide to church services on Sunday and holidays, Thanks to Kenn Harper for this as I could not find it in the Greenlandic bibliography! Seems scarce with no copies on the internet.





Not found in any of the standard polar references. Renard records a copy in his auction sale. The map only in his famous Antarctic sale in 1994 as lot 513. the basis of the report is the loss of three ships on route from Britain to Australia. The map provides future shipping with a range for the southern ice zone. The map is based on the voyages of Cook, Bellinghausen, Weddell, Ross, etc. Very Scarce.

Arctic Biblio. 682. Personal narrative of the surgeon on board HMS
"Investigator" (Captain R. M'Clure) on the search for the missing Franklin expedition, 1850-1854. Having reached the Arctic Islands via Bering Strait, the ship became solidly beset at Mercy Bay, Northern Banks Island and had to be abandoned there.

Her crew hiked across the ice of M'Clure Strait to Dealy Island, where HMS
"Resolute: and "Intrepid" were wintering; thereafter these ships wintered yet again off Cape Cockburn, Bathurst Island and in the spring of 1854 were in turn abandoned in the ice. Their crews (and those of "Investigator") hiked across the ice to the depot ship "North Star" at Beechey island; the latter vessel and the supply ships "Phoenix" and "Talbot" then brought them back to England. On the basis of this complicated journey M'Clure and his crew were recognized as having discovered the Northwest Passage. Very scarce in this condition and a wonderful binding.





56 pp Tall Octavo. (26.5 X 19.3 cm.) Bound in half brown cloth and marbled boards for the Marinens Bibliothek. Frontis portait of Drygalski. 2 illustrations which have been mounted on fairly acidic paper which has stained a few other leaves. Otherwise a great copy of a fragile item.

Not in Rosove, Spence or any of the other standard bibliographies. It also appeared in a German journal Sonder-Abdruck aus der Zeitschrift der Gesellschaft fur Erdkunde zu Berlin, volume XXXVI 1901 No. 4. As my German is not as good as I would like it to be, I believe this is the prospective for the Drygalski German Antarctic expedition and this item is a separately issued offprint of the Journal version. This has separate pagination while the Journal article is paginated 165-218. I have not found out much about the author as yet. It must be very rare if no one has referenced it before and even more so as a separate item.



Not in the standard bibliographies or that I could find. In 1899, Benard founded the Société d'océanographie de France 1 and became acquainted with Albert I Prince of Monaco. Bringing together private capital, it organized an expedition to the Arctic in 1908 to study the fishing systems of Norway and Lapland, conduct oceanographic surveys in the Barents Sea and conduct research in New Emble. It seems this 1903 prospectus was his first attempt at putting together an expedition that did not get off the ground until 1908. The brochure has an image of a modified Fram for Expedition and a long extensive budget! The 1908 expedition ended poorly when Bénard abandoned his ship and crew at Arkhangel'sk, leaving the organizing committee with the problems of fixing the mess and returning the crew. Brochure seems rare and a bit of a grand production with the laid paper and being printed by the Prince.




J. B. Z. Bolduc was born in Lower Canada, educated at the Quebec Seminary, and upon ordainment was sent to Oregon Territory as a missionary in 1841, This valuable account, published in 1843, gives Bolduc's journal of his voyage from Boston, by way of Cape Horn, to the Oregon country where was to take up his work in the missions already established there by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Quebec. He set sail the 12th of September 1841, and visited Chili and the Pacific Islands of Gambier, Tahiti and Hawaii. His journal gives valuable accounts of each of these locations, descriptions of the geography, the native inhabitants, missionary work and local communities.

"The author gives an eye-witness account of the founding of Victoria, B.C." [Lande, 970].

Interesting presentation inscription (not from author) dated March 1850. Some darkening on edges of boards, primarily on the front. Small dents on top and bottom edges. Corners moderately bumped. A superior copy of a book that is usually found rebound or heavily foxed and soiled.

Arctic Bibl. 2344; Abbey Travel 637; TPL 3047. One of the first Franklin search expeditions, Ross attempted to follow Franklin's route, but could not penetrate Lancaster Sound further than North Somerset, where the ships wintered. There is apparently no published first-hand narrative of the expedition. This is one of the three Search for Franklin colour plate titles published, the other two being the





Like most scientific reports published, these were done over a period of time, not printed in large quantities and difficult to put together a complete set. You can start with the first one here!

Rosove 64 Denuce 2405 Spence 258 Rosove in his bibliography records this report as rare! Richard bought the item in 1985 from Wheldon & Wesley for 10 Pounds. The contents contain a preliminary summary of the scientific results of the Expedition. The individual reports are the same as the appendices in Le Pourquoi-Pas dans L'Antarctique. I have not seen a copy before and this is a great collectable copy.





A bit of browning, more on the preliminaries, but generally a nice clean copy.

NMM cat. 902a. First edition. The author was midshipman on the H.M.S. Herald during her circumnavigation of the globe and three cruises into the arctic regions in Search of Sir John Franklin. The author's father offered him 5 Pounds if he kept a diary! This was 40% of his yearly salary and a big inducement. Unfortunately, when the book was published he was still waiting on the Five Pound note. There is a second edition, printed in 1862 which is not much more than a reprint. Both editions are rare and very seldom come on the market, especially in nice condition.







Wrapper and text have a bit of professional restoration and are a bit soiled. Plate images are 40 X 30.5 cm. Images have a bit of light foxing on the blank outer edges but generally are clean. A much superior copy with the rare front wrapper, text, and map.

Arctic Biblio. 3477 The rarest of the four arctic colour plate volumes and certainly the most impressive due to its large format. Very difficult to find complete and without any trimming as many copies were broken up over the years. Cresswell was a very accomplished artist and several of the images have become iconic and often represented in arctic history volumes. It seems many copies when they were bound lost the outer wrappers. This copy housed in a large attractive fold over box. See the other 3 arctic colour plate books in this catalogue. A great chance to buy the set!

Compare Rosove 86. Very rare! We have had in the past a version of the Report dated 1918 and printed in Melbourne. It seems like with a lot of government documents, there are often variants printed in a short span. After comparing Rosove 86 with the last version we sold, this would appear to be the earliest version and was printed in New Zealand rather than Australia and a year earlier. It is 9 pages and not 14 as the version in Rosove and the two maps in the later edition are also not included in this version. There is no evidence that there ever were maps with this version. There is one single other correction in ink in the text. My best guess is this is the earliest version printed in New Zealand and the maps were not ready or an afterthought. It is obviously rare and perhaps unique as Rosove had not found a copy. There have been no copies at auction and we cannot trace another copy. Davis's journals were printed by Bluntisham Books in 1997 and called Trial by Ice, edited by Louise Crossley.





This is the second edition after the first appeared in 1853, also done by the Hakluyt Society. The very extensive introductions provide valuable insight into the original text which is presented here as well. One of the scarcer Hakluyt Society publications that deal with 16th century Arctic Exploration






Sabin 20406, TPL 194. This is the second pamphlet of seven produced between Arthur Dobbs and Christopher Middleton, collectively known as the Dobbs/Middleton pamphlet war. The first pamphlet was produced by Middleton in 1743 with the last pamphlet being produced in 1745, also by Middleton. Each pamphlet dealt with

the author's opinions regarding the exploration for a passage of water between Hudson's Bay and the Pacific. Middleton, a Captain in the employ of the HBC was tasked with the exploration and had Dobbs initial support. After Middleton returned, Dobbs felt that they had found the passage through to the West Coast but Middleton thought the opposite. Dobbs thought that Middleton was hiding the discovery and unfortunately things soured between the two men and this long and heated exchange took place. All of the pamphlets are rare and do not show up on the market very often. The only complete set was in the Brooke-Hitching sale in 2014 making 212,500 Pounds. This individual item has not been at auction since 2002 when it made \$6,900.00 US.



One of the first published accounts of Captain Cook's third voyage during which he discovered the Sandwich Islands and acquired many datum on Alaska and the NW Coast of America. In defiance of the Admiralty's insistence that no private journal of this voyage be retained, Ellis was the only Englishman who had the guts to admit authorship. The fine plates, drawn by the author, who was assistant surgeon, are among the earliest established on these areas. This third edition is just a reprint of the first and there does not seem to be any changes. The Third edition must have been printed in fairly small numbers as it seems much scarcer than the first. If you like copies in original boards, this certainly is a copy to consider. The bookplate is from Howland Windsor Loring.

Certainly one of the most interesting prospectus's I have seen before. Interesting that Thomas Streeter had an example in his collection.



There are 20 small vignette images of Klondike themed items. A large White Pass Railway ad, and on the front cover a map showing Northern Canada. The first interesting thing when you open to the title page is a Robert Service poem "Written Specially for the Dawson News"! There are over 60 individual articles written on all aspects of life in the North and composed by the who's who of famous people. You certainly get the impression that Dawson was booming 10 years after the Rush. One of the most interesting images is of a map of a 50 mile long Main Line Ditch to provide water for the mines. It must have been an engineering marvel!! Rare and I am surprised Gary never encountered another example.







Macaulay was a Judge of the Territorial Court, Dawson. He was elevated to the Bench in 1902 and preceded over the Court in the Yukon Territory for 39 years. This document provides Macalulay's report on the trial and appeal of Rokuichi Yoshioka, a Japanese born Dawson fox farmer. He was accused, tried, and convicted of the crime by a jury. The trial was 6 days long, after which the accused was convicted and hanged on the 23rd of November 1917. I am not

sure what happened with the appeal. Although not a Gold Rush item, certainly a very interesting document related to a murder in Dawson City. It must have been sensational and a major event in Dawson. Constable Stallworthy of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police was the investigating officer and provided testimony during the trial. Over the years I have had a number of primary source documents like this but nothing for Dawson and only one other murder before. This document or another copy was addressed To The Honorable The Secretary of State for Canada in Ottawa. Usually documents like this do not survive. A rare and interesting item.

I have done this trip before in an inflatable and it was very exciting as I continued to Fort Yukon over the Arctic Circle. There were no tourist facilities when I did the trip! Like all of these early promotional pamphlets, they have become very scarce.



The Miners are holding mine tools and seem to be posing for the image as opposed as working at the time. The first thing that strikes me is the complexity of the image with a flume above them to deliver water and a complex mine shaft. The second observation is how much timber was used to support the flume and the shaft. They must have kept sawmills going 7 days a week and cleared vast areas of timber. Wolfe was well established as a photographer in

Dawson City and worked out on the claims as well as in town. It seems he had a studio and worked in the area until at least 1915. A great image.








There also was a Dublin edition also published in 1789 and appears to just be a reprint of the London edition. The book is very rare and at the time Lada-Mocarski could only locate 3 copies in the US and it seems the British Library did not have a copy. This is the only copy we have handled, and initially passing through my hands in 2002 and now coming back to our stock. At the time of writing this, there was a single copy on the internet at over \$87,000.00 CAD




This watercolour and several others recently surfaced from the Kellett family along with Kellet's sledging flag. The flag is now in the Naval Museum in Portsmouth. McDougall served as Second Master on the Resolute and was a very accomplished artist.

The image depicts the HMS Resolute in the foreground and the Intrepid in the background. The Intrepid was a steam tender and the smaller of the two ships. Both ships are seen moving along, under sail in the image. Both ships were part of Belcher's Arctic Squadron and formed the Western Searching group. The Resolute and three of the other ships were abandoned in 1854 after being beset in the ice. This was done under Belcher's controversial orders. The Resolute finally broke free of the ice in the next season and was spotted and recovered by an American whaler. The ship was returned to the British People in a grand ceremony attended by Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and even Lady Franklin was there. The ship was eventually decommissioned and salvaged for timber. Two larger desks were made with some of the wood and a small writing desk that was presented to Queen Victoria. The larger desk has graced the office of many of the US presidents including John F. Kennedy. There is a famous photo of his son looking out from under the desk. A great chance to acquire an attractive watercolur, executed on the expedition and with a great history.



This envelope was probably written by a family member and mailed to the Naval Yard at Portsmouth where it was transferred to Allen Young's Expedition on the "Pandora". Young in his book states they arrived in Portsmouth on the 22nd of May and the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh visited the ship on the 23rd of May. After final preparations the ship left Portsmouth on the 27th of May for Cowes. The mail was taken by the Pandora, which was going to meet the Alert and the Discovery near Ellesmere Island. As it turned out the ships never met, and the mail was not transferred over to the two ships until after they returned home to the UK. Overall a fantastic artifact. Ex Peter Wordie collection. "The routine & trivialities, the meandering cliques and passing animosities of the day are all unworthy of being placed on record & yet each day has its little enlivening incidents that make life worth living....." So wrote Thomas Orde-Lees on 23 October 2015 as he and his companions awaited a rescue that they didn't know with certainty was coming.

Just as the opening guns of World War I were sounding, the Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition set out for the south pole under the leadership of Ernest Shackleton. The expedition aimed to cross Antarctica from the Weddell Sea to McMurdo Sound via the Pole, but instead the expedition ship was trapped in the jaws of sea ice and drifted for ten months. Eventually escaping with the lifeboats and travelling over open water to Elephant Island, Orde-Lees and his companions were to spend months living aboard two boats as Shackleton and five other men set out on a desperate journey to South Georgia in search of help. Orde-Lees and his companions were rescued on 30 August 1916; Orde-Lees received the Silver Polar Medal for his part in the expedition.

This work was privately published by Margot Morrell and is a rough draft of a transcription from the diary of Orde-Lees, documenting his experiences during that traumatic adventure. At the time of this cataloguing, there were no other copies of these scarce volumes available online. Among many interesting notes are the records he kept of the food consumed; penguins, seal meat, and the expedition dogs were included on the menu.

These volumes belonged to Captain Richard Campbell, OBE, of the Royal Navy. Campbell specialized in Hydrographic Surveying and worked in various regions round the world including Antarctica. He both wrote and edited publications for the Hakluyt Society. Campbell's bookplate is on the front pastedown of these volumes.



John Rae was the famous HBC explorer from the Orkney Islands, who traveled vast distances in the Arctic with only the bare essentials and minimal support. He discovered the first evidence of the fate of Sir John Franklin and his crew and the last link of the navigable North West Passage. He fell afoul of Lady Franklin and Charles Dickens based on his options of cannibalism during the Franklin crew's retreat. His achievements are the basis for legends and in my opinion, he is a true hero.

Rae did not sign a lot of things and his signature is not common at all. This letter is very interesting with him writing to the editor of Nature magazine with his observations on the reanimation of frozen fish! Shackleton comments on the objectives of the expedition, the people, the science, methodology and gives tributes from famous people and the press. This is rare first state where Shackleton was trying to woo John King Davis to be the Captain of the Endurance. He states this in the text and Davis absolutely refused and Shackleton had to redo the offending text or face Davis's wrath! The second issue has the corrections and if you want to say, it seems to be somewhat more common.

It is hard to imagine a more interesting copy than this example. This copy is boldly signed by Shackleton to his Old Friend and Shipmate Ernest Shackleton. We have never seen or heard of a copy as interesting. This copy was purchased 35 years ago from Maggs and only recently has come back on the market. 

Identified specimens like this are very rare from the Antarctic and I have only seen a handful ever turn up for sale. An interesting fact: Mount Erebus' summit crater was first achieved by members

of Sir Ernest Shackleton's party; Professor Edgeworth David, Sir Douglas Mawson, Dr Alister Mackay, Jameson Adams and Dr Eric Marshall. I am assuming at least one of the specimens was collected at that time.

This is the first example of this plate I have encountered before. While other Polar expeditions, like the Nares Expedition and Scott's Discovery expedition had ceramic dinner services, I find it unusual to find an enameled dish. I believe the Fram had enameled cups etc. though. I believe another dealer may have sold an example of the plate but I have not confirmed this. Shackleton a was member of the Royal Yacht Squadron and when he renamed the ship was allowed to add the R.Y.S. title. This was removed after Shackleton's death and the ship was sold in 1923.

AB 18137. A classic overland travel narrative of a Canadian Geological Survey in 1893 sent out to make an exploratory survey of the interior of the Keewatin District. Joseph Burr and brother James William set out from Edmonton travelling via the Athabasca River and Lake Athabasca to Black Lake, travelling north by canoe, they followed the Chipman River to Selwyn and Wholdaia Lakes, then continued down the Dubawnt River to Dubawnt Lake discovering Barlow, Carey and *Markham Lakes in the process. They ex*plored the area for a week searching for the outlet of the Dubawnt River, before continuing on through Baker Inlet to Chesterfield Inlet discovering Grant Lake, the mouth of Chamberlain River, Wharton Lake, Aberdeen Lake, and Schultz Lake on the way. On September 13, they left Chesterfield Inlet for home travelling down the



west coast of Hudson Bay to Churchill, and from there overland by snowshoe to Winnipeg arriving on January 2, 1894. Interestingly, there doesn't appear to have been a second edition after the first of 1897. Inscribed to McNeill? by the author and date 1913 on the front endpaper. Modern bookplate on pastedown.

Led by Ernest Shackleton, a sledging party came within 97 nautical miles of the South Pole. Another group, led by T. W. Edgeworth, came within the area of the south magnetic pole. The expedition also was the first to ascend Mount Erebus. This volume was personally arranged and edited by Edward Wilson's great nephew David Wilson, who worked with descendants of the Nimrod families to access family albums and scrapbooks to illustrate the story.


