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
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Dear Friends,

Tyrrell's book on David Thompson.

Group of Four Photographic Postcards

[1] "Terra Nova" at Cardiff - Group of Four Photographic Postcards. Cardiff: No publisher details, 1913.

Picture side: Black glossy photographic postcards. Title handwritten in the negative, lower centre. Address side: photo post card printed, details on the back. Printed in black. No publisher details available. These postcards are being sold as a group of four rare Antarctic "Terra Nova" items. Based on the images that we have seen, it is believed a set would have contained at least seven images.

Image One: Sleeping Bag Used at the Antarctic - Speculated by Dominic Winters Auctioneers that the man in the sleeping bag may have been Tom Crean, who was awarded the Albert Medal for volunteering to make a solo mission to rescue Scott's party in 1912. Crean was also part of the recovery expedition to find and bury the bodies of Scott, Wilson and Bowers in November of 1912. The identity of the photographer is not known. Winters proposes Edward McKenzie as a possibility.

Image Two: Ski's & ski sticks belonging to late Lieut. Bowers - Photographer unidentified; suggested by Dominic Winters that it may be Edward McKenzie. Whilst the rest of Scott's party had their skis with them when they achieved the South Pole, Bowers didn't and had to walk. His skis and sticks returned home on the Terra Nova without him.



Image Three: Commodore Evans Onboard "Terra Nova" - This photograph is believed to have been taken on 14 June 1913 at Cardiff. Evans was Scott's second in command on the ill-starred Terra Nova expedition, personally coming within 150 miles of the Pole. Rather than completing the journey, Evans was sent back in command of the last supporting party. Evans became so ill with scurvy that he barely survived himself. Just over a year after this photograph was taken, World War One intervened and Evans spent the war as the captain of a destroyer.

Image Four: Wharton KI-6. This rare photographic postcard is dated 14 June 1916. A photo of Terra Nova taken at anchor in harbour from a distance. May have been taken from another boat. The successful British attainment of the South Pole had not only come second to the Roald Amundsen Norwegian effort, but had also cost every one of the explorers who had achieved it their lives. It is believed that 60,000 people may have turned out to greet the ship at Cardiff. Only two months later, the "Terra Nova", newly outfitted as a sealer, departed Wales for her new role in Newfoundland, leaving behind her wooden figurehead, which had been presented to the City of Cardiff as a memorial. The expedition, the ship and her crew are still remembered today, with a café in Cardiff christened the "Terra Nova" in their honour.

Summary: This group of four scarce photographic postcards document the return voyage of the "Terra Nova" from the Antarctic in 1913, and its arrival in Cardiff, Wales on 14 June 1913. The images capture a series of unique and fleeting historic moments.



colour. Remnants of an old paper label on the spine and dated 1756. All edges trimmed. Bookplate on front pastedown. Engraved plate used as frontispiece. Folding maps. 4 other plates including 2 folding. A fine clean copy with a very crisp text block.

This edition not in Jenkins. Second and best edition of this early Greenland/ Iceland/Davis Strait history with sections on whaling. Also included is an early Danish-Dutch-Greenlandic dictionary as an appendix. Johan Anderson (1674-1743) was a German lawyer and the son of a merchant who owned the whaling ship "Ammon". Anderson's work was first posthumously published in 1746 in German. Anderson never traveled to either Iceland or Greenland. Niels Horrebow (1712-1760) was a Danish author and scientist. In 1749 he went to Iceland and explored there for three years. Horrebow's work was originally published in 1752 as "Tilforladelige Efterretninger om Island". It provides corrections to Anderson's work and gives detailed descriptions of Iceland, its geography, people and natural history. 
John Barrow Junior was the son of Sir John Barrow, second secretary of the Admiralty and one of the most powerful administrators of the admiralty during his life. The son certainly took after the father and became very influential in his own right. One of his earliest works was this yachting trip to Iceland in 1834. He went on to be very important for developing records management and was Head of the Record Office from 1844. He was also very influential during the Search for Franklin period. This title is also a very early example of a cloth binding.



The expedition wintered at Cape Adare, the first expedition to winter on the Antarctic continent and the first to sledge towards the South Pole.





Publisher Albert & Charles Boni produced this very scarce edition of an otherwise common book. It is bound in more of a special binding and I believe better paper. Contributors include Roy Chapman Andrews, Prentiss N. Gray, Felix Riesenberg, George K. Cherrie, Frederick S.



Dellenbaugh, William J. Morden, John P. Holman, J. Monroe Thorington, Dillon Wallace, etc., and Arctic explorers Robert A. Bartlett, Anthony Fiala, William H. Hobbs, Viljalmur Stefansson, and Hubert Wilkins. Certainly a who is who of early 20th century exploration including many polar explorers. Although there is no printed limitation the book seems very scarce with this being the second copy we have handled. 



Rosove 52-4.A1. The fourth and largest volume of the very scarce Scottish Antarctic Expedition Scientific Results. The volumes mainly comprises the Vertebrates and is made up with contributions of dozens of different scientists. Volume 1 was unpublished and volume 4 was in two parts. The set was published from 1907 to 1920 and all volumes seem particularly scarce with complete sets rare. Many of the plates are particularly striking and were printed in black and white as well as colour. There do not appear to be any library markings in the book.





Forbes 491; Hill 223; Holmes 82; Howes B1001; Sabin 9386; Streeter sale VI:3510. Not in Lada-Mocarski. First edition of an uncommon work of Pacific exploration and northern exploration. It gives a very good, early, first-hand account of Cook's death. This later title is supplemental to Burney's great five-volume Chronological History of the Discoveries in the South Seas (published between 1803-1817) and concentrates on the discoveries and voyages made by all the main maritime nations in the North East Arctic regions, but also incorporates the author's earlier research into Russian discoveries. The author notes that his original intention had been to write a history of the maritime discoveries made by the Russians in all parts of the globe, but dismissed the idea as too broad. The author sailed with Cook on his Second Voyage, was also on the Third Voyage. Although a plain binding, a very presentable copy all the same.




Robert Evelyn Byrd was a pioneering American aviator and explorer, and his celebrity status ensured that items related to his North Pole and Transatlantic





In contrast to the earlier European expeditions to the Antarctic, American ventures were large and well-funded. Little America, a generously supplied base, was constructed on the Ross Ice Shelf in 1929. Explorations involved not only sea and land observations, but the use of planes as well, and Richard Byrd and three companions completed the first flight over the South Pole. After such a triumphant and well publicized event, Byrd returned to the Antarctic from 1933 - 1935. This book documents the controversial adventures of the five months he spent alone in Little America, at times in temperatures below -76 F.

This book is one of 1000 numbered copies signed by Byrd and the publishers on the limitation leaf, printed from a different type setting than the trade edition. This book is numbered 582. A fine copy in the box. Spence 227. "Preceded by a shower of crystals, I descended slowly.... I found myself standing in a grotto, with the domed walls curving in above me, and the refracted illumination from the searchlight falling through the slit rose in a glorious rainbow." So wrote Richard Evelyn Boyd, in a chapter from Little America entitled, "Civilization Doesn't Matter." This book is the story of a large and well-funded American expedition to Antarctica. Boyd described the dramatic Antarctic landscapes, which the vast majority of his readers would never see, blending his poetic narratives with details about the cutting edge 1930s technology



that was being used to document and explore this most mysterious of continents. As a note on the provenance, it may be of interest to collectors to know that this volume came from the library of polar historian Marty Greene.




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

Two very large folding maps in Volume 1. Volume 1 has pages 265-271 with duplicate number on the next quire but is continuous and complete. Text blocks in each volume are very clean and crisp. A superior copy with almost no staining in the text.

Sabin 11150, TPL 586. Cox Vol 2 page 166 and Lande 106, O'Dea 245a. This is the first and only edition of one of the earliest and most important works on Labrador. The author was a former British army officer and brother of the celebrated Major John Cartwright. He was engaged by a group of British merchants to trade with the Canadian Esquimaux in Labrador. During the years 1770-86, he made six long fishing and trapping expeditions to Labrador and established posts near Sandwich Bay. The journal provides a very detailed account of the fur trade, native peoples, and natural history of Labrador. 

Allen Ronaghan was a school teacher and historian who lived in the small hamlet of Islay, just east of Vermillion, AB. He was a prominent local historian and wrote many articles and published local histories. Apparently in the late 1970's he became aware of Evans who was in his 90's at the time. Ronaghan was either asked to or decided to interview Evans on tape and record his life experiences. It seems there were two sessions and this typescript is the result of the interviews. The first half of the interview deals with the polar expeditions Evans was on, and a good portion of the second part does as well. There is also much on Evans' life and experiences in Western Canada as an early pioneer. I am not sure if the original tapes survived but Ronaghan states he placed copies with the Provincial Archives and in Norway. Evans must have lived with his two daughters on the farm and there is a newspaper clipping included about them. As a contemporary of fellow performer Bill Hickok, Jack Crawford witnessed a period of tremendous change in the American West. He participated in the Civil War, accompanied Custer during the 1874 expedition to the Black Hills, and went on a Gold Rush. This broadsheet promotes "probably the last appearance of the poet scout" as Crawford was raising money to go to the Klondike in 1897. Endorsements from the YMCA, a former Ohio mayor and others praised Crawford's abilities as a storyteller, assuring the ticket-buying public that they would be educated and entertained. Broadsides were intended to be posted or publicly distributed; today we know them as posters. Few of those printed survived long enough to be collected by libraries or archives, so to find one in such good condition, promoting an appearance by a celebrity, is a cache in itself! Crawford did indeed make it to the Klondike in 1899, but the blistering, frenetic days of the Gold Rush were mostly ended by the time he got there. He would return to the stage just a few years later.



A1 a. (pp. 21) in Mitham (first ed.). Service originally put together this collection of poems intending to make a Christmas keepsake for his friends. He sent a cheque to cover printing costs and a typescript of the collection to the Methodist Book and Publishing House. However, the heads of the literary department were convinced upon seeing the collection, of its literary potential. Book steward William Briggs was convinced by them to accept the collection as a publication of the house itself and not a volume published at the author's expense. William Briggs issued the initial order for the book's publication on the 6th of December, 1906. Twenty copies were sent to Service, by Briggs, on the 26th of February 1907 and 30 copies were released for review purposes. The book was published and copyrighted on June 4th, 1907. It was originally priced at seventy-five cents but sold at one dollar; 500 copies were printed with an undetermined number appearing in green cloth and others in brown.




This copy has a number of very interesting features. The original owner was Harold Begbie. He purchased the book in Winnipeg on July 26th, 1907, just 8 weeks after it was published and probably in the initial order that was placed by the local bookshop. Edward Harold Begbie (1871 – 8 October 1929), also

known as Harold Begbie, was an English journalist and the author of nearly 50 books and poems. He died in London on 8 October 1929. Folded and laid in the book is a copy of a letter from Charles J. Musson to a Mr. Merle Johnson of New York, explaining that the first edition of the book (Author's Edition) was paid for by Mr. Service after which Mr. Briggs sold the title to an American publisher. Briggs was the Canadian publisher and perhaps also dealt in out of print material and had obtained Begbie's library just before his death. The next link in the chain is the bookplate of Carroll Atwood Wilson, a noted American lawyer and book collector. It was issued under the laws of South Dakota but printed in London, England and for the investment in US dollars. Interestingly, the text is bilingual in French and English. The vignette is custom engraved it would seem as opposed to a stock image, costing much more per certificate. This was also a dividend offering with 16 coupons to be clipped to collect the dividend amount. In this case none of the coupons have been clipped which does not bode well for the longevity of the Company! 





The purchaser of the shares was from Dundee, Scotland. This certainly shows the world wide interest in the Klondike during the day. The most interesting element of the certificate was William Ogilvie was the president of the company and signed the certificate. During the Klondike Gold Rush, he surveyed the townsite of Dawson City and was responsible for settling many disputes between miners. Ogilvie became the Yukon's second Commissioner in 1898 at the height of the gold rush, and resigned because of ill-health in 1901. It is very interesting to see many of the pioneers became financially invested in the gold rush and I am sure were happy to benefit from their famous names.

A Peep at the Esquimaux is a collection of poems concerning the lifestyle of the 'Esquimaux' as well as various animals found in the Arctic. A Polar Pastoral recounts a 'reproachful dialogue between a young Esquimaux hunter and a favourite girl to whom he is betrothed'. This first edition was reprinted the same year without any changes by the same publisher. The Polar Pastoral at the end seems to have not been issued in all copies as we have had examples of the book with out it being bound in. Also in 1828 another publisher T. and J. Allman of London seems to have done their own edition which has reset type but makes no serious changes to the text or illustrations. The book has become rather scarce of late and we have not handled a copy for quite a few years. We have also included an 1973 reprint edition as well.

Herbert Ponting was the "Camera Artist" on Scott's Last expedition and captured some of the most amazing images on film and through cinematography. Once the news of the disaster made it to the world there seemed to have been a frenzy for information from the public and Ponting's lectures and showings were tremendously in demand. It would appear from the film's synopsis that the presentation was in two parts and the theatre must have been a showplace for his amazing images. Enlargements were advertised in the brochure and that the Fine Art Society were selling them. Ponting had a manager, Ben Natan, and a press representative, Mr. Herbert Grover. The dramatic music was played on a grand piano. It must have been something to experience the films as they traveled around the country. 



Scott and his party of four men reached the South Pole on 17 January 1912, only to find that the Norwegian Roald Amunden had arrived there almost a month earlier and beaten them to the prize. Five men in the British party died on their journey back to the base camp. The bodies of the final three members of the party were discovered on 12 November 1912 by a search party lead by Charles








It would seem the publisher was not sure of the final version's format and make up and used the extras sheets from the text of the first volume to fill out a test copy of the Antarctic Book. This copy has the complete suit of plates including the 6 etchings and the 4 colour portraits that are with the final version. The first issue of the contents page is present with the "Erebus: A Poem by E.H. Shackleton" It is interesting that the text was perhaps not even composed at the time when they were working on the final design. The big change seems to be the way the signature sheets were going to be handled, the location of the plates., and perhaps the final text length. A wonderful item and would go well a set of the Limited edition which is also in this catalogue. We would be interested to know if anyone has encountered anything similar to this example.
