On Clerical Vestments

Woodcut Portuguese royal arms on title-page, woodcut headpiece and initial (five lines high) on p. 1. Considerable use of Greek and Hebrew type, as well as some Arabic. In fine condition; internally very fine. Engraved armorial bookplate of J.G. Mazziotti Saalema Garção of Porto, noted mid-twentieth-century collector and wolfram magnate; his small embossed stamp on title-page. (8 ll.), 117 pp., (1 blank l.).

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this treatise on clerical vestments. The extensive footnotes contain significant text in Greek and Hebrew; there are Greek and Hebrew words and phrases scattered throughout the main body of the work as well. The author was born in Lisbon, 1750 and died in 1813. A member of the Third Order of the Franciscans, having professed in 1771, he exercised the "magisterio" of the order for some years, was "Definidor," "Chronista," and finally was elected "Ministro geral" in 1807. He was a brother of the poet José Ferreira Barroco.

FIRST EDITION of Baudouin's *De calceo antiquo* and first illustrated edition (?) of Negrone's *De caliga veterum*. A variant issue of both works with the imprint "sumpt. S. Combi et Jo. Lanov" also exists, as does a separate issue of the first part only, with a cancel engraved vignette pasted onto the title-page. The two works were also printed at Leiden, 1711 and Leipzig, 1733.

Baudouin's work includes illustrations of rope-soled sandals, skis (p. 40), iron boots as an instrument of torture (p. 43), Scythian curly-toed shoes (p. 68), shoe-shaped oil lamps (p. 126), high-platformed buskins (pp. 142, 146) and low shoes (p. 159) for actors, and papal footwear (p. 264). Two plates show ancient coins and medals (pp. 329, 338).

Negrone's work, first published in Milan, 1617, deals with what ancient writers, the Scriptures, civil law and inscriptions say about shoes. Illustrations include the Last Supper (this plate also appears in Baudouin's work), leather sandals, several coins or medals, and a Byzantine emperor.

Born in 1553, Negrone entered the Jesuit Order in 1571. In addition to holding several administrative posts, he taught rhetoric, philosophy, and theology at the Jesuit colleges in Verona, Cremona, Genoa and Milan, where he died in 1625 (or 1632?).

Sermons Preached in Bahia, 1700: Important for the History of Slavery-Describes Obligations of Masters Towards Slaves Regarding Food, Clothing and Medical Care

Second edition. The original edition, Rome 1705, is extremely rare. Borba noted, "This book is very important for the history of slavery." In this collection of sermons preached in Bahia in 1700, Benci allows that African slaves are intellectually inferior to their Portuguese masters, but stresses that this does not justify the inhuman treatment that many masters mete out to them. The work is divided into four sections: obligations of masters to their slaves regarding food, clothing, and medical care; obligations to teach slaves Christianity; appropriate punishment; and appropriate work (with Sundays off for religious services).

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of these detailed regulations concerning the organization and operation of the public workhouse in Caracas. Provisions cover under which circumstances poor Venezuelans will be assigned to live there, what clothes and food they will receive, how their day will be structured, rules of conduct and punishments for infractions, the kinds of articles they will manufacture, provisions for medical care and sanitation, and how they may earn their release back into society. There are no provisions for instruction, either educational or religious. Other regulations concern the facilities, staff (including specific duties and compensation of each), finances, and general administration.

Third edition. The first edition of the first 2 parts appeared in 1697, the first edition of the third appeared in 1705. A third volume (Part IV) appeared in 1709.

The essays in Part I are: Upon Pride; Upon Cloaths; Upon Duelling; Upon General Kindness; Upon the Office of a Chaplain; Upon the Weakness of Human Reason. "Upon



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the Office of a Chaplain," written in 1688, throws much light on the position of a large section of the clergy: Collier deprecated the extent of authority assumed by patrons and the servility of the poorer clergy.

The essays in Part II deal with fame, music, the value of life, spleen, eagerness of desire, friendship, popularity, the entertainment value of books, confidence, envy, appearance, despair, covetousness, liberty, old age and pleasure. The essays in Part III deal with pain, revenge, authors, power, infancy and youth, riches and poverty, whore-dom, drunkenness, usury, solitude, discontent and an apostle. This reissue of the third edition of Part III has been greatly expanded from the original issue of earlier the same year, which contained only 277 pages. At the end of the third part are pp. [1]-34 [of 46] of Collier's "An Essay on Gaming, in a dialogue between Callimachus and Dolomedes," London: for J. Morphew, 1713, in a smaller 8.° format.

Jeremy Collier (1650-1726) was an English theater critic, theologian, and non-juror bishop, best known for his attack on the Restoration drama of William Congreve, John Dryden, Thomas D'Urfey, and others, *Short View of the Immorality and Profaneness of the English Stage*, 1698.

Fundamental Biographies of Camões, João de Barros, & Diogo do Couto Plus an Essay on Ecclesiastical Vestments

Second edition of a work originally published in Évora, 1624. It includes biographies of three of the greatest literary figures of sixteenth-century Portugal—Luis de Camões, João de Barros and Diogo do Couto—plus essays on the Spanish rule of Portugal, the Portuguese language, hunting and Portuguese ecclesiastical vestments.

The biography of Camões is one of the first written on that poet: the Canto collection cites only three earlier references to his life, the first two very brief. Many details that were only mentioned in passing in the third source, Pedro Mariz's biographical comments in the 1613 edition of the *Lusiadas*, are elucidated by Severim de Faria: for instance, Camões' ancestry, his trips to India and the Moluccas, and his final years. Severim de Faria also analyzes the importance of Camões as a poet and puts him into the contemporary cultural context.

The biographies of João de Barros and Diogo do Couto are equally fundamental: Boxer used the latter as the primary source on Couto in *Three Historians of Portuguese Asia* (p. 30, n. 17), and describes the one on Barros as "still the basic biography, on which all later ones are built" (*João de Barros* p. 153).

Severim de Faria (1583-1655) is best known for this work and his Noticias de Portugal, Lisbon 1655. His *Relação universal do que succedeu em Portugal* ... Lisbon 1626, is considered the first periodical published in Portugal, and includes a famous account of the loss and reconquest of Bahia. Severim de Faria was Resende's successor in archeology, and his fame came to rival that of his uncle; he also collected a choice library of rare books. Innocêncio describes Severim de Faria as "um escriptor geralmente respeitavel, e que nas suas obras deixou muito bons subsidios para a historia civil, não menos que para a da litteratura, da lingua, e da critica litteraria em Portugal. A sua dicção e geralmente pura e fulente"

Provenance: José de Cupertino d'Aguiar Ottolini (1778-1863) was Procurador geral da corôa in 1844. Also conselheiro de Estado, and juiz da Relação de Lisboa, he was the father of the first Conde de Ottolini, Manuel Sarmento Ottolini (1840-1898). See *Nobreza de Portugal*, III, 81. The family was of Italian-Swiss origin.

Armorial bookplate ("Condes do Bomfim" appears beneath the arms); see Avelar Duarte, *Ex-libris portugueses heráldicos* p. 275 (n° 770). The first Conde, José Lucio Travassos Valdez (1787-1862), served in the Peninsular Wars and was in charge of putting down both the rebellion under the Conde de Amarante in 1823 and the Miguelist insurrection in Tras-os-Montes a few years later. He was governor of Madeira and served with Costa Cabral and Rodrigo da Fonseca on the Conselho. When the Maria da Fonte movement broke out he was named commander of the government forces in the south, but having been captured in late 1846 by the Duque de Saldanha, was deported along with his two eldest sons to Angola for the duration of the war. Travassos Valdez's oldest son, José Bento Travassos Valdez, succeeded to the title. The third Conde, José Lucio Travassos Valdez (1841-1926) had been born in Luanda.

Handsome Thirty-Volume Work on the Natural and Civil History of Chile, With Two Volumes of Illustrations—Many Hand-Colored Includes Plates Depicting Costumes

FIRST EDITION. Monumental account of the natural and civil history of Chile, with two volumes of beautiful illustrations, mostly hand-colored. Gay's work set the tone for all future historiographers of Chile with its meticulous examination of sources, including contemporary documents from the period immediately following the conquest.

The overall condition of this copy as well as the quality of the plates and coloring are far superior to most. In fact, many copies are without coloring altogether. In addition, this set has the complete text, which is unusual since the work was issued over a period of 27 years.

The two volumes of the atlas contain a total of 315 plates: one tinted lithographic frontispiece portrait; 20 engraved maps plus a folding cloth-backed map of Chile; two hand-colored plates of antiquities; 53 lithographic plates of views and costumes (12 are hand-finished colored, 41 are tinted); and 238 hand-colored engraved plates (103 botanical, 135 zoological).

The text is divided as follows: *Historia*, 8 volumes; *Documentos*, 2 volumes; *Agricultura*, 2 volumes; *Botánica*, 8 volumes; and *Zoología*, 8 volumes.

Gay, a French botanist, was commissioned in 1830 by the government of Chile to carry out a thorough scientific survey of the country and to produce a detailed description of its geography, geology and natural history. To accomplish this, Gay traveled from province to province for eleven years. In 1839 he was persuaded to add political history



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to the project, but only the section of the work covering the history of Chile up to the time of the discovery and conquest are his work. When he became too busy writing the volumes on natural history, the task of writing the political history was handed over to Francisco de Paula Noriega. The five volumes of history covering the discovery to 1810 are acknowledged to have flaws, but constitute the first reasonably complete picture of Chilean history written with modern historiographical methodology.

Presumably the second edition of this charmingly-illustrated pocket manual for foot soldiers, and one of the first military works to describe arms and armor in detail. The *Traité* is known in two Cramoisy editions of 1678: one with an added title and plates engraved by N. Guérard, and this (presumably later) edition with woodcut plates and a completely reset text. An English translation appeared in London later the same year, with a second published in 1680 as part of the anonymous *English Military Discipline*.

In his preface, Gaya explains that, having already discussed soldiering and strategy in his *L'Art de la guerre*, and there being no need to improve upon existing treatises on fortifications, he will devote this manual to arms and other instruments of war. In the first book (pp. 13-64), Gaya describes and illustrates the various kinds of swords, bayonets, muskets, pistols, pikes, crossbows, armor, and shields presently in use. Flares, fireworks, and mines are discussed in the second book (pp. 65-84). Book three (pp. 85-128) contains information on the types of cannon, mortars, shells, grenades, and battering rams available and general instructions for their use. The final book discusses military banners and musical instruments, and summarizes the kinds of arms typically used by various European and Arab armies as well as French armies in previous centuries. Eight of the plates show soldiers in ancient military costume or uniform.

Little is known of Louis de Gaya, Sieur de Gaya, other than that he was a captain of a regiment in Champagne. Gaya also published *L'Art de la guerre* (Paris, 1677) and two works on French genealogy and local history.

The collation agrees with that given in OCLC.

FIRST EDITION, with 304 photos of Spain, including many attractive images of folk costume, landscapes, and architecture from Roman times to the early twentieth century. Hielscher (1881-1948) published a series of books illustrating architecture and landscapes across Europe. This work appeared again in 1925, 1930, and 1942.

FIRST EDITION. The engraved plate (unsigned) shows an elaborately decorated altar, marked with the points at which the priest should pause at various times in the mass. The table is a summary of appropriate vestments, prayers, etc. for various feast days. FIRST and ONLY EDITION. D. Luís da Câmara (1685-1723), 3° conde da Ribeira Grande, was godson to Louis XIV and had served with distinction in the War of the Spanish Succession, defending Campo Maior against the Spanish. He was a plenipotenciary at the negotiations resulting in the Treaty of Utrecht (1713) and, once Portugal was at peace with France, was sent to Paris as ambassador.

The Count made his entrance magnificently, outshining all other embassies. Due to the discovery of gold in Brazil toward the end of the seventeenth century, and later (1730) diamonds, the Portuguese monarchs were perhaps the wealthiest rulers in Europe during the first half of the eighteenth century. Their attitude on occasions such as this one was, "If you've got it, flaunt it." This account describes in great detail the five coaches ("as melhores, que se virão em Paris excedendo o primor da arte ao precioso da material"), each coach ornamented with emblems and reliefs and drawn by 8 horses (pp. 4-8). Then the author moves on to describe the velvet and cloth-of-gold outfits heavily embroidered with gold, silver, and jewels that were worn by dozens of footmen, pages, secretaries, valets, Swiss guards, coachmen and postillions (pp. 8-10). The description of the actual entry occupies pp. 10-14.

Louis XIV died on September 1, 1715; the Conde da Ribeira Grande served most of his seven years in Paris as ambassador to Louis XV, who succeeded to the throne at age 5.

Ignacio Barbosa Machado (Lisbon 1686-Lisbon 1766) was brother to Diogo Barbosa Machado, author of the *Biblioteca Lusitana*, and like him "de elocução purissima, e que pódem servir de mestres da lingua portugueza" (Innocêncio). After earning a law degree from the University of Coimbra he served as a magistrate in Portugal and in Brazil, hold-ing the offices of *Desembargador da Relação do Porto, Ministro do Tribunal da Legacia*, and

Chronista geral do Ultramar, and was a member of the Academia Real de História. Other works include poems and historical accounts.

Mantillas were popular in Spain and Portugal throughout the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. By the early nineteenth century, when this poem was composed, they were falling out of fashion, which our author laments. Barely a decade later they had a brief revival in Spain under D. Isabella II (1833-1868), who encouraged their use among her ladies at court. By the end of the nineteenth century they were again out of fashion, and today they are mostly worn only on special occasions: bullfights, weddings, and Holy Week.

The author, a native of Porto, was blinded at the age of 2 by a fever, but nevertheless published many poems and dramas.

FIRST EDITION of this collection of practical recipes for the arts, industry and domestic use. There are sections on varnish for waterproofing and in various colors (gilt, tortoise-shell, etc.), for colors to paint on porcelain, for dyes, and for ink in various colors.

Includes methods for washing chintz and gingham dresses; how to wash white silk, black silk, and silk of different colors (including yellow, brown, and crimson). Additionally there is a section on how to store furs and wool dresses without being eaten by bugs (pp. 12-26). Also covered are imitation gems, iron-working (with two American methods cited, pp. 54-5 and 57-8), making dry milk for use on long voyages, cleaning and coloring bronze and copper, stain removal, cosmetics and food preservation. The recipes were compiled from works recently published in France and England.

Lopes de Moura (1780-1860), an Afro-Brazilian author, native of Bahia, became involved in the Inconfidencia Bahiana of 1798 and later fought in the Peninsular War before establishing a medical practice in Paris. There he found that he could not live on his income as a physician, and so applied himself to writing and translating: he was responsible for the translation into Portuguese of several French medical books, as well as works of Sir Walter Scott and James Fenimore Cooper. His translations had such great influence in Brazil that D. Pedro II, hearing of his financial difficulties, awarded him a pension from his private purse.

A sample book produced by Emilia Sobún, who was presumably a student learning *lenceria*, fancy needlework for lingerie and household linens. Each sample is executed white-on-white on a square of stiffened silk organza with machine-made trim. The squares bear progressively more difficult handwork, from buttons, pleats and simple fagoting through embroidery, fine crochet, and lace insets. Each student was probably given a blank book with the school's name stamped on it, and expected to insert her own work into it. With the school's official stamp on each piece, the book could be shown to potential employers as proof of the student's competence.

Samples of needlework from aspiring professionals are extremely rare on the market—especially samples produced in Latin America.

government support of the factory, the addition of facilities for dyeing and design, the cultivation of silkworms, and the changes made by Piedmontese immigrants. Chapters XIV-XIX (out of 27) deal with other industries in Portugal, including tapestries, hatmaking, stucco, locksmiths, combs, cardboard boxes, varnish, watches, crockery, buttons, and decanters.

Accursio das Neves (1766-1834), a noted economist, held various government posts; his writing was primarily concerned with the political implications of commerce. Elected a member of the Real Academia das Sciencias de Lisboa in 1810, he was a defender of conservativism, being one of the principle supporters of D. Miguel in the Côrtes of 1828. As a conservative, he had been opposed to the liberal ideology behind the revolution of 1820, and the 1822 constitution. On May 14, 1821 he lost his government offices, only to be reinstated in June 1823. Nevertheless, Neves was elected deputy to the Côrtes of 1822. The years 1821-1828 saw the maturing of his political-economic development. Despite the conservative approach to politics, Neves favored industrialization and free trade (while defending a moderate protectionism). As a result of his support for Miguelismo, Neves became an obscure figure after the liberals triumphed toward the end of his life. Today he is regarded as one of the most brilliant Portuguese thinkers and most lucid prose writers of his age—a precursor of modern economic theory in Portugal.

The purpose of the voyage—to negotiate a trade treaty—is described here with detailed accounts of Japanese customs and dress, politics, industry and geography. The second section of the work is a history of Luso-Japanese relations with references to Fernão Mendes Pinto, Diogo do Couto, the American Francis Hawks, and others. Like the United States, Portugal wanted to see Japan opened up to foreign trade. With the success of Perry in 1853, other countries began to send diplomatic missions to Japan, and Portugal was one of the first to do so.

Marques Pereira, son of the diplomat Antonio Feliciano Marques Pereira, was a naval superintendent in Goa and a lieutenant captain in the National Armada.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION, with lengthy excerpts describing extravagant dress and spending and substantial quotes from the laws that attempted to control them from Roman times to the eighteenth century. "Though not devoid of economic errors worthy of censure, it deserves praise in that it shows the futility and ineffectiveness of the laws condemning lavishness," comments Colmeiro. Sempere y Guarinos approached the problem of lavish spending as a mercantilist, condemning the extravagance of luxury as a vice, but finding it inevitable in a society that encouraged inequality and admired a man more for his ostentation than for his virtue and moderation. Such consumption was a necessity because it kept industry, and the state, thriving. Herr considers Sempere one of the outstanding members of the Amigos del País of Madrid, an early economic society (*The Eighteenth-Century Revolution in Spain*, p. 163).

Sempere y Guarinos (1754-1830), a native of Elda in Alicante, a historian of law, literature and institutions, is known for his prologue and translation of Muratori's *Riflessioni sopra il buon gusto intorno le scienze e le arti*, 1782, which helped disseminate Muratori's neoclassical ideas in Spain. The prologue was later expanded to the six-volume *Ensayo de una biblioteca española de los mejores escritores del reinado de Carlos III*, 1785-89, which remains a useful bibliographical reference for its period.

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an economic crisis under D. Carlos I (Emperor Charles V). In a decree of 9 October 1552 (reprinted on ll. A2r-A3v), D. Carlos ordered prices to be fixed for shoes and other leather goods. The decree was published as *La prematica para el remedio de la grand carestia que havia en el calçado*, variations of which were printed in October and November of that year at Madrid and Alcalá de Henares.

Recognizing that prices varied widely throughout Spain, D. Carlos ordered the local *ayuntamientos* to set the prices of leather goods for their regions. Here the officials at Salamanca announce prices for over a hundred types and sizes of shoes for men, women, and children, ranging from slippers to boots, in materials from the crudest cowhides to the finest cordovan leather. A shoe of cordovan leather "a la morisca" of 5 *puntos* can be sold for a maximum of 29 *maravedis*, while one of 13 *puntos* can be sold for 69 *maravedis*. Prices for leather bottles of various sizes (*cueros para vino*) range from 51 to 119 *maravedis* (ff. A9v-10r). A supplementary decree on the final leaf clarifies issues regarding *herretes* (leather cords?). The names of members of the local government are mentioned, as well as Salamanca manufacturers and sellers of leather goods, with the locations of their shops.

Price regulations such as these were an attempt to resolve severe shortages of basic commodities in Spain. The influx of gold from the Americas that began in the 1520s eventually led to massive inflation in the Spanish economy. Spanish goods were priced out of European markets, and shortages in clothing, shoes, and other basic goods became common throughout Spain. Mistakenly believing that the shortages were occurring because too many goods were shipped abroad, D. Carlos slapped on export restrictions. In May 1552 he prohibited the export of wool, silk, and leather goods from Spain, except to the Spanish colonies in America. Within a few years the export restrictions led to an economic depression, and merchants and the *cortes* were pleading with the crown to revoke them; but the restrictions remained in place for more than a decade.

This is a relatively early imprint by Andrea de Portonaris, active in Salamanca from 1547 to 1568 and most famous for the definitive edition of *Las Siete Partidas* by Gregorio López, 1555. Descended from a family of printers in Italy who had established a branch in Lyon, he married a woman who was the widow and the daughter of Salamanca printers. Andrea published over 180 editions of books, making him Salamanca's most prolific sixteenth-century printer, and was the first in Salamanca to switch to redonda types from gothic. From his press came most of the works by the University of Salamanca's professors, including Domingo de Soto, Diego de Covarrubias, Melchor Cano, and Francisco Sánchez "el Brocense." He also published Italian Renaissance works by Pietro Bembo and Angelo Poliziano, the first editions of Luis de Granada, and works in Greek, for which he cast his own type.

Sixteenth-century Spanish works have become steadily more rare on the market. The British Library's 16th-century STC lists only 9 works printed by Portonaris through 1551.
