

The engraved title page (which includes a vignette of the "Ménagerie du Jardin des Plantes à Paris") states that there are 26 engravings, which presumably counts each of the 24 engraved animals on 4 leaves as a separate engraving, plus the frontispiece and the engraved title page.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Azambuja was Portuguese charge d'affaires in the United States from 1829 to 1834. Pages 45-8 deal with whaling, including mention of New Bedford, Fairhaven, New London, Falmouth, Newport, Plymouth, Salem, Sag Harbor, New York, among other places in the United States. Fisheries in Newfoundland and Labrador are also discussed. Most of the book deals with fishing for cod, with emphasis on the United States and Canada. Herring are also mentioned.



First French edition (?) of a work first printed in the *Philosophical Transactions*, then separately in London, 1743, as *An Attempt Towards a Natural History of the Polype*. It includes observations of the habits of freshwater polyps and various experiments performed on them. Baker (1698-1774) was one of several fellows of the Royal Society who became interested in polyps after Trembley's experiments were published. He is best known for his popular *The Microscope Made Easy*, 1742.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Includes questions on chemistry; physics; botany; zoology; mineralogy, geology, and mining; agriculture, care of livestock, and rural economy. *Provenance*: D. José de Saldanha Oliveira e Souza, who also used the name José Luiz de Saldanha (1839-1912), was a son of D. João de Saldanha Oliveira Juzarte Figueira e Sousa, 3° conde de Rio Maior, and brother of António José Luís de Saldanha Oliveira Juzarte Figueira e Sousa, 4° conde and 1° marquês de Rio Maior. A chemist and mineralogist, parliamentary deputy, and high government official, he studied mathematics and philosophy at Coimbra University, wrote on subjects as varied as agriculture, finance, and engravings, and amassed an important library. He was a devoted proponent of progress in the national agricultural sector, which he considered one of the primary sources of public wealth. FIRST and ONLY EDITION. This rare pamphlet includes comments on anatomy, the nervous system, mollusks, invertebrates, zoology, classification, animals, worms, and annelids.

[Charles] Émile Blanchard (1819-1900), was a French zoologist and entomologist. He accompanied Henri Milne-Edwards and Jean Louis Armand de Quatrefages de Breau to Sicily on a marine zoology expedition. In 1862 he was given the chair of natural history of Crustacea, Arachnida and Insects at the Natural History Museum in Paris, and was elected to the Academy of Science the same year.

FIRST EDITION of this group of 4 poems commemorating the marriage of D. José, Principe do Brasil (the future D. José I), with D. Mariana Victoria, eldest daughter of Philip V of Spain, Infanta of Castile. In all 17 pieces in honor of the marriage were printed as individual pamphlets but with continuous pagination, and for those who wished to collect the whole set a frontispiece, dedication and prologue (present here) were also issued.

The *Colecção* includes three poems by Thomaz Pinto Brandão—"Jornada real vista por cartas jogadas," "Boas vindas reaes, dads, cantadas, ou tocadas pelo mesmo …," and "Obra nova do mesmo …" (with a woodcut of a fortress under siege). Pinto Brandão (1664-1743), a native of Porto, accompanied his good friend, the poet Gregorio de Matos,

when the latter returned to his native Brazil. Once there, Pinto Brandão offended the authorities in Bahia and was imprisoned. In Rio de Janeiro the same thing happened, and he was deported to Angola. There he served as captain of an infantry battalion, lived with the niece of Queen Ana Ginag, and made a small fortune. In 1703 he moved back to Lisbon, where he made a living writing poetry, most of it satirical.

The fourth poem, "Vida, e morte de hum coelho, morto pela Serenissima Princeza dos Brasis, o qual coelho foy embalsamado por Monsieur Liote, Romance," celebrates the shooting of a rabbit by the princess and its embalming by one Monsieur Liote. The charming woodcut on p. 29 shows the princess taking aim at a rabbit chased by dogs. A puff of smoke erupts from the gun, as the gentleman beside her (D. José?) looks on. "Musa tenho Cosinheyra," says the anonymous author, and "Viva a Matadora bella."

Hunting was one of the passions shared by D. Mariana Victoria and D. José—they also both loved music. D. Mariana ruled as regent for her husband from 1776-1777, after he suffered a series of strokes, and was an advisor to her daughter D. Maria I, who took the throne in 1777. D. Mariana also improved relations with Spain by arranging a double marriage between two of her grandchildren and two children of the Spanish royal family.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Collection of laws regarding livestock (*ganaderia*), with a chronological index and an index by subject.

The Mesta was a powerful association of sheep ranchers established in the thirteenth century. The export of merino wool enriched the members of the Mesta (the nobility and

religious orders) who had acquired ranches during the process of *Reconquista*. Two of the most important wool markets were held in Medina del Campo and Burgos. The kings of Castile conceded many privileges to the Mesta. The *cañadas* (traditional rights-of-way for sheep that perhaps date back to prehistoric times) are legally protected "forever" from being built on or blocked. Some Madrid streets are still part of the *cañada* system, and there are groups of people who occasionally drive sheep across the modern city as a reminder of their ancient rights and cultures, although these days sheep are generally transported by rail.

Dog Decries Spanish Death Threats

FIRST EDITION. We have not been able to determine with certainty the point of these pamphlets, be they early precursors of humane society legislation, or some sort of allegory.

In the first dialogue A dog is explaining to his owner, a blind man, why he must leave him before his life is taken from him. Essentially the dog wishes to bid his owner "good-bye". The blind man objects furiously, questioning what has he done wrong. The dog suffers from an awful secret that he does not wish to tell his owner, but he eventually explains: he has heard two men reading this printed paper (or Edital) "Papelino impresso" from Castella (Spain). This papelino explains that all dogs should be taken away and killed with swords. The main reason why the dogs would be killed is because of their barking, which disturbs the sick in hospitals and convalescents in their homes. The dog highly criticizes the Spaniards for their view, saying they are acting against God by killing animals created by Him. However, the dog says two classes of dogs will be saved from the killing: hunting dogs and guard dogs. Nonetheless, all other dogs will be killed. The blind man resolves to write a new paper that will save the dogs and have it published. In the second dialogue, the dog describes what the Spaniards will do to the dogs, with gruesome detail of torture and killing. The dog also speaks about common dog names and what they mean, as well as dogs from ancient times. The third dialogue develops "officios dos cães", what dogs are good at doing, as well as a variety of other talents (such as dancing). In the fourth dialogue, the dog says the Spaniards believe dogs "profane" Temples, to which the dog objects saying Spaniards pray to Iconoclasts. The blind man argues that dogs do "profane" religious processions by getting into the middle of everything but the dog argues this is because dogs like to follow their owners.

The fifth dialogue contains an ink manuscript note in the lower margin of its title page where it is written "Este dialogo cos outros 4. Forão feitas ... [illeg.] que querer matar os caens ... [illeg.] seu Edital ... [illeg.] respeito em 173(?)" This concluding dialogue summarizes much of what has gone on, and states that the blind man was not able to get his paper published but rather published these dialogues.

In the Dialogo Unico, two gentlemen (Tirso and Pancracio) discuss the other dialogues where they debate the possibility of a dog having the ability to speak in human language. One of them even suggests that the dog was potentially possessed by the devil. Tirso clarifies that the Edital only said for stray dogs that had no owner or home should be killed and not *all* dogs as the dog of the dialogues would have the reader believe. They both remark about how erudite the dog is, attributing it to the dog having been previously owned by a lettered doctor. This dialogue essentially criticizes, makes fun, as well as summarizes principally the first dialogue with reference to the others.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this important contribution to Portuguese ornithology. With the photograph of each bird are given data concerning its general aspects, a detailed physical description, its flight, song, feeding, habitat, distribution in Portugal, and breeding. Although translated from the English by Ana Roque and Ana Dahlin, this appears to be the first published edition in any language.



Mafra (also known as the Portuguese Escorial) was completed in 1730, and when this work was published, was an Augustinian house.

The final leaf, blank on the recto and with directions for placement of the plates on the verso, is absent in most copies.

It has the peculiarity of using an unconventional system of orthography, based on pronunciation, conforming in part to the theories of Verney expounded in the *Verdadeiro methodo de estudar* more than forty years earlier.

P. Francisco de Paula Figueiredo (Aveiro 1768-Porto 1803) was a secular priest with a Bachelor's degree in Canon Law from the University of Coimbra. After completing his studies ca. 1793, he established himself in Porto, where he became renowned for his sacred oratory. In addition to the present poem he was responsible for several brief poetical works and a volume of sermons.

First edition in Spanish? The story involves geese-lovers whose tragic story ends on the festival of San Miguel (Michaelmas, September 29), when the traditional meal is a goose. In the illustrations (rather naive in style), the geese are set against country landscapes that include substantial homes, plain church steeples, a mill with a water wheel, a horse and carriage, and simple rail fences. In the final illustration, the cook serves a roasted goose to four gentlemen at a table.

This is a translation of *Michaelmas day; or, The fate of poor Molly Goosey*, published in Albany by E.H. Bender, 1840, with hand-colored illustrations by R.H. Pease, in the series Grandmama Easy's Large Toy Books. According to OCLC, Appleton published Spanish-language books from the 1840s through the end of the nineteenth century. The lower wrapper of this one lists more than two dozen books in Spanish for children, most of which OCLC dates to 1865-1870.

Later edition of this popular work on wolf hunting. Clamorgan first offers observations drawn from sources as diverse as Aristotle and Olaus Magnus on the natural history of wolves and the medicinal uses of preparations derived from wolf excrement and body parts. Clamorgan acknowledges that most of the medicinal information (pp. 15-17) derives from Pliny the Elder's *Natural History*, for example: wolf's liver in mulled wine as a cure for a cough, wolf excrement as a cure for cataracts, and wolf fat as a treatment for conjunctivitis. The chapter's subsections include uses for wolf's excrement, fat, liver, gall, bones, oil, flesh, and hide. Clamorgan also notes that, as stated in Pliny, wolf's parts have been used against magic.

Later chapters address such topics as training bloodhounds for the hunt, how to distinguish wolf tracks from dog tracks, and strategies for capturing wolves using traps, nets, and decoys. Each method is illustrated by one or more nearly full-page woodcuts.

The Chasse du loup was first printed in 1566 (Paris: J. Du Puys) to accompany the third edition of Charles Estienne's L'agriculture et maison rustique. Both works were frequently reprinted well into the seventeenth century and are often found bound together, though each also seems to have been published separately on occasion. An earlier Gabriel Cartier edition appeared in 1584, without place of publication. The 14 woodcuts in this edition are free copies of those in the earlier Du Puys editions.

Clamorgan served in the French navy for nearly 50 years. Although *La chasse du loup* is his only published work, he also wrote an unpublished treatise on navigation and shipbuilding.

First collected edition. Includes poems addressed to D. Miguel, from 1823, when D. Miguel led the Vilafrancada, through his 3 years in exile in Vienna and his return as regent and later king. A few poems are to D. Miguel's mother, Queen D. Carlota Joaquina, wife of D. João VI. Among the less conventional poems are a poem to a wolf shot by D. Miguel and a poem "No infeliz acaso que teve Sua Magestade no carrinho, em que se conduzia."

The frontispiece is apparently a self-portrait: it is signed in print "Josino Leirense," Rodrigues da Costa's Arcadian name.

José Daniel Rodrigues da Costa (1757-1832), a native of Leiria, was a fervent supporter of D. Miguel. He held many government posts in Portugal and was a prolific writer: his

works (the earliest of which dates to 1777) were very popular and often reprinted during his lifetime. Innocêncio uncharacteristically declines to catalogue all the author's works: "Parece-me desnecessario além de difficil, apresentar aqui um catalogo geral de todas as suas producções." Rodrigues da Costa was a poet of *arcadismo*, using the name Josino Leirense in the Nova Arcadia. His narrative poem *O balão dos habitantes da lua* (1819) is considered the first Portuguese work of science fiction.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this imaginary dialogue between an educated man and a dog who speaks French, English, and Portuguese. The dog has fled the French because they hate loyalty and love, which dogs symbolize: "os Francezes são os exemplares da perfidia e do odio, pois que até aborrecem os seus semelhantes. O Cão é humilde; o Francez soberbo."

The present copy does not contain the illustration mentioned by Ayres de Magalhães Sepúlveda. Of the six copies we have been able to locate, it appears that only the ones in the Bayerische Staatsbibliothek, and the copy in the Biblioteca Pública de Braga contain an illustration.

The Bayerische Staatsbibliothek attributes the work to António Maria do Couto (on this author see Innocêncio I, 197-200; VIII, 243-4; this title is not mentioned); none of the other catalogues give an author for this title.

Part II describes Dampier's voyage as a young sailor to the Bay of Campeche on the east coast of Mexico, in 1673-1676. He provides details about the Caribe Indians, Jamaica, the Yucatan, logwood cutters (i.e., buccaneers), saltpeter, boobies, Grand Cayman, alligators and crocodiles, raccoons, monkeys, sloths, armadillos, hummingbirds, "a great many poisonous Creatures" (snakes, spiders, legworms, etc.), manatees, and battles between the English and Spaniards. The folding map shows the area around the Bay of Campeche.

Part III is Dampier's "Discourse of the Trade-Winds, Breezes, Storms, Seasons of the Year, Tides and Currents of the Torrid Zone throughout the World." Two folding maps illustrate the trade winds in the Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans. It ends with an account received from Dampier's friend Capt. Rogers of Natal, in South Africa (pp. 108-112), giving details of geography and the inhabitants.

The Hill Collection notes, "Dampier [1651-1715] was the best known, and probably the most intelligent, of the famous group of buccaneers that tormented the Spaniards in the South Seas from 1680 to 1720. His industry in taking notes of all he saw was equaled by his pains in preserving them from destruction. His first voyage, under Captain Swan in the Cygnet, took him from Virginia to Spanish America and across the Pacific to the East Indies. He traveled extensively in the Orient on several voyages which lasted from 1683 to 1691. It was on one of these trips that the first landing was made by the English on Australian shores, at the entrance of King Sound on the northwest coast, in 1688." Dampier circumnavigated the globe three times, was court-martialed for cruelty, and produced the first detailed record of Australian flora and fauna. He published his experiences in separately issued, independent volumes, the first in 1697, this (the second) in 1699, and a third in 1703; they include the first appearance in English of such words as "barbecue," "avocado," "chopsticks," and "sub-species."

João VI of Portugal and his wife D. Carlota Joaquina.

José Sebastião Ŝaldanha Oliveira de Daun (1777-1855), then Senhor de Pancas, later Duque de Saldanha, was one of 32 riders.



Gay's work set the tone for all future historiographers of Chile with its meticulous examination of sources, including contemporary documents from the period immediately following the conquest.

this set has the complete text, which is unusual since the work was issued over a period of 27 years.

The two volumes of the atlas contain a total of 315 plates: one tinted lithographic frontispiece portrait; 20 engraved maps plus a folding cloth-backed map of Chile; two hand-colored plates of antiquities; 53 lithographic plates of views and costumes (12 are hand-finished colored, 41 are tinted); and 238 hand-colored engraved plates (103 botanical, 135 zoological).

The text is divided as follows: *Historia*, 8 volumes; *Documentos*, 2 volumes; *Agricultura*, 2 volumes; *Botánica*, 8 volumes; and *Zoología*, 8 volumes.

Gay, a French botanist, was commissioned in 1830 by the government of Chile to carry out a thorough scientific survey of the country and to produce a detailed description of its geography, geology and natural history. To accomplish this, Gay traveled from province to province for eleven years. In 1839 he was persuaded to add political history to the project, but only the section of the work covering the history of Chile up to the time of the discovery and conquest are his work. When he became too busy writing the volumes on natural history, the task of writing the political history was handed over to Francisco de Paula Noriega. The five volumes of history covering the discovery to 1810 are acknowledged to have flaws, but constitute the first reasonably complete picture of Chilean history written with modern historiographical methodology.





This book was the first guide to shell collecting, with some of the earliest direct references to collecting shells in New Holland and the South Seas. Mawe's charming, rare guide to shell collecting was first published in 1804, without illustrations; only one surviving example of the first edition is known. The second edition is completely unrecorded. The third edition of 1821, with two color plates, is less rare, as is this fourth edition, enhanced by the two exquisite plates engraved by John Mawe. According to Stilwell, these were colored by Mawe's wife, Sarah. The illustrations depict shells and fauna found in the far reaches of the world, including the South Seas, with shells of the Sandwich Islands (Hawaii), the Marquesas and Society Islands, Tahiti and New Zealand all discussed in the text.

The collecting of shells in New Holland is discussed on three pages: "Van Diemen's Land offers a vast field to the naturalist, particularly to the conchologist, zoologist and entomologist, who would be amply remunerated for whatever they might collect ... "; there is further mention of rare shells found by two boys on a whaling ship in Western Port.

Mawe (1764-1829), who spent many of his early years at sea, collected minerals in England for the King of Spain in the late eighteenth century. When war broke out between England and Spain in 1804, he was detained at Cadiz and then again at Montevideo. Only after Beresford captured Montevideo was he released. Soon after, he began a journey to Rio de Janeiro and then into Minas Geraes, which lasted two and a half years. After his return to England in 1811, he published *Travels in the Interior of Brazil, particularly in the Gold and Diamond Districts of that Country, by Authority of the Prince Regent of Portugal, including a Voyage to the Rio de la Plata, and an Historical Sketch of the Revolution of Buenos Ayres* (1812). Mawe opened a shop in the Strand and wrote books on mineralogy.

Provenance: Joaquim de Sousa-Leão, distinguished Brazilian historian and diplomat of Portuguese ancestry, was a significant book and art collector. He wrote on art and historical subjects, being an expert on the Flemish painter Frans Post: see *Frans Post 1612-1680*, Amsterdam: A.L. 

Kill All the Dogs in Buenos Aires

FIRST EDITION. On 25 May 1810 a provisional junta was formed to supersede the authority of the viceroy and to carry on the government. Although the new government acted in the name of King Fernando VII, the "Revolution of May 25" was in fact a declaration of independence for Buenos Aires. In this edict, the Junta orders owners of houses fronting on streets to repair the pavement before their homes, and gives specifications for pavements and drains. It also prohibits leaving garbage or dead animals in public thoroughfares and orders owners to kill all dogs in the city within eight days. The decree is signed by the officers of the new government, who were prominent figures in the May revolution: Saavedra, Castelli, Alberti, Mateu, Larrea and Moreno.

used in red-legged partridge hunting. The Portuguese pointer arose from the ancient Iberian hunting dogs with its presence in Portugal traceable to the early twelfth century. Initially the dog was bred in the royal kennels and later became a popular hunting dog for the lower classes of society. In the eighteenth century, many English families established a presence in the region of Oporto in the business of wine production and came to know the Portuguese hunting breed which was taken to England where they played a part in the origin of the English pointer. During the nineteenth century when Portugal was experiencing considerable social hardships, the breed began a progressive decline. It was not until the 1920s when some breeders made an effort to salvage the breed by locating some of the ancient Portuguese dogs in the inaccessible north of Portugal. The Portuguese pedigree book was then established in 1932 and breed standard in 1938. For at least a thousand years, this dog has always had the same square head, a marked stop, triangular ears, compact look, and since the seventeenth century, the same docked tail. Among pointing dogs throughout the world just the perdigueiro and his "son" the English pointer have this typical skull-facial convergence.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION? The first part (pp. 5-52) provides a very detailed account of how merino sheep are raised in Spain, with additional chapters on shearing and washing merino wool. The author then compares the efforts made in other European countries to raise merino sheep (pp. 53-71). He concludes with an account of how merino sheep were first introduced into the Crimea in 1803 and offers specific proposals for ensuring that the flocks grow and thrive, thus vastly improving the quality of wool available in Russia and the Ukraine (pp. 71-88).

FIRST EDITION. A second edition appeared in 1969. This play about fishermen and cod fishing was selected by the Comissão de Leitura of the Teatro Nacional D. Maria II, and chosen by the Companhia Amélia Rey Colaço-Robles Monteiro to inaugurate the 1959-1960 season. It was directed by Pedro Lemos and produced by Amélia Rey Colaço. A cast list is printed on the recto of the first supplementary leaf.

The poet and playwright António Martinho do Rosário, a native of Santarém (1920-1980), earned a degree in medicine from Coimbra University and used his specialization in psychiatry in his work for the theater. He wrote under the pen name Bernardo Santareno.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. The author provides information on the effects of cow's versus goat's milk on babies after their mother's milk runs out, and includes analyses of these milks and other appropriate foods for infants. The conference, sponsored by the Royal Academy of Sciences in Lisbon, in 1812, came to the conclusion that

cow's milk was more beneficial. Freitas Soares (1769-1831 or 1832) was chief physician to the King of Portugal.


