NOTES FOR BUYERS

REGISTRATION: Bidders are required to register before the auction and obtain a bidding number.

FIRST SESSION

Art and Literature (Lots 1-27)

1 COBB, Victor: The menu for supper at the Adelaide Town Hall, July 1920, one of the civic celebrations organised during the visit of His Royal Highness, Edward, the Prince of Wales (later King Edward VIII). It is a most lavish production, comprising a very large sheet of deckleedged card (300 x 255 mm), with the city's coat-of-arms printed in gilt at the head and the bill of fare occupying the bottom half. Tipped on to the top portion is a large titling etching ('Supper. Menu', 105 x 107mm image size on deckleedged paper 150 x 205 mm), printed in brown ink, signed and numbered in pencil below the image by the artist Victor Cobb, and signed and dated 1920 by him in the image. It features a porthole vignette of HMS Renown under the Southern Cross behind a still life of stuffed turkey, wine and fruit, with the city's coat-of-arms nestling behind a large floral garland. + The engraved invitation to the Royal Ball at the Adelaide Town Hall, 14 July 1920. It is of a similar format, comprising a very large sheet of deckle-edged card (390 x 255 mm), with the city's coat-of-arms printed in gilt at the head, with the caption 'To have the Honour of Meeting His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, K.G.' at the top and the formal invitation from the Lord and Lady Mayoress at the bottom. Tipped on to the bulk of the card is a large titling etching ('Come and be merry. Adelaide, 1920. The Ball', 203 x 140 mm image size on deckle-edged paper 270 x 205 mm), printed in brown ink, signed and numbered in pencil below the image by the artist Victor Cobb, and signed and dated 1920 by him in the image. It features kookaburras in a gum tree, the state emblem, the Prince of Wales's Feathers ... A sheet of opaque textured paper, tipped on to the head of the verso, acts as a protective overlay to the invitation. A printed note (95 x 145 mm) regarding rules for acceptance of the invitation is still present (visible from the front but tipped on to the verso). [2 items] [\$300-400]

Large octavo, 19 volumes; original blind-stamped cloth lightly sunned; some corners bumped; slight wear to the tail of a few spines, some corners and to a few small spots on some hinges; two volumes have loose stitching in a few sections, which are now a little proud of the leading edge; occasional light foxing throughout; in very pleasing original condition. The 1980 Perth Survey of Drawing catalogue; **signed by Russell Drysdale** on the title page. **+ LUMBERS, Eugene:** The Art of Pro Hart (Adelaide, Rigby, 1977; quarto; a fine copy in the slipcase; **number 88 of 1001 copies of the deluxe edition signed by the artist**). **+ FULLERTON, Peter:** Norman Lindsay War Cartoons, 1914-1918 (Melbourne, Melbourne University Press, 1983; folio; cloth; a fine copy with the slightly chipped dustwrapper). **[3 items] [\$150-200]**

4 **[FRIEND, Donald]:** Prospectus. Sundry Notes and Papers; being recently discovered Notes and Documents of the Natural & Instinctive Bestiality Research Expedition. Collected and collated under the title Bumbooziana ... Melbourne, Gryphon Books, 1979. Quarto, [iv] pages with 3 illustrations by Donald Friend; in very fine condition. **The illustration on the first page of this copy is fully handcoloured by the artist**. 'And I've spent three days at the maddening toil of hand-colouring 60 prospectuses to be sent out to special people' (entry for 7 September 1978 in The Diaries of Donald Friend, Volume 4 [2006]). **[\$150-200]** 5 [FRIEND, Donald]: Prospectus. Sundry Notes and Papers; being recently discovered Notes and Documents of the Natural & Instinctive Bestiality Research Expedition. Collected and collated under the title Bumbooziana ... Melbourne, Gryphon Books, 1979. Quarto, [iv] pages with 3 illustrations by Donald Friend; a very fine copy. The illustration on the first page of this copy is fully handcoloured by the artist and signed with his initials. 'And I've spent three days at the maddening toil of hand-colouring 60 prospectuses to be sent out to special people' (entry for 7 September 1978 in The Diaries of Donald Friend, Volume 4 [2006]). 6 **[FRIEND, Donald]:** Sundry Notes and Papers; being recently discovered Notes and Documents of the Natural & Instinctive Bestiality Research Expedition. Collected and collated under the title Bumbooziana ... Melbourne, Gryphon Books, 1979. Elephant folio, [iv], 126 pages (a full-colour facsimile of Friend's richly illustrated manuscript). Oversubscribed on publication and destined to be perennially rare, as the edition was **limited to only 150 copies numbered and signed by Donald Friend. This copy is signed but not numbered. It is an unbound file copy housed in a slipcase**; 'Proof sheets only. Not to be bound in any form' is written in ink in lieu of a copy number. A mint copy, ideally suited to a designer binding (it comes complete with the original endpapers) or for exhibition purposes.

7 [FRIEND, Donald]: Sundry Notes and Papers; being recently discovered Notes and Documents of the Natural & Instinctive Bestiality Research Expedition. Collected and collated under the title Bumbooziana ... Melbourne, Gryphon Books, 1979. Elephant folio, [iv], 126 pages (a full-colour facsimile of Friend's richly illustrated manuscript). Quarter leather and gilt-decorated cloth; a mint copy with the slipcase. Oversubscribed on publication and destined to be perennially rare, as the edition was limited to only 150 copies numbered and signed by Donald Friend. This is **copy number 141.** The original prospectus (quarto, 4 pages with 3 illustrations) is loosely inserted. Also present is the booklet (quarto, 24 pages with 8 illustrations by Friend; unsigned and unnumbered) published to accompany the portfolio of sweepings from the printer's floor; 100 of these were produced to cater for the demand left unsatisfied when [\$2000-4000] the book was oversubscribed.

[FRIEND, Donald]: An unpublished bifolium of 8 original manuscript of Sundry Notes and Papers; being recently discovered Notes and Documents of the Natural & Instinctive Bestiality Research Expedition. Collected and collated under the title Bumbooziana Friend's erotic masterpiece was published in Melbourne in 1979 by Richard Griffin's Gryphon Press - a full-colour facsimile of the richly illustrated holograph manuscript (elephant folio, [iv], 126 pages). The edition was limited to only 150 copies numbered and signed by Donald Friend; it was oversubscribed on publication. This large-format bifolium (each page is 380 x 510 mm) contains the complete text and illustrations for pages 3, 4, 9 and 10, and although it is basically similar to the published version, it differs in every detail. Not least of the differences is the number, treatment and quality of the drawings. The published version contains six watercolour drawings, one in full colour, the rest merely black and white. The manuscript on offer contains seven drawings, with one only in black and white; there are two with a monochrome wash, and four drawn in varying monochrome. One of these covers well over half the page, considerably larger than the published version. A less immediately obvious but more telling difference is the handwritten text. On these two leaves, it is identical to that on the leaves numbered before and after them in the published version, whereas it is completely different on the substitutes. One possible explanation is that this is the

original version, that it went missing prior to publication, and that it had to be completely recreated. These variations in handwriting occur elsewhere in the published text; perhaps the final draft was made up from two (or more) manuscripts prepared some time apart. However, although The Diaries of Donald Friend, Volume 4 (2006), covering the period 1966 to 1988, refers to Bumbooziana many times, there is no mention of errant leaves, no hint of variant drafts. The various (and unsuccessful) attempts to sell the manuscript as published are described in detail in the diaries. On 15 October 1982, Friend records he was offered \$25,000 for it; 'It was a shock. I want \$45,000 and regard it cheap at that'. On 20 May 1983, he records that the several manuscripts, including that of Bumbooziana, 'would all go to the library [the National Library of Australia] on loan and be gifted one manuscript per annum, valued for tax deduction purposes by the library'. 9 **FRY, Jas.**: *Original Poems*. [Balaklava, E.J. Walker, Printer, circa 1903]. Octavo, 67 pages. Original flush-cut quarter contrasting cloth with title and imprint details in gilt on the front cover (and nowhere else); cloth a little flecked and marked; spine slightly worn; minimal loss to silverfish to the first and last leaves; a very good copy. Loosely inserted is an original unmounted albumen paper photograph of an elderly couple, presumably the author and his wife. More religious than topical, but there is 'A Trip to Kangarilla', and the birthday acrostic supplies the latest date (his 71st birthday, 17 March 1903), and his home town (Mintaro). **Apparently unrecorded**. **[\$100-200]**

10 **GIBBS, May:** Little Ragged Blossom & More about Snugglepot & Cuddlepie. Sydney, Cornstalk, 1929. Octavo, 'practically unabridged from the 5/- editions, with four fullpage plates and numerous other illustrations'. Pictorial wrappers; staples a little rusty, with the centrefold neatly detached; contemporary inscription (curiously, dated June 1928); a very good copy. **+ GIBBS, May:** Snugglepot and Cuddlepie. Their Adventures Wonderful (a companion volume in similar condition). Scare editions in the Gumnut Readers series; Muir 2753 and 2745. **[2 items] [\$200-250]**

11 **JOHNSON, Samuel:** A Dictionary of the English Language. London, Times Books, 1979 [facsimile edition]/ 1755. Folio, two volumes in one; a fine copy with the slipcase. + **The Compact Oxford English Dictionary.** The Complete Text reproduced Micrographically (Oxford, Oxford University Press, 1980/ 1971; large quarto, two volumes; cloth; a fine set in the slipcase, complete with the magnifying glass in a separate drawer). **[2 items] [\$150-200]**

12 **JOYCE, James:** *Finnegans Wake.* London, Faber, 1939 [first edition]. Original cloth, top edge cut and dyed, others uncut (as issued); cloth very fine; edges, endpapers and first (blank) and last pages foxed, with minimal light scattered foxing to a few leaves; contemporary ownership signature and date on the front flyleaf; an excellent copy with the priceclipped dustwrapper a little chipped and torn with some loss to the head of the spine (including a few letters of the title).

13 **Mary's Own Paper.** Primarily a Review of Current Cultural Events in South Australia [and numerous other subtitles]. A substantial but broken run of approximately **85 issues from March 1949 to August 1961**. [Adelaide], Mary Martin Bookshop, 1949 to 1961. Foolscap folio; roneod typescript stapled in the top lefthand corner; various lengths but generally 8 pages each issue; all loose as issued (but half of them have two holes punched in the lefthand margin and are held together in a folder with an Arnos Fastener); trifling chips and short tears to a few edges; in excellent condition. The journal was 'published, printed, edited, authorised by Mary Martin. [Max] Harris [was] a co-manager of Mary Martin's bookshop, and although he rarely signed his name, it was generally understood he wrote most of MOP' (Tregenza: *Australia's Little Magazines, 1923-1954*). This run contains only one issue each from 1949 (Number 4) and 1961, but the majority of the issues from 1950 to 1960 are present. This ephemeral publication is very rare on the open market and in institutional holdings alike. **[\$1000-1500]**

14 A Mother's Offering to her Children, by a Lady long resident in New South Wales. Sydney, printed at the Gazette Office, 1841. Duodecimo, [viii, last leaf blank], 216 pages. Original quarter roan and marbled papered boards; covers a little rubbed, with minor wear to the corners of the boards; original endpapers a little tidemarked; minimal scattered foxing; leading edges protrude a little unevenly (but the stitching is very firm); overall an excellent copy. Muir 559: 'the first book for children publ[ished] in Australia' (and Marcie Muir established the identity of the author as Charlotte Barton). A fabulous rarity in appealing original condition, and, amazingly, the second copy we have had in less than two years (the last copy selling at our July 2011 auction for just over \$25,000). The thirteen stories in the book are drawn largely from recent colonial history, and include 'Port Essington', 'Loss of the Stirling Castle', 'Wreck of the Charles Eaton' and 'Anecdotes of the Aborigines of New South Wales'. Provenance: the contemporary ownership details of 'W.E. Weeden, Augst 1st 1856' in ink on the front pastedown (with the signature repeated in pencil above it). William Ed Weeden (December 1841-1927) was born in London and arrived in South Australia in 1846; ten years later, aged fourteen, he inscribed these details. The book has been in his family to this day. [\$15000-20000]

15 **NEILSON, John Shaw:** Ballad and Lyrical Poems. Sydney, The Bookfellow in Australia, 1923. Octavo; original quarter black cloth (with the title printed in gilt) and the original boards (albeit these have been recently re-covered with art vellum with a mounted facsimile paper title label, resembling the original binding); new endpapers; top edge gilt, others uncut (and very lightly foxed); spine lightly sunned; an excellent copy. **Number 48 of only 75 copies of the Large Paper edition, signed by the author**. The standard edition was limited to 250 unsigned copies, not all of which were issued. It has also been established that unknown quantities of both versions were lost in transit at the time of publication. **[\$600-800]**

16 NICHOLSON, William: London Types. [Quatorzains by W.E. Henley]. London, 1898. Large quarto, **12 full-page colour lithographs** (after hand-coloured woodcuts) plus the colour pictorial cover. Original quarter vellum and pictorial boards; covers foxed and bowed, with minor surface silverfish damage, and a nick, to the leading edge of the front board; internally a fine copy. **The scarce Library Edition printed on Japanese vellum**. **[\$500-600]**

17 **OUTHWAITE, Ida Rentoul:** Blossom. A Fairy Story. London, 1928 [first edition]. Quarto, 16 full-page plates (8 in colour). Pictorial cloth slightly bumped and mottled; tiny hole in the front hinge; scattered foxing; a very good copy. Muir 5604 (recording only quarter cloth and pictorial papered boards). **[\$250-350]**

18 **OUTHWAITE, Ida Rentoul:** Elves and Fairies of ... Verses by Annie R. Rentoul. Melbourne, 1919 [selected edition]. Quarto, 15 monochrome and 6 colour plates (all fullpage). Original quarter cloth and pictorial papered boards (albeit resewn with some inner hinges neatly reinforced); slight wear to the extremities; an illustration ('after Outhwaite') tipped onto an early blank; trifling signs of handling; a very good copy. The complete version of the book was first published in a limited edition in 1916. **[\$300-400]**

19 **OUTHWAITE, Ida Rentoul:** *The Little Fairy Sister.* London, 1923 [first edition]. Quarto, 16 full-page plates (8 in

colour). Original quarter cloth and decorated boards a little worn at the extremities; ownership signature; moderate foxing; a presentable copy. **[\$400-500]**

20 **PEPYS, Samuel:** The Diary of Samuel Pepys. A new complete transcription edited by Robert Latham and William Matthews ... [complete in 11 volumes]. London, 1973-83 [mixed editions]. Octavo, eleven volumes; cloth; a fine set with the fine dustwrappers. The definitive edition: 'nine volumes of text and footnotes (with an Introduction of 120 pages in volume 1), a tenth volume of commentary (The Companion) and an eleventh volume of index.... Each of the first eight volumes contains one whole calendar year of the diary, from January to December [commencing in 1660]. The ninth volume runs from January 1668 to May 1669. The Diary was first published in abbreviated form in 1825. A succession of new editions, re-issues and selections, published in the Victorian era, made the diary one of the best-known books, and Pepys one of the best-known figures, of English history. But ... the present edition, which has been in preparation for many years, is therefore the first in which the entire diary is printed and in which an attempt has been made at systematic comment on it' (publisher's blurb). [\$300-400]

21 **Phoenix**. Published annually by the Adelaide University Students' Representative Council. 1935. [Together with the issues for 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1939]. Adelaide, 1935 to 1939. Octavo; decorated wrappers with the occasional light chip, mark or crease; an excellent run of **the five attractive pre-war issues**. Four more issues were published (in 1946 and 1948-1950). [\$200-250]

22 **RENTOUL, Annie R. and Ida Rentoul OUTHWAITE:** *The Little Green Road to Fairyland.* London, 1922 [first edition]. Quarto, 16 full-page plates (8 in colour). Original pictorial cloth slightly marked with light wear; ownership signature; moderate foxing; a presentable copy. **[\$400-500]**

23 **SCOTT, Sir Walter:** *The Waverley Novels.* Edinburgh, 1860. Small octavo, 25 volumes; half morocco and marbled papered boards (edges lightly rubbed, spines lightly sunned); an excellent set. The first volume is inscribed 'John J. Duncan from J.G. Duncan-Hughes, Septr 1927 (From the Hughes Park Library)'. John Grant Duncan-Hughes (1882-1962) was a politician (Senator for South Australia from 1932-37); the family estate is near Watervale; the Duncan-Hughes Collection of about 6200 books was presented to the National Library of Australia by his widow in 1963. **[\$250-350]**

24 **[SHEAD, Garry]. LAWRENCE, D.H.:** Kangaroo. The Corrected Edition. Pymble, 1992. Octavo; a fine copy of the Angus and Robertson trade paperback with the front cover illustration a detail from 'Portrait of D.H. Lawrence' by Garry Shead. On the blank inside surface of the front cover is **an original illustration (200 x 120 mm) in blue ballpoint pen of a kangaroo and Lawrence's holiday house at Thirroul, captioned and signed** 'Kangaroo Series, Greenaway Gallery, Dec 1992. Garry Shead'. About a dozen copies of the book, each containing a unique drawing, were offered for sale at the 1993 Greenaway Gallery exhibition of Shead's D.H. Lawrence Series. A related publicity card from the gallery is loosely inserted. **[\$200-400]**

25 SOLLY, Benjamin Travers (1820-1902): An original pen-and-wash sketch on paper (175 x 260 mm), captioned in ink at the foot of the image, 'Looking West from Encounter Bay Sth Australia 1852' (with a similar caption in two different hands on the verso); unsigned, but from the family of the artist, by descent. Slight residue of glue and paper on the verso (where removed from an early mount); in fine condition. The invaluable *Dictionary of Australian Artists. Painters, Sketchers, Photographers and Engravers to* 1870 edited by Joan Kerr contains half a page on Solly. The following note incorporates and expands on that information. The artist arrived in South Australia on the Brightman on 13 December 1840. In March 1856 he married Jane Isabella Watts, the youngest daughter of the postmaster-general of South Australia (not to be confused with her namesake, the author of an anonymous memoir in 1882). He then relocated to Tasmania, where he was assistant colonial secretary from 1857 to 1894. 'No information survives about Solly's training as an artist, but in his 1856 account of his family he refers to the artistic talent of his three sisters. As he was the youngest child, it is possible that his sisters influenced his artistic development.... His earliest drawings date from the late 1830s, when he was aged about nineteen, and continue until about 1894, when he was seventy-four. They are mainly landscapes, in pen, pencil or watercolour'. John Whitehead (1860-1899) 'spent four years exploring North Borneo (1884-1888), then a British possession, as well as visiting Java, Palawan and Malacca. He was one of the first to make detailed observations on the natural history of these islands, discovering 45 new species of birds. He was also the first person to successfully climb Mount Kina Balu all the way to its true peak. But he also describes the peoples and their societies, living conditions, customs, and beliefs in detail. Tragically, Whitehead died of a fever in Hainan when only 38'. Manuscripts and Photographs (Lots 49-70)

49 [Australian Judaica]. A large illuminated address (visible image 460 x 370 mm, extensively illustrated) presented 'To Solomon Saunders Esq. J.P., President of the Adelaide Hebrew Congregation. Honoured Sir, We the undersigned on behalf of the Adelaide Hebrew Congregation ... Congregation ... beg to offer you our heartiest congratulations on the celebration of the Seventieth Anniversary of your Birthday', Adelaide, 5 June 1908. Attractively presented in the original ornate frame (slightly damaged on three edges) and matt (visible matt 590 x 470 mm, with the top corners in a stepped quarter-round profile). At the head of the address is a well-executed watercolour of the Adelaide Synagogue, featuring both the original building from 1850 and the extensive Italianate addition from 1871 (both still standing today in Synagogue Place, albeit hiding behind a 1936 art deco facade). Solomon Saunders (1838-1925), active and prominent for decades in the local Jewish community, was 'one of the best known Jews, not only in South Australia, but in the Commonwealth' (from his obituary). 50 BARRETT, Walter Franklyn: A selection of 22 vintage gelatin silver photographs (each approximately 155 x 200 mm), being publicity shots from the early 1920s motion pictures produced by this pioneering Australian film-maker. Apart from a handful of bumped or creased corners, and a mild concave curve to them all, they are in fine condition. There are captions in all negatives; all but one has 'Barrett Australian Productions', all but one has a visible title, and two also identify the actors and the relevant movie ('A Girl of the Bush'). Walter Franklyn Barrett (1873-1964, film cameraman and director) formed his own film company in Melbourne in 1920, and in '1921-22 made three features, "A Girl of the Bush", which "had a distinctive spirit of documentary realism", "Know thy Child" and "A Rough Passage". They all revealed "his sensitive eye as a photographer of Australian landscapes". In mid-1922 Barrett's company failed' (ADB). [\$400-600]

51 BARTON, Edmund (1849-1920, first Prime Minister of Australia): The ink signature of Australia's first Prime Minister, Edmund Barton (from 1 January 1901 to 24 September 1903); a large example cut from a letter (or similar); slight traces of old paper hinges on the rear; in fine condition. 53 **[BOOTHBY, Benjamin (1801-1868, judge)]. A manuscript document signed** by Benjamin Boothby, controversial South Australian Supreme Court judge. The signature appears on the second of two large sheets of vellum laced together (each approximately 605 x 740 mm), with an embossed wax seal at the foot of the first leaf. The document is a 'correct Probate of the Will' of Henry Berryman, contractor and mining agent of Adelaide, who died in May 1864. It is signed in full 'Benjamin Boothby, Judge', dated 10 June 1864. The signature is very large and legible, and the document is in excellent condition. Boothby was appointed second judge of the Supreme Court of South Australia in February 1853; it was the last appointment to the South Australian bench made by the Colonial Office. Boothby's period in office was marred by controversy, leading eventually to his dismissal in July 1867. 'His self-righteous pomposity, disdain for things colonial and inability to compromise played an important part in causing his downfall' (*ADB*). **[\$400-600]**

Full green calf; slight blemish to one cover (a flaw in the original hide); essentially an uncirculated set in the lightly marked and rubbed cloth-covered slipcase with reproduction embroidered 1928-29 and 1948 Australian blazer pockets mounted on the front and rear panels. This is an example of the deluxe edition limited to only 500 sets. A printed numbered sheet of paper signed by Don Bradman was mounted in the first volume of each set when it was published; this set contains instead a loosely inserted card signed in ink by Don Bradman. [Cased Image]. A hand-coloured half-plate 56 ambrotype of an Australian rural scene, featuring several crude bush dwellings with cattle yards in the background and two men standing in the foreground, surrounded by archetypal eucalyptus-dominated scrub. Mounted as issued in an ornate velvet-lined leather-covered hinged case (the leather hinge now broken); plate size 105 x 140 mm, with the image behind an ornate oval metal matt (visible image size 90 x 120 mm); in excellent condition. The photographer, subjects, location and date are unknown, but the ambrotype came and went in the period 1855-1865. Large-format Australian outdoor ambrotypes are scarce; ones of this quality are rare. [The ambrotype is a thin collodion negative on glass with a black backing of paper, cloth or paint (as in this instance), which makes it look like a positive image. The [\$6000-8000] packaging as above is standard.]

CHIANG KAI-SHEK (1887-1975): Two original 57 gelatin silver photographs of President Chiang Kai-Shek, the legendary Chinese nationalist general who fled China in 1949 in the wake of the communist victory to set up what he envisaged as a Chinese government-in-exile in Taiwan. The first photograph, a head-and-shoulders portrait in uniform, is **inscribed and signed** (in 1957) by the President in black ink in Chinese characters, complete with his seal in red ink; it is 175 x 137 mm, laid down on the inscribed mount, visible size 257 x 205 mm. The second photograph, featuring a smiling and relaxed President and his wife seated at a table on either side of a large vase of flowers, is 205 x 255 mm. Both images are blindstamped in English and Chinese 'Photo by OMEA' (Officers' Moral Endeavour Association). Both photographs are mounted behind glass in matching frames; details (including an enlarged colour snapshot) of the original Chinese recipient of the items are on the verso of the frames. Apart from a small light tidemark at the foot of the signed mount (well clear of the inscription), both items are in fine condition. [2 items] [\$500-700]

58 DREYFUS, Captain Alfred (1859-1935, 'The Dreyfus Affair'): An autograph sentiment in ink, unsigned, but on

his personal calling card (57 x 96 mm): 'Avec les remerciements pour vos paroles de sympathie'. Trifling light marks; light traces of old paper hinges on the rear; in excellent condition. **[\$150-200]**

59 DURYEA, Townsend: A photograph album (255 x 340 mm) captioned in gilt on the front cover Duryea's Adelaide Album. It contains a series of vintage albumen paper photographs (1866-67) mounted on stiff leaves (rectos only). On the first leaf is a magnificent panorama of Adelaide, comprising five roughly uniform panels, mounted as issued - slightly overlapping, on linen - to form a continuous image 125 x 895 mm (the linen measures 248 x 940 mm, and folds into three equal sections to fit into the album). There are 13 other Duryea photographs in the album; the majority of them relate to the visit of Prince Alfred, the Duke of Edinburgh, to Adelaide. This was the first Royal Visit to Australia, and Adelaide was the first port of call. Prince Alfred arrived there on 31 October 1867 and left three weeks later on 21 November. Duryea was chosen as official photographer; on 9 November the Prince posed at Duryea's King William Street studio for the first Royal portraits made in the country. Duryea then accompanied the official party throughout the visit, travelling in a specially prepared photographer's van. Several images depict the carnival atmosphere at the unveiling of the foundation stone for the GPO in King William Street on 1 November; others were taken at Government House, the Parade Ground, along the main street and at Glenelg. They are impressive (some are almost impressionistic); Duryea lets the spirit of the occasion seep into even the more formal of his studies. There is one ring-in, a very large image of the National Bank of Australasia (277 x 240 mm), which looks suspiciously like an early example of product placement. New York-born Townsend Duryea (1823-1888) emigrated to Australia (Melbourne) in 1852, and commenced work as a photographer the following year. In 1855, he relocated his studio to Adelaide. By the early 1870s Duryea's panoramas, royal portraits and prizes won in Society of Arts photographic competitions had made him famous (ADB). Much more detail on Duryea may be had from the lengthy article in Joan Kerr's Dictionary of Australian Artists ... to 1870. However, the panorama in this album is not the one described in Kerr ('a fold-out 360-degree panorama of Adelaide taken from the tower of Adelaide Town Hall in 1865'), nor is it the larger panorama 'taken from the top of the GPO tower soon after it was completed in 1870'. The present panorama is taken from a local rise (Montefiore Hill) in North Adelaide and sweeps left to right from the hills towards the sea. All of these panoramas are excessively rare, not least because 'Duryea's studio and enormous collection of glass-plate negatives, stated to number 50,000, were destroyed by fire in 1875'. This catastrophe effectively ended Duryea's career as a photographer. It must assuredly account for the genuine scarcity of material by Duryea on the open market (other than bread-and-butter carte-de-visite portraits). This album is very rare in our experience (and if the earlier records are any guide, for long before we came on the scene in the mid-1970s). This is only the second example we have handled; indeed, it is only the second one we have seen on the open market in that time. We have inspected three other examples in institutions; all five copies are bound similarly, and contain the same panorama. However, the balance of the contents varies in each instance, and we have no hesitation in claiming that this Royal Visit example is the pick of the crop. The original full brown cloth album has had minimal conservation work done to a little wear at the extremities, and there is some loss of colour to a section of the rear cover. There is slight silverfish damage to the endpapers, and the front flyleaf has been removed; overall the contents are essentially in fine condition. [\$8000-10000]

60 **GEIKIE**, James (1839-1915, geologist): Three autograph letters signed by Professor James Geikie in

reply to a former student in Australia, [Charles Graham Weir] Officer; Edinburgh (one on University of Edinburgh letterhead); 5 October 1892 (duodecimo, 4 pages); 29 July 1893 (small octavo, 4 pages), and 13 June 1894 (octavo, 4 pages). Apart from slight silverfish damage to the third letter, they are in excellent condition. Graham Officer contacted Professor Geikie with information about his pioneering research into 'glacial conglomerates', and sent him photographs and samples (striated stones); Geikie is frankly excited and delighted with it all, not least as he is working on the third edition of his The Great Ice Age and its Relation to the Antiquity of Man. There is animated theorizing arising, for example 'There may quite well have been a considerable extension southward of the Australian land area - which may have or may not have been at one time continuous with an Antarctic Continent'. There is some discussion of specific sites of geological interest in Australia, and mention of other Australian correspondents. Finally, 'The new edition of my Gt. Ice Age is going through the press.... In the Appendix I have given a short account of all the recorded discoveries of erratic deposits occurring in the older geological systems ...and your work of course comes in for notice'. The PS to the last letter is intriguing: 'I am interested to know something of the wine-growing trade in Australia.... One of my boys has got a notion into his head of learning the art of wine-making in France & Germany with a view to subsequently trying his fortune at the work in Australia'. [3 items] [\$600-800]

61 HEYSEN, Sir Hans (1877-1968): An autograph letter signed to 'Dear Mrs Wholahan'; quarto, two pages, Ambleside, Sunday (undated but circa 1940s?); creased where folded for posting; in fine condition. After arrangements for an impending visit are discussed, Heysen writes 'It is good to feel someone has a heart for the Struggling Art Student ... I shall be very glad to fulfill the position of Trustee ... The time is still fresh in my memory when I felt the need of a "leg-up", and lucky for me it came, and just at the right time, when my mind was most receptive and I could paint & study with peace in my heart'. The artist and arts benefactor Elizabeth Maud Wholohan, nee Vizard (1875-1950) was a lifelong friend of Hans Heysen, exhibiting with him at an early age. On her death she bequeathed a substantial sum of money to establish the Maud Wholohan-Vizard Art Prize, awarded first in 1957. + Two not-unrelated newspaper cuttings. [\$300-400]

HUXLEY, Thomas Henry (1825-1895, English 62 biologist): An autograph envelope (93 x 118 mm) addressed and signed by Thomas Huxley to Sir Joseph Hooker FRS, The Camp, Sunningdale. The envelope is postmarked Eastbourne, 10 June 1895; the contents are no longer present, but Huxley's wife, Henrietta Anne, has written across the flap at the rear: 'Waking up to write this has made him feel sea-sick! - & the nurse has forbidden him to write to other friends. HAH So don't tell them he wrote to you!' Huxley died on 29 June, less than three weeks later ... The flap is a little torn from opening, affecting one word of the note; old paper hinges on the rear touch two words; in excellent condition. Huxley was Assistant Surgeon on HMS Rattlesnake on her voyage of discovery and survey to New Guinea and Australia, 1846-1850. On returning to England, he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society; his lifelong friendship with Hooker dates from this time. [\$150-200]

63 **KING, Henry:** Holiday Tours. Sydney & Blue Mountains, 1881-1886 [cover title of an album of photographs]. A vintage album (235 x 350 mm, half morocco and lettered cloth, both a little worn, with the cloth on the front cover a little tidemarked), with 13 thick card leaves containing **16 original albumen paper photographs.** Thirteen are by **Henry King** (each approximately 155 x 225 mm, captioned in the negative, with his credit also blind-embossed in four of them). Three are by William Hall (each approximately 235 x 185 mm, captioned in the negative); they are the only images mounted on the verso of the leaves; they appear to have been added later. Ten of King's photographs are of Sydney; the other six are of the Blue Mountains, including the three by Hall, which depict the Katoomba, Leura and Wentworth Falls. Minor surface scuffing to one King image; trifling silverfish loss to the surface of one Hall image; minor damage and pencilling to some mounts, not affecting the images. In 1880 Henry King (1855-1923) 'established a photographic studio at 316 George Street in partnership with William Slade and by 1884 was sole proprietor. For the rest of his life he worked from studios in George Street, although much of his reputation was derived from work done outside' (*ADB*). William Frederick Hall (1855-1943) was also a noted photographer in Sydney at the time. **[\$600-800]**

64 MARKHAM, Sir Clements Robert (1830-1916, Arctic explorer and geographer): An autograph draft manuscript 'Proposal for an Antarctic Manual' by Sir Clements Markham, with a covering typed letter signed Professor John Walter Gregory (1864-1932, bv geographer, geologist and explorer). The draft proposal is six pages foolscap folio (two bifolia, last leaf blank), in fine condition apart from creases where folded for posting. The cover letter is one page quarto, folded ditto, now lightly foxed; The University, Melbourne, 27 July 1903. Gregory was appointed foundation Professor in Geology and Mineralogy at Melbourne University in 1899. 'With university permission, Gregory also accepted the directorship of the civilian scientific staff of the 1901-04 British National Antarctic Expedition commanded by Commander R.F. Scott. However he resigned (1901) when "representatives of the Royal Geographical Society and of a few scientific men belonging to the Navy" opposed the agreement that he would have charge of the landing party's scientific programme' (ADB). It was in that capacity that this proposal came into his hands. His letter explains how it came to leave them; it is his contribution to a young autograph hunter's collection ... 'I enclose Sir Clements Markham's draft for the scheme of the Antarctic Manual, issued in conjunction with the Antarctic expedition. The book as issued, followed fairly closely to the scheme laid down'. Markham made two Arctic voyages, in 1850-51 (a Franklin relief expedition) and 1875-76. In 1893, he was elected President of the Royal Geographical Society; at that time there had been no significant Antarctic exploration since Sir James Clark Ross's expedition fifty years previously. A new impetus was provided through a lecture given to the RGS in 1893 by the oceanographer Professor John Murray, calling for 'an expedition to resolve the outstanding questions still posed in the south'. In response to Murray the RGS and the Royal Society formed a joint committee, to campaign for a British Antarctic expedition. Markham devoted his entire presidency to the furtherance of this cause. In his preface to *The Antarctic Manual for the Use* of the Expedition of 1901 (London, RGS, 1901) he explains that in 1874 he suggested 'that instructions and memoirs on the various scientific subjects which were to occupy the attention of the officers of the Arctic Expedition should be prepared, so as to form a manual'. That two-volume manual came out the following year. This lengthy and detailed proposal is undated, but there is a marginal note of 8 [\$3000-4000] November 1899 towards the end.

65 [Music]. A large autograph album (220 x 180 mm) with numerous entries signed by (mainly South) Australian musical identities of the Edwardian era. The entries, generally dated and occupying a full page, often include inscriptions or autograph musical sentiments. Possibly compiled by Gerta Homborg, 'an amateur singer and authority on German lieder' (*ADB*), who married the composer and musician Hooper Brewster Jones in Adelaide in June 1910. **[\$200-300]**

66 NANSEN, Fridtjof (1861-1930, Norwegian Arctic explorer, statesman and Nobel Peace Prize winner): A printed portrait photograph (65 x 45 mm, clipped from a magazine) signed by Nansen. The cutting and signature probably date from the 1900s; the image depicts a slightly younger Nansen. Light mark just touching the portrait; slight traces of old paper hinges on the rear; in very good condition. + A contemporary newspaper review cutting of E.E. Reynolds' 1932 biography of the explorer. [\$150-200]

67 PADEREWSKI, Ignacy Jan (1860-1941, composer, pianist and second Prime Minister of the Second Polish Republic): An autograph musical sentiment (four bars from his Polish Fantasy, Opus 19), signed and dated; small octavo, one page, on the letterhead of The Australia [Hotel], Sydney, 27 October 1904. An oval portrait of the composer (105 x 80 mm, clipped from a contemporary journal) is attached with paper hinges to the sheet, slightly obscuring the letterhead. Unevenly discoloured through contact with acidic paper; old paper hinges on the verso; in very good condition. Paderewski made his only tour to Australia in the second half of 1904. + The programme for a concert given by Paderewski at Wangaratta on Tuesday October 25 [1904] (one page, 210 x 110 mm; folded once; old paper hinges on the verso; in excellent condition). This was the only country town concert he gave on the tour. + Two contemporary newspaper cuttings regarding the concert at Wangaratta. **[4 items]** [\$150-200]

68 **REID, George Houstoun (1845-1918, fourth Prime Minister of Australia): The ink signature** of Australia's fourth Prime Minister, George Houstoun Reid (from 18 August 1904 to 5 July 1905), cut from the foot of a letter with the words 'Yrs sincerely'; slight traces of old paper hinges on the rear; in excellent condition. **[\$150-200]**

SPENCER, Herbert (1820-1903, English 69 evolutionary biologist and political theorist): An autograph letter (in a secretarial hand) signed by Herbert Spencer to 'My dear Hooker' (Sir Jospeh Hooker); duodecimo, first and third pages of a bifolium; London, 22 October 1895. 'When I wrote to you I had some thought of using botanical illustrations in my article against Lord Salisbury, and had hoped in such case to have your assistance, but I have limited myself to zoological illustrations. I shall be very glad nevertheless if you will read over the enclosed proof'. Sir Joseph Hooker (1817-1911) was Director of Kew Gardens from 1865 until his retirement in 1885; Lord Salisbury (1830-1903) became British Prime Minister for the third time in August 1895. Spencer, perhaps best popularly known for coining the concept 'survival of the fittest', could be remembered (or forgotten) for a great variety of reasons, not least for his attacks on the reform movements in late Victorian Britain, hinted at in this letter. Slight traces of old paper hinges on the first and last (blank) pages; first leaf sunned; in very good condition. [\$150-200]

70 **SWEET, Captain Samuel:** *Captain Sweet's Views of South Australia* [title leaf printed in gilt]. An album containing **22 vintage full-plate photographs** by Captain Samuel Sweet (1825-1886), South Australia's premier nineteenth century photographer, and a significant Australian landscape photographer. The album (280 x 215 mm) has been reinserted in the original slightly worn decorated cloth covers. The high-gloss gelatin silver photographs are each approximately 155 x 210 mm, and are mounted on the rectos only of plain card album leaves, without captions. Eight images carry Sweet's blindstamp, indicating (in our experience) that the photographs were printed after his death in 1886; his widow continued to operate the business until 1892. Further to this, the high-gloss gelatin silver prints did not come into regular use until the late 1880s. The acidic album leaves are foxed and unevenly discoloured, affecting some plates (generally in the sky or other light areas); there is an unsealed tear to one image and a short closed tear to another; overall in good condition. The subject matter is wide-ranging, all but three images are interesting – country rather than city, built environs rather than landscapes – including a winery, a series of six photographs featuring bridges (some with good crowd content), and a group portrait of 36 Aboriginal school children and their male teacher at Point McLeay Mission Station. **[\$2000-3000]**

From the collection of the South Australian historian and bibliographer Thomas Gill, with his pencilled signature (dated 1884) on the verso of the frontispiece, and his numerous annotations in pencil throughout the book. His collection was bequeathed to the Royal Geographical Society of South Australia, which later disposed of duplicates; this copy has the RGSSA stamp on three pages (cancelled on one of them) and the John Goodchild-designed Gill bequest bookplate on the front pastedown. **[\$150-200]**

76 **CLOW, Robert John:** The Pillar of Salt. A Story of Station Life viewed from the Plains of Austral-Asia. Balaklava, 1903. Octavo, [3]-128 pages with one full-page illustration. 77 **GIBLIN, R.W.:** The Early History of Tasmania. The Geographical Era, 1642-1804. [Together with] ... Volume 2: The Penal Settlement Era, 1804-28. London, 1928 and Melbourne, 1939. Octavo, two volumes, the first volume with 3 plates and 12 facsimile charts (many folding), the second volume with the errata slip. Ferguson 10265, citing the Petherick copy in the National Library copy, states that 'every copy available was purchased and destroyed by the Angas family'. A relevant contemporary newspaper cutting is loosely inserted. **[\$300-400]**

Sir Charles Napier, one of the famous Peninsular War brothers, wrote this account while he was under consideration for the post of the first Governor of the new colony of South Australia; he subsequently withdrew his nomination, for reasons explained in the book. **[\$500-600]**

89 **The Northern Territory Times.** June 1890 to June 1932 [the last issue]. **An unbroken 42-year run** of the main Northern Territory newspaper of its day; in contemporary institutional bindings, in excellent condition internally and externally. The newspaper commenced publication on 7 November 1873; accordingly this set lacks the issues for the first sixteen and a half years of its existence. However, it is perhaps more remarkable that ANY ISSUES AT ALL have survived, given the well-documented effects of tropical climates on paper (let alone turn-of-the-century newsprint). This run owes its existence to its long-term residence in an institution in the temperate regions of southern Australia.

A very large folding full-colour map (printed surface 1795 x 1310 mm: external dimensions an imperial 6 by 4.5 feet, cut and mounted on linen, as issued, in 36 uniform panels, each 305 x 225 mm). It has been neatly removed from the original cloth boards in which it was mounted, with later ownership stamps on the now-exposed verso of the panel to which the cover had been attached (it is no longer present). The map has three insets: 'The Adelaide and Port Darwin Telegraph Line', 'Port Darwin and the County of Palmerston', and a 'General Map of Australia and New Zealand'. A lavish four-page brochure for the South Australian Company, with a spiel by Edmund Wheeler, the manager of the Company, on the bottom half of the front page and the first ten lines overleaf: the balance of the contents (finishing a guarter of the way down the fourth page) consists of testimonials from (literally) happy campers. These range in date from December 1836 to 24 February 1838. Ferguson 2376 records an earlier version ('Folio. Pp. 4 [last blank, 1837])', a photocopy of which is in the State Library of South Australia. The text of that version finishes at the foot of the third page, and although the map is identical, everything else is different, often completely different. The list of directors has been reset, with obvious differences. Wheeler's contribution has been brought up to date (for example, he now quotes shipping figures of 26 to December 1837, as against 15 to January 1837 earlier). However, the main difference is in the encomia and testimonials. The 1837 version has quotes from William Light, John Morphett and others, dated 23 August to 28 September 1836. None of these appear in this revised version; here they range in date from 'Mr Brown's Letter' of December 1836 to a quote from the South Australian Gazette of 24 February 1838. Henry James Hillier (1875-1958) was a teacher at Hermannsburg Mission under Pastor Carl Strehlow from 1906-10; from 1916 [until July 1927] he was 'diocesan secretary and registrar for the Church of England bishop of Willochra Gilbert White Hillier had great affection for T.G.H. Strehlow, his godson, who inherited some of "Uncle Harry's" books and drawings' (ADB, Supplementary Volume, 2005). Sixteen pages have pencilled emphases in the margins and there are minor corrections or annotations to another three pages; the latter are made by Hillier (page 7) and T.G.H. Warburton didn't fade away; when he successfully conquered 'the formidable Great Sandy Desert to become the first to cross the continent from the centre to the west' in 1873-74, he was over 60 (albeit emaciated and blind in one eye after [\$800-1200] the gruelling trip).

The second letter thanks the collector for sending HIS photograph (!!!), then continues in a more interesting vein: 'We are still at it here, but I think things are really moving in, and the end of it, as a war, cannot be far off, although shots may be fired for some time to come'. The first letter has a sunned front page and slight traces of old paper hinges on the blank rear page; the second letter is in excellent condition. The original envelope for the first letter, addressed and signed by Alderson, is also present. At this time, Alderson was Commander of the Mounted Infantry in South Africa; he was instrumental in forming British counter-tactics and used his brigade to great effect against the Boers, his elite troops being two regiments of Canadian soldiers. This resulted in him being placed in command of the Canadian Expeditionary Force during the first half of the First World War, but he made enemies amongst the Canadian political and military elite, and suffered disastrous casualties during operations in 1915-16, which forced his sidelining and eventual retirement from service. Eric'. The recipient is 'Mr A Carrol [?] / Bagot St / Hilton / S Aus'. Eric Walker was attached to the 4th Australian Infantry Brigade; he landed at Gallipoli on the evening of 25 April 1915. He never left the peninsula; he was killed in action there on 12 August 1915, a fortnight after writing this note.
