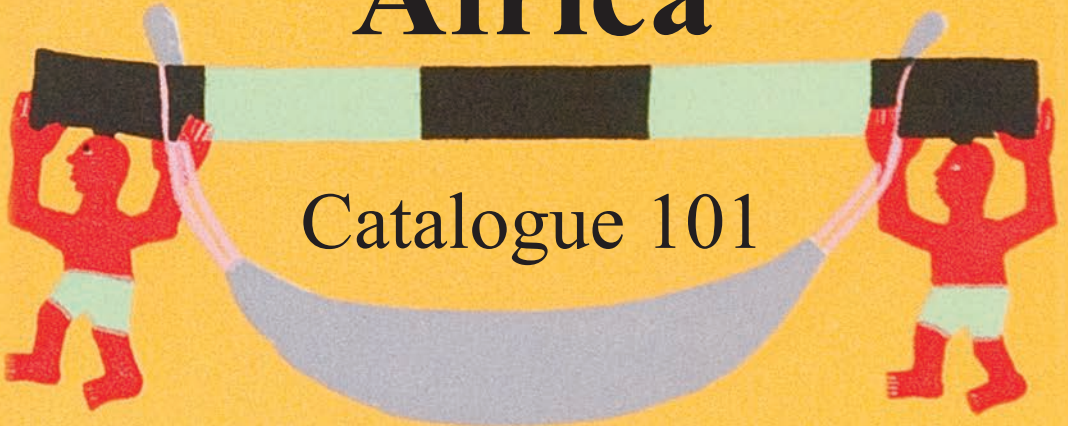

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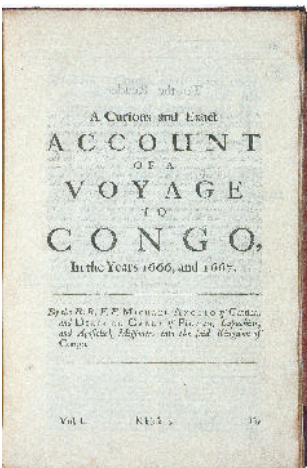
All descriptions in this catalogue were correct at the time of cataloguing.

1. ALMEIDA, Manoel and Balthezar Tellez **Historia geral de Ethiopia a Alta, ou Preste Ioam, e do que nella obraram os Padres da Companhia de Iesus.** Composta na mesma Ethiopia, pelo Padre Manoel d'Almeyda, Natural de Vizeu, Provincial, e Visitador, que foy na India. Fruytiers (partly hand-coloured), title printed in red and black, half-title, double-page engraved map (lower blank margin extended) and its descriptive leaf 'Advertencias sobre este mappa', engraved map to show the source of the Nile.

Manoel de Almeida (1580-1646) was a Portuguese Jesuit who was sent to Ethiopia in 1624 during the reign of the Roman Catholic convert Emperor Susneyos. He was the first traveller to describe various parts of south-west Ethiopia and spent time in the Jesuit establishment at Gorgora on the shores of Lake Tana. In 1632 he witnessed the death of Emperor Susneyos and left Ethiopia in 1633 during the expulsion of the Jesuits. Balthezar Tellez edited this work and included the accounts of Pedro Pays and Alfonso Mendes. This copy has the additional engraved title partly hand-

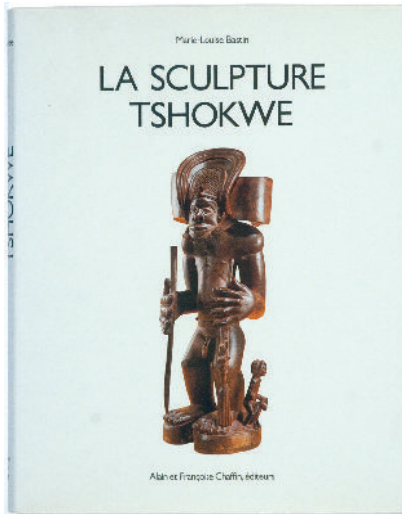
coloured, so as to cover up the nakedness of several figures on the right-hand side. KK2 remargined to size, rust-holes affecting one or two letters in A2, M5 and Tt1 (the last two repaired), repairs to blank margins of M1 and KKK6, short tear in Ii6 repaired without loss. The rarity of this work has been suggested by some scholars as due to James Bruce destroying any copies he came across so as to pass off the descriptions as his own. From the Britwell Court Library of Henry W. Miller, with his monogram in compartments on the spine (Britwell Court sale, lot 20, 30 June 1919); and from the library of Dr. Juel-Jensen with his Amharic bookplate, bought from Brockhaus Catalogue 70 (1984) with the original invoice enclosed and some copies of related correspondence. An excellent copy of the first edition in a nineteenth century black morocco with marbled endpapers by Lewis. [Fumagalli: 1409] COPAC lists the Oxford, BL and SOAS copies. **£17,500**



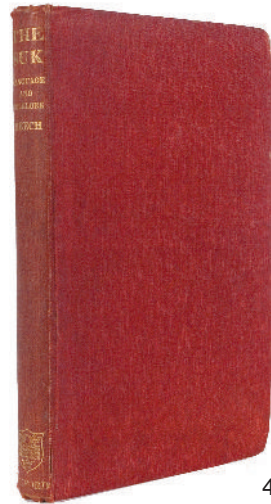

The two volumes bound together in nineteenth century maroon half calf, Fcap.folio. Translated from the original Italian, an important narrative with valuable accounts of Loanda, the Kingdom of the Congo and the peoples therein. The spine renewed and lettered in gilt, a very nice copy. **£600**

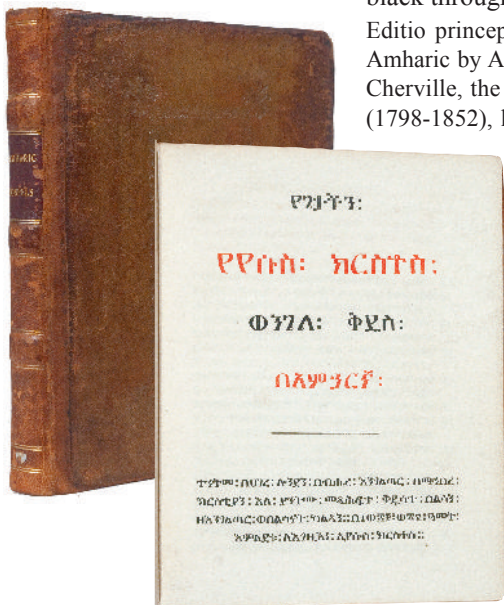

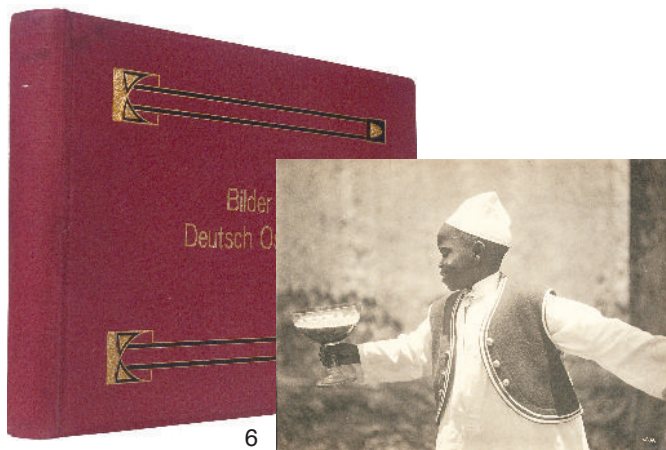

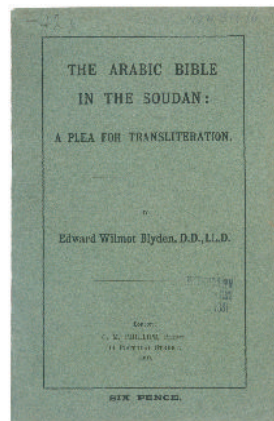
Editio princeps of any part of the Bible in Amharic. Translated into Amharic by Abu Rumi, an Abyssinian monk, assisted by M. Asselin de Cherville, the French Consul at Cairo and edited by Thomas Pell-Platt (1798-1852), later Honorary Librarian of the British and Foreign Bible Society. The type is that used by Ludolf. 'The history of the first translation of the Bible into Amharic is a romantic and exciting story which deserves to be better known among éthiopiants' - (cf. Edward Ullendorf, Ethiopia and the Bible, 1968, pp.63). The spine with a later reback, boards a little rubbed, a very nice copy in a contemporary calf. With the bookplate and signature of the Coptic scholar Henry Tattam (1789-1868); the bookplate of J. P. R. Lyell, book collector; from the library of Dr. Juel-Jensen with his Amharic bookplate. 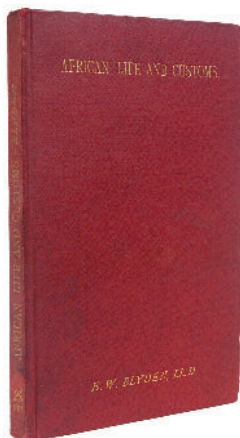

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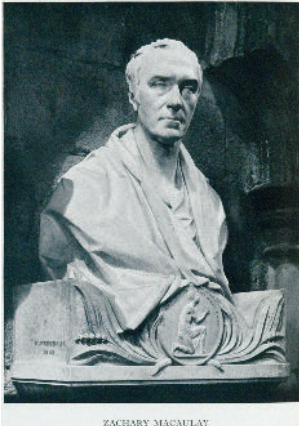

The photographs show scenes in Dar es Salaam, village scenes, the railway, Manyoni and Tabora stations, Islamic ruins, German askaris, and various good portraits. 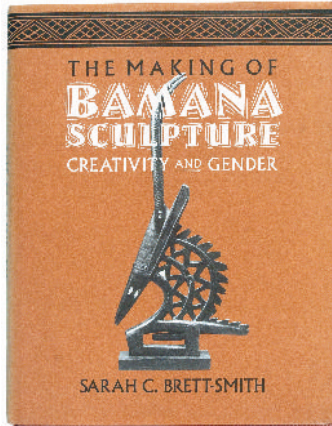


**8. BLYDEN, Edward Wilmot African Life and Customs. Reprinted from "The Sierra Leone Weekly News."** By Edward Wilmot Blyden, LL.D. London: C. M. Phillips, 1908 8vo. 91pp. Edward Wilmot Blyden (1832-1912), widely regarded as the Father of Pan-Africanism, was born in Saint Thomas, Virgin Islands. He edited and wrote articles for newspapers in Liberia, Sierra Leone and Nigeria, served as an ambassador for Liberia to Britain and France, became the Liberian Secretary of State (1862-64) and Minister of the Interior (1880-82). The first edition in book form of a series of articles written for the "Sierra Leone Weekly News" on general African topics with many references to Mary Kingsley. Slight marking to covers, a very nice copy in the publisher's red cloth, from the library of the African-American collector and writer, Professor John Ralph Willis with his bookplate. **£200**

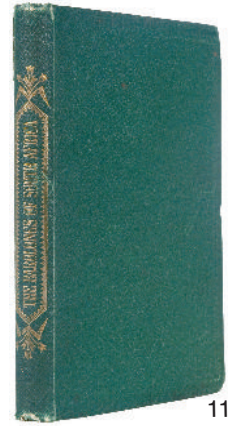

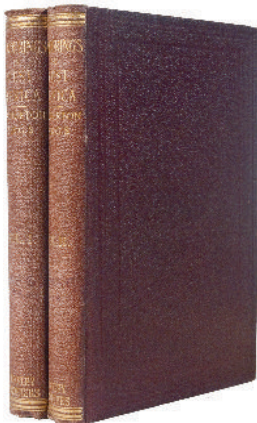
‘The Making of Bamana Sculpture describes both the techniques and the rituals used by Bamana blacksmiths in Mali, West Africa, when they carve sacred sculpture.’ A very nice copy in the publisher’s cloth with the dustwrapper. **£250**

**11. BROADBENT, Samuel** **A Narrative of the first introduction of Christianity amongst the Barolong tribe of Bechuanas, South Africa:** with a brief summary of the subsequent history of the Wesleyan Mission to the same people. By the Rev. Samuel Broadbent. London: Wesleyan Mission House, 1865 Fcap.8vo. iv,204pp. errata.

In 1823 the author, another missionary (Mr. Hodgson) and their families set up a mission in Maquassi in Bechuanaland under much difficulty due to a constant state of warfare in the country. The Rev. Broadbent studied the people and even mastered the language enough to be able to preach to them. Spine rubbed at head and foot, back hinge weak, a very nice copy in the publisher’s green cloth lettered in gilt on the spine. [Mendelssohn, I: 192] COPAC lists four copies. **£375**

**12. BURTON, Richard** **Wanderings in West Africa from Liverpool to Fernando Po. By a F.R.G.S.** With map and illustration. In two volumes. London: Tinsley Brothers, 1863 Cr.8vo. (1). xi,303pp. folding map as frontispiece. (2). v,295pp. frontispiece of ‘The juju, or sacrifice house, Grand Bonny River.’ According to Penzer, Burton intended to suppress his name from this work, however this copy has ‘R. F. Burton F.R.G.S.’ on the spine.

‘Newly married and needing employment, Burton approached the Foreign Office for a consular position, hoping for the post at Damascus. Instead, he was offered the consulship at Fernando Po, a small, unhealthy island in the Bight of Biafra on the west African coast. When he accepted the position on 27 March 1861 he requested to retain his commission in the Bombay army, but he was struck from the list, thereby losing not only his half pay but also any prospect of a pension or sale of his commission, an action about which he always complained bitterly. Burton did not permit Isabel to accompany him to Fernando Po, which he described as ‘the very abomination of desolation’. He slipped away from the post at every opportunity for excursions on the African mainland or to meet Isabel in the Canaries or England. Although he loathed Fernando Po, he worked continuously at his writing with Wanderings in West Africa and Abeokuta and the Cameroons Mountains both appearing in 1863.’ (ODNB). Both spines are a little faded, bookplate of the Bath Reference Library to front paste-downs, occasional blindstamps, a very nice copy in the publisher’s dark purple cloth. **£850**

Major William Francis Butler (1838 - 1910) was in command of one of the four columns which operated against the Ashanti during the 1874 war, however before he could attack the Ashanti his Akim troops deserted. An influential work which underwent three editions in that year. Covers spotted and head and tail of spine frayed, inner front hinge splitting, a very nice copy in the publisher's maroon cloth, from the library of the African-American collector and writer, Professor John Ralph Willis with his bookplate.

The account of the important Portuguese journey of exploration across Africa from Angola to the Indian Ocean. Volume I has a contemporary presentation inscription in Portuguese on the half title to Charles K. Ivens from "velho" - old man. Presumably from the author to his son or grandson. The maps in this book were printed on an inferior paper and tend to get browned, this copy is no exception; occasional spotting in the text, some crinkling to upper margins of last half of volume I, both volumes rebacked and recased in the publisher's red, black and grey decorative printed covers, now somewhat worn and faded.

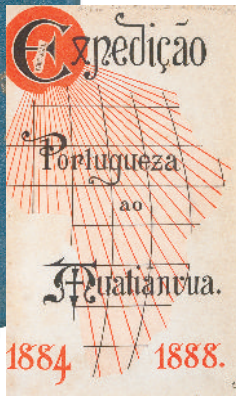
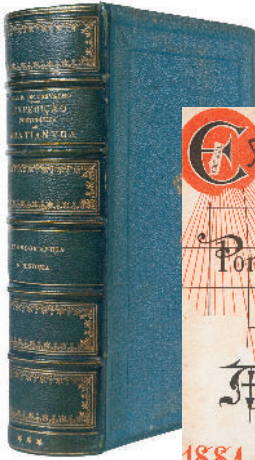

Cover title: Expedição portuguesa ao Muatianvua, 1884-1888. Although 24 plates are called for the plate opposite page 664 is not present nor does it appear to have ever been bound-in. The plate was designated 'chromo' and may not have been issued. The Portuguese explorer and colonial officer Major Henrique Augusto Dias de Carvalho (1843-1909) led the diplomatic expedition to Muatianvua, the king of the Lunda, and to his capital, Mussumba. This lasted from 1884 to 1888 and was commissioned by the Portuguese government with the support of the Sociedade de Geografia de Lisboa. These are the comprehensive ethnographic results of the expedition and feature numerous fine drawings of the expeditions' artists. Some scattered foxing, the publisher's wrappers bound-in, encased in a contemporary dark-green quarter morocco, the spine gilt in

compartments, olive green cloth boards with the upper board embossed in gilt with the letter 'A' surmounted by a coronet, a very nice copy. **£500**

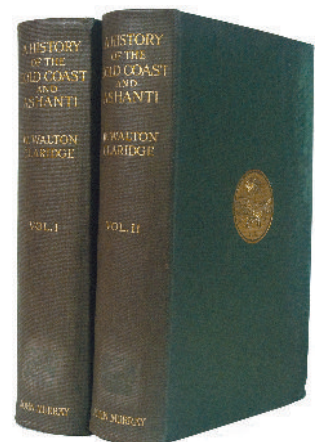

Jean-Louis Castilhon (1720 - 1782) was a French author and lawyer. Zingha or Ana Nzinga (1582 - 1663) was a queen of Ndongo, a part of Angola, who resisted the Portuguese expansion into that country during the seventeenth century. Castilhon's colourful biography caused a sensation when first published. This is the first edition, a second edition was published in the following year. Spine and covers rubbed, head and tail of spine chipped, a very nice copy in a contemporary binding; with the distinctive bookplate of the anthropologist and explorer Emil Torday. **£750**

With the cancelled bookplate of the Boston College Library to front endpapers, slight discolouration to spines caused by removal of shelf labels, fore-edges of upper boards slightly marked, a very nice set in the publisher's dark green cloth, from the library of the African-American collector and writer, Professor John Ralph Willis with his bookplate. **£250**

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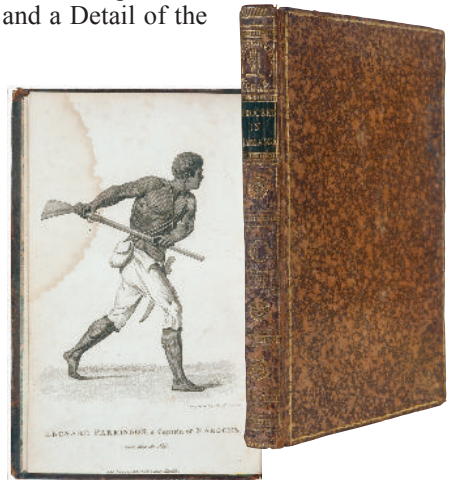


The Summit of Antananarivo, showing the Great Palace.

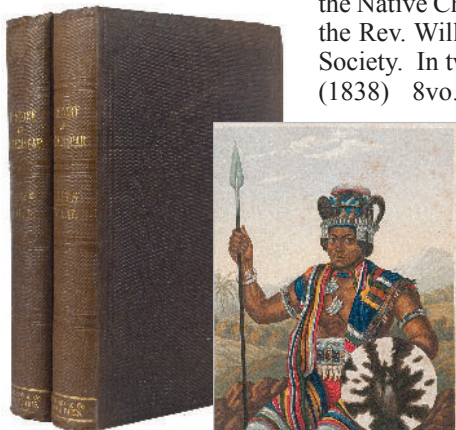

The frontispiece shows Leonard Parkinson, a Captain of the Maroons, taken from the life. Contemporary speckled calf with marbled endpapers, from the Somerville House library in their binding, with the armorial bookplate of Sir Marcus Somerville (d. 1831), the armorial bookplate of his son Lord Athlumney, William Meredyth Somerville, first Baron Athlumney (1802-1873), liberal politician, and armorial bookplate of Peter Garnett Agnew (1900-1990) Royal naval Commander and politician; stain to outer edge of frontispiece and slightly onto title, joints weak, a very nice copy. The first edition of this famous compilation was published at Edinburgh in 1799 by John Leyden (1775-1811) Scottish linguist and poet; and Hugh Murray the geographer assisted in later editions and re-issues. As a eighteenth century moral philosopher Leyden was more interested in the manners and customs of the Africans rather than the achievements of travellers, and the book reflects this ethnological interest. During the first half of the nineteenth century, this became one of the most influential books on Africa, published in French as well as English editions, the last edition being published in 1853. The Winterton copy with his bookplate, previous bookplate of the "Circulating Library, English College, Lisbon". In the original publisher's boards, the spines carefully rebacked in matching paper with the original paper labels re-affixed, maps foxed as usual, all

Frans M. Olbrechts (1899-1958), the Belgian anthropologist and art historian worked under Boas in America. He later became director of the Royal Museum of the Belgian Congo, Tervuren. He wrote his most famous work, *Plastiek van Kongo*, in 1939 although this was not published until 1946. **£650**

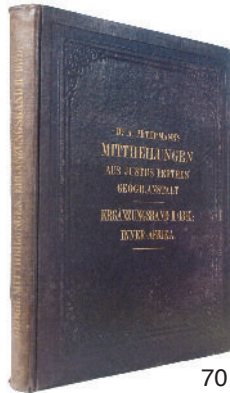


The first French edition, apparently translated by the Jesuit Jean Darde, a translation of the first (Italian) edition 'Lettere annue di Ethiopia del 1624, 1625 e 1626' published at Rome in 1628. Gasparo Paëz, a Jesuit priest not to be confused with Pedro Paëz, was born in 1593 at Covilhao, went to Ethiopia in 1624 and was martyred at Assa in 1635. Alfonso Mendes was sent to Ethiopia from Goa in 1625 as patriarch to replace Pedro Paëz who had died in 1622. Their letters give a detailed account of the country, the state of the church, and the activities of the various Jesuit missions stations in Ethiopia. Interestingly Paëz asks for type or blocks so that a press can be set up to print works legible to the Ethiopians. On his arrival in Ethiopia Alfonso Mendes was responsible for the Emperor Susenyos declaring his allegiance to the Pope; however his high-handed attitude towards the Ethiopians resulted in the expulsion of the Jesuits in 1634 and the martyrdom of several including Gasparo Paëz. The letters are signed "Gaspard Paëz" and

"Alphonse, Patriarche d'Ethiopie". Encased in a later mottled sheep with gilt spine, spine slightly rubbed, some slight marginal staining, an early ownership inscription on title, "Dono Joannis Sou[n]fflet figursta, 1631"; "Collegi Vald." 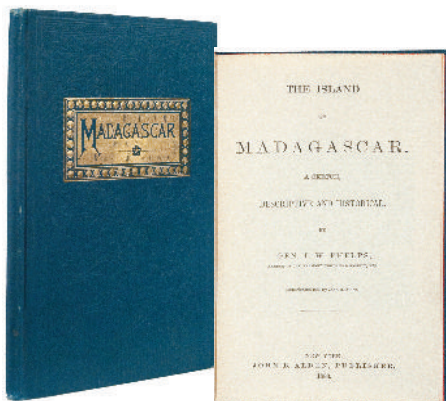

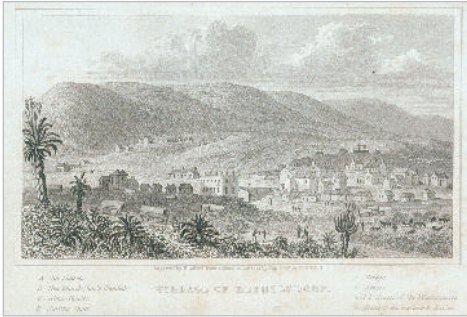

John Philip (1775 - 1851) was a Scottish missionary for the London Missionary Society. He arrived in Cape Town with the Revd John Campbell in February 1819.



‘...Philip wrote *Researches in South Africa*, in which he exposed the various abuses perpetrated in Cape Colony and expounded on the benefits of missions.’ - ODNB. ‘Few books on South African matters have been the subject of such fierce denunciation and bitter criticisms as these volumes. The author proceeded to South Africa in the service of the London Missionary Society in 1819, and soon became a most drastic censor of the methods pursued towards the natives by the colonists, and the policy of the colonial Government with regard to native affairs.’ - Mendelssohn: II, 160. 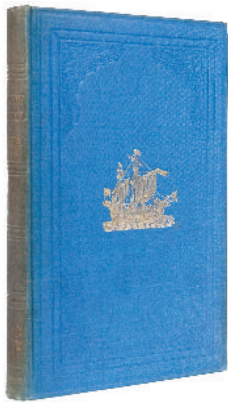

John Carter Brown (1797-1874) started his library in the mid-nineteenth century as the private collection of books written about the discovery of the New World. The John Carter Brown Library is now a library of the humanities at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. During the sixteenth century there was a great deal of intercourse between the Portuguese and the inhabitants of the Congo region, indeed at the end of the fifteenth century there was an alliance between the King of Portugal and the King of the Congo. Missionaries,

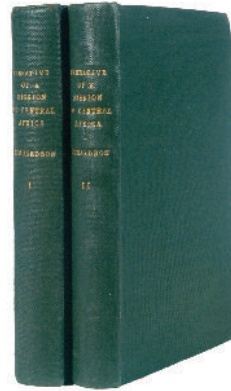
soldiers and traders went there, some Congolese went to Rome to be granted an audience with the Pope. One of these Portuguese, Duarte Lopez spent five years in the Kingdom of the Congo before returning to Europe as an ambassador of the King of the Congo. At Rome he dictated his account of explorations in the country to Filippo Pigafetta who published at Rome in 1591 ‘*Relatione del Reame di Congo et delle Circonuicine Contrade.*’ This is De Bry's Latin translation of that Italian original. **£1,500**

Major Alexandre Alberto da Rocha de Serpa Pinto (1846-1900) was a Portuguese colonial administrator and explorer of southern Africa. In 1877 the author travelled from Benguella (initially with Capello and Ivens) to the Upper Zambesi, following its course to the Victoria Falls, and then South to Natal. 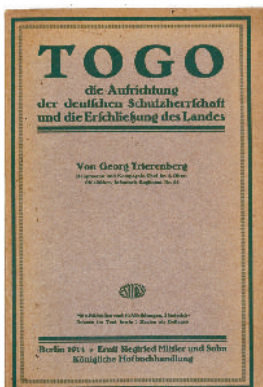
Louis Tauxier (1871-1942) was an anthropologist who joined the colonial administration in 1905 and spent his entire career in French West Africa. He was a co-founder of the Société des Africanistes. A very nice unopened copy in the publisher's wrappers. **£150**

The author was attached to the flagship of the American Squadron as chaplain on the West African coast between 1855 and 1857. This is the first edition published in New York in 1860. An abridged London edition was published in 1864 edited by the brother of the author, W. Mathew Thomas; but this first edition is a much fuller account. A nice copy of this rare work on the West African coast in the 1850s, in the publisher's gilt-decorated brown cloth, the spine slightly faded. [Cardinall: 626; unknown to Luke.] **£300**

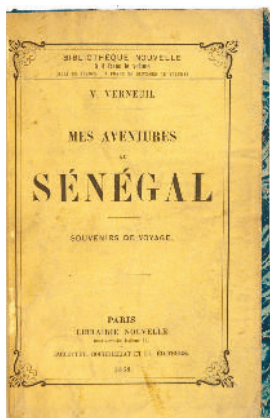

Tuckey was appointed to explore the river Congo and reached as far as the cataracts in July 1816, but unfortunately died in October. Professor Smith continued with the expedition and filled-in the rest of the narrative. Containing many first-hand and important observations on the peoples of the area and the country. In a recent half calf binding, raised bands to spine, with contrasting leather labels, a very good copy. **£1,500**

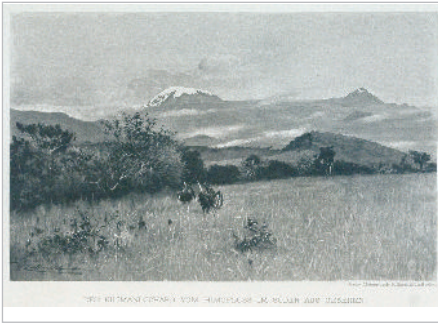

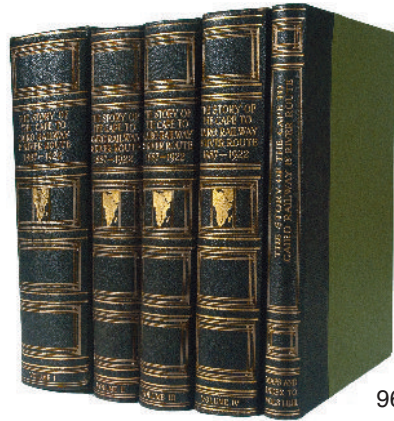

A second part was published in 1805 dealing with the ancient navigation from the Red Sea to Ceylon. From the library of Lord Brougham and Vaux, with his bookplate of a monogram surmounted by coronet; from the library of Dr. Juel-Jensen with his original invoice enclosed, a very nice copy in a contemporary quarter calf. **£450**
