PRINCE ALBERT'S ONLY LETTER TO PRINCESS BEATRICE -

HIS "DEAR BABY"

ALBERT (Prince, 1819-1861, Consort of Queen Victoria)

Autograph letter signed "ever your loving Papa" Extraordinary to his voungest daughter **BEATRICE** (Mary Victoria Feodore, 1857-1944, Princess, Daughter & Companion of Queen Victoria) when she was on holiday in Scotland, he writes "Dear Baby, What a beautiful letter you have written to me! Dear Baby was very much missed by me yesterday & is so today but I shall soon kiss her again and then she will have so much to tell & to say about her journey & all she has seen in Scotland ... the mountains & the river, & the smell of peat, & the old people in the cottages & (I hope) the good things she has been eating..." emphasizing how important it is to eat "good things" when you are in the mountains, she tells them they are all well and looking forward to being back with her, 3 sides 8vo., with original autograph envelope and four cartes de visite, the first shows the Prince with his daughter holding her hand, the next shows him with Queen Victoria and the other two are of Albert and the Princess on their own, beautifully bound in a morocco folder with gilt lettering & purple silk endpaper,9" x 6", Killarney, 27th August 1861 [36155] POA

This letter clearly shows Albert as a caring and loving parent. Albert had been suffering from chronic stomach problems since 1859 and was involved in a carriage accident in the autumn of 1860 which probably exacerbated his condition and he told his brother and Princess Victoria that he felt his time had come. In 1861, when Victoria was grief stricken by her mother, the Duchess of Kent's death, Albert took on most of the Queen's duties despite his own ill health and the last public event he presided over was on 5th June when he opened the Royal Horticultural Gardens and he did manage to visit his son the Prince of Wales on 25th November in order to discuss the Prince's indiscretions. Despite being gravely ill he intervened in the Trent affair (when Confederate envoys were forcibly removed from a British ship by Union forces in the American Civil War) in an effort to soften the British diplomatic response and avert any threat of war between the States and Britain. On 14th December he died at Windsor Castle and though the contemporary diagnosis was typhoid it seems likely in view of his problems in the two years prior to his death that he actually had a chronic condition such as Crohn's disease or cancer.

Provenance: Beatrice gave the letter to her son **Lord Carisbrooke** who gave it to Captain K. E. Schweder (Irish Guards in World War I) from whose son I acquired it.

EXTRAORDINARY PRESENTATION FRAMES FROM THE BACCHANTE VOYAGE

In 1879 the royal brothers served as Naval cadets on HMS Bacchante. They toured the British Empire, visiting the colonies in Australia and the Far East, and acquired tattoos in Japan. A delightful and unusual example of these two young Princes taken while travelling in China. Signed photos from the short life of the Duke of Clarence are rare.

From the descendants of the Hughes family. Patrick Hughes was British Consul General in Shanghai at this time. One of his duties was to entertain visiting Royalty, and this presented considerable problems as the accommodation was quite primitive. His brother Thomas was the Commissioner of Chinese Customs and also held the rank of a Chinese Mandarin. These photos came from his eldest daughter, Gladys, later Viscountess Sidmouth.

These frames would have been made as presentation gifts for the journey. Although they did not visit New Zealand there was every intention for Bacchante to visit there from Sydney, right up to 23rd July 1881. Earlier, on 6th July, the New Zealand authorities had telegraphed that, owing to smallpox in Sydney, they would require 5 days' quarantine, which would leave only one day to see the country. But on the 23rd, with everything ready, the medical authorities forbade the escorting Admiral, the Earl of Clanwilliam, (commander of the 'Flying Squadron', 1880-1882), who was ill, to sail. He was sufficiently recovered by 3rd August 1881 to signal that they would set off for Fiji and Yokohama, but 'New Zealand will not be visited'. See the Revd. J.N. Dalton's 'The Cruise of H.M.S. Bacchante', 1886, pp. 537, 585 and 607.Under the circumstances it would have been invidious to omit the New Zealand badge while retaining Australia and the other great countries as well as the smaller places like Gibraltar.

The photographer, **Raimund, Baron Stillfried von Rathenitz** (1839-1911) set up in Yokohama and became known for his portraits and studies of Japanese life. He visited Shanghai in 1876. 32179-1.jpg

The Princes were privately educated until 1877, when they were sent to join the training ship Britannia at Dartmouth, despite the fact that Prince George was only 12. In 1879 they went on a three years' cruise in H.M.S. Bacchante, which sailed round the world and visited most of the British colonies.

In 1882 they left the East and returned by Colombo to Suez, spent a month's sightseeing in Egypt, after which they crossed to Jaffa and made their way on horseback through the Holy Land. On 6 May they rejoined the Bacchante at Beirut and crossed to Athens, where for ten days the brothers were the guests of their maternal uncle, King George of the Hellenes, before returning home through the Mediterranean.

During this holiday, on 14th September, **Princess Marie and Prince Valdemar** became engaged. They were married in France on 20th and 22nd October. Princess Marie embraced Prince Valdemar's life in the Navy, and had an anchor tattooed on her arm. Her brother **Prince Henri** became a well known explorer, discovering the source of the Irrawaddy. At this time **Prince George of Greece,** seen here in uniform, was living under the care of his uncle Prince Valdemar while in the Danish Navy.

to kill us". It is most unusual to get images of the whole family as Grand Duke George was sent to a sanitorium in 1891 for his tuberculosis, and never returned.

An exceptionally rare image of the future King George V and his wife Queen Mary surrounded by the cousins from the Edinburgh/Saxe Coburg Gotha side. George V had been in love with his cousin 'Missy' (Marie of Roumania) who is sitting in front of him in a fur collar. This was Princess May's first visit abroad as Duchess of York, representing Queen Victoria at Sandra's wedding on 20th April 1896. Ernie and Ducky met the Yorks at Darmstadt station at 7 a.m, although they had been dancing till 4 am. Next day they made the 7-hour journey to Coburg together. At the wedding, the sermon was so affecting that both the bride and Baby were in tears. See Pope-Hennessy, 'Queen Mary', 1959, pp. 323-325, for Princess May's delightful account. Victoria Melita, her sister is leaning against the Grand Duke of Hesse, her husband, who she is already beginning to loathe. She was the talk of St Petersburg high society as she was in love with the Grand Duke Kyril. Sadly, Queen Victoria would not let her divorce Ernst. The moment the old Queen died divorce proceedings started and Ducky married her Romanoff against the wishes of the Tsar and her former sister in law the Empress Alexandra. She survived the Russian revolution but only just by hanging out a red flag on the palace against her own cousin Nicholas II much to the horror of many members of the international Royal families. This is one of the few photographs of **Prince Alfred** who is photographed at the front. He had already started to lead a dissipated life, contracting venereal disease which made him slightly muddled. Within three years of this photograph, following his secret marriage in 1899 and during his parent's silver wedding celebrations, the Prince shot himself in a railway carriage. CONSTANTINE PAVLOVICH (Grand Duke, 1779-1831, from 1826 Governor of Poland, elder brother of Nicholas I of Russia)

Constantine, a brave and headstrong soldier, but no tactician or strategist, was made Csarevich by his father in 1799 for his bravery at Novi Ligure, in preference to his elder brother Alexander. Alexander succeeded in 1801. Constantine renounced the succession in 1822, but when Alexander I died in 1825, there was great confusion. Nicholas proclaimed Constantine as Emperor, but was faced with the liberal Dekabrist revolt. In the event, Nicholas crushed the revolt and took over as Emperor. Constantine liked to think of himself more Polish than Russian. He reorganised the army and during the height of the Polish rebellion of 1830-31, which the army supported, referred to 'our army' and 'our successes'. He died of cholera during the revolt on 27th June 1831. Kutschera as a young man had been Adjutant to the Archduke Joseph, Palatine of Hungary, and as Councillor to the Emperor Franz II and I greatly influenced his military government policy.

Extraordinarily long and personal autograph letter signed "Lilibet" to 'Darling Diana' (her cousin Diana Bowes-Lyon, 1923-1986, daughter of the Queen Mother's brother John, 1886-1930, Member of the Princess's patrol in the Guides and later Bridesmaid), saying she was "so delighted to hear from you in Germany ... we missed saying goodbye ... but we had the chance to stay at Balmoral for a bit longer, and we took it greedily!", she supposes that going to Germany "one is grateful for any small thing, and when one thinks of how much one grumbles back here, then we all ought to be ashamed of ourselves", she thinks "you must have fun with all your Generals", according to Iris Peake who was at "Diana Legh's wedding" (on the 27th October, to Johnny Kimberly, 4th Earl, the first of his six wives), the reception at Windsor Castle "eventually became so packed that one couldn't move without some horrid old lady ... listening to what one said to every man one met! ... Johnny ... made a very good little speech in answer to Papa's toast", she has "just come back from three day's racing at Newmarket ... I stayed with Marion Hyde's mother, and so I was right in the midst of the racing world", she is "most jealous to think that you saw Hugh Easton", he couldn't "come up to Balmoral ... very disappointing ... as I should have liked to have seen whether he or I had changed after two years!", she continues "We were very lucky with our Guard this year. There were only 5 officers, and 4 were ex-P.O.W.s" including "Allan Cameron, Lochiel's middle son" with "his wife ... a native of Aberdeenshire. Another was a devastatingly attractive young giant (with fair hair and blue eyes, of course) from Skye called Roddy Macleod! He caused my Margaret's heart to flutter a bit, I think, (mine too, a bit) ... We learned a great many Scottish country dances", she talks of reel parties and "two proper ghillies' dances ... !", she comments "It's a great pity that so many people who one just got to know ... have all departed for Palestine or Germany, so one has got to begin all over again", and hopes Diana "will have a good time in Cologne", 6 sides 8vo. withautograph envelope addressed to Ensign D. In 1943, at the age of 16, Elizabeth undertook her first solo public appearance on a visit to the Grenadier Guards, of which she had been appointed Colonel-in-Chief the previous year. As she approached her 18th birthday, the law was changed so that she could act as one of five Counsellors of State in the event of her father's incapacity or absence abroad, such as his visit to Italy in July 1944. In February 1945, she joined the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service, as an honorary Second Subaltern with the service number of 230873. She trained as a driver and mechanic, and was promoted to honorary Junior Commander five months later.

During the war, plans were drawn up to quell Welsh nationalism by affiliating Elizabeth more closely with Wales. Welsh politicians proposed that Elizabeth be made Princess of Wales on her 18th birthday. The idea was supported by Home Secretary Herbert Morrison, but rejected by the King because he felt such a title belonged solely to the wife of a Prince of Wales, and the Prince of Wales had always been the heir apparent. In 1946, she was inducted into the Welsh Gorsedd of Bards at the National Eisteddfod of Wales.

At the end of the war in Europe, on Victory in Europe Day, Elizabeth and her sister mingled anonymously with the celebratory crowds in the streets of London. She later said in a rare interview, "we asked my parents if we could go out and see for ourselves. I remember we were terrified of being recognised ... I remember lines of unknown people linking arms and walking down Whitehall, all of us just swept along on a tide of happiness and relief." Two years later, the princess made her first overseas tour, when she accompanied her parents through southern Africa. During the tour, in a broadcast to the British Commonwealth on her 21st birthday, she pledged: "I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

This remarkable letter is full of the chatter of a young girl at the brink of her adult life. She had already met and fallen in love with Prince Philip but she seems still to have half an eye on the other young men!

Friedrich Franz's mother, Alexandrine, (1803-1892), was a sister of Emperor Wilhelm I, Charlotte's grandfather. In 1866 he was on the staff at the battle of Königgratz, then led a reserve Corps including his own Mecklenburgers from Leipzig to Nuremberg, which had sided with Austria. The inhabitants accorded him immense respect for the discipline of his troops and the personal attention he gave to individual grievances. He played an important part in the Franco-German war of 1870-1871, and rode into Paris side by side with Charlotte's father, the Crown Prince. He was three times married, and his youngest son married Queen Wilhelmina.

Princess Charlotte as a child was sensitive, nervous and 'difficult'. At 14 or so her disposition improved, and the present letter shows a genuine affection for her, but some time after her marriage her capacity for making mischief was given full rein, and she signed herself 'Charlotte the Brat' in her letters to England. In her early 20s she developed strong symptoms, identified very recently (and confirmed by DNA tests) as 'variegate porphyria', apparently inherited from George III through Queen Victoria and Charlotte's mother, the elder 'Vicky' (Empress Frederick), who suffered dreadfully in the last years of her life. When Charlotte's brother Wilhelm became Kaiser in 1888 she spent two years creating trouble at Court, being credited with removing her brother's close advisers (the 'camarilla') and so paving the way for the war party. From the early 1890s she was constantly under the doctors and gained little relief. Her only child Feo, (1879-1945, who married Henry XXX of Reuss), inherited the symptoms. In 1883, after spending six months in Lausanne to improve his French, Prince George was appointed midshipman to the 'Canada'. From 1883-4 he served on the North American and West Indian stations. His aunt, Princess Louise, was at Ottawa, and at her court he picked up Sir Francis de Winton, then Lord Lorne's secretary, who subsequently became comptroller and treasurer of

the Duke of York's household. He revisited the West Indies, and passed as sub-lieutenant on his nineteenth birthday, obtaining a first class in seamanship.

De Winton started his career serving in the Crimea at the siege of Sevastopol, later he was military attaché at Constantinople and rose to become a Colonel in 1887. In 1885 he was appointed administrator-general of the Congo under the rapacious Leopold II's International Association enterprise, just before it became the Congo Free State. He also served in the Boer War and ended his career a Major General. He left the army in 1890 and in 1892 he was appointed controller and treasurer of the household of the duke of Clarence, after whose death in January 1892 he continued to act in the same capacity in the household of the duke of York, later George V.

Princess Marie's husband was an Admiral in the British Navy, Commanderin-Chief, the Nore, and son of Queen Victoria's half-brother.

Princess Alice nursed her father Prince Albert in his last illness, the soldiers in Germany in the wars of 1866 and 1870, and her own husband and daughters in 1878 before succumbing to diphtheria. **Princess Charlotte** had married on 18th February Bernhard III of Saxe-Meiningen, the only one in her family to choose her own spouse, Sadly, Charlotte inherited the royal porphyria and this may have caused her later erratic behaviour. Mrs Wakelin was Nanny from about 1860 to the children of the Crown Prince (later Emperor Friedrich III) and Vicky, till 1879, when she went to look after Princess Charlotte's baby Feo. Never as close as her sisters Alexandra & Dagmar were, she increasingly became detached from her family and the fact that her son married the daughter of the last Kaiser of Germany, who both the Empress and the Queen detested, increased her isolation.
