AN UNRECORDED ART POSTER of impressive size, here attributed to the graphic designer William Henry Bradley (1868–1962), the foremost American poster designer of the Art Nouveau movement.¹ It depicts the American dancer Ruth St. Denis and apparently was created to publicise her 'American Tour of East Indian Dances' (November 1909–April 1910), or her 'Coast-to-Coast Tour' (December 1910–May 1911).²

The poster is based on a photograph published in *The American stage of to-day: biographies and photographs of one hundred leading actors and actresses, with an introduction by William Winter* (New York: P.F. Collier & Son, 1910), [no. 90] (Fig. 1). Will Bradley, formerly Art Editor at Collier's, newly established as a freelance artist ('Will Bradley Studios'), is credited in the colophon for the book's design ('Arranged and Decorated by Will Bradley').³

According to the picture caption in *The American stage of to-day* (Fig. 1), St. Denis is photographed in her 'Nautch Dance', a solo dance which she premiered in Vienna on 5 February 1908 as part of a cycle of five East Indian dances. The original photographic portrait (Fig. 2) was taken by Siri Fischer Schneivoigt, in Berlin, probably during May 1908, when St. Denis gave numerous performances of the 'Nautch' in the Komisches Oper, to rapturous audiences.⁴ Another photograph made during the same sitting is known;⁵ two

further photographic portraits of Ruth St. Denis by Siri Fischer Schneivoigt, perhaps of earlier date, also survive.⁶

In November 1909 St. Denis commenced a five-month tour of the United States, performing the 'Nautch' in New York's Hudson Theatre, Chicago's Colonial Theatre, in Boston, Washington, DC, Baltimore, and elsewhere. Our poster may have been produced to publicise these performances, or else performances given during her next tour which commenced in December 1910 and closed in California in May 1911. Both tours were organised by St. Denis's agent, Henry Harris, manager of New York's Hudson Theatre in partnership with the theatrical producer Charles Frohman. Harris and Frohman had previously collaborated in organising the London engagements of St. Denis's European tour (1906–1909). It may be no coincidence that Bradley's poster for 'The Masqueraders' (New Empire Theatre, New York, September 1894) had been commissioned by Charles Frohman.⁷ Further evidence of the artist's work for the stage has yet to come to light.⁸

Our poster was formerly in the collection of the choreographer Jack Cole, who in 1930 joined Ruth St. Denis and Ted Shawn, and spent time learning and performing the repertory of the Denishawn troupe. Cole later assembled a substantial collection of material related to Ruth St. Denis. There was no example of the poster in the collection of memorabilia gifted by Ruth St. Denis to the Museum of Modern Art in 1940 (since transferred to the New York Public Library), or among the material sold by her to the University of California, Los Angeles, in 1966–1968.
