### Rare books, manuscripts, music, ephemera

'The popularity of English divines in Germany during the seventeenth century is most extraordinary ... No less than forty-eight treatises and pamphlets, the work of eight different authors, were translated into German and many ran through five or six editions' (Waterhouse, *The Literary Relations of England and Germany in the Seventeenth Century*, p. 101).

What is most extraordinary here is that an early reader has bound translations of no less than three English works together, from a period of almost 30 years: *Meditations and Disquisitions upon the Lord's Prayer* (1636) by Sir Richard Baker (1568–1645), translated by the great German Baroque poet and playwright, Andreas Gryphius; *Now or Never. The holy, serious, diligent Believer justified, encouraged, excited and directed* (1662) by leading Puritan man of letters, Richard Baxter (1615–1691); and *The Great Concern, or, A serious Warning to a timely and thorough Preparation for Death* (1671) by Edward Pearse (1633?–1674?).

Baker: Second edition, variant title, first published in 1663. Cf. McKenzie, Catalog of British Devotional and Religious Books in German Translation from the Reformation to 1750, 144 (dated 1680); Waterhouse 232 (1663 edition). OCLC locates no copies outside Germany, and only one of the 1663 edition, at Northwestern.

Baxter: Final seventeenth-century edition, first published in 1676. McKenzie 240; Waterhouse 240 (1678 edition). Not in OCLC, and no copy of any earlier edition located outside Europe.

Pearse: First edition of this translation. McKenzie 1326. OCLC locates a sole copy, at Wolfenbüttel.



## **EARLY ENGLISH LITHOGRAPHY**

**03.** [LITHOGRAPHY.] Eleven early works of English lithography, together with two letterpress pamphlets, produced by the Establishment for Field Instruction, Royal Engineer Department. Chatham, 1823–7.

The Royal School of Military Engineering as it is now called was founded in 1812 and its first Director, the Scottish army officer Charles William Pasley (1780–1861), author of a number of the works here, played 'a seminal role' in its early development. 'Precisely when and under what circumstances the press of the Royal Engineer Establishment was set up at Chatham is not clear, but the first of its products that have been traced date from 1822 ... Whatever the circumstances, however, it is hard to imagine that Pasley took a back seat. He had already proved himself to be an innovator and energetic organizer, and some of the very first productions of the Chatham press were written by him ...


'The productions of the press that are of most interest in the present context [i.e. the history of lithography] are a series of small instructional manuals produced during the 1820s and early 1830s, several of which were written by Pasley. Thirty-nine of these early instructional manuals are listed [before 1877] ...

The word "published" has been carefully avoided in this account of the work of the press since most of the manuals it produced [including all those in the present collection] carry the following note: "Papers and Plans lithographed at the Establishment for the use of the Corps are not to be published or used as materials for publication". The use of the word published here, rather than re-published, seems to suggest that these manuals were not considered to have been published in the ordinary sense of the word' (Twyman, *Early Lithographed Books*, pp. 61–2).

Twyman lists 23 pamphlets produced by the lithographic press at Chatham in the 1820s, and the present collection, formed by a Royal Engineer at the time, contains half of them. As one might expect, they are rare.







Frederic Harrison (1821–1923) was one of the leading English proponents of the positivist ideas of Auguste Comte. 'Comte's teaching, centred as it was upon the phenomena of human life, fell in with the views of those who were dissatisfied with social conditions, and anxious to promote reforms. Harrison, like a few others, eventually accepted positivism as a religion and as a substitute for belief in the supernatural' (DNB). Harrison was a vigorous man of many interests, and his influence extended far beyond the positivist circle. The present volume contains pamphlets on many subjects, including the future of positivism, education, trade unions and the working classes, church and state, martial law in Jamaica and Kabul, Transvaal and the Boer War, Bismarck, etc. Also included are ten annual reports of the London Positivist Committee (for 1880–89), which Harrison chaired.


