The first English appearance of **Theophilus Golius' (1528-1600)** Lutheran textbook of Aristotelian moral philosophy. First published posthumously (Strasbourg, 1615) in the city where he had lectured, Golius' abridgement and translation of the ten books of the Nicomachean Ethics replaced John Case's *Speculum quaestionum moralium* as the standard degree level exposition, in both the British Isles and the American colonies, soon after the appearance of this edition. Scarce outside of the UK, with ESTC locating only six copies (Boston Public, Folger, Harvard, Huntington, Chicago and Yale).

A rare late eighteenth-century English translation of the Jesuit writer Bartholomew Baudrand's *Ame elevee a Dieu* (Lyon, 1770), with ESTC locating only four copies in the British Isles (Aberdeen, BL, Downside, Oxford) and five elsewhere (Canberra, Illinois, Newberry, UCLA and Virginia).

An interesting pairing of the first revised edition of Samuel Roger's *Italy*, with illustrations by Turner engraved by Stothard, and the first Italian edition of James Beattie's *The Minstrel; or, The Progress of Genius* (London, 1771/2). The latter, translated by Naples resident and Italian scholar **Thomas James Mathias (c.1754-1835)** is particularly uncommon, with OCLC locating only five copies worldwide: BL, NLS, BNF, Cornell and John Hopkins.






A family copy of this scarce first edition of the definitive account of Admiral Lord Nelson's final days, the events of the Battle of Trafalgar, and particularly the medical matters surrounding his death, composed by the attending surgeon William Beatty. Beatty was also later to perform the autopsy, and was responsible for the commissioning of a detailed engraving, included here opposite p.70, showing the 'the ball which mortally wounded the lamented Nelson of glorious and immortal memory. This family copy bearing the slightly later bookplate of **Nelson Matcham** (1811-1886), eighth and youngest son of the traveller George Matcham and his wife Catherine, sister of Lord Horatio Nelson, was evidently bound in this sombre yet luxury funerary style as a monument to a dead brother, uncle and war hero.

An English translation of French poet Joseph de Berchoux's (1760-1838) well received *La Gastronomie, or, l'Homme des...a table* (Paris, 1801). Such was the continental impact of this culinary work that French lexicographer Emile Littre later referenced Berchoux as responsible for coining the term gastronomie. A translation into Italian (Ravenna, 1838) followed this rare English version, of which OCLC locates copies at only two British libraries (BL, Cambridge) and eight elsewhere.

Finely printed and lavishly produced in this large format, with beautifully engraved head-pieces, vignettes and initial letters, this magnificent folio Greek Testament was reprinted with a handful of alterations from the Elzevir edition of 1624. Printed under the auspices of **Giulio Mazarini (1602-61)**, Italian born Cardinal and French Stateman, it is commonly referred to as the Mazarin Bible.

As Chairman of the Commons' Select Committee on East India Affairs since 1781, he was perhaps pre-occupied by such issues, and would later lead the proceedings of impeachment against Warren Hastings, Governor of Bengal.

A significant study of the life of **Pope Gregory X (c.1210-1276)**, native of Piacenza, eventual victor of the longest papal election in history (1268-71) whilst engaged on the Ninth Crusade at Acre and correspondent of Mongal Great Kublai Khan via Niccolo and Matteo Polo, by Piacenzan nobleman and scholar **Pietro Maria Campi (1569-1649)**. Composed as an eventually unsuccessful effort towards the canonization of Gregory X, the frontispiece of this work depicts the medieval Pope within a border which includes the arms of Rome, the city of the Curia, Leige, the city

which hosted his major Council to consider the East/West Schism, Piacenza, the city of his birth and Arezzo, that of his death.

Joseph Dacre Carlyle (1759-1804), English Orientalist. He was appointed as the Cambridge University Sir Thomas Adams's Professor of Arabic in 1796, the same year as his edition of *Specimens of Arabian Poetry* (London, 1796), translated from Arabic into English, was published. In 1799 Carlyle took up the position of Chaplain to Lord Elgin's diplomatic mission to Constantinople, allowing him to tour Asia Minor, Greece, Italy and the Holy Land. This posthumous collection of topographically inspired poetry was composed during that tour, and edited from his journals. A beautiful production, with fine aquatint illustration matching the immaculate typesetting of William Bulmer.

A rare printing of the popular eighteenth-century New History of the Trojan Wars by pioneering Paisley bookseller come printer Alexander Weir, who had gone into partnership with Glasgow printer Archibald McLean five years before the publication of this volume. Although the register is continuous The Siege of Troy, an adaptation from Elkanah Settle's opera of 1701, has a separate title page (which supplies the date of

imprint) and pagination . Unrecorded on ESTC, OCLC records a single copy of this work at Glasgow University.

A rare provincial Czech polyglot edition of J. A. Comenius' popular *Orbis Pictus*, first published Nuremberg, 1651 and commonly considered the first picture book intended for use by children. In appearance it is rather archaic, despite being newly edited by **Josef Chmela (1793-1847)** and including Polish alongside the four more traditional Comenian tongues, not least because of the reuse of the traditional woodcut illustrations.

William Crowe (bap. 1745, d.1829), Anglican clergyman and poet. The first, anonymous, appearance of Crowe's best-known poem on the picturesque Lewesdon Hill, west of Beaminster in Dorset, much admired by Coleridge, Moore, Rogers and Wordsworth.

Presentation copy, inscribed by the author of the preliminary memoir on the life of David Dalrymple, Charles Stuart of Dunearn 'Mr. H.W. Gardiner, Barnstaple with the sincere respects of C.S. Edin. June 6th 1820' to blank fly. The recipient of this volume was, according to contemporary accounts, something of an evangelical luminary in the Westcountry during the early nineteenth-century.

Sir David Dalrymple, Lord Hailes (1726-1792), Scottish jurist and historian. His historical writings, although generally traditional and with a definite bias towards his own positive view of early Christianity, were occasionally incendiary. This present work, first published 1786, was an attack on Edward Gibbon's suggestion in *Decline and Fall* (London, 1776-88) that the growth of Christianity hastened the demise of the Roman Empire.

interesting indications of early provenance. A few, mostly interspersed amongst the text, remain: 'John Hugh of (?) Mathafarn' and 'Liber Joannis Pugh', presumably son of the former, given that the Welsh surname Pugh stems from ap-Hugh.

John Davies (c.1570-1644), Anglican clergyman and Welsh scholar. Davies was a contemporary and pupil of William Morgan and Richard Parry, two of the most influential exponents of the Welsh language and respectively the translator of the Bible into Welsh and future Bishop of St. Asaph. Scholarship considers it was in fact Davies, rather than Parry, who was chiefly responsible for the revised 1620 Welsh Bible and the revised 1621 Welsh Liturgy. His Welsh linguistic scholarship extended to the translation of poetry, Anglican devotion, and perhaps most significantly, to the publication of a Welsh-Latin Grammar (1621) and this two-part Welsh-Latin Dictionary (1632).



A.L.S. and ink inscription records the presentation of this volume to G.A. Williams by A. Nicholson (whose armorial bookplate is beneath the inscription), '11th September 1828', with the letter mentioning that this copy, a duplicate from the then owner's library, 'contains 1st & 2nd Editions'. Twentieth-century bookplates and ink inscriptions of J.F. Prenter to each volume. The library of Alexander Nicholson, presumably our presenter here, was sold at auction by Evans in 1830, and included a large paper set of this present work.

Thomas Frognall Dibdin (1776-1847), bibliographer and cofounder of the Roxburghe Club. Bibliomania is his most famous work, celebrating, if occasionally with some satire, the leading book collectors of the day and their tastes. As witnessed by this present set, the second edition of 1811 was greatly extended and extensively illustrated.

A panoply of contemporary advertisements includes such delights as that for the first issue of The Boys Own Paper, Jan 1863 in Pt. 45.

All the Year Round was launched by Charles Dickens, who was also the owner and editor, in the wake of a dispute with Bradbury and Evans, publishers of his previous periodical *Household Words*. 

Established during the Russo-Turkish War of 1877-8, the Turkish Compassionate Fund was the practical result of the efforts of Sir Henry Layard, British traveller and Ambassador to Constantinople, his wife Lady Enid Layard, and the philanthropist Baroness Burdett-Coutts, to alleviate the impact of Russian military expansion on the Muslim population of Turkey. At the outset, the Fund was intended to provide for the shelter, food and clothing of women and children refugees, but the influence of several leading female art collectors on the direction eventually led to more: the organisation of the manufacture and export of Turkish embroidery to British markets, thus providing both work and income to those displaced by war. This volume, published only 6 years after the establishment of the fund, is concerned more with the practical details of refugee resettlement and



related British diplomacy, as well as listing the subscriptions of British donors. The handsome production of this volume does somewhat hint at the future direction of a charitable organisation that influenced British artistic tastes in the late Victorian era. Anthony Fothergill (bap. 1737, d.1813), English physician, elected FRS 1778, was a leading member of the Royal Humane Society which promoted life-saving of those drowning at sea. He was awarded the Society's gold medal in 1794, both sides of which are depicted on the half-title of this present volume, for an essay on resuscitation. On his death a bequest from Fothergill led to the founding of another medal given by the society, named in his honour and awarded to the 'author of the best essay on the prevention of shipwreck, the preservation of mariners, or other circumstances left to the Society's discretion'. This present work consists of a later prize essay, along similar lines, specifically aiming to preserve the lives of shipwrecked mariners. First published in 1799, both editions are scarce.





John Gould (1804-1881), ornithologist and pioneering naturalist of Australia. Printed for the author, 'for facility of correction, I have had a limited number of copies printed in an octavo form, for distribution among my scientific friends and others', with several other presentation copies recorded in the auction records. That this was presented to Nelson Matcham Esq (1811-1886), youngest son of the traveller George Matcham and nephew of Admiral Lord Horatio Nelson, some 21 years after its printing suggests Gould had long kept a personal supply for presentation purposes. Nelson Matcham's elder brother Charles Horatio Nelson Matcham had significant connections with Australia, owning a 2500 acre estate on what is now the Central Coast region of N.S.W. where his premature death was reported in 1844.






Jonas Hanway (bap. 1712, d.1786), English merchant, philanthropist and author. Hanway had been responsible in 1756 for the foundation of the Marine Society, the first public charity for seamen. The initial aims of raising numbers in the Service and improving the provision of clothing were almost immediately successful: by the end of the Seven Years War, more than 10,000 men and boys had been recruited for the service by the Society. Further involvement in Naval matters followed in the form of several pamphlets, which proved sufficient to convince Lord Bute to award Hanway a commission as a victualler in 1762. He seized upon this appointment with characteristic zeal, pioneering efforts to improve sailors' diet in the North American stations.



This present work, as eloquent and disparate as Hanway's writings on trade and other charitable endeavours, was composed in an attempt to secure the future of the large number of young seamen that the war, and his own Marine Society, had thrust into service, whilst at the same time ensuring the future naval security of Britain without resort to the unpopular practice of impressment. ESTC locates only five copies in British libraries (BL, Cambridge, Lambeth Palace, Newcastle Literary and Philosophical Society and Royal Society) and 13 elsewhere.

Thomas Holcroft (1745-1809), English author, actor and radical. After failed careers in stables and schools Holcroft found success in the theatre. He progressed from positions as prompter and bit-part actor on the provincial stage during the early 1770s, to actor, producer and playwright in London by the end of the decade. His literary output grew to include poetry and novels, among them Anna St. Ives (London, 1792), the first Jacobin novel, as well as drama. A correspondent for the Morning Herald during the French Revolution, Holcroft was inspired by Parisian radicalism, evident not only in his involvement in the printing of the first part of Paine's Rights of Man, or his close friendship with William Godwin, whose Political Justice (London, 1793) was a foundation text for English Jacobins, but also in his early 1790s literary and output. Following the suspension of habeas corpus in 1794, Holcroft was thus arrested, held in Newgate and put on trial amongst other prominent radicals. Acquittal cleared his name, but he was never again to achieve the literary success and financial security of his pre-trial years. The occasional successful play punctuated a series of failed novels during the 1800s, culminating in this collection of narrative poems, his final published work. Reviews were scathing of the work; as critical of his poetical presentation of the work as various pieces' extremely satirical nature.



Sir William Wilson Hunter (1840-1900), Scottish administrator of India and historian. Topping an open competition for entry to the Indian Civil Service in 1861, Hunter was posted to lower Bengal in the following year. In addition to executing his administrative duties he travelled widely and read voraciously to collect details of the history and customs of the locality. This extensive history of Orissa or Odisha, a state in eastern India on the Bay of Bengal which includes the famous Hindu temple of Jagannath, followed the publication of *The Annals of Rural Bengal* (London, 1868) and *A Comparative Dictionary of the Non-Aryan Languages of India and High Asia* (London, 1868).

This rare production, of which we can find no further copies on OCLC, records the before and after views of the Bridge, along with two depictions of Railway engines on the diversionary replacement bridge, and a wealth of engineering action shots of the work in progress, with Western and Indian workers collaborating.


A single issue of the long-running Swiss almanac *Historischer Kalender*, with a large woodcut plate depicting the eponymous Lake Erie steamboat disaster of August 1841, aflame and with numerous passengers drowning in the waters beneath, with explanatory text to rear. The *Erie* caught fire some four hours outside of Buffalo, en route to Chicago. This calamity, thought to be caused by the presence of turpentine above the boiler room, resulted in the death of around 150 souls. The majority of the dead were Swiss immigrants, accounting for the European appearance of this horrifying woodcut.

bookplate and frequently with the inscription, as here, mournfully recording ejection from a St. John's fellowship in 1717. Other works from Baker's library later acquired by Joseph Mendham including Frith's Boke (London, 1548), answering Thomas More.



Giuseppe Mazzini (1805-1872), Italian revolutionary. The instigator of numerous riots and failed revolutions in various Italian cities during the 1830s-50s, Mazzini briefly returned to Genoa from his exile in London in 1856. His efforts there were no more successful, though his English allies (including the radical politician Joseph Cowan) ensured that Mazzini's explanation of the events, alongside his overarching Republican plan for Italy, were published in this pamphlet. Cowan dispatched several hundred copies to national and provincial journalists and known supporters of the author's cause. The recipient of this copy, **Dr Henry Lonsdale (1816-76)**, was physician to the Cumberland Infirmary, a political radical and friend of Garibaldi, Kossuth and Mazzini.





Despite the inclusion of 'The Second Edition more correct and much enlarged' to title, this was the first collected edition of the works of the leading Cambridge Platonist, containing material and annotations not present in the earlier separate editions of his major works, and including for the first time his appreciation of Cartesianism. The apologetic theological works 'An Antidote Against Atheisme' and 'The Immortality of the Soul' reveal More, especially appearing here alongside the works 'Enthusiasmus Triumphatus' and 'Conjectura Cabbalastica', as the most mystical of the Platonists.

John Mush (1555-1612), Roman Catholic priest and author. One of the most scholarly of the secular Catholic priests on the English mission, Mush was responsible for the publication of two anti-Jesuit Catholic works in 1601. This present work was intended, as signalled by the title, to explain the position of secular priesthood to a lay, vernacular audience and thus composed in dialogue form, contrasting greatly with the academic Latin of *Declaratio motuum ac turbationum* (London, 1601).

William Watson (c.1559-1603), Roman Catholic priest and conspirator. Almost certainly born in England, little else is known of Watson's biography before he was confirmed into Catholicism (1581) and ordained Deacon and subsequently priest in northern France (1586) shortly before returning to England as part of the mission. During the 1580s-90s he was variously imprisoned or in European exile, emerging during a spell in the Clink (1601-2) as a leading figure of the so-called appellant priests, opposed to the appointment of the Jesuit-friendly George Blackwell as Archpriest of England, and as such was the obvious choice to pen a preface to this volume. He was eventually hanged for his involvement in the Bye House Plot.

His dismissal without court-martial was arranged, despite his repeated request for public hearing. By a quirk of fate, Nugent's fate immediately preceded the posting of detachments from the 1st-3rd Foot Guards to service in the War of American Independence.

The final work of Scottish Presbyterian clergyman and prolific poet John Ogilvie (1733-1813), Britannia is an epic description in 20 books of blank verse of the legendary discovery and foundation of Britain by Trojan Brutus. The myth was included in John Milton's History of Britain (London, 1670), and given that Ogilvie's extensive work is preceded by a 'Critical Dissertation on Epic Machinery' that pays homage to Paradise Lost's Satan it is perhaps unsurprising that contemporary reviews and scholarship alike has connected to the two poets. An extensive ten page subscriber's list, headed by the Prince of Wales, includes James Beattie (2 copies), Erasmus Darwin, and (later) American President John Quincy Adams alongside the recipient of this presentation copy. Scarce, with OCLC locating copies at rather fewer British libraries than one would expect for such a lavishly produced poetic quarto: Aberdeen, BL, Edinburgh, London Library, Manchester, NLS, Oxford, St. Andrews and V&A.







A remarkable survival in the original binding of the foundation text of French statistical sociology. Lambert Adolphe Jacques Quetelet (1796-1874), Belgian scientist, mathematician and sociologist. His application of statistics and probability, techniques then increasingly used in astronomy, to the measurement and understanding of social phenomena such as criminality, suicide and marriage was to have a significant effect on nascent sociological studies. Indeed, it was Quetelet's appropriation of the term 'physique sociale' from the positivist philosopher Auguste Comte to describe his statistical approach to the study of man within society that provoked Comte to coin what he considered the separate field of 'sociologie'. Sur L'Homme outlines this new approach by demonstrating its application to social issues amongst the populations of various locations, including France and the United States. Included here for the first time is the theory of 'l'homme moyen': one who acts most normally according to the mean values of a standard distribution of human attributes and behaviour. This latter feature was of great significance to future developments in medicine, criminology and the development of the theory of natural selection. Indeed Charles Darwin wrote in his 1838 notebooks of a need to understand Quetelet's statistical methodology on the distribution of marriage by age.











Apparently composed prior to his *Wealth of Nations* and *Theory of Moral Sentiments*, the history of the progress of astronomy was likely to have been included in a more monumental history of philosophy, conceived by Smith in the final decade of his life but never completed.

The Ulster Harmonist was his second collection, preceded in 1832 by The Orange Minstrel, of 78 songs representative of the Irish Protestant cause and celebrating numerous victories over Irish Catholics. In 1866 he was awarded a civil service pension, presumably more for the symbolism of such partisan efforts as 'Stanzas on the Death of Daniel O'Connell, Esq. M.P.' than his poetical ability.
