







A stern defence of parliamentary independence written by Whig jurist and political writer **Roger Acherley (bap. c.1662, d. 1740)**, and printed by Samuel Richardson. Acherley is chiefly remembered for his fervent defence of the 1688 Glorious Revolution and the subsequent political settlement, *The Britannic Constitution* (London, 1727).


A classic Enlightenment study, this wide-ranging survey of female power, custom, influences and employment is the best-known work of Edinburgh physician **William Alexander (bap. c.1742, d.c.1788)**. Contemporary reviews were generally favourable, although the female owner of this copy evidently paid little heed to the rather condescending warnings of distasteful content in the author's graphic description of the customs of ancient civilisations that were made in the *Montbly Review*.

A curious copy, evidently bound for presentation, of this separately published Phillips county atlas with maps drawn by **Henry Cooper (fl. 1800s).** Cooper's maps, newly published for the first time in 1807, more frequently appear in Capper's *Topographical Dictionary* (London, 1808). The questions abound: why is a school magazine mentioned on the presentation label? What, if anything or whom, if anyone, constituted No. 1?

Evidence of earlier ownership somewhat carelessly removed from FEP, but a small penciled note to p.27 referring to a shot crippling Victory's main sail 'Well do I remember this shot' is signed G.M.B.

A handsome copy in contemporary red morocco of this scarce first edition of the definitive account of Nelson's final days, the events of the Battle of Trafalgar, and particularly the medical matters surrounding his death, composed by the attending surgeon **William Beatty**. Beatty was also later to perform the autopsy, and was responsible for the commissioning of a detailed engraving, included here opposite p.70, showing the 'the ball which mortally wounded the lamented Nelson of glorious and immortal memory'.

The first separately printed edition, not to be confused with an extract from the Transactions of the Royal Irish Academy. Louisa Beaufort was the younger sister of Frances Ann Beaufort, the fourth wife of Richard Lovell Edgeworth, thus a step-aunt only thirteen-years senior to the recipient of this copy, **William Edgeworth (c.1794-1829)**. William's novelist sister Maria was later to follow her step-aunt's footsteps in obtaining membership of the Royal Irish Academy.

Further biographical and bibliographical notes to endpapers.

The rare first collection of Chichester psalmody and hymnody published in the early years of the tenure of **Thomas Bennett** (1784-1848), Organist. Psalms included are texts by Tate/Brady Merrick, Sternhold/Hopkins and Addison and compositions by Wainwright, Purcell, Handel and Hadyn, amongst others. Local poet William Hayley contributed several of the Hymns, and is also listed as subscriber: 'W. Hayley, Esq. Felpham, 3 copies'.

A fine reprint executed by **Francis Fry**, the leading Victorian scholar of early English Bibles, of a rare early sixteenth-century tract. Printed originally by J. Hoochstraten at Antwerp, despite the false imprint of 'Hans Luft', *A Proper Dyaloge* presses for the publication of an English Bible. Speculation has always been that the work was known to Tyndale, who devoted his life's work to the same cause, and likely composed by a friend or at least an acquaintance of his. Fry explains in his introduction the manner of the production of this reprint from the only known copy, in the library of Lord Arthur Hervey at Ickworth and bound with a translation of the Prophet Jonah by Tyndale; 'by taking a tracing on transfer paper, placing this on lithographic stones, and then printing it in the usual way: a method calculated to insure the closest correspondence with the original. To prove the correctness of the work, I have compared a proof of every page, folding it so as to place each line parallel with and close to the same line in the original'.

An apparently unrecorded miniature collection of translated excerpts of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans from Swiss Protestant theologian Jean-Frederic Ostervald's famous revised French translation of the Geneva Bible (Amsterdam, 1724). OCLC locates no other works printed by E. Williams of Ryde, presumably the coastal resort on the Isle of Wight.

A rare and curious translation of the thirteenth- and part of the fourteenth chapter of Isiah, relating to the destruction of Babylon and the fall of it's ruler Belshazzar by **Nathaniel Scarlett (1753-1802)**, London bookseller and Universalist. The translation is presented, as was his *A Translation of the New Testament from the Original Greek* (London, 1798), in dramatic verse form beneath the name of the speaker's involved; in this present case Jehovah, Isaiah, Jews, Generalissimo's Prolocutor, Sardanapalus and Laborosoarchod, and Buriers of the Slain. Rare, with OCLC and COPAC locating only two copies, at BL and Glasgow.



A handsome copy of this scholarly Oxford edition of the works of Greek bucolic poets **Bion of Smyrna** and **Moschus of Syracuse**, with notes by Christ Church scholar John Heskins and printed in parallel Greek and Latin, the latter in prose translation by van Meetkercke. Uncommon outside of Europe, with ESTC listing only six copies (Cornell, Harvard, Illinois, Otago, St. Louis and UCLA)

An unrecorded monument to Victorian civil engineering featuring bridges in Chile, India (Chuza-chazum), Fribourg, Budapest and Niagara Falls in addition to the Menai Straits and alongside successful (Brunel) and unsuccessful (Telford) designs for the Clifton suspension bridge, the engraving of the former also features on the upper wrap. Given publication in Bristol and with an advertisement for Clifton based John Beattie, the Queen's photographer, featuring on the lower wrap, this rather handsome volume was presumably produced for the opening of the Clifton suspension bridge in 1864. Neither OCLC nor COPAC locate any institutional locations.

A handsomely bound pair of English translations of the works of Portuguese poet Luis de Camoes. The first is a free translation of the Homeric epic *Os Lusiadas* by **William Julius Mickle (1734/5-88)** which remained the definitive English version throughout the later eighteenth- and early ninteenth-centuries, the second a collection of shorter pieces by English diplomat to the Portuguese court at Lisbon, and later Brazil, **Viscount Strangford (1780-1855)**.



William Cobbett (1763-1835), English farmer, journalist and radical. An unsophisticated copy of the first collected edition of perhaps the most influential works of English agricultural journalism. Composed during the early 1820s following his return from America, Cobbett rode across the farmland of (mostly Southern and Midland) England in order to understand and report on the state of the agricultural nation. His descriptions of the plight of the rural poor since widespread enclosure were originally published in his long-running Political Register between 1822 and 1826, and became part of the complex narrative in which he advocated both parliamentary and economic reform.

A short foreword to this unrecorded Sri Lankan publication informs the reader that 'no introduction [of the author] is required of one so well-known to readers of the local press', but then continues to outline a 'long colonial career...a pioneer in Australia and New Zealand and afterwards as coffee planted in Rangala, Ceylon'. Included are chapters on nineteenth-century gold exploration in colonial Ceylon, and details of the local coffee industry.



An anonymously published satirical novel of London society by **Francis Coventry (1725-53/4)**, Anglican clergyman. Dedicated to Henry Fielding, it follows the spaniel Pompey the Little, incidentally one of the earliest non-human characters in an English novel, through coffee houses and trips to Bath and Cambridge via the rather thinly veiled parlours and dining rooms of London

socialites. Something of a bestseller, *Pompey* went through eight editions before 1762, including two at Dublin. Both are now rare, with ESTC recording only four copies of this edition worldwide (Cambridge, NLI, Pennsylvania VDP and Stanford).

A once splendid example of the early nineteenth-century bookbinder's art, this binding would surely have been rather out of the place on this mere practical guide. Cowie's *Manual* is one of the earlier and more successful of its kind, and contains one of the first accounts of binding within boards, and a terminal 10pp list of binders, bookbinder's tool makers, book clasp markers, book and card edge gilders, manufacturers or dealers in milled boards and bookbinders' lodges.



A finely bound, privately printed Oxford edition of the popular semiautobiographical study of childhood by **Water Pater (1839-94)**, English essayist, critic and classical scholar.





The first English edition of **Jean Louis de Lolme's (1741-1806)** influential treatise on the English constitution. First published in French as *Constitution d'Angleterre* (Amsterdam, 1771), de Lolme completed his own translation into English, likely with the assistance of Francis Maseres. Frequently reprinted during the eighteenth-century, it secured both commercial and critical success in England, with contemporaries such as Jeremy Bentham, comparing *The Constitution* with William Blackstone's *Commentaries* - high praise indeed considering Bentham was a student of Blackstone at Oxford.



A rare examination of the economics of Scottish spirit production. Taking the form of a response to the 'a Question then in dispute...Whether the Distillery of Scotland was a National Profit or Loss' when the anonymous author was 'lately at Edinburgh', this examination of the mathematical and industrial nuts and bolts of the significant Scottish Whisky industry simultaneously serves as a wide-ranging survey of the means of production, qualities and costs of American, Caribbean and European produced alcohol. ESTC locates only two copies, at BL and Harvard.

A rare and comprehensive guide to the coasts of Britain, Ireland, Europe, Africa and Asia by Trinity House Pilot (and thus experienced in deep sea pilotage) **John Diston**. This present copy appears to have been practically used well into the nineteenth-century. Apparently first published in Liverpool, 1770, all early editions are rare, with ESTC locating only one or two copies of each. This 1790 edition, which includes the addition of tide tables apparently first added to the work in 1783, is unrecorded by ESTC but located by OCLC in a single copy at Peabody, MA.

ESTC records two printing's of this selection from Independent Minister Philip Doddridge's devotional work in York during the 1790s. Both emanated from the same press as this present copy, but were in duodecimo rather than this sextodecimo format. All are rare, but this edition, reset in a smaller pocket format, is unrecorded.



Sir William Drummond of Logiealmond (1770-1828), Scottish classical scholar, politician and diplomat. A member of the Dilettanti Society, he was a respected voice in the contemporary discourse of archaeological matters, but provoked controversy with two books espousing rather extreme views on the Christian faith. The first, *Academical Questions* (1805), attracted threats of prosecution for blasphemy in more or less suggesting that the Established church was based entirely on superstition. This second, *Oedipus Judaicus*, was thus published for private circulation only in a limited edition (200 is suggested). Unsurprisingly, given that it attempts to prove that the Old Testament (by specific reference to Genesis 49 and the Book of Joshua) has sources in astrological texts, protests continued.

A rare guide to conduct and instruction for the Italian tutor, including lengthy chapters on the court, first published 1641. This edition was reissued with slight changes, hence the replacement of leaves and the consequent disjointed pagination. The engraved title was similarly slightly altered, to include 'Con l'ampliatione del medesimo' and the date of imprint updated (though the colophon was left unaltered and thus reads 1641). 

Thomas Holcroft (1745-1809), English author, actor and radical. After failed careers in both stables and schools, Holcroft found success in the theatre. He progressed from positions as prompter and bit-part actor on the provincial stage during the early 1770s, to actor, producer and playwright in London by the end of the decade. His literary output grew to include poetry and novels, among them *Anna St. Ives* (London, 1792), the first Jacobin novel, as well as drama. Holcroft took a degree of license with this translation of Isabelle de Montolieu's bestselling first novel *Caroline de Lichtfield* (Lausanne, 1786), in so doing attracting the admiration of contemporaries such as Anna Seward and Jane Austen, who was later to see her own *Sense and Sensibility* and *Persuasion* translated by Montolieu.

The detailed accounts of this two-volume work, mostly concerned with the land-based warfare, followed the success of his 1817 work focused wholly on naval exploits of the same conflict. The detail of both was admired then, as it is now, although his generally anti-American stance did provoke criticism and the outbreak of several pamphlet skirmishes.





Shipwrecked twice in seven days whilst under Sir Edward Pellew's orders to sail (originally in the Hussar) from Ares bay, Spain, for England in February 1804, O'Brien notes his misfortune in being forced to subject himself to 'the pain and mortification of delivering myself and boat's crew prisoners of war' at Brest. The majority of the narrative concerns progress through various states of imprisonment and a lengthy escape via Germany, Austria and Trieste to eventually rejoin the Amphion in November 1808. Service in the Mediterranean fleet recommences immediately, and a concluding 'further memoir' reveals the remarkable exploits of our industrious Irishman, by 1813 promoted to the rank of Commander, in the years until his return to England, October 1813. Arthur Herbert, 1st Earl of Torrington (c.1648-1716), English Admiral, First Lord of the Admiralty and commander of the Joint Anglo-Dutch force at the Battle of Beachy Head (1690) during the Nine Years War. This present work is the first printed edition of the Earl's defence against charges that he failed to support a Dutch squadron against the French, leading to defeat in battle and the loss of 11 ships, which blames faulty intelligence, a lack of naval preparedness and an over-eager Dutch contingent. A Court-Martial acquitted Torrington, he was nevertheless relieved of his command by the King. Although immediately detrimental, the significance of the loss at Beachy Head led to heavy investment in the Royal Navy's shipbuilding enabling eventual dominance over other European powers. The large engraved plate was made for this work, and is particularly fine and detailed, with a key enabling the identification of each participant ship in the battle.

As noted in the preface, this volume was 'presented to some of the Members of the two Houses of Parliament' prior to publication, and was undoubtedly influential to fostering the environment for the introduction of the income tax by Peel's administration in 1842.

The first Tonson edition of the popular Elizabethan dramatic portrayal of the life of Lollard leader Sir John Oldcastle, executed for treason in 1417. Given that it was first printed by Valentine Simmes (London, 1600), who had also printed genuine Shakespearean Quartos, and that the character Falstaff in *Henry IV* Parts I and II was almost certainly originally named Oldcastle on first performance and occasionally in the earliest printed editions, it is not altogether surprising that the drama was falsely attributed to Shakespeare as early as 1619. An advertisement for Tonson's editions of the Plays to the verso of title rather ironically points out the flawed selection of genuine plays and alternative texts made by R. Walker in his competitor 'pirate' edition.

An entirely unrecorded journal of an unidentified society woman's family travels in Europe, North Africa and the Middle-East in the late 1830s. The initial leaf explains the author's intentions: 'I write only for my friends' in 'a legible and convenient mode of telling them what I saw...in preference to taxing their patience with reading through a bundle of blotted crossed letters which, stained and pierced in the quarantine at Malta, and partly defaced by sea water, never reached the individuals for whom they were intended'. Commencing via Ireland, where the authoress encounters 'raal paddies' for the first time, a short journey by steam-packet to Antwerp is followed by transfer through Belgium to the Rhine, thence to Bonn, Coblentz, Heidelberg and Munich, through Austria via Inspruck (sic), across the Brenner pass to Trent and Venice. The Mediterranean is punctuated by stops, often greeted by British Consuls and dignitaries, at Corfu, Patras, Delphi, Corinth and Athens, from whence what was presumably considered the most exotic leg of the journey begins: through Egypt via Alexandria, a trek to (and a scramble up) the Pyramids and along the Nile to Nubia, where minor complaints about the travails of foreign travel give way to expressions of some wonder and no little awe for the customs, costumes and cultures of Arabia - including a lengthy description of a Court Harem. Return, and quarantine, commences via Constantinople, and the return leg to London is made via the Roman treasures of the west coast of Italy (Pompeii, Herculaneum, Rome, Florence, Pisa, Genoa and Milan are mentioned, amongst others), through Switzerland, Paris and Boulogne. Neither OCLC nor COPAC locate any copies of this anonymous work.
