[British Parliament] A COLLECTION OF SEVEN ACTS OF PARLIAMENT PRODUCED BY THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT IN RESPONSE TO THE SEDITION AND UNREST IN THE COLONIES OF AMERICA. Including the Repeal of the Stamp Act, and the Declaratory Act.

London: Mark Baskett... by the Assigns of Robert Baskett 1766

All of these pieces of legislation are first edition / issue as produced by the Crown in 1766. "The...Colonies and Plantations in America have been, are, and of right ought to be, subordinate unto and dependent upon, the Imperial Crown and Parliament of Great Britain...." The Boston Tea Party of December 16, 1773 signified an escalation in the unrest which led to the American Revolution – but not the beginning. In 1765, parliament imposed duties on sugar, currency,



and finally a wide range of duties with the Stamp Act. The colonists demurred, on the grounds that they had no representation. Franklin made representations to the British parliament – which was debating whether to repeal the Stamp Act – or send troops to enforce it. They did repeal it (see Cap. XI below). But they also, in the Declaratory Act (also called the Dependency Act) of March 1766 insisted that parliament retained full power to make laws for the colonies "in all cases whatsoever". (Cap. XII below). In this period further

London: Charles Eyre & William Strahan 1783

All First Editions / First issue – as produced by the Crown in 1783. During the American war, Lord North had taken on the uncharacteristic role of conciliator. By 1778 he had repealed the worst of the Intolerable Acts and was trying to split the Patriots opposition. To no avail. The British lost the war, and were fairly soon attempting to make good their losses through trade. The Treaty of Paris of 1783 (Ratified in the British Parliament on April 9th 1784) acknowledged defeat. It is interesting, that France was the biggest loser of the final peace treaties. America gained her independence, Britain soon returned to a profitable relationship, whilst France was saddled with debts, which at least in part led to the French Revolution. These acts show part of the British response to the loss of America, and some of the attempts to give reparation to those loyal to the Crown who lost property. Each complete in itself, with an introductory leaf / caption title etc. The lead items are the two Acts repealing the prohibition of Trade with the United States of America, and act appointing a commission to look at reparations. Cincinnati Dollar Times / Know-Nothings A New Ritual for "SAM:" Written by one connected the with Cincinnati Times and dedicated to "SAM's" numerous Friends

Cincinnati: Dollar Times 1855



Small paper covered booklet, purporting to be a ritual for a secretive organisation "SAM" in fact, this was a fictional document, produced by the Dollar Times, in furtherance of their political position. In the introduction it states that other newspapers have exposed the rituals of SAM, and so they felt they would do the same. "Hoping it may at least interest you, during an idle hour, just as much as if it was the genuine one...C. W. Starbuck." However, SAM is almost certainly the "Order of the Star Spangled Banner" whose members were known as the "Know Nothings" (from their claiming to know nothing when asked about the Order). This secret society was so closely aligned with the Offices of the Dollar Times, that this could well be a publication of the genuine rituals, stated to be an invention for purposes of deniability. From the adverts to the rear, this document states that it is put out by the "American Party" and is thus

one of the very first of their publications. A touch of nicking to the edges of the covers. There is a stain to the front cover, which has bled through a little to the first few pages. Still all legible though. The booklet is fragile - but is holding together. Page 41-48 and the covers are adverts for other Dollar Times publications.

In the Stanford University archive, there is a letter which perhaps demonstrated the belief systems of the Dollar Times - "Office of the Daily and Dollar weekly times, Cincinnati, Dec., 1855. Dear Sir:--A few days ago we mailed to your address a pamphlet entitled 'A New ritual for Sam.' As it is positively certain that many postmasters are mere tools of the administration, and as such take unwarrantable liberties with mail matter ... we are in doubt as to whether the pamphlet has reached your hands. ..."--p. [3]. Signed: C.W. Starbuck & Co., proprietors Cincinnati times.

Articles on Lower Canada, Upper Canada, Lord Durham's report, articles from Boston, London etc.: The second part of the newspaper is the "Sentinel" which gives information about local issues, births, marriages etc. in Fredericton. Lots of small ads. Now landing from Halifax &c. From issues of the day, to the loss of a brown great coat, near the Barracks, and having mittens in the pockets! A lovely period piece. There is a chip to the side of the first leaf (not affecting text) and a little nicking to the edges. Slight creasing where folded. Overall a nice copy of this early newspaper. 4 pp.

A small pamphlet of 24 pages, with a folding plan to the inside rear. Text is entirely in French. The text is dealing with plans for a new tunnel in the district of Simplon in the Swiss Alps. The mountain pass at Simplon was built by Napoleon's engineers to allow

access to Italy. The Simplon pass was only finally navigable all the year round from the 1970's. Also included is a copy (published by Samat) of a letter encouraging the Chambers of Commerce etc.: to support the plans. Overall a very nice copy. The covers are slightly darkened, but overall clean. There is a small area of rubbing / closed tear to the front cover, and a small nick to the corner. Otherwise very good.

BAEDEKER, Karl Baedekers Autofuhrer Deutsches Reich Band 1. (Ohne Das Land Osterreich) Offizieller Fuhrer Des Deutschen Automobil-Clubs Leipzig: Karl Baedeker **1938**

The last German Baedeker before the war, this published in a limited edition for members of the German Automobile Club, with the (Nazi) arms of the DDAC on the title page. Has the famous Hitler quotation "Ein Volk - ein Reich - Deutschland!" dated 18th March 1938 to the front end paper. There are two stamps to the end paper and title page, from the owner, the private brewery A.

Rolinck of Burgsteinfurt. The stamps are dated 2nd June 1938. There is also the name "Geoffrey May, Burgsteinfurt April 6 1945" presumably liberated by him! Nb. Text is entirely in German. The book is in excellent condition. It is complete, with all maps and plans in good clean condition. The binding is clean, with just a little fading to the spine. Burgsteinfurt is a village in North Rhine Westphalia. It was known as the "Village of Hate" for its silent resentment of the British troops after the war. As a result, the entire village was made to watch "Bergen Belsen Atrocities - the evidence" in 1945.

London: J. Phillips 1788

New Edition (Second British Edition). Recent quarter leather with marbled boards. Gilt titles. New end papers. Half title, title, contents, biography of author, introduction and text. To the end there is a leaf of adverts on the subject of slavery from Phillips. In very nice condition. The quarter calf is clean and tidy, with just a touch of handling. The edges of the marbled boards are slightly rubbed, but overall in very good clean condition. Internally clean and tidy throughout, with just a touch of foxing to the pages.

An important early American publication against the slave trade. Benezet (1713-1784)



was born in Picardy, France. His family moved to London following the edict of Nantz, which was against Protestants in France. The family moved to Philadelphia in 1731, and shortly after he converted to Quakerism. He is described in the Library Company Afro-Americana catalogue (Item 44) as "the colonial anchor-man of the Anglo-American anti-slavery axis." Benezet worked

ceaselessly to have slavery abolished by the colonial legislatures, and corresponded with Granville Sharp, one of the most important English abolitionists.

First edition, first issue. From the library of the British Embassy at Aden, and bound in burgundy buckram with gilt titles. Complete, with all maps and photographs. The binding is spotless, in good, clean, unblemished condition. The pages are a little darkened / foxed, and a few are crinkled. There are some library marks, consistent with an embassy library. Overall a sound copy of this uncommon first edition

It is perhaps surviving that the embassy staff would go to the trouble to remove books such as this from the embassy on evacuation in 1967, in the face of a hostile revolution. CHAMBERLAIN, Basil, Hall. A Practical Introduction to the Study of Japanese Writing.

London: Sampson Low, Marston & Co. ltd 1899

New half calf (dark blue) with corresponding buckram cloth. Gilt titles to spine. New end papers. Text and Japanese characters throughout. Ex library, but the rebinding has resulted in very few library marks remaining. A lovely copy of this work. The binding is immaculate (it was finished last week!). Inside, the first 4 leaves have moderate foxing to them. The rest of the book is clean and tidy, with just a little darkening to the edges. Library marks are limited to a stamp to the verso of the title pages, then small discreet stamps to the top of page 1, and the bottom of page 480. Tape residue to the last page (list of author's other works).

Chamberlain was one of the foremost Japanologists active in the Nineteenth Century. He wrote some of the earliest translations of haiku into English. During his tenure at the Tokyo Imperial University, he sent many Japanese artifacts to the Pitt Rivers Museum at Oxford. [vi], 1-480, [vi]. pp

Original Black cloth. Text in English, with substantial notes in Arabic. Originally from the High Commissioner's Office library in Aden (Yemen) which then became the British Embassy in Aden. Liberated by a member of staff on the closure of the embassy. The black cloth is clean, but has rubbing / fading to the spine



which makes the titles hard. to read. Internally clean and tidy throughout. Library stamps to the front end paper only.

An important source of information on Arabia, and particularly the Yemen. Includes poetry, archaeology and pre-Islamic data.

FAWCKNER, JAMES. Narrative of Captain James Fawckner's Travels on the Coast of Benin, West Africa. *Edited by a friend of the Captain* London: A. Schloss: (1837) Original blue blind stamped cloth with gilt titles to the front board and spine. Owner's signature to the front end paper. Also the signature of Fawckner's niece, Ada Fawckner to the half title page, with the date Sept 9th 1853. To the rear is a pencilled family tree. The binding is a little darkened and dusty - but still very presentable. There is chipping to the head of the spine. Internally the book is clean and tidy if a little darkened throughout. Overall a very nice copy.

A scarce title, which last appeared at auction in 2004, First

edition. A rare account of a tragic trading expedition to the Benin Coast. Captain Fawckner and his crew were taken prisoner when their schooner ran aground at Mongyee. The cargo, intended for the purchase of palm-oil and ivory from the local tribes, was plundered. Includes a description of Giovanni

Battista Belzoni's grave at Gatto, Captain Fawckner having buried one of his deceased crew in a nearby plot. Not found in any of the usual bibliographies. [ref: 1581]

Recently bound in three quarters green leather with green boards. Ex library, but with only one small stamp to the title page and library number to the verso of the title, a couple of other discreet library stamps throughout. Originally published in Dutch (as Japansche Spraakleer) in the previous year, this is the first English edition.

Original plum blind embossed cloth covers - now heavily faded, with a couple of small holes to the spine edge. Inside, the text block has come away from the binding. End papers detached, so requires re-casing. The text block itself is in good, clean condition, with a couple of owner's signatures in pencil - but overall sound.

Published shortly after the gold fields were opened, Lang gives Sage advice to prospective miners about life in the fields. This is the first issue – shorter (at 94 pages) and without the appendix letter to the Industrious Classes of Scotland that the later issues had.

Original tan cloth (no dust wrapper) With folding map to pocket at rear. Complete with all illustrations. This comes from the library of the High Commissioner's Office at Aden, in the Yemen, which became the British Embassy at Aden (until 1967 when the British were forced to evacuate). The tan cloth has some markings, and a little fading to it, but overall is clean. The binding of the book is slightly shaken to the rear hinge (but still all holding firmly). The library stamps are limited to the front end paper, half title and title page. Given the recent history of Yemen, these are perhaps a nice provenance rather than a blemish. Otherwise clean and tidy. The map is in beautiful condition

(but the pocket to the rear inside board has a closed tear). Overall a sound copy. It is perhaps surviving that the embassy staff would go to the trouble to remove books such as this from the embassy on evacuation in 1967, in the face of a hostile revolution. The last British High Commissioner had to

be lifted out by helicopter under armed guard to a naval carrier standing well offshore, He left behind the first avowedly Marxist state to take the place of Empire, the (People's Democratic Republic of South Yemen). These were the days when books were seen as important!

Edinburgh: W. P. Kennedy 1852 A first edition of this small anonymous collection of poems. Original white covered boards. Spelling is "Willie" to the covers, "Willy" to the title page. Would seem to have sold as a charity book for the Irish famine victims, as a verse on the rear cover states "Madam! Sir! I pray you buy / for the sake of charity! / the children starve in Erin's isle" etc.: Steel engravings throughout the book. There is a bookplate for Cambridge University to the verso of the title page. The spine is lost, so the front and rear board are a little fragile. inked shelf mark to the spine. The boards are a little rubbed, but clean. Internally clean and tidy throughout, with a little darkening and foxing only.



This book was produced towards the end of the Irish potato famine, by which time around a million had died. A folder containing 18 Lithographs by Rene-Jean Clot. These are loosely gathered with a title page, and tissue guard between each. the folder is 20 inches by 13 inches, the lithographs themselves are of varying size and are printed on cream paper, with some mounted on paper backing. Limited to only 200 copies, this is copy #15. Although similar in name, this is a much scarcer item than the "XXVIII Lithographies" which appeared in the 1950's. Many of the scenes pictured are concerned with troop movements and the war. The folder is in good, sound condition, with a few markings to the front cover. The lithographs are all clean and tidy without flaws. A couple of the backing papers & tissue guards have small tears and creases to them. The title page is tidy, but has a closed tear to it. Overall a good example.

Jean Rene Clot (1919-1936) was a French Algerian artist and novelist, who won the prix des Deux Magots in 1951 for Le Poil de la bête and the Renaudot prize in 1987 for L'Enfant halluciné. [ref: 1616] £250

Two volumes. Both first edition thus (illustrated editions). Tom Brown's Schooldays was published in 1869. Tom Brown at Oxford in 1870. Both full dark brown leather, with gilt decoration to the boards, and extensive gilt decoration to the spine. The two have been recently re-cased, with minor repairs to the binding and hinges. Consequently, they are now tight and tidy copies. A touch of marking and rubbing to the spine of the boards only. Curiously, both volumes have double marbled end papers. All edges gilt. Internally both volumes are clean and tidy, with a little darkening to the pages. Overall, attractive copies.

and German, and then has the prints. Stated limited edition (although no indication of limitation). Cloth spine with paper covered boards. Owner's label for Charles T. Craig to the inside board. The boards are a little darkened and rubbed – somewhat darkened to the spine with the label being a little rubbed and darkened. Inside, the book is partially disbound (although collated and complete). There is moderate darkening to the page edges, and a little nicking to some of the page edges.

Whilst the first volume dealt with realistic bird portraiture, this second volume is organised into chapters, with text by the author and her father-in-

law. In addition to many beautiful full size portraits, this work includes larger birds and game birds (With head illustrations and close ups at life size. There are also illustrations of birds habitats, environment, flowers, butterflies etc. There are also many insights into the

author's working life - with field sketches and colour notes. As Richard Laws comments, "She truly can be compared with the great bird artists of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries." This is a brand new copy, held in protective packaging and a box. Opened only to check the limitation number and to take photographs. No flaws to book or slipcase. 144pp.

little gaudy - and is probably later colouring. The map and mounting board are both a touch darkened, but overall in sound condition. There is a very light centre fold to the map. Richard Blome (1635-1705) was a cartographer and publisher. Often accused of plagarism, this work appeared in his "Brittannia" in 1673. Van Den Keere, Pieter.

Map of Suffolk From the Miniature County Atlas of the British Isles *Amsterdam: Blaeu* **1617** Van den Keere's Atlas was first published by the Dutch publishing house of Blaeu, in Latin around the year 1617. This is one of the earlier editions of this map, with the County names in the original Latin. They were later changed to English titles to accompany George Humble's work (Humble was Speed's



publisher). Framed and glazed with text (for Darbyshire) to the verso. This is visible through a glass panel. Map itself is 4" $x5^{1/2}$ " frame is $6^{1/2}$ " x $7^{1/2}$ " A touch of darkening to the map, but still perfectly legible / visible. More recent mounting & frame. Overall a nice copy.

Van den Keere was a refugee who came to England, with his sister, to escape religious persecution in the Low Countries between 1570-1590. After their arrival Van den Keere's sister married the map maker Jodocus Hondius, a fellow refugee, and it is likely that it was from his brother in law that Van den Keere then learnt cartography and engraving. He returned to Amsterdam around 1596 and began engraving this work.
