First published in 1766 and very enthusiastically received by Gray and Walpole, the work created a sensation and passed through dozens of editions in the ensuing hundred years.

William Fowler, 1761-1832, a builder by trade, from Winterton, Lincolnshire, developed an interest in the mosaic or tessellated pavements unearthed in the area at the end of the 18th century and became a meticulous recorder of these monuments, both locally, at such sites as Horkstow, Roxby and Scampton, as well as further afield at Littlecote, Wiltshire, and Stonesfield, Oxfordshire, producing a large number of plates of medieval stained glass and related church architecture in addition; a staggering achievement. The plates, engraved almost entirely by Fowler himself. and hand-coloured by the family, were published, initially, by subscription on an individual basis, then as bound-up 'sets' of those issued to date with 'no more than 30 or 40 copies...completed' (Lowndes). The two appendix volumes are excessively rare, even more so than the main work, and Henry Ball's memoir of Fowler, (1888, and a rare book in itself), refers to the second as 'quite unknown.'



Milford, owned by Sir William Hamilton, had been developing as a port since the Milford Haven Harbour Act of 1790 under the direction of Hamilton's nephew Charles Greville. A shipyard was leased to the navy in 1796 and after Nelson's visit in 1802 the Navy Board began to extend the dockyard buildings. However it was unable to buy the shipyard outright as the Grevilles priced themselves out of the market and the development moved to Pembroke Dock in 1812-14.

This book seems to have been produced, by the unknown author using the nom-de-plume 'Pembrocensis', with a view to describing and promoting Milford's aspirations as a port but virtually all of the plans fell by the wayside for a variety of reasons and large-scale docks would not be constructed until the 1870s.
