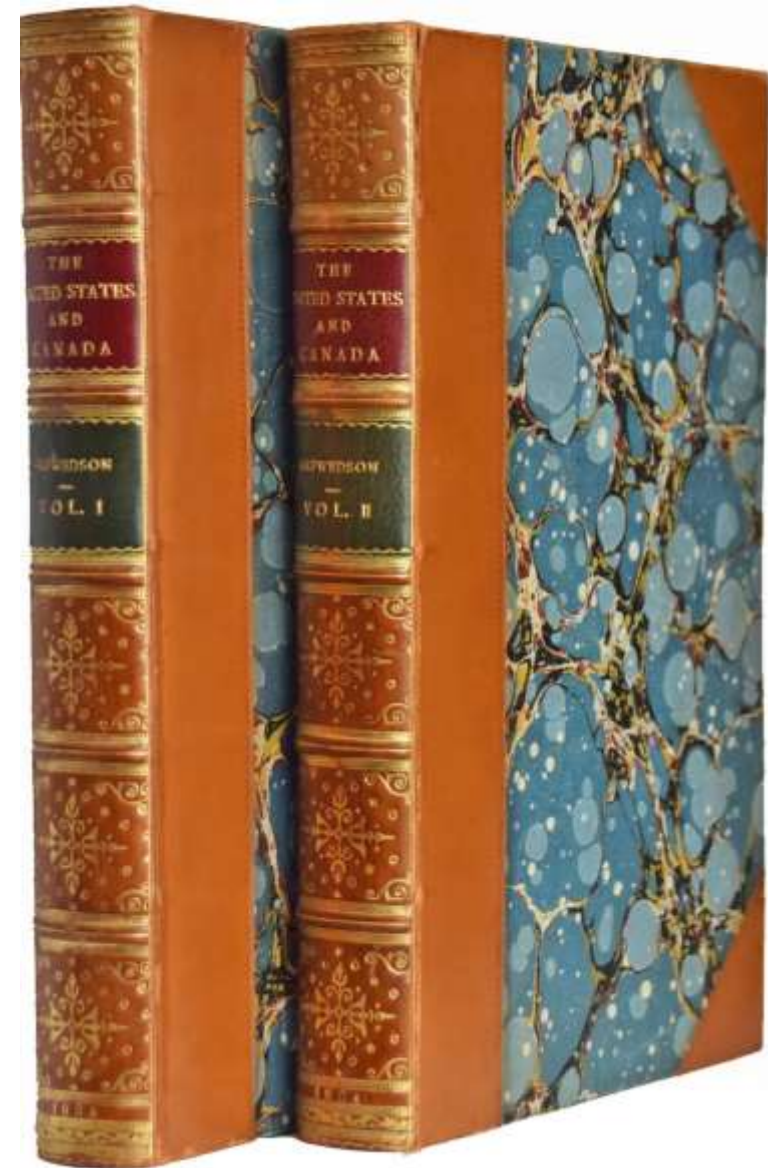

Dionne II 1093, Swedish Arfwedson visited the United States (including New York, Massachusetts, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Georgia. Ohm. Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Washington) before travelling into Canada (through Niagara Falls, Toronto, Quebec and Montreal). Among the more well-known features of his narrative is a description of the Shaker community at Lebanon Springs. Like his contemporary, Alexis de Tocqueville, Arfwedson describes the American penal system, as well as provides a broader discussion of social and economic questions, including slavery.

A contemporary review praised the work: "We are pleased with this work, it shall be our guide if ever we visit the United State. It steers clear of the aristocracy of Captain Hall, the flippancies and sneers of Mrs. Trollope, and the narrow-mindedness of a host of other travellers; whilst it freely yet liberally speaks of all that accomplished author observed. One is pleased to find a man entering upon the important business, which he has executed so well, that of fairly and manfully characterizing a great nation, in all its bearing and institutions, with a generous, we would say, a capacious spirit; at the very outset deeply impressed with the value and magnitude of the subject, and determined to persevere, throughout the course of a careful scrutiny, to accord room for the exercise of certain peculiarities which its posture and history have induced" (Monthly Review, ... 1835. Volume 1, No. 1., pp13-27).



Swedish Arfwedson took a wearisome trip from Newark to Prescott, dropped in to Montreal, and pronounced Canadians in a feverish state, with restless demagogues and English governors daily losing their popularity. "Principles of freedom from the neighbouring state penetrate perceptibly among the rising generations, and the fore of example will sooner or later induce the Canadians to hoist the standard of Rebellion".

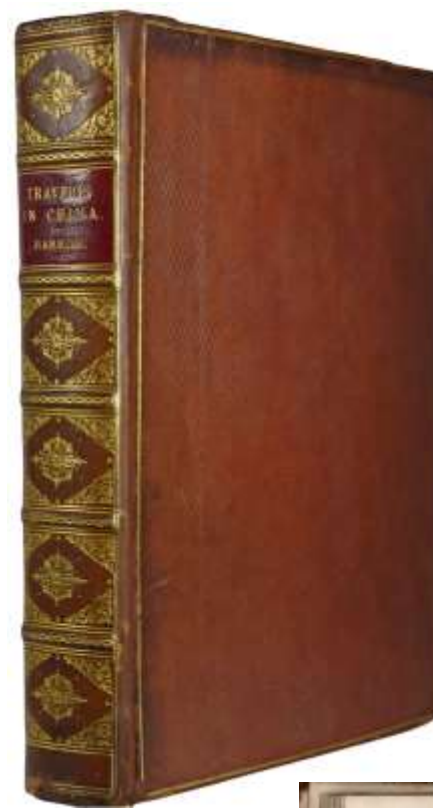

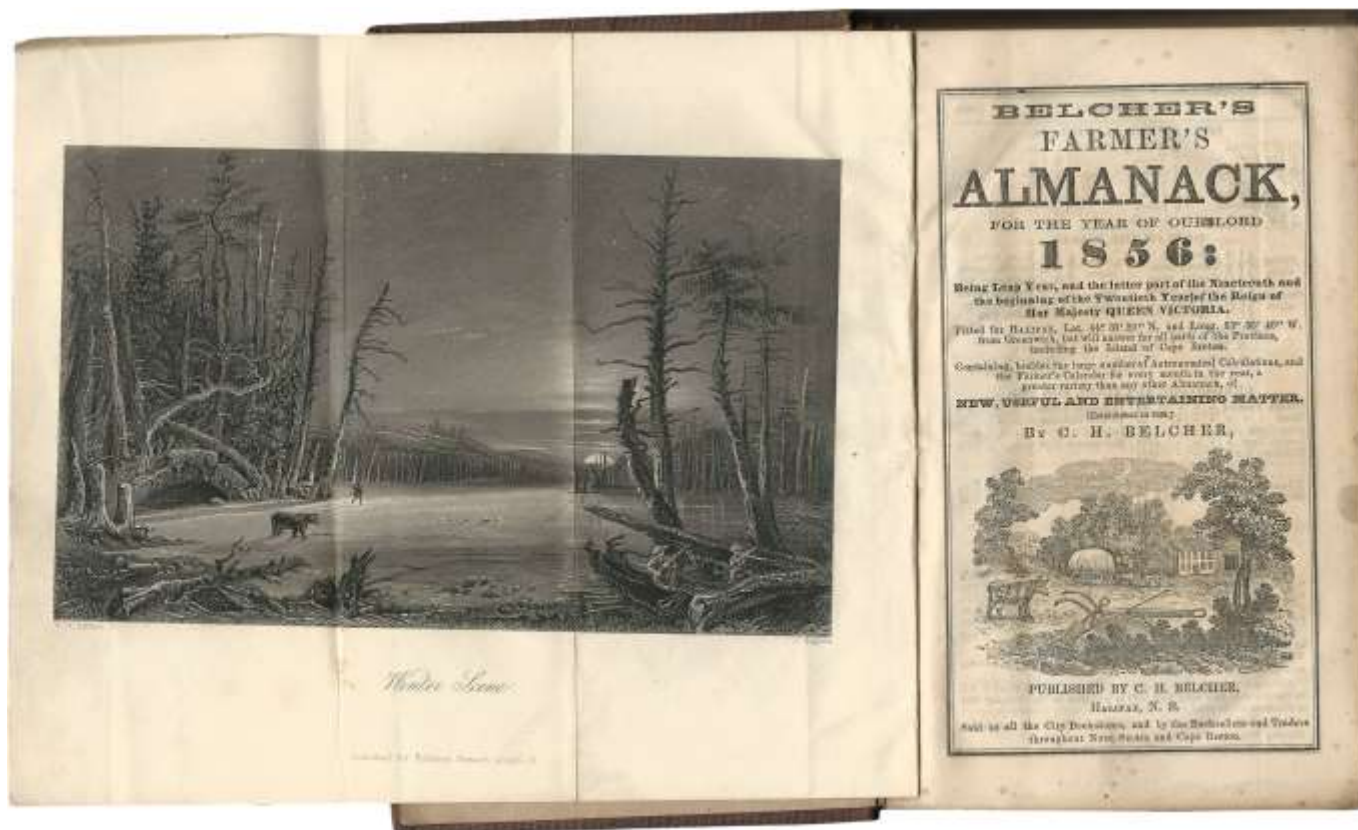

Barrow accompanied Macartney's mission to the court of China in 1792 as his private secretary. The present account of the country is one of the best illustrated English travels on China. The eight plates are from drawings by William Alexander who accompanied the embassy and later published his own work. The strict exclusion of Europeans by the Chinese Emperors had left China very much terra incognita to the western world well into the nineteenth century. Barrow was an excellent observer, and the text contains a number of descriptions of Chinese artefacts and novelties. Among these is a plate of musical instruments, extensive renditions of Chinese melodies into western notation, and a long description, with illustration of the abacus. (Hill).

The Canadian Government authorized the formation of high school cadet corps in 1879, for boys over 14 years of age, to teach military skills and drill. The military influence was strong and many boys passing through the cadet system in the early 1900's are noted as enlisting in World War One.

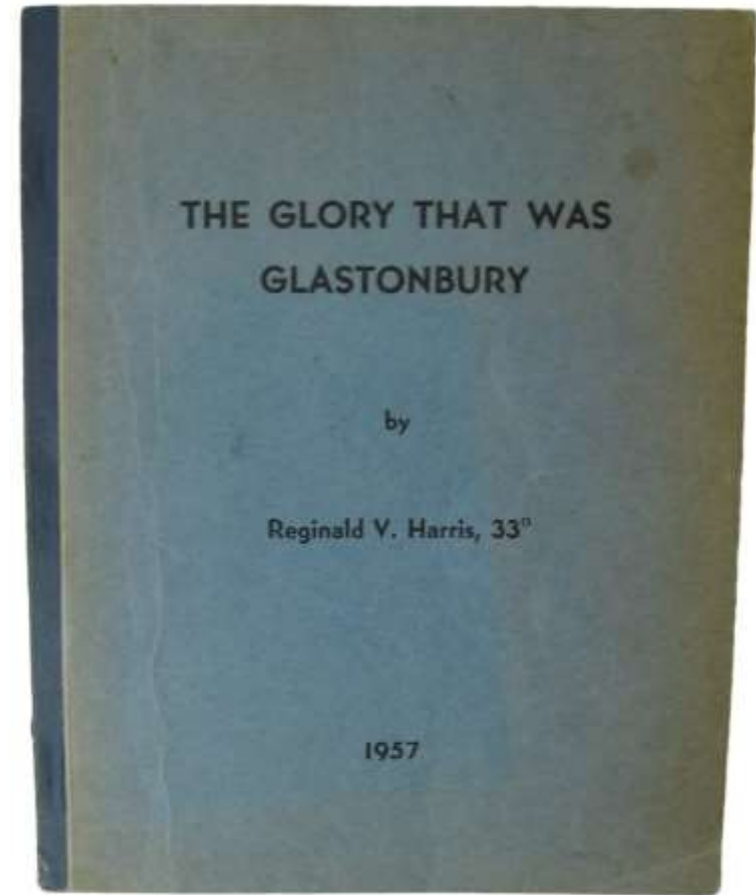

An abridgement of Hugo Grotius' "De juri belli et pacis" (The Rights of War and Peace), originally published in Paris in 1625. A classic, early study of the fundamentals of jurisprudence by the eminent Dutch jurist; the first attempt to portray the principle of rights as a basis for society and government outside of the church and Bible. This edition was published in the Holy Roman Empire and dedicated to the noble Magyar family of Esterhazy of Hungary. With a brilliant engraved frontis of "Blind Justice". A very scarce copy of a critical legal publication.

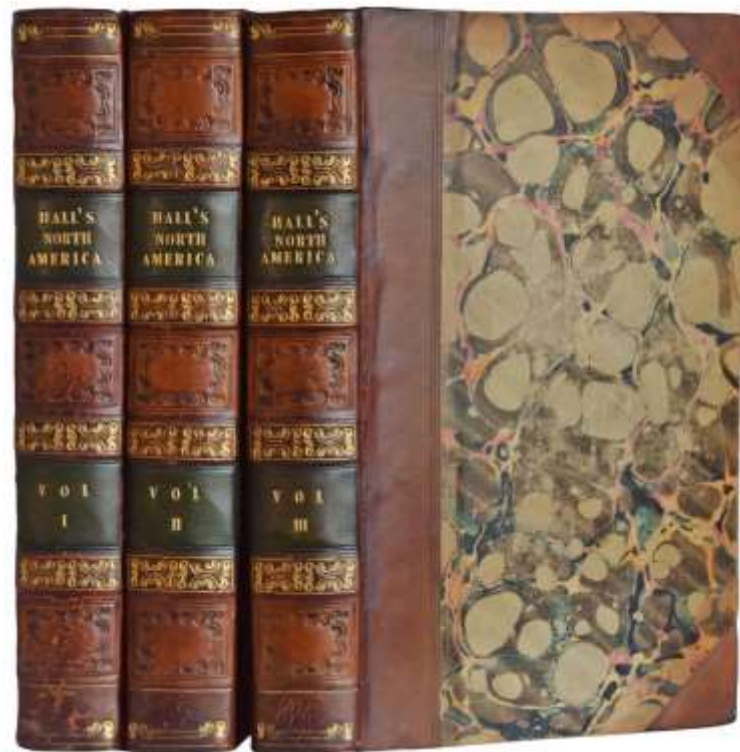

"Well-born, connected with Lord Selkirk, naval officer Hall travelled with his wife and baby. He intended to survey the arguments for Canada vs. the States as a home for British emigrants. The Canadian portion of this excellent book comprises tours from Niagara to the Welland and Rideau Canals, a foray up from York to Lake Simcoe, and one down Lake Ontario to Cobourg and Kingston. In Montreal he met Captain Franklin. At Lake Simcoe, he saw distributions of presents to the Indians. Basil Hall emphasizes waterways: he describes the Grand River "black and sluggish", Lake Erie "like a pond", and the "deep sea-blue surface" of Lake Ontario. His sketches were made by using the camera lucida, which accurately documents visual details. (Waterston).

While visiting the United States "His frank criticism of American customs excited the utmost indignation in the United States". (DNB). He took a keen interest in Upper Canada but was less enthusiastic about Lower Canada and Montreal; although he apparently enjoyed Quebec. He travelled throughout much of the Northeast, including the Great Lakes region, then south via the Mississippi through Louisiana. "... His work contains many excellent descriptions of places and conditions that came under his observation". (Clark). Includes Cree Indian ceremonies, and navigating the Mississippi.



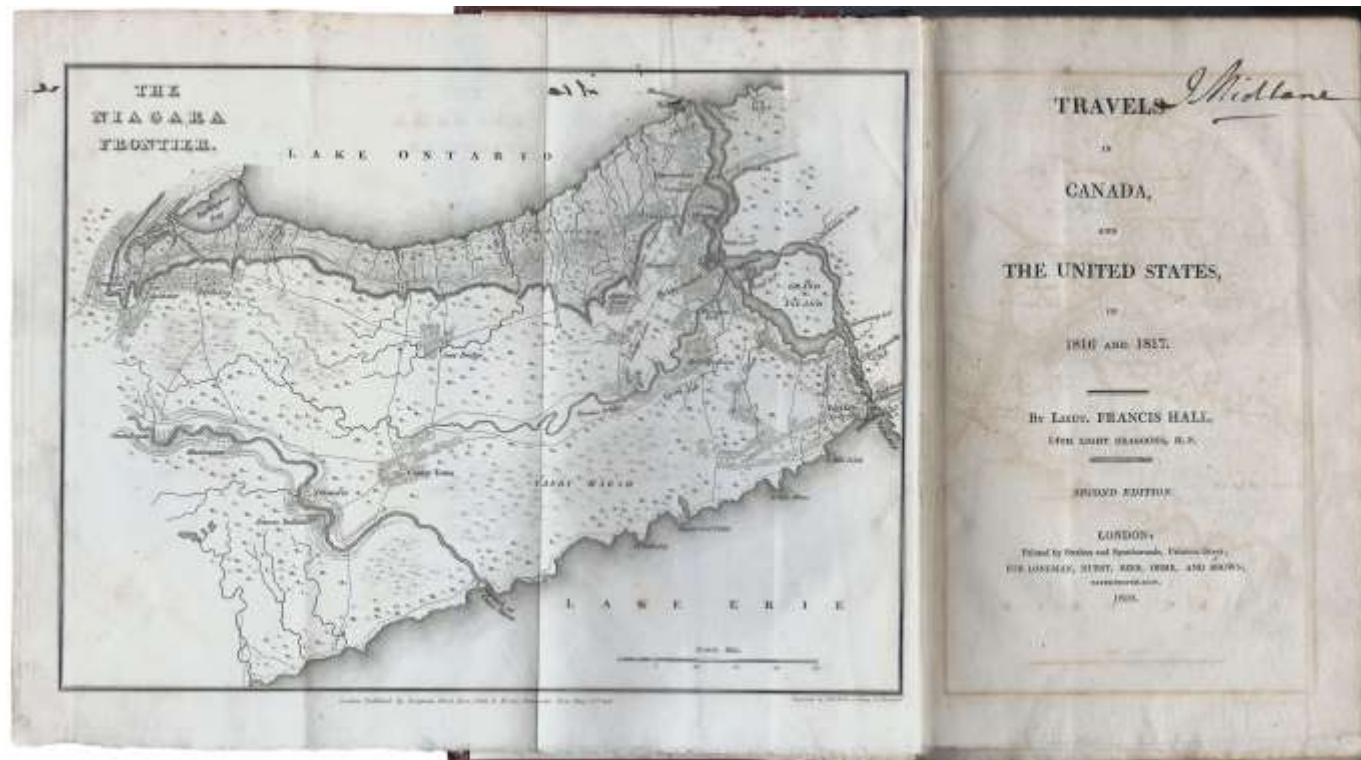

Appendix includes an essay on slavery pp321-337. "Of all travellers between 1800 and 1820, Lieutenant Francis Hall (14th Light Dragoons, H.P) best exploited interest in French presence in Canada. Memorable anecdotes about the urbane cure of Les Eboulements; a country home at Le Petite Riviere, where the skin of a sea wolf hangs against white-washed wall; pictures of distorted Virgins and ghastly saints decorating each inn room; a friendly meal of omelet with ample sugar; a mass of milk porridge; at Beloeil, a new breed of cure, cold, lanky, unfriendly. Hall visited libraries in Quebec seminaries and officers' quarters, not ironically the small fleet at Kingston, and compared American/Canadian towns such as Lewiston/Queenston. This is the liveliest account of travel in the wake of the War of 1812-14. Hall combines military acumen, skill in anecdote, and power of scenic description". Waterston.

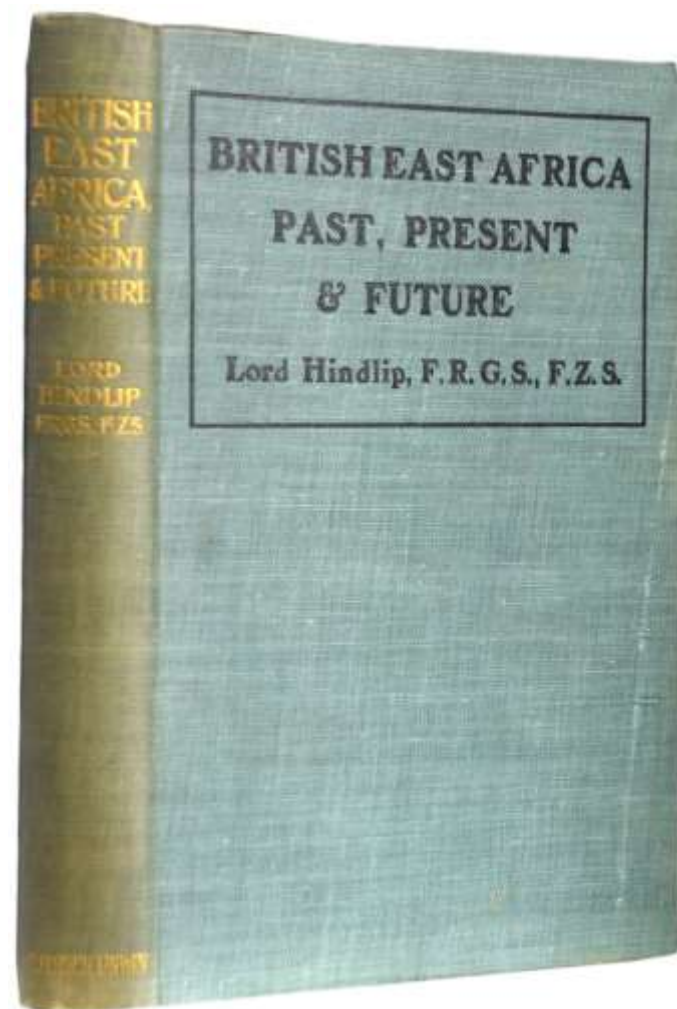

A controversial book written after Sir Charles Eliot's resignation as British High Commissioner of German East Africa due to the Foreign Office refusing to give approval to the granting of Masai land to the East African Syndicate. Lord Hindlip (Charles Allsopp) was an African traveler and hunter and author of *Sport and Travel. Abyssinia and British East Africa* (1906). His solution to the "Masai Question" was "... they must be put on a reserve..." and refers to Canadian precedents - "if the Redskin will take honest labour the Masai will." The author also has chapters on the Uganda Railway, the colonial administration, native labour, homesteading, suggestions for settlers, and game preservation. An insight into a contemporary view of European immigration and colonialism in what is now Kenya.



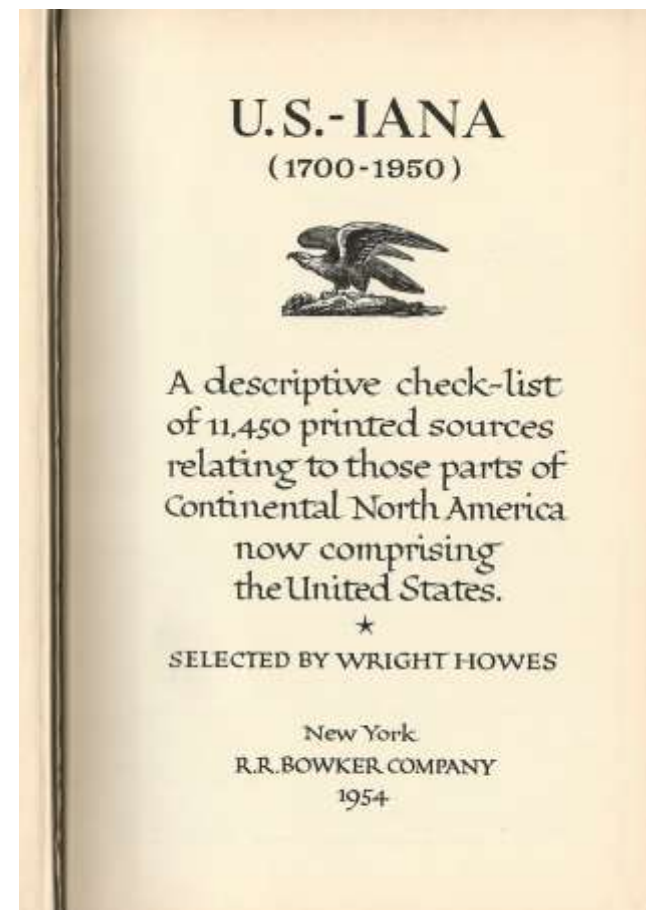

The issue stemmed from Captain Robertson being publicly insulted by a Colonel Dickson in the Army and Navy Club, London, in 1860 - "accusing him of blackguard and cowardly conduct, and by shaking his fist before him, and threatening to horsewhip him". Subsequently, Captain Robertson was charged "For conduct unbecoming the character of an officer and a gentleman, and to the prejudice of good order and military discipline": for not reporting the incident to his commanding officer, for having failed to obtain an apology, and for neglecting to vindicate his character. The report gives a fascinating insight into Victorian military justice. The frontis consists of illustrations of Captain Robertson and Colonel Bentick both of the 4th Royal Irish Dragoon Guards.



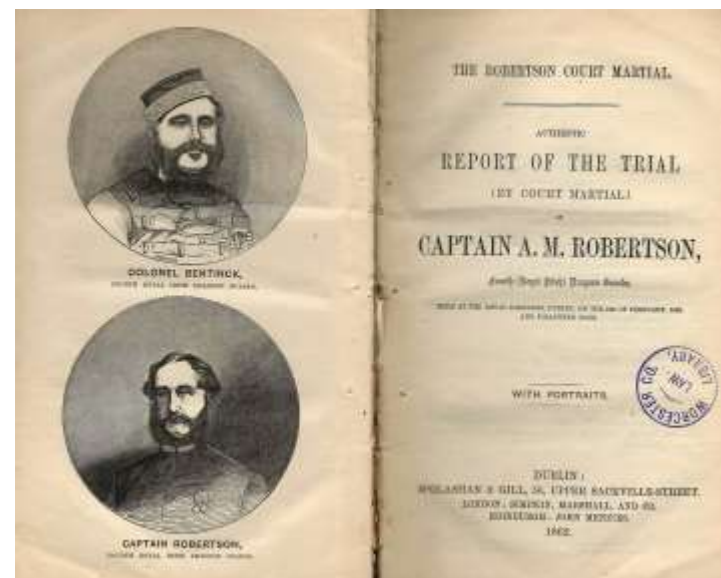

A rare account of this Canadian and Pacific adventure. The author, a native of Coventry, Vermont, went to Lower Canada in 1838, to take part in the rebellion. He was captured, tried and transported to Hobart in Van Dieman's Land in 1840. In January, 1845, after greathardships, he was pardoned and made his way to Honolulu in an American whale ship. The further adventures included those aboard the whale ship from Tasmania, with visits to the Society Islands, Hawaii and Monterey. It includes also several pages concerning California describing a meeting with Captain Sutter, ranches visited, and the agriculture promise of Upper California which he states is "destined to be a great commercial country".

"First edition of an early California item and a rare Australian captivity narrative. The original is not only a famous rarity, but an important early historical narrative as well. Captain Heustis contracted to take charge of the Grimes Rancho about 300 miles north of Monterey between the Sacramento and American Rivers. He reached Monterey on May 25, 1845 and reported to Consul Larkin. He spent months traveling up and down California, including a visit with Sutter at Nueva Helvetia (which is described at length) and a stay at Yerba Buena. The description of Upper California is of the highest interest, being one of the few we have at this period, immediately prior to the Conquest" – Ebersdadt.

His property will be protected until after the war.. we are doing that for any man who is serving in this war in the Allied forces... I trust your son will get through safely after having done his duty to his country." The third letter is from Charles Slatford to his father and is signed. The 37th Battalion, C.E.F., was recruited in Halton, Ontario and sailed overseas in November, 1915.

Abenaki linguist and missionary to Penobscot and Passamaquoddy Indians. VETROMILE, was born, in Gallipoli, Italy in 1819; and died there in 1880. In 1840 he came to the US and entered Georgetown college in Washington D.C. It was while at Georgetown that he gained his first knowledge of the Abnaki language. After his ordination he was assigned to missionary duty at Port Tobacco, Maryland. After a short time as a teacher he was given charge of the mission at Old Town, Maine. He spent more than twenty five years as a missionary among the Penobscot Indians returning to Italy in broken health and dying shortly after his arrival. During his time in Maine he wrote 28 works, mostly on the Abanaki and Acadia. Among them being ; Indian good book for the benefit of the Penobscot, Passamaquoddy, St. John's, Micmac, and other tribes of the Abenaki Indians.

The Penobscot Indians, the tribe of the famous Abenaki confederacy of Maine, and the only one still keeping its name, territory, and tribal identity. The Abnaki confederacy, to which the Penobscot belonged, consisted of a number of small tribes of Algonquian linguistic stock, holding the greater part of the present state of Maine, and closely connected linguistically and politically with the Pennacook of the Merrimac region on the south and with Maliseet or Etchimin of the St. John river on the north, and more remotely with the Micmac of eastern New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. ...
