Mary Bryan was born in 1780 at North Petherton, near Taunton, Somerset, the daughter of Edmund Langdon and Mary (Ballam). In 1815 she published Sonnets and Metrical Tales in which her she and her sisters appear; Anna is described as 'prudent, quiet' and 'discreet, nice and fair'; Mary, on the other hand, 'stands / Impatient in her wand'ring eye' who 'well could spare;- / At least of follies, half her store'. Julia, however, had died, after twenty 'summers', a fact confirmed by parish burial records which give 17 February,1804, at Durston, near Taunton, Somerset.

Inspired by Lyrical Ballads, Mary Bryan's work shows that by 1815 Wordsworth could influence not only the London literary scene but also less privileged contemporaries. She is recorded as printing some poems by Joseph Cottle, and it is possible that through him she presented her appeal to Wordsworth (her books appear in the library at Rydal Mount). She also records in her letters that "I have received from Mr Wordsworth and others very soothing testimonies of the quality of some of my compositions: but it is well known that Mr W is not popular enough to give public weight to his opinion."

She married Edward Bryan 30 May 1804 at St. Cuthbert's, Wells, Somerset. In or about 1809, he set up as a printer and stationer, in the High Street, Bristol. From 1812 to 1814, the firm operated from the City Printing office, 52 Corn Street and 19 Clarence Place. He probably died in 1814. (There is no burial record in Bristol.) The firm became known as Mary Bryan & Co. from 1815 to 1823.

At a time when many early geologists were abandoning Genesis in favour of the oldearth interpretations of Hutton, Werner, Buckland, Cuvier and others, Granville Penn made a stand in defence of the Scriptures in his book *A Comparative Estimate of the Mineral and Mosaical Geologies* (1822). He insisted that earth history began with six literal days of creation by God, during which the 'primitive' (granitic) rocks were created with an appearance of age (on Day 1) and a major geological upheaval occurred which built and shaped the first land (on Day 3). The global year-long Flood was then responsible for devastating the earth, building most of the layers of fossil-bearing rocks, and eroding today's valleys when retreating. This contemporary response to his theories is generally favourable, but not in total agreement.

In or about 1719 Henry Raine (16791738), a London brewer, founded free schools in Fawdon Fields for 50 boys and 50 girls of the parish of St. George, Wapping. The boys were to enter at the age of nine, and after four years at school were to be eligible for apprenticeship grants of  $\pounds 3$  each. The girls were to enter at eight and after two years 10 were to be selected annually for transfer to a boardingschool; here they were to receive domestic training, by their own knitting and sewing earning the salaries of their mistress and cook, and after four years they were to be put out as apprentices or servants.

A scarce work, first published in 1794, but ESTC recording just single copies of the  $5^{th}$  &  $6^{th}$  editions of Part I, (1799-1800) and a single copy of the  $4^{th}$  (1798) edition of Part II. Copac records just one copy of either part (both in Manchester).

In 1793 Mrs Trimmer sent twelve copies of her treatise 'Reflections upon the Education in Charity Schools with the Outlines of a Plan Appropriate Instruction for the Children of the Poor' to the subcommittee that chose the books funded by the organization. In the treatise, she argued that the current charity school curriculum was outdated (it was over 100 years old) and needed to be replaced. She suggested a list of seven books that she herself would write:

- \* A Spelling Book in two Parts
- \* Scripture Lessons from the Old Testament
- \* Scripture Lessons from the New Testament
- \* Moral Instructions from the Scriptures
- \* Lessons on the Liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer
- \* Exemplary Tales
- \* The Teacher's Assistant

The committee largely accepted her proposal, and The Charity School Spelling Book was printed first and was the most widely-used. It was one of the first children's books for the poor that was small but still had large type and large margins (features often considered appropriate only for books for more privileged readers). The stories themselves were also innovative: they emphasized the ordinary lives of ordinary children—"these children climbed trees, played with fire, threw cricket bats at sheep and begged in the streets". The book was adopted by Andrew Bell around 1800 for his Madras system of education and by various educational societies throughout Britain and its colonies; it was even used to educate adult slaves in Antigua and Jamaica.







Mary King did not attend school or university but was educated at home in Co. Offaly by a governess. William, the 3rd Earl of Rosse, was Mary's cousin and she was a frequent visitor to Birr Castle where she observed and chronicled the building of the giant telescope in the castle grounds. Through her famous cousin she met many of the most eminent men of science of the day. Mary became well known as an artist, naturalist, astronomer and microscopist yet she never received any formal marks of distinction. She was the first woman to write and have published a book on the microscope, although she did not use her full name but was referred to as The Hon. Mrs W. It was produced privately in an

edition of just 250 copies by Shields of Parsonstown in 1857, and was entitled Sketches with the Microscope.

It was re-published in 1858 by Groomsbridge of London as The World of Wonders Revealed by the Microscope. On 31 August 1869, when she was 42, Mary, Henry and two of Lord Rosse's sons were travelling on a steam carriage invented by their father when it jolted and threw Mary to the ground where she was crushed by one of its heavy wheels and died instantly.
