

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
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1. THE NATURAL HISTORY OF QUADRUPEDS, BIRDS AND INSECTS. Pp. [iv] +297+[1](publisher's advert); demy 12mo; full brown calf, spine ruled in gilt & with gilt-lettered red morocco title-label. Very good; small inked ownership stamp (dated 1823) to front pastedown, faint pencilled ownership signature to front free endpaper, contemporary inked presentation inscription to preliminary blank, some light browning to endpapers, scattered minor foxing, boards somewhat worn, embossed institutional stamp to upper board. London: Printed for C. & J. Rivington, 1823. SCARCE. \$90

Includes a description of the kangaroo as a nocturnal, subterranean creature (p. 104).

2. Montgomery, James. THE PELICAN ISLAND, and Other Poems. Pp. [ii] +xii+264; f'cap 8vo; t.e.g.; full green morocco, spine lettered in gilt between raised bands, marbled endpapers, by Sangorski & Sutcliffe. The Preface states: 'The subject of *The Pelican Island* was suggested by a passage in Captain Flinders's *Voyage to Terra Australis*. Describing one of these numerous gulfs which indent the coast of New Holland, and are thickly spotted with small islands....' Reference is also made to Kangaroo Island.

3. [Craik, George L.] THE NEW ZEALANDERS. Pp. [iv]+iv+424, plus frontispiece map, text illustrations; f'cap 8vo; publisher's brown cloth, embossed in blind, spine lettered in gilt. Very good; some light foxing, a few tiny edge-chips, boards slightly rubbed. **London: Charles Knight et al, 1830. First single-volume edition**. Entertaining Knowledge series. An account of the native New Zealanders, the character of whom, according to the author, exhibits, with remarkable boldness of relief, many both of the vices and the virtues of the savage state.

- **4. Murray, Rev. Thos. Boyles.** PITCAIRN: The island, the people, and the pastor. To which is added a short notice of the original settlement and present condition of Norfolk Island. Pp. [ii]+414+[4](publisher's cat.), plus frontispiece portrait (of John Adams), 15 plates (incl. 1 folding) & 1 map, text illustrations; f'cap 8vo; publisher's green cloth, embossed in blind, spine & upper board lettered & decorated in gilt, by Trickett & Son (with binder's ticket tipped to rear pastedown). Very good; contemporary inked presentation inscription to front free endpaper, some light soiling & a little light foxing, boards slightly soiled & a trifle worn. **London &c.: S.P.C.K., [1860].** Twelfth edition. - **5. Goodrich, Newton.** THE POETICAL WORKS. Pp. xx+452+xvi (list of subscribers, last blank), hand-tipped photographic frontispiece portrait, decorative head- and tailpieces, text illustrations; post 12mo; marbled edges; half green morocco and green cloth, spine lettered & decorated in gilt with raised bands, marbled endpapers. Very good; slight soiling, a small closed edge-split, edges lightly faded, boards lightly rubbed, spine somewhat faded. **Melbourne: George Robertson, 1873. First edition.** (BAL 2:189.) Collection of drama and poetry by Henry Newton Goordich, who also published under the *nom de plume* 'Beelzebub'. Goodrich emigrated to Australia via New Zealand in the late 1850s, settling in Melbourne in 1858 where he established himself as a pawnbroker in the inner-city suburb of Collingwood. He died in 1878.



6. Finnamore, John. CARPIO. A tragedy in five acts. Pp. viii+80; demy 8vo; publisher's blue cloth, ruled in blind, spine and upper board lettered & decorated in gilt. Very good; edges a little foxed, some minor soiling, light creasing to top forecorner of one leaf, boards lightly worn (incl. some light flecking to upper board). **Melbourne: George Robertson, 1875. 7. THE AUSTRALIAN READING BOOKS: FIFTH BOOK. (FOR BOYS). With fifty-one illustrations. Pp. 400, text illustrations, publisher's endpaper advert; cr 8vo; publisher's green cloth, embossed in blind. Early primary reader for Australian children. Includes instructions & illustrations for restoring to life the 'apparently drowned'.




8. Newbery, Mrs Mary. THE DROWNED CHILD AND OTHER POEMS Collected From the Writings of Mrs Mary Newbery. Pp. A worn & soiled copy, with inked ownership inscription to half-title, some light foxing. **Tonbridge: Printed by W. Blair, 'Free Press' Office, 1879. First edition**. SCARCE. **\$60**

A memorial pamphlet printed after the death of the author by her husband and brother as a keepsake for the family & friends of the deceased; includes poems written to her two older brothers who emigrated to Australia when she was sixteen; 'She felt the parting very keenly.'



9. Tangye, Richard. REMINISCENCES OF TRAVEL IN AUSTRALIA, AMERICA, AND EGYPT. With illustrations by E. C. Mountfort. Pp. xvi+290, plus frontispiece portrait (of Tangye; with tissue-guard), title-page vignette, decorative initial letters, text illustrations, musical score, index; publisher's dark green cloth, spine and upper board lettered & decorated in gilt. Very good; a little light soiling, slight wear to boards (incl. a little bubbling to cloth). London: Sampson Low, Marston, Searle, & Rivington, 1883. First trade edition. Sir Richard Tangye's travel narrative includes many piquant episodes.


Loosely based on the famous wreck of the Dutch vessel *Batavia* off the West Australian coast in 1629. Favenc also drew upon his own experiences as an explorer and pastoral-hand in northern and western Australia.


Future war novel in the style of Jules Verne about a conflict between Japan and the United States set in the Pacific.



Includes contributions from Alan Falconer, Wallace Gaitland, R. Gilberd, G. R. Gilbert, James Harris, Marion Hope, John Male, Don McDonald, Ronald L. Meek, E. O. Petersen, P. W. Robertson, Frank Sargeson, Kendrick Smithyman, Greville Texidor, Anton Vogt and M. T. Woolaston. With short bios of each author. The Progressive Publishing Society made a brief but significant contribution to the New Zealand cultural scene between 1942 and 1945. A product of the developing 'New Zealand' cultural consciousness, the PPS was also a response to war-time strictures which 'made literature a scarce commodity'. It was also part of a contemporary left-wing cultural movement stimulated among Western artists and intellectuals by the Depression, the war and the perceived growing threat of Fascism. Trollope's hitherto unpublished analysis of Victorian England which he penned at the start of his writing career.
