

2. WEST TOFTS, Norfolk.

A seventeenth century rate assessment, dated April 4th 1681, made by the churchwardens and overseers of the poor of the said parish for the collecting of sutch summs of mony as have been disbursed by them since Michaelmas last past. 3. INSTITUTIONES PHILOSOPHICA. Five volume, manuscript treatise, dated 1759 on one calligraphic title-page, with the name Nicolao Rolland. Written in Latin in a neat hand, with some calligraphic flourishes and embellishments.

~ Adrianus Nicolaus Rolland was 'arbiter' and Professor of Philosophy at the French Jesuit Collegio Bellovaco. There are printed editions of similar *Theses Philosophiae* for 1743, 1751, 1755, 1756, and 1757, each apparently written by a different student and adjudicated by Rolland. This may be one such example, or a student's own set of course notes from Rolland's lectures.

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4. THATCHING. A handwritten bill issued by Edward Peirce, for work carried out at Fosbroock [Fossbroke, Wiltshire?], for Peter Delme, Esq. It is dated 15^{th} October, 1764. Original folds, and docket title on the reverse. 198mmx 198mm. 1764. £75.00 + vat

~ Peter Delmé (28 February 1710 – 10 April 1770) was a wealthy English merchant and landowner of the mid 18th century. He served as MP for Ludgershall from 1734 to 1741, and for Southampton from 1741 to 1754. The son of a wealthy London banking figure, Sir Peter Delmé, he inherited his father's affairs at the age of 18. Through two marriages he accumulated various estates in Wiltshire & Kent. In 1741 he was elected Member of Parliament for Southampton and became a freeman of the town. In London, he was known as a patron of the arts, and influential in the Academy of Sciences and the Royal Society of London. Sometimes called 'Peter the Czar' (a reference to his considerable wealth), he managed to fritter away much of his fortune and ended his life by shooting himself in London's Grosvenor Square.



5. CHIESA CATTEDRALE. Vacchetta pel Anno 1781 della Chiesa Cattedrale. [Duomo, Milan?]

Preliminary leaf, and 123 hand numbered leaves. 18 sections towards the end are separated with vellum tabs bearing the names of various churches in Milan.

This appears to form a year book for 1781, with copious details of masses, festival days and officiating priests (curato) on each recorded day. The churches all appear to be in the vicinity of Milan, and Chiesa Cattedrale (Cathedral Church) would most likely refer to Duomo Cathedral in the city.

The name Lodovico Bimbi occurs at the beginning and also at various occasions in the manuscript.

~ Possibly a printer's proof of this 18th century notice to rent a fine country house. There are several manuscript notes to the front, and on the reverse is a handwritten bill from the printer, signed and receipted 30 Juillet 1784.



7. KIRK'S TOY SHOP.

Also known as Tickets, brass discs of this type were issued by shops as advertising tokens and redeemable tokens for stock.

The obverse side show the interior of a toy shop with a counter and squared shelving. To the left is a door and more shelving which appears to form a window. It is possible that the squared shelving is actually a window display. In front of the counter stand a woman and a boy

and girl; behind the counter stands another woman. Each square of the shelving shows all or part of an object. The most recognisable are doll figures and horses. The top area is patterned as a plaster ceiling and the bottom a wooden floor. Below the image is KIRK.

The reverse side is marked with details of the shop: Dutch and English Toys, Fans, &c. Sold by I. Kirk in St Paul's Church Yard. Some tarnishing. 30mm diameter. c1785. £75.00 + vat

~ James Kirk was a seller and not a maker of toys, however, he was also listed as an engraver and a seal engraver. The best guide to the London merchants at this date is the *Kent Directory* and James Kirk is not listed in any volumes between 1780 and 1800. The merchant had to pay to be included and this may be the reason he does not appear. He is listed in Bailey's *British Directory of Merchants & Traders's Useful Companion*, 1784.

Company's Machine No 62, Dec 22, 1788. Original canal carriage ticket for a consignment of straw, for Mr. Unwin from Mr Whitaker. Numbered, dated and signed by hand, and with a numeric calculation on te reverse. Light folds, but in very good condition, and a scarce survival.

~ In 1662 an Act was passed for making the River Stour navigable from Stourport to Stourbridge, with a view to exploiting the vast mineral resources in the latter area. By 1667 the engineer Andrew Yarranton had carried out the work, only


for it to be destroyed by floods three years later. It was almost a century more before the Company of Proprietors of the Stourbridge Navigation was formed with the intention of cutting a canal from the Staffordshire & Worcestershire Canal to the town of Stourbridge for much the same purpose. It opened in 1779.

9. TRADE UNIONS. An 18th century membership card for a trade union, or 'combination' of workers. It is engraved, with 'Division No 64' hand-written at the head, and the owner's name at the foot. It is dated January 1796, No. 35, on the reverse. 115mm x 67mm. [1796]. £95.00 + vat

~ Detailed monthly accounts for numerous named people for wine (Vino Cantina Grande, Vino Cantinetta), "Conto delle Pigione, di Case e Botteghe -Soccio al Canal Grande, Franco Nicoletti - Falegname (Carpenter) &c. Also payments made for wages, carriage, monthly rent to Sign. Marchese (of Bologna?).





11. TRADE UNIONS. An 18th century membership card for a trade union, or 'combination' of workers. It is engraved, and printed in green on card. It bears the motto "Be Permanent to protect & not combin'd to injure." It is dated January 1798, Adolph. sculp.

Two pages torn at the lower edge without loss, and some marginal fingermarks, and occasional browning, but in good legible state. ~ There is a list at the other end of the book noting 27 varieties of flowers. I would not date the recipes to 1799, and think they were written in the early 19^{th} century, with three pages in pencil in a later 19^{th} century hand.

13. STAFFORDSHIRE

ESTATE. A large quantity of early 19th century manuscript bills and receipts, together with an account book for the period 1825-1830, relating to the upkeep of the Shareshill Estate in Staffordshire. There is also a tall narrow folio 10 page 'memorandum of goods paid for Xmas 1810', one page torn with loss. There are c100 receipts &c., several valuations: "Timber grown upon Mr Robert Smith's Estate at Shareshill"; another valuing livestock and farm machinery in 1831. The account book, bound in contemporary half calf, with mar-



bled boards, has a number of pages excised, but records details of timber on the estate.

~ This Irish printed example, most probably a piracy, is not in the British Museum or the National Portrait Gallery. It is printed with Bellingham facing to the left rather than the right as in the authorised London printed versions.

16. PASSPORT. A large engraved passport issued by Henri Baron Fagel, Ambassadeur Extraordinaire et Plenipotentiaire de Sa Majeste le Roi des Pays Pas. It is issued in London on the 1st July 1816, to Henry Allen Johnson, Gentilhomme Anglais. Signed by Fagel. There are some tears without loss to the folds, presumably from having to regularly unfold it for inspection. The reverse bears a handwritten panel and official stamps, "Direction du la Police".

~ Sir Henry Allen Johnson, 2nd Bt (1785-

1860), was tutor to The Prince of Orange and, having received a commission in the 81st regiment, accompanied him as his Aide-de-Camp to the Peninsula, where he served with Wellington. He fought in the Napoleonic Wars, including Ciudad Rodrigo, Badajoz, Salamanca, Vittoria and Pyrenees, and was awarded the Knight, Royal Military Order of William of The Netherlands.

This dates from the year after William was proclaimed Prince of Orange, and the final year of Johnson's time at Christ Church, where he most probably met William, a fellow student at Oxford.

~ Johanna Maria Barrow (1800-1886), wife of the English army officer and artist Lieut-Col. Robert Batty (1789-1848), and daughter of Sir John Barrow (1764-1848). Despite their rather shaky early meetings, the couple were swiftly married on 14 September 1821, at St. Alkmund, Derby, Derbyshire,

The journal begins: 'On Monday July 31st. 1821 Captain Batty arrived at Darley - I had heard much of him, and looked at him as at a sight - thought him uncommonly clever and agreeable, - but rather conceited - this I fancied, because I know he had so much cause to be so; he planned sending up a Balloon which I helped him to cut out on Monday and Tuesday Evening - on Thursday we went out to Home. I walked with him

about the grounds he took care of my Parasol, offered to make a drawing for me, and begged that I would draw in his book - I remember feeling sorry that he returned in Mr. W. Russell's carriage, and wishing he would have exchanged with one of our party'.

On the Saturday she helps Captain Batty again with his balloon: 'Mrs. Watts Russell said jokingly, he was in love with me. I perceived a difference, he was more serious, and said two or three things which I did not know how to take.'

The couple play chess together, and Captain Batty attends church with the family, following which 'Mrs. W[illiam]. R[ussell]. told me that little Bessy had told him "I did not like him at all - he was so conceited," and added - "the best of it is, he is in love with you" - I quite disclaimed this & asked what a man was worth who could not take care of his heart for one week? Miss W. said, "And why should he take care of it."

After some flirting (singing at the piano, going for rides) she is 'left alone with him some little time. The gentlemen were shooting with pistols, Mrs W. R. called through the window, they are fighting a duel for you - he said

instantly "I must have a hand in that" - this was the first open speech he had made - I took no notice of it'.

Matters proceed a little further, and then on 'Thursday - This was the day that decided our inclinations - we went to Dovedale - I rode behind with him part of the way there - walked with him and rode home again with him. He was so kind to me wrapped me up in his cloak and said so many sweet things that my heart was completely won - all that night was perfect happiness. Friday he was still more affectionate to me'.

A short while afterwards 'Mrs. W. R. found fault with my conduct during the day [...] Mrs. W. R. was angry with me again - I then flew to him he took my part very kindly - when my letter came he brought it up to my bedroom door. Afterwards I went down and he read to me Papa's letter to Mrs. W. R. I returned to my room and he brought me up the ring which I had given him back - put it on my finger - and kissed me - we took a long and happy walk together. Wednesday He sat in the Library drawing all the morning - all the afternoon we sat under a Tree. This day he went to see the letter he had written to his Father, I gave him the withered rose which had so endeared Dovedale to me. Thursday I gave him the Purse I had worked for him - he left in my charge the order of St. Anne of Russia & the Waterloo Medal'.

As the account draws to a close matters do not look encouraging: 'Wednesday - Still worse from home - received orders to return his medals - or at best to give them in charge to Mrs. W. Russell [...] Mrs. W. Russell wrote to Papa - received a discouraging letter from home - returned Captn. B. letters &c with an order that he should come down'.

Robert Batty was born in1789, the son of Dr. Batty of Hastings and started to study medicine at Caius College, Cambridge, being awarded an M.B. in 1813. He left his studies to join the Grenadier Guards (then the 1st Foot Guards), with whom he served in the campaign of the Western Pyrenees and at Waterloo, where he was wounded and wrote an account of the Battle of Waterloo in a series of letters. He later published an illustrated account of his experiences and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1822.

He was an amateur artist of considerable merit and from 1822 to 1833 travelled the continent drawing and painting. He published in 1822 French Scenery; in 1823 German Scenery and Welsh Scenery; in 1826 Scenery of the Rhine, Belgium, and Holland.

19. HARE HILL, Cheshire. A handwritten diary, August 30th 1823 - February 15th 1824. 48 pages. Original drab sugar paper covers in good clean condition. The owner has economically used an earlier virtually blank book for his entries, and 6 pages which had been written in now have his entries pasted over with new sheets. The diary is continuous, and most entries are prefaced by an observation on the day's weather.

~ It opens with reference to Hare Hill, which is situated at Over Alderley, near Macclesfield, and the diary was most probably written by the estate manager for William Hibbert (1759-1844), the owner of Hare Hill until 1844. He records the cutting of ditches, labourers hoeing turnips, horses sent to Kerridge to move stone to make a water course, Thomas sent to Macclesfield for sundries, to (Joseph) Brocklehursts, a young bull bought by Mr Howard near Cheadle, Thomas and John B(rocklehurst) moving beech boughs, packing sheeps' wool to be sent to Messrs. Hodgsons in Halifax, bullocks and an Irish cow bought for Hare Hill at Macclesfield Fair, 8 Irish beasts sold, 41 sheep sold, &c.

In the late 18th century, William Hibbert purchased Hare Hill, a country estate in Cheshire, from Sir J.F Leicester, and built a small hunting lodge. To create a grand setting for his new home - and no doubt to impress his visitors from London - he landscaped the park, and built an ornamental lake.

He was the sixth son of Robert Hibbert (1717-1784) and Abigail Hibbert née Scholey. Born in Manchester, William went to Jamaica in the early 1780s with the intension of becoming a planter. His brothers Thomas (1744-1819) and Robert (1750-1835) were already working as partners in their uncle Thomas' (1710-1780) slave factorage business in Kingston. In 1782 William won $\pounds 20,000$ when his number was drawn in the Benefit Lottery, and following this he returned to England.

Hibbert moved to London in 1810, but continued to invest in Hare Hills, until his death in 1844. Around this time, the Brocklehurst family bought the Hare Hill estate, and embarked on a major extension to the lodge, which became Hare Hill Hall. They also decided to create a woodland garden, with a traditional Victorian walled kitchen garden at the centre, which was completed around 1902. It is now owned by the National Trust.

20. HARVESTING. A detailed handwritten table recording "Labourers extra Wages on Acct. Of Harvest, allow men 2/6, & women 2/3 per day. Nov. 3rd, 1823." Forty three individual names are recorded, the number of days worked, and their payment. It relates to Sir Philip Musgrave's Estate at Eden Hall, Cumbria. In very good clean condition, original folds, and one section detached along the fold. Docket title on the reverse.

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21. WINE LICENCE. An authorisation to sell and drink wine issued by the Mayor of Marseille, to Jacques Martin, a resident, "a debiter du vin et a donner a boire dans le Ville Mansion..." It is signed, and bears official stamps.

22. NEW BRUNSWICK, Canada. A detailed two page account by Thomas H. Peters, Notary Public, recording the events leading to, and letter of protest personally received from Captain John Black regarding the loss of his vessel 'William' of Whitehaven, England at Miramichi. The brig, sailing from Whitehaven to New Brunswick, was sunk by "a field of ice", and some of the passengers rescued by the brig 'Cumberland' of Maryport which was nearby. 315mm x 192mm. 1825.

23. MAIDSTONE GRAMMAR SCHOOL. Two double-sided cards detailing the programme of recitations, held on December 22, 1834, and December 20th, 1836. They record readings from Shakespeare and the classics, with the scholars' names noted, and some corrections and deletions by hand to the printed text. One bears the ownership name of E. Penfold Esq., one of the scholars noted on both cards. He read the part of Hamlet's Ghost, and Achilles.

~ The cards are preserved in an original hand-made wallet cut from a late 17^{th} or early 18^{th} century vellum legal document, edged in pink silk, with silk ties.

The Colonel provides good descriptions on architecture, the Louvre, the Royal Palace, finances, dining etc.

The final pages set out a 'List of English residing in France as reported by the police in 1829"; a table of post routes from the Hotel Royal, Calais; "regulations for post horses"; "regulations required by the French Government to be observed by foreigners in France"; and a "memorandum of some Palaces and Royal Establishments in France."

~ Colonel Pownoll-Phipps was born in Totnes, Devon in 1780, and died in 1858 in Clonmel, County Tipperary, Munster, Ireland. There is a printed address panel inserted into the volume from his Clonmel address.

In 1791, Phipps' father, Constantine (1746–1797), rented the Hotel d'Harcout in Caen, France, from the Duke of Harcourt; in 1793, he returned briefly to England in 1793 for the wedding of one of his daughters, leaving eight of his children in France. When the War of the First Coalition broke out in 1793, the children were separated from their parents. Pownoll Phipps (1780–1858) and his siblings grew up in the French city during the French revolution, and lived under the threat of anti-English violence. Only after the Treaty of Campo Formio could the children return to England, arriving on 2 October 1798, all of them fluent in French; Pownoll Phipps reportedly spoke with French-accented English for the rest of his life. By the end of October, Pownoll had a commission as a lieutenant and joined the Bengal Army of the East India Company. The following June, he embarked for India on the Bombay-built ship Britannica.

Upon arrival in India, Pownoll Phipps joined the force under command of Colonel Arthur Wellesley. He participated in Sir David Baird's expedition from India to Egypt in 1801, for which participation he eventually became a Knight of the Crescent. Phipps married Henrietta Beaunpaire; orphaned by the French Revolution, she had taken refuge with him and his siblings at the Hotel d'Harcout, on 10 August 1802, in Calcutta.

Pownoll Phipps' second wife, Sophia Matilda Arnold, was Benedict Arnold's daughter, and they married I 1813. Phipps retired from the East India Company service on 1 July 1825, with the rank of colonel. Living for a time in London, he was a popular regular at Exeter Hall events. A wellversed, informed and articulate speaker and storyteller, Phipps was a gallant gentleman, readily at ease in all society, and very friendly: "a tall, stout, officer-like person, about 60-years of age, with white hair, short, sharp features, and a pleasant cast of countenance." He also had a strict sense of honour. In 1857, a year before his death, he wrote a letter to the Editor of The Times, in which he asserted his belief in the good character and quality of the Sepoys, despite the popular outrage against them during the Indian Mutiny.

This tour to Paris in 1829 was undertaken the year after his second wife's death in June 1828. His third wife was the Irish-born Anna Charlotte Smith.

Pownoll Phipps developed bronchitis after presiding over the closing of an art exhibit in Clonmel, Ireland; he died in November 1858. His funeral was attended by Protestant and Catholics, and the procession was over a mile long.



 \sim A witty and diverse account of the author's travels: the following are the first two pages of the journal setting the scene for the trip.

"On Wednesday the 24th July 1861 I started from Yonval [Somme department] at a quarter to 9am in capital spirits & condition for my journey which was not to exceed six weeks in duration. I was equipped in a light suit of Holland & carried at my back a canvas docky-bag similar to those used by the soldiers for carrying their provisions while on a march, which besides containing all the extra toggery I might require during my trip, was crammed with the good things of life - sandwiches, a piece of pork, sausages, a great lump of hard cheese &c, so it presented a very comfortable not to say corpulent appearance, while in my breast pockets I carried liquor - a bottle of wine & a flask of cognac - which like Johnny Gilpin's bottles of beer, their weight counteracting the bag at my back, aided in preserving the centre of gravity, which with my scotch cap on my head & a stought ash stick I had cut from a wood at Yonval to serve as a companion and protector composed my personal effects - tho I must not forget to add they included that most useful & necessary of all my goods and chattles - my purse which was lined with 262 francs, 17 sous.... and Fred accompanied me as far as the stone-cross on the Havre road, where I gave them a parting 'Hurrah for Brittany' and I left them to find their way across country to Varengeville..."


"... I passed through St Vallery en Caux a small fishing port... claims I believe the honor of being the port from which that scamp Billy the first set sail with such murderous designs against poor old Albion. It had just strucj 8pm when I arrived at Fecamp, I having put 62 kilom or 38 miles between myself and home, rather too long a march I think for the first day I suppose... The 'Normandie', a well built steam boat, took me from Havre at 12.45am & landed me safe at Honfleur about an hour after starting, we had some music on board, two young ladies playing - one a violin & other a guitar, the band master performed on the cornet. Mr Y's house is very pleasantly situated overlooking the town The Y's have been here 3 years, Mrs Y thinks the country very pretty but the people (the lower orders) are a drunken, thievish set and provisions are dear... no poultry to be had & the meat is no great things. The Y's wanted me to pay Trouville a visit as it is a watering place much frequented by the elite of France, but I didn't much fancy going 10 or 12 miles out of my road to see a parcel of old Dowages, Duchesses &c so declined.. On my way to Lisieux I passed through Pont L'Eveque, a small place with nothing worth seeing in it. I started for Caen, across an open monstrous country, I entered the city by the Rue St Jean. I put up at an Inn in it & got well fed & housed during my short stay. The French tho' in the absence of political excitement as sober & peaceful a community as could be found anywhere, appear in times of commotion or popular tumult to go one and all 'staring mad' and commit acts which if in their right senses, they themselves would condemn; they don't content themselves with knocking on the head all who dare presume to differ in the slightest degree from their own dogmatical opinions..."

The author leaves Caen in the direction of Bayeaux, and notes that a recent change in the law allows 'Englishmen should be permitted to visit France

without either passport or papers', however on passing through Bretteville is asked by a policeman for his papers and marched off the to Brigadier and Mayor and told to get a passport a Carentan. The policeman seems to have warmed to our traveller as "I cracked a bottle of wine with the gentleman with the cocked hat... he turned out a jolly fellow enough." After a visit to Bayeux, he is asked for his papers twice more in nearby towns, the second time "... he had the impudence to make me display my riches to him before letting me go." On reaching Carentan he is told by the Mayor that a passport could not be issued as he had no one in the town to vouch for him. He journeys on towards Coutance and then to Granville ("... a dirty little sea-port...", and so the trip continues westward via Dinan towards Brittany, reaching the town of Folgoat ("bleak, dreary & unsheltered"). He notes visiting a churchyard and seeing "Skull houses... filled with the skulls and bones of dead men... the skulls looking ghastly & grinning... hollow to the touch of your stick which showed they were not overcrowded with brains." The journal is written with a lot of character and good observation adventures later include a visit to a cattle market, a lady with a dancing dog at dinner ("perhaps the ugliest old hag I ever saw."), more brushes with the law, and an overriding sense of his interest in the agriculture and country habits of the French. The journal ends abruptly (around August 14th), with the book virtually filled, and no evidence of pages removed, leaving the reader wondering what befell the author in his subsequent weeks of travel. A charming manuscript.





These are a series of religious observations drawn from first and third hand accounts, for example: "Shipwreck at St Andrews. Alarm guns tell of a vessel in danger, it was drifting in danger of rocks dragging its anchor - they cut away its 2 masts back still it drifted - but now a life boat appeared but could not get along side of the vessel without danger - to save the crew each one must leave the ship, leap into the ocean and be dragged to the life boat - Christ is a life boat...." There are references to conversations with other Baptist ministers (Mr Weaver, Mr Meadhurst), preaching at a Weslyan chapel. The other end of the book appears to be a series of draft sermons, and commencements, one referring to Wesley. 

It opens with recipes for cakes, jellies, creams and preserved fruits, which are nearly all noted as being supplied by Mrs Read. These are followed by junkets, marmalades and jams [Mrs Halahan, Mrs Spalding, Mrs Mardew. Others include devilled kidneys, toad in the hole, indian and curried eggs, anchovy butter, oyster sauce, dried haddock puree.

More interestingly there are a good number of recipes for curries, chutneys, rice, and one for ceylon curry written over 8 pages. A number are noted as coming "from my Ayali in India."



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
