

Crite was a New Jerseyborn Boston artist best known for his religious and spiritual images. These images are very much in the style of Crite's best-known book: Three Spirituals From Earth to Heaven (see item 7), which illustrated the spirituals "Nobody Knows the Trouble I See," "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," and "Heaven." These drawings may have been either rejected from that volume, or existed to form the basis for a never realized sequel. Rare. [BTC #90387]



Virginia's poll tax was instituted in 1902 and immediately resulted in about 80% of African-Americans being removed from the rolls. It was rendered invalid by the Voting Rights Act of 1964. expensive boarding school until their father dies and their uncle claims them as slaves. Soon liberated by the Union Army, she offers her services as a nurse, and attracts the attentions of a white doctor, who discovers she is of mixed race, and encourages her to "pass" for white, which she rejects, setting off with a light-skinned black doctor instead.


Iola commits herself to the education and furtherance of her race, and particularly of the freed slave, but is especially adamant about maintaining her status as an employed woman, saying at one point: "I think that every woman should have some skill or art which would insure her at least a comfortable support. I believe there would be less unhappy marriages if labor were more honored



among women." Iola is also strongly in support of the temperance movement and in the principles of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in particular. While the novel has a conventional ending - Iola marries the black doctor - she continues her educational endeavors and social work as a married

OCLC locates 27 copies of the first edition, a surprisingly large number, but all but a handful are found in the libraries of traditionally black colleges, where they would have been of particular interest, and more readily available at an early date. However, the list of institutions that would have an interest in the subject and might be expected to have a copy of the first edition but do not is impressive. No copies at auction in the past 25 years. A group of material related to the dramatic production of *Uncle Tom's Cabin* by Parsons & Pool's Famous Ideal Uncle Tom's Cabin Company and Tennessee Jubilee Singers. The collection includes 25 advertising flyers, seven blank performer contracts, six broadsides with rules for performers, nine complimentary tickets, six handbills, one poster and, most notably, a canvas bag likely used by a canvasser during the tour to promote upcoming shows with the production company's name on the front accompanied by an engraved image of Uncle Tom with Eva.

Dramatic and musical versions of Harriet Beecher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin* were produced almost immediately upon publication of the novel in 1852 and, like the book, became an instant success with the public, propelling the book's sales to even greater heights. These numerous "Tom Shows," as they became known, continued to be produced for more than 50 years after the book's release.

Little seems to be known about the Parsons & Pool version of *Uncle Tom's Cabin* outside of this collection except that the company toured between 1893-1895, predominantly in the New England area. All the flyers and handbills tout its version of the story as "Legitimate and Complete," likely to help distinguish it from other less faithful

dramatic productions. The largest flyers in the collection list each scene of the six-act version of the play, suggesting it was likely based on a combined adaptation of two George Aiken plays based on Stowe's novel, *Uncle Tom's Cabin* and its sequel, *The Death of Uncle Tom, or the Religion of the Lonely*.


Accompanying the production were the Tennessee Jubilee Singers, who the flyer calls "The Finest Colored Singers in this Country." The name suggests they may have been related to the African-American singing group The Fisk Jubilee Singers from Fisk University that brought jubilee singing into prominence and included noted singer Mathilda "Black Patti" Jones. More likely the group was assembled for this particular production and given a similarly sounding name to attract customers. Whether they performed during the production or in support of it is not clear.

The illustrated canvas bag was likely a canvasser's bag used to distribute flyers and handbills to drum up interest in the coming production either to city officials or passersbys. The bag is moderately soiled but the construction remains strong and the canvas material is considerably supple, as are the leather straps and hardware which show only minor wear and oxidation.

The remainder of the collection includes: a printed folder used to house the show's orchestra music; printed flyers outlining the production, its actors and a synopsis of the play; blank performer contracts with spaces for names, terms of employment and salary; broadsides listing the rules of conduct for performers; handbills of various sizes proclaiming the show's merit; complimentary tickets with engravings of the proprietors; and a 42" x 27" color poster illustrating the sale of Uncle Tom at the slave auction. A remarkable collection of material that sheds light on a specific, little-known THE CREAT AUCTION SCENE New England Tom Show. It also illustrates the enduring popularity of Stowe's work throughout the UNCLE TOM 19th Century, as well as the emerging interest in Negro spiritual music.
