”A NOBEL PRIZE BLOKE” & OTHER LITERARY ITEMS

Our fourth catalogue offers a wide range of first editions, books on various subjects, and presentation copies from authors such as Ingmar Bergman, Sinclair Lewis, Lars Norén and Émile Zola. There is a small number of early Swedish translations of foreign literature from the library of C. F. Ridderstad (1807-1886), author, politician and publicist. Items no. 14, 35, 64, 80, 101 & 102 are review copies which he received as the editor of the newspaper *Östgöta Correspondenten*.

The catalogue contains a section of works by Åke Hodell, one with works by Freud from the library of Torsten Husén, and another with books that show the various stages of publication of Selma Lagerlöf's debut, *Gösta Berlings Saga*.

Books inscribed by William Faulkner are known to be scarce, which is why we are particularly proud to offer no less than ten presentation copies. They were all inscribed to Else Jonsson (1912-1996), with whom Faulkner had a love affair in the early 50s. Of particular interest is the copy of *The Reivers*, which was posted by Faulkner on the 3rd of July, 1962, and received by Else Jonsson on the 8th, two days after his death.

Else Jonsson was the widow of Thorsten Jonsson, Swedish author and journalist (1910-1950). It is commonly accepted that his appreciative writings on Faulkner were of vital importance for the selection of Faulkner as the 1950 Nobel Laureate. Thorsten Jonsson is represented in the catalogue by items no. 21, 68 & 69. Items no. 12, 67 & 90 are books from his library, as is the case with most of the books by Faulkner in this catalogue.

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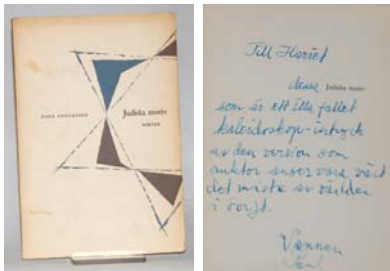

1. Andersson, Paul: *Judiska motiv*. Stockholm; Bonniers, 1956. 1st ed. [20x14 cm]. 38, (3, 3 blanks) pp. Printed wrappers. Wrappers a bit soiled and slightly darkened in margins. Minor specks in outer margin of pp. 21/22, and a tiny speck in top margin of pp. 34. *Jewish Themes* is the poet Paul Andersson's last book, in which he explores some old testament motifs. Inscribed: "Till Harriet / dessa [Judiska motiv] som är ett illa fallet kaleidoskop-intryck av den version som auktor anser vara värt det minsta[?] av världen i övrigt. / vännen Paul". 2200 SEK

on spine, marbled endpapers and green edges. Spine ends and corners slightly rubbed. Two small specks on the spine. A small hole on front free endpaper, and on pp. 11/12 in the first part. A short tear in outer margin of pp. 285/286 in the first part. A tear in top margin of pp. 95/96, 127/128 and 137/138 in the second part. Small loss in top margin of pp. 161/162 and 169/170 in the second part. A small hole on pp. 459/460 which affects a hyphen. A few scattered specks. A great copy from the library of the Herrborum mansion in Östergötland, Sweden. *The Island of Happiness* is Atterbom's magnum opus and one of the high points of Swedish romanticism. 5000 SEK

Hillbom. A near-perfect copy of the first Swedish edition of *Nightwood*. Laid-in is a review from a Swedish newspaper, in which is said that this novel is probably the fulfilment of the modernistic tradition.

The spine slightly rubbed and there is a small crack in lower front joint. Corners very slightly worn. Lacks the front free endpaper. 3 pages with a small mark in outer margin of the first work. "NB" written by an early owner in outer margin of 6 pages in the second work, and 1 page with underlinings. Old purchase note on rear paste-down. A very clean and handsome copy of the first Swedish edition of Beccaria's *On Crimes and Punishments* (*Dei Delitti e delle Pene*), and of his disciple Dragonetti's treatise (*Delle virtù e dei premi...*). 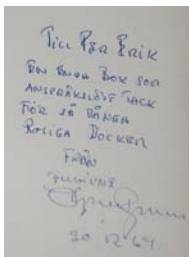
them translated by Joh. Henr. Hochschild. Bygdén I:16. This important work of the Italian Enlightenment aimed at reforming the criminal law system by adopting rational principles, and is among the first to argue against the death penalty. A milestone in the field of criminology. The work inspired the Swedish king Gustav III to the implementation of criminal justice reforms during the 1770s, for instance the abolishment of torture.

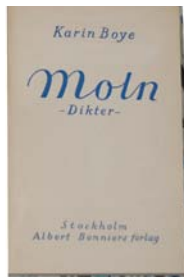

Jacket design by B. S. Biro. The jacket is very slightly creased at spine ends and corners and has a short tear on front inner flap. Foot of spine a trifle bumped. A small speck and a minimal chip on rear paste-down. A very fine copy of Behan's autobiographical novel, by many held as his best work. The title's *Borstal*

refers to a type of British youth prison.

Publisher's laminated wrappers. Spine ends slightly worn. The laminate has started to come off at the joints. A fine copy. The first edition of Bergman's scripts of *Through a Glass Darkly*, *Winter Light/The Communicants* & *The Silence*. Inscribed in Swedish by Bergman to Per Erik Wahlund (1923-2009), author, translator, director, and one of the leading theatre critics in Sweden at the time. His Swedish translation of Büchner's *Woyzeck* was used by Bergman in the production of 1969. The inscription reads in translation: "For Per Erik / a single book as a modest thanks for so many amusing books / from your affectionate Ingmar Bergman / 30.12.64." Wahlund reviewed several of Bergman's

stage productions in the 50s and 60s, and "was one of the most important theatre critics to notice Bergman's development as a director." (Steele, *Ingmar Bergman: A Reference Guide*, pp. 782).

London; Burberrys Limited, no year [1931?]. [22,5x14 cm]. 248 pp. Richly illustrated with photos and drawings. Bound in green Burberry Gabardine with a paper label on the front board. A gift label, signed by managing director T. M. Burberry, is mounted on the inside of front board, and a "Board of Directors" list is mounted on pp. 248. Pp. 133/134 very slightly chipped in outer margin.



Light spotting in outer margin of pp. 136, and a cornerfold on pp. 199/200. A very fine copy. The book presents the history of Burberry and the advantages of their products in all climates and surroundings, and includes numerous endorsements by appreciative costumers. There are chapters on most aspects of outing -- such as riding, hunting, winter sports, and fishing -- and on the favourable use of Burberry in military campaigns, naval missions, arctic and antarctic explorations, with photos

and descriptions of famous explorers and members of the military who were all successful gabardine users.

With a preface by the translator, who emphasises his efforts to retain the original verse and the poet's peculiar manner of expression.

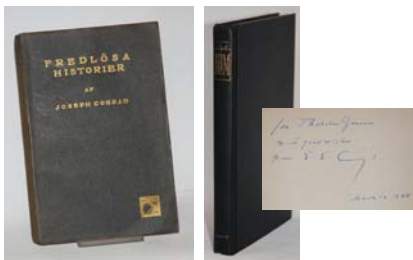

Spine very slightly out of square. Rear top corner bumped. The wrappers are creased, soiled, and with minor losses. Rear wrapper detached. The first two leaves with a minimal corner loss. There is a small hole in the inner margin of pp. 105/106 (a bit of the leaf is stuck to pp. 107) and a tear in the inner margin of pp. 107/108. Pp. 133/134, 325/326 and 335/336 are detached. Contents toned, with some corner folds and a few small stains scattered throughout the text. Inscribed on the title: "A Monsieur de Pinto [?] / Ma aspirant-collabo / Willy". Henry Gauthier-Villars (1859-1931) was one of Paris's most influential music critics, and a central figure in the city's fashionable circles. Under the pseudonym "Willy", he published around fifty titles between the years 1898 and 1908, novels as well as essays. Characteristic of his approach was the systematic use of ghostwriters, so called "nègres", which he himself called "collabos", helpers. The ghostwriters were carefully chosen by Gauthier-Villars himself and worked under his direct supervision. Many of them were young writers and scholars who would later make a name for themselves in their own right, like Jean de Tinan and Pierre Véber. Best known of Willy's "nègres" is of course his first wife,

Sidonie-Gabrielle Colette, who between 1900 and 1903, under the pseudonym "Willy", wrote four novels about the young school girl Claudine, the first of which was *Claudine à l'École*. The novels, which are partly autobiographical, depict a young, provincial schoolgirl who discovers sensuality and big-city temptations. The novels became a huge commercial success, framed by the scandals of their equivocal content. Colette was later generally acknowledged as the author of the *Claudine* novels, later editions of which were signed "Colette Willy", and finally "Colette". This copy was apparently given to a potential ghostwriter.

First Swedish edition of *Tales of Unrest*, and the first

book by Conrad to appear in Swedish.

endpaper. The first trade edition of *HIM*
was preceded by an edition of 160 signed
and numbered copies. The play *HIM*
combines elements of circus, vaudeville
and expressionism, into a kind of dream
play. Inscribed by Cummings on front free
endpaper: "For Thorsten Jonsson with
good wishes from E. E. Cummings / March
12 1948". Jonsson made translations
of a fair number of Cummings' poems,
which were published in his book *Sidor av
Amerika (Sides of America)* in 1946.

base of spine, which is faintly visible in the
inner margin of most leaves. A dampstain
in outer margin all through the book.
Contents a bit toned and brittle. Thora
Dardel (1899-1995), Swedish artist and
author. She went to Paris in 1919 to study
sculpture, married the Swedish artist Nils
Dardel in 1920, lived in the Montparnasse
for 13 years and befriended many of the
great artists of the time, such as Cocteau,
Braque, and Modigliani, the latter of
whom painted her portrait. She describes
her stay in Paris in the autobiographical

work *Jag for till Paris (I Went to Paris, 1941)*, where she also tells the story behind this book. Oberlé suggested that her short stories, one of them previously published in Swedish, should be translated into French and assisted her in doing this. Cocteau, who was ill at the time, sent a letter containing the preface. The title of the first story, *The Trip to Berlin and Paris*, was changed into *My Married Lover* in order to amuse Cocteau. Inscribed “Otte / Thora”. The recipient was the Swedish artist Otte Sköld, who was a close friend also living in Paris, and who had illustrated Thora’s previously published book *Konfektasken (The Candy Box, 1924)*.

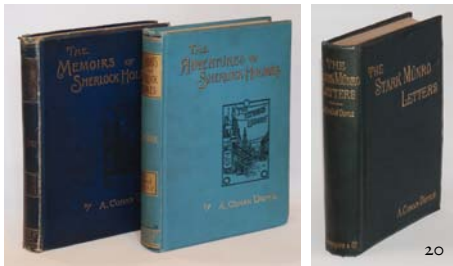

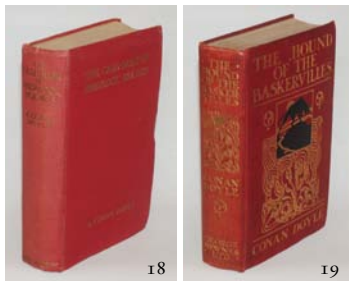

Contents bright and clean. Gift inscription dated "Xmas 1896" on half-title, and Thore Virgin's signature, dated 1946, on front free endpaper. Doyle describes the book in a letter to Captain Stainsbury, on 10 July 1913, as "the evolution of a young medico, based largely, on the subjective side, on my own experience and feelings. In it I treat religion and science, and I there give the reasons which brought me to a broad Theism. I find myself still practically in the same position." A sequel was planned but never realized. 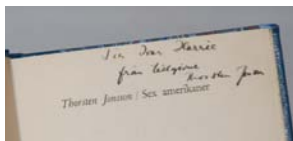


“A NOBEL PRIZE BLOKE”

That William Faulkner would be awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1950 had been predicted by the Swedish author, journalist and connoisseur of American literature Thorsten Jonsson (1910-1950), who admired Faulkner's works and who acted as his main introducer in Sweden. Jonsson was *Dagens Nyheter's* USA correspondent from 1943-46 and made his statement while interviewing Faulkner at Rowan Oak in 1946. Unfortunately, Jonsson didn't live to see his prediction come true. At the dinner party given the night before the Nobel Banquet by Faulkner's Swedish publisher, a toast was proposed for Jonsson, as “the man most responsible for our gathering tonight”. Among the dinner guests was Else Jonsson, his widow, who had been invited both as a guest of honour and as a fluent speaker of English with a broad knowledge of American customs. She and Faulkner immediately found each other, and they met several times during his stay in Stockholm. On the 11th of December, the day after the banquet, they had lunch together and walked home to Else's apartment, which is the probable occasion for most of the inscriptions offered here. Their encounter developed into a life-long passion and friendship, clearly seen in the many letters Faulkner wrote to her,

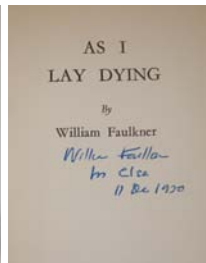
and they managed to spend some time together in Paris, Holmenkollen (Norway) and Stockholm during the years to come. In his first love letter to her, dated the 15th of December 1950, he asks himself how he will be able to return to the USA without seeing her again. He also says that being a Noble Prize bloke is nothing compared to spending an afternoon with her. Faulkner's last letter is dated the 14th of December 1960. However, she occupied his mind during the last days of his life, as shown by the presentation copy of *The Reivers*, which reached her first after the news of his death.

THE MAKING OF A DEBUT

Selma Lagerlöf (1858-1940) was employed as a teacher at a girl's school when in August of 1890, she contributed to the literary contest of the weekly magazine *Idun*. She was awarded with the first prize for five chapters of what would develop into her debut novel, an episodic tale set in her home province, Värmland. The publisher of *Idun*, Frithiof Hellberg, offered her a contract for a book and used the magazine to promote the coming novel. The awarded five chapters was printed as a "Gift edition", which was sent out to newspapers and critics, and also printed as a supplement to *Idun* no. 6 in February 1891. In a June issue of the magazine Lagerlöf is presented with a portrait on the front page, and during October and November the novel is advertised and also offered to the readers at a reduced price, if ordered before publication. At the beginning of December, *Gösta Berlings Saga* was finally published. The critics were however not impressed, and the book sold poorly. In late 1892, the book was positively reviewed by the leading Scandinavian critic Georg Brandes, which meant a turning point in her literary career, which was crowned with The Nobel Prize for Literature in 1909, and membership of The Swedish

Academy in 1914. *Gösta Berlings Saga* is now considered an important part of the romantic revival of Swedish literature in the 1890s. Offered here are the mentioned titles, displaying the stages of the novel's emergence, as well as a few other related items.

Le Cinquième Acte, published in september 1899, was the fourth of altogether seven articles and open letters published by Zola in *l'Aurore* between 1898 and 1900 in favour of the French Army captain of Jewish and Alsatian descent Alfred Dreyfus, charged with treason in 1894 in a much-publicized affaire. In the article Zola expresses his

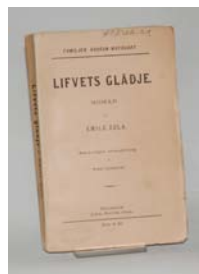
outrage with the military tribunal in Rennes where Dreyfus, repatriated from his imprisonment on the Devil's Island, was tried again only to be re-condemned despite clear evidence in favour of his innocence. The anger and disappointment of Zola, who had spent almost a year in exile in London in the aftermath of his 1898 open letter "J'Accuse..." is quite palpable in the text. The Rennes trial was, says Zola, supposed to be the fifth act of the play that was the Dreyfus affair -- a happy ending where the wronged party is redeemed -- but it turned out to be only the "fourth act": "When, Oh dear God, will there be the Fifth?" Zola did not have to wait for very long for the "fifth act", as Dreyfus was pardoned later that same year on the grounds of feeble health. The finale of the affair was however not enacted until 1906, when Dreyfus was formally acquitted and his honour restored, something Zola himself sadly never lived to see.

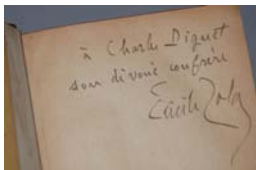
