(not in all copies; the book has continuous signatures), and without the price of 12 shillings beneath the imprint (no priority); recent quarter calf over marbled boards, red morocco label; some scuffing, but very good. Ash (?1724-1779) was an English Baptist minister whose dictionary (second edition, 1795) was compiled on the basis of Bailey's. In a catalogue of 1872 John Russell Smith writes: "A very useful dictionary as it contains obsolete, provincial, and cant words and phrases, besides a number of technical terms." In a letter to David Ramsay, Webster notes: "It is questionable how far vulgar and cant words are to be admitted into a dictionary ... Johnson has transgressed the rules of lexicography beyond any other compiler; for his work contains more of the lowest of all vulgar words than any other now extant, Ash excepted." Alston V, 288.

Darby [et al.], 1721. \$1,750 First edition of one of the greatest of all English dictionaries, and "the most popular and representative dictionary of the eighteenth century" (Starnes & Noyes). 8vo, [388] leaves, lexicon in double column, title-p. soiled, with small neat paper restoration at the tips, as well as on a few internal leaves, mild dampstaining, clean tear in 4N2, but generally a very good, sound copy in recent black calf, gilt-lettered direct on gilt-paneled spine. Bailey's An Universal Etymological Dictionary of 1721, which reached a 30th edition by 1802, was the most popular of all dictionaries before Johnson. Notable features include the prominence, and subsequent permanence of the etymological aspect, the inclusion of proverbs, a smattering of cant terms, obsolete expressions, dialect, and equivalents from other languages. It was also the first "universal" dictionary of English, accounting for all words in the language, not just the difficult or specialized ones. Alston V, 94; Kennedy 6211. He also drew heavily on the dictionary of his friend, Dr. Samuel Johnson, and he introduced "thousands of vocabulary entries" from Johnson into this work. Later editions appeared in 1846 (abridged), 1847, 1848, and 1850. Bolles (1800-1883) was born in Marlborough, Conn., and graduated from Amherst in 1828. He was also the author of The New American Spelling Book and a volume of poetry, and he was editor of The Complete Evangelist. Burkett gives this "a unique place in the history of American dictionaries," it being one of only two phonetic dictionaries published in America before the Civil War, although she cautions that they are "interesting mainly as experiments." Burkett is wrong, however, in classifying this dictionary with that of Smalley, as the latter derives from the phonography movement which was in vogue in America in the mid-19th century, while Bolles' is strictly a pronouncing dictionary in the tradition of Sheridan and Walker. The case of Mary Alice Orford vs. Thomas Butler Cole caused quite a sensation. According to The Times, the trial was "the subject of general conversation throughout the county of Lancaster for several months ... We do not remember any former occasion when the public curiosity was more excited." The matter was summed up by the plaintiff's counsel as follows: "The declaration states, that in consideration that the plaintiff would promise to marry the defendant, he, the defendant, undertook to marry the plaintiff; but that instead of doing so, he had married another woman. The plaintiff pleads the general issue." The defense argued that the defendant truly was, as the opposing counsel put it, "the meanest reptile on earth," and therefore, Miss Orford lost nothing, not "happiness," not "character," not "peace of mind," in losing the defendant to another woman. The argument failed to sway the jury which awarded Miss Orford an astonishing £7,000 settlement. This volume is from the library of famous book collector Francis Mary Richardson Currer who followed the trial and, according to her notes in the volume, seemed to have agreed with the defense: "From the subsequent life of Mr. Cole up to this present time, June 1860, no one can think that Miss Orford had sustained any loss of happiness, by her loss of Mr. Cole, though she would of position in life for a time, for with such a person, her reign as Mistress of Kirkland Hall and Cole would probably have been short - the damages must now when people's minds have cooled on the subject, be considered quite out of all reasons..." Currer goes on to list similar cases between Mr. Cole, "the faithless swain," and several other local women, one of whom

declared as Cole tried to leave her "at the church door... 'No, no Mr. Cole, as we have got so far we will go on', or words to that effect... As might be expected after living a short time together most unhappily, she left him ... " Francis Mary Richardson Currer (1785-1861) was, according to Dibdin, "at the head of all female collectors in Europe" (Reminiscences, ii. 949). "From her earliest youth Miss Currer was fond of books and reading... 'She is in possession of both the Richardson and Currer estates,' says Mrs. Dorothy Richardson in 1815, 'and inherits all the tastes of the former family, having collected a very large and valuable library, and also possessing a fine collection of prints, shells, and fossils, in addition to what were collected by her great-grandfather and great uncle' (account of the Richardson family in Nichols, Illustrations, i. 225-52)" (see DNB). Currer continually added to her collection which eventually numbered over 15,000 volumes. Dibdin describes

Currer's library "in his usual enthusiastic manner (*Reminiscences*, ii. 949-957), and gives some further details on a second visit (*Bibliographical Tour*, II. 1081-1090). The 'Tour' is dedicated to Miss Currer" (DNB). Currer was also the neighbor and friend of Charlotte Bronté and it is believed that the pseudonym Bronté chose for her first book, Currer Bell, was in her honor. OCLC locates only one copy, at Harvard Law School.

He succeeded, not always without difficulty, in supporting himself and his family by his pen for nearly twenty-five years. There seems to be little known about his life" (Weedon). He was the author of no less than 90 titles, many of them juveniles. The Juvenile Biographer was published first in London by John Newbery in 1780 (see Roscoe J-198). Fictitious educational biographies, including those of Miss Betsey Allgood; Master Bill Bad-enough; Master Billy Easy; Miss Polly Charity; Miss Betsey Pert; Master Dickey Sprightly; Master Isaac Curious; Master Billy Bashful; Miss Fanny Squeamish; and others, including a biography of "the little author, written by himself." This is the so-called "Piccadilly Edition," a reissue of the original 1771 edition, with additional letters (pp. 257-366); page 366 has the catchword: "LET-". With cancel half-title, title page and first leaf of 'Contents' (signed A3). In this issue there is a colon after "London" in the imprint. "The secret of the authorship of these letters which puzzled the men of the last century still remains unsolved, and it may be added that with our present information it is practically insoluble" (Halkett & Laing III. 327), although current scholarship seems to suggest that they are the work of Sir Philip Francis (1740-1818). "The first of the letters of Junius appeared in Woodfall's *Public Advertiser* in London, Jan. 21, 1769. Further letters appeared irregularly until 21 Jan. 1772. The series attracted enough attention to make it profitable for various booksellers to bring out editions of the letters before the series was concluded. At least 16 of these unauthorized partial editions were published before the end of 1771. In addition, individual letters were published in other political collections" (NCBEL, II, 1178). One record in OCLC suggests there is a portrait frontispiece, not present here. Cordasco, *Junius Bibliography* 37 (making no mention of a frontispiece); Lowndes, p. 1241.

J. M. Kemble." Cloth a bit stained and frayed, endsheets foxed, but generally very good. A most interesting notebook kept by one of the foremost philologists of the first half of the 19th century, among whose many accomplishments is the first complete modernized version of *Beowulf* (1833). Kemble (1807-1857) "had a more scientific as well as a more accurate knowledge of the [Anglo-Saxon] language than any earlier scholar... The publication of his collection of documents belonging to the Anglo-Saxon period may be said to have laid the foundation of our present knowledge of the institutions and customs of the English before the Norman conquest" (DNB). He studied for a time under Jacob Grimm, who considered Kemble one of his most promising students. This notebook was obviously used over a period of time and for different purposes; different sections are separated by many blanks and are scattered through the text block; there are also a number of pages that have been excised. Among these notes and transcriptions are his transcription of the MS. Cotton Vitellius A.XV (folios 1-9, containing Alfred's translation of Augustine's Soliloquies); his transcription of portions of the Cottonian, Trinity, and Gottingen manuscripts of the Cursor mundi, the second being the most lengthy, and with his replication of illuminated elements of the original MS in colored inks; and his notes for his famed Codex Diplomaticus which occupies nearly half the volume. There are other transcriptions as well, including "A German Poem concerning Charlemagne. Harl. MN. 3971," and a "Translation of the Hildebrands Lied (Rough translatn. Munich 1835)." Another section resembles a concordance to the occurrence of specific words in various manuscripts, and yet another is a list of words he wished to locate in either AngloSaxon or Old English texts based on their transference into Gothic and other texts. The front endsheet bears the ownership signature of "C[harles] E[dward] Donne," the eldest son of Kemble's very close friend and school fellow, William Bodham Donne, who succeeded Kemble as examiner of plays in the Lord Chamberlain's office after Kemble's death.

The present pamphlet by the French economist and litterateur Morellet (1727-1819), relates to the status of the parents and grandparents of émigrés during the French Revolution. He argued that it was in the interests of the clergy to complicate religion, thereby making themselves indispensable in the religious lives of the people: their powers made the Protestant call for further reformation impossible, and the interests of their church were declared to be incompatible with those of true religion" (DNB).

abstruse, outlining those theories which Webster was later to develop more fully in his great *Dictionary* of 1828. In the body of the *Compendious* he included thousands of words which were in daily use but not in any other lexicon.
