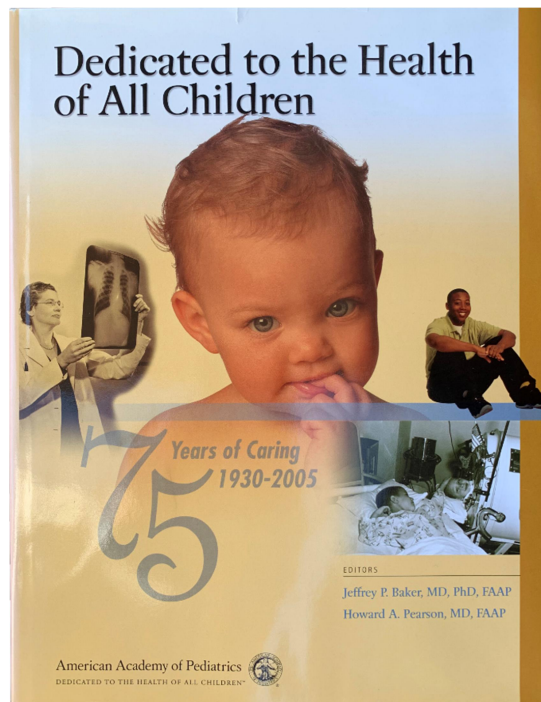
First edition. Dedicated to Virchow. A fourth edition was issued in 1892, a seventh in 1902. Abt described Baginsky as "one of the most active and practical scientific pediatricists of modern times."

Adolf Aron Baginsky (1843–1918), born in Ratibor, Silesia, studied medicine at Berlin and Vienna, graduating from Berlin University in 1866. He studied under Virchow. He took a position as private assistant to Ludwig Traube at Berlin's cholera hospital. Baginsky opened his own practice in 1868 but by 1870 was working in a military hospital during the Franco-Prussian War. He



became professor of diseases of children at Berlin University. "Baginsky devoted himself to the treatment of children's diseases. He was director of the Kaiser und Kaiserin Friedrich Kinderkrankenhaus, which he founded in Berlin with the assistance of Rudolf Virchow in 1890. The Berlin Poliklinik für Kinderkrankheiten was also established in the metropolis through his efforts. He was also the founder and editor-in-chief of the *Archiv für Kinderheilkunde* in 1880, in collaboration with Monti and Herz in Stuttgart." [Wikip.].

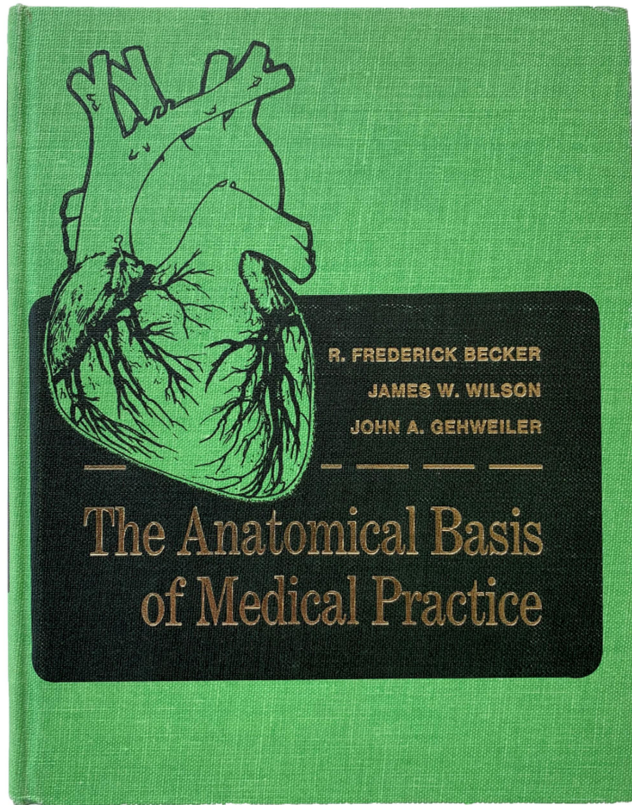

First Edition. "At multiple places in the text, the authors used sexually suggestive and "cheeky" comments about women. A small fraction of the illustrations were stylized, posed female nude photographs purchased from California photographer Peter Gowland. These photographs, of a type typically seen in Playboy centerfolds or "pin-up girl" calendars, produced a firestorm of controversy. The book was criticized in the press and in reviews in scholarly journals, and a boycott was organized by the Association of Women in Science. The publisher received negative feedback from consumers, and the book was

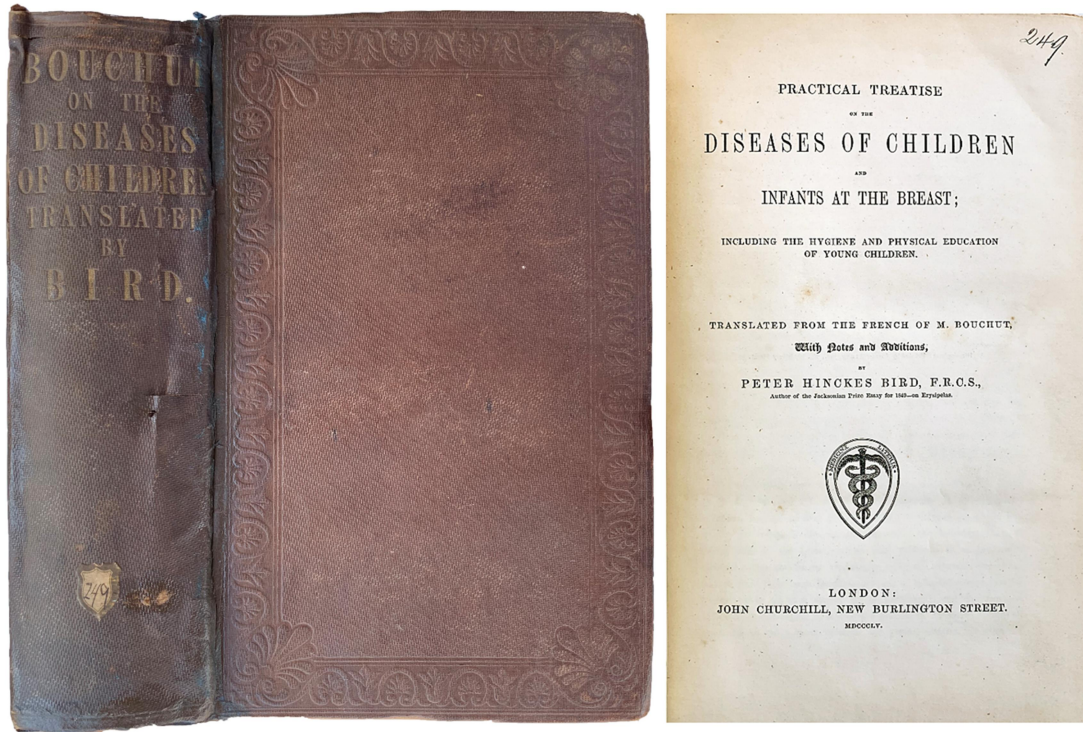


withdrawn from the market. The book is now a minor collector's item. Professors Becker and Wilson vigorously responded. They laid blame for the debacle on the publisher and also claimed they were the victims of a witch hunt by feminists. The *Anatomical Basis of Medical Practice* appeared as the women's movement became part of the American popular consciousness. It was also an era in which the public began to grapple with how to define pornography. Professor Becker and his coauthors thought that they were writing a witty, engaging, and funny book. Their detractors thought the book denigrated women." – Halperin.

PREFACE: "Perhaps we should have included photographs of garden-variety, American males and females who have let their physiques go to pot. Instead, we used female models as model females. The student will see the ordinary specimen every day. Only on rare occasions will the attractive, well-turned specimen appear before him for consultation. He should be prepared for this pleasant shock. For the growing ranks of female medics, we included the body beautiful of a robust, healthy male. We are sorry that we cannot make available the addresses of the young ladies who grace our pages. Our wives burned our little address books at our last barbecue get-together." (p. vii).

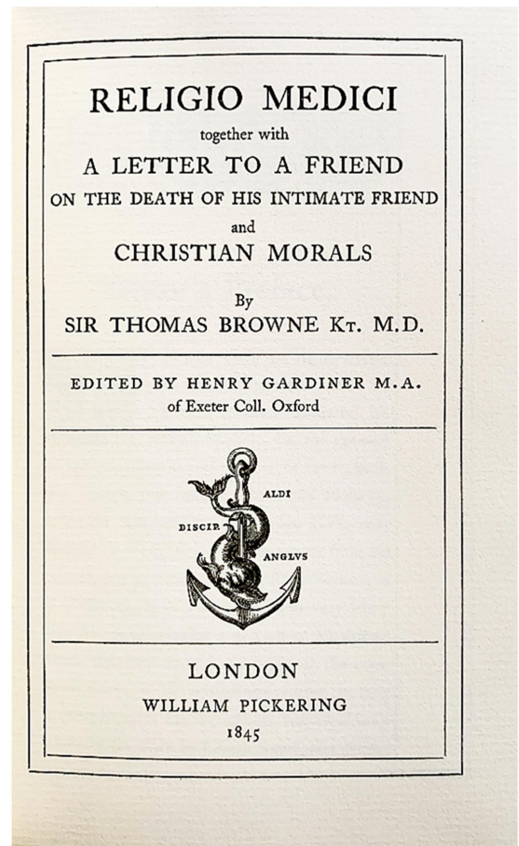
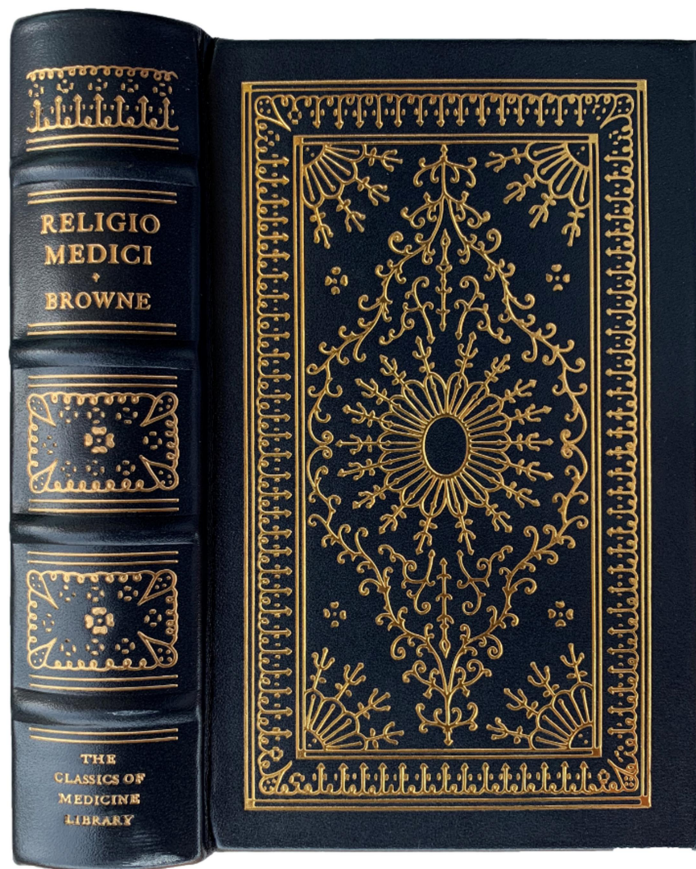

"Ernest Bouchut . . ., a Paris graduate of 1842 and physician to the Hôpital des enfants maladies (1872), was a pioneer in the use of the ophthalmoscope in the diagnosis of nervous diseases (1865) and of jurisprudence of death . . . His *Manual pratique* of 1845, treats of the hygiene and nutrition of infancy, the semeiology of infantile diseases, after the manner of Billard, with sections on diseases of the mouth, abdomen, nose, larynx, chest, exanthemata and skin diseases, eyes and rickets, illustrated by medical cases." Dewees attended the University of Pennsylvania, earning his diploma in 1789. He was extremely famous, a specialist in obstetrics, such that "no parturient woman of the time considered herself safe in other hands." [Kelly]. Dewees became adjunct professor at the University of Pennsylvania in 1825 and professor in 1834.

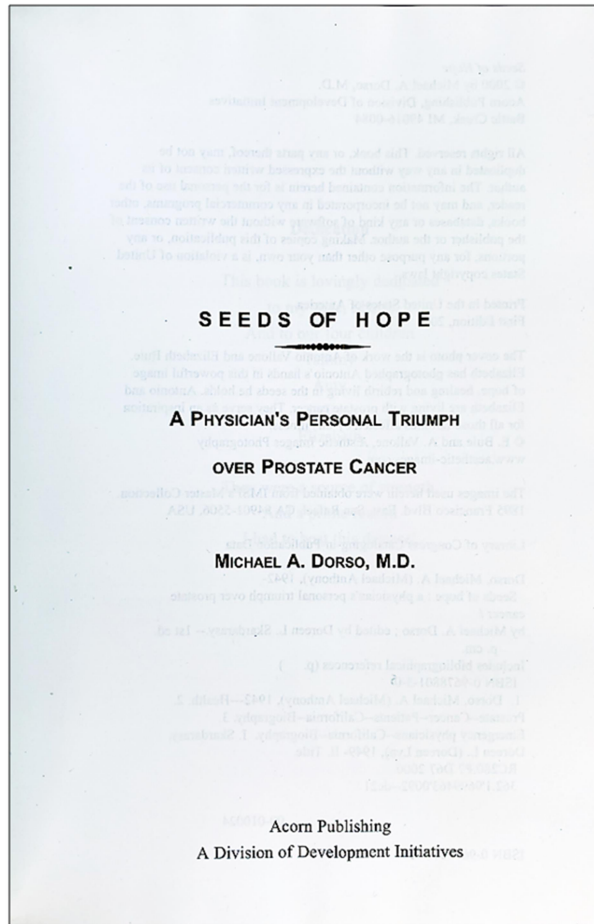
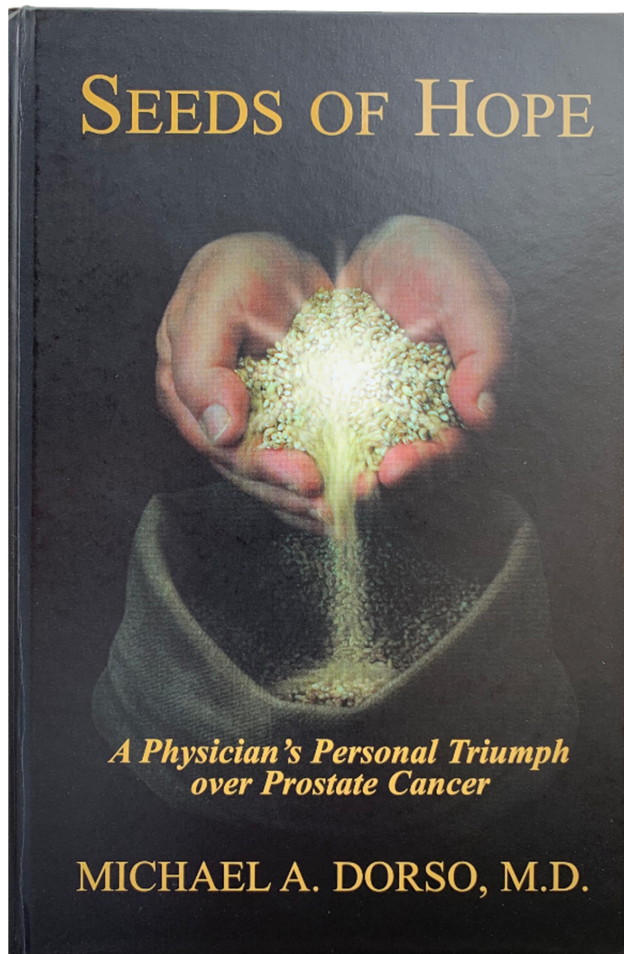

Dick was a professor of Clinical Medicine, Rush Medical College, Chciago. "Dick studied scarlet fever whilst serving the Army Medical Corps during World War I. Dick continued with his research into scarlet fever following the war, and in 1923, in collaboration with his wife Gladys Rowena Dick, managed to locate the cause of the disease in a toxin produced by a strain of Streptococcus bacteria. Using this, they were able to create an antitoxin for treatment and a non-toxic vaccine for immunization." [Wikip.]

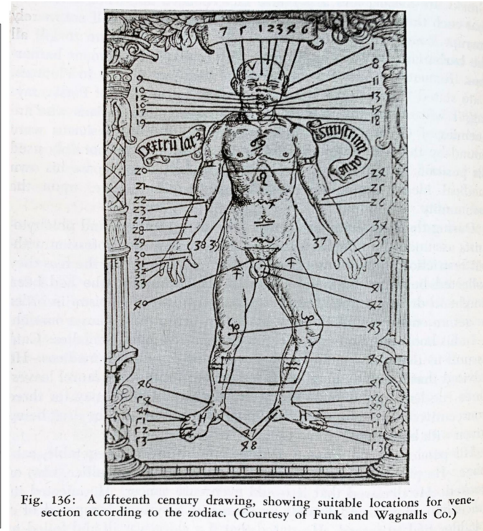
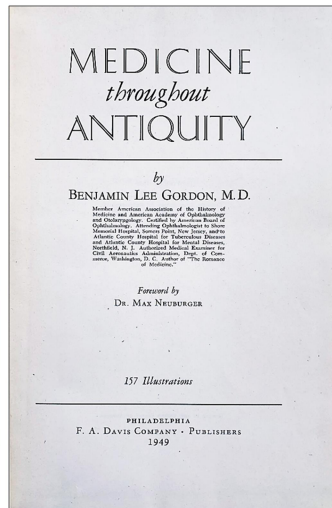
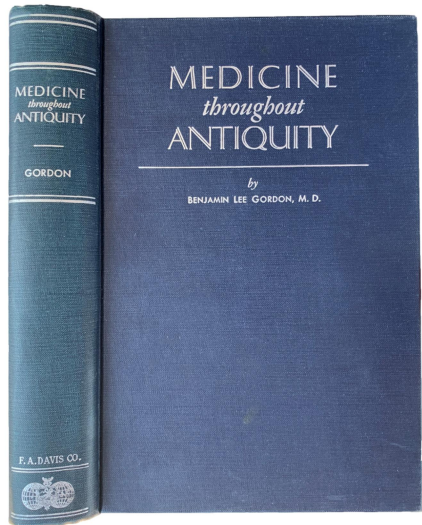
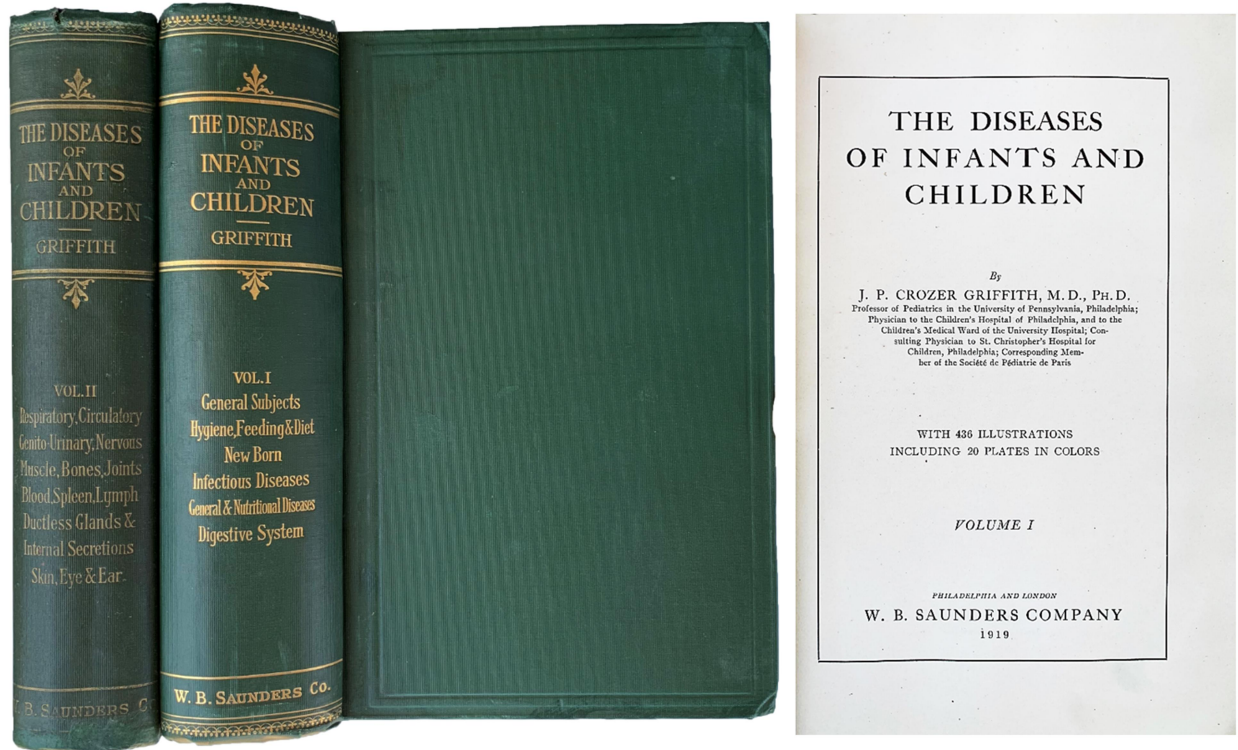


Fig. 136: A fifteenth century drawing, showing suitable locations for venesection according to the zodiac. (Courtesy of Funk and Wagnalls Co.)

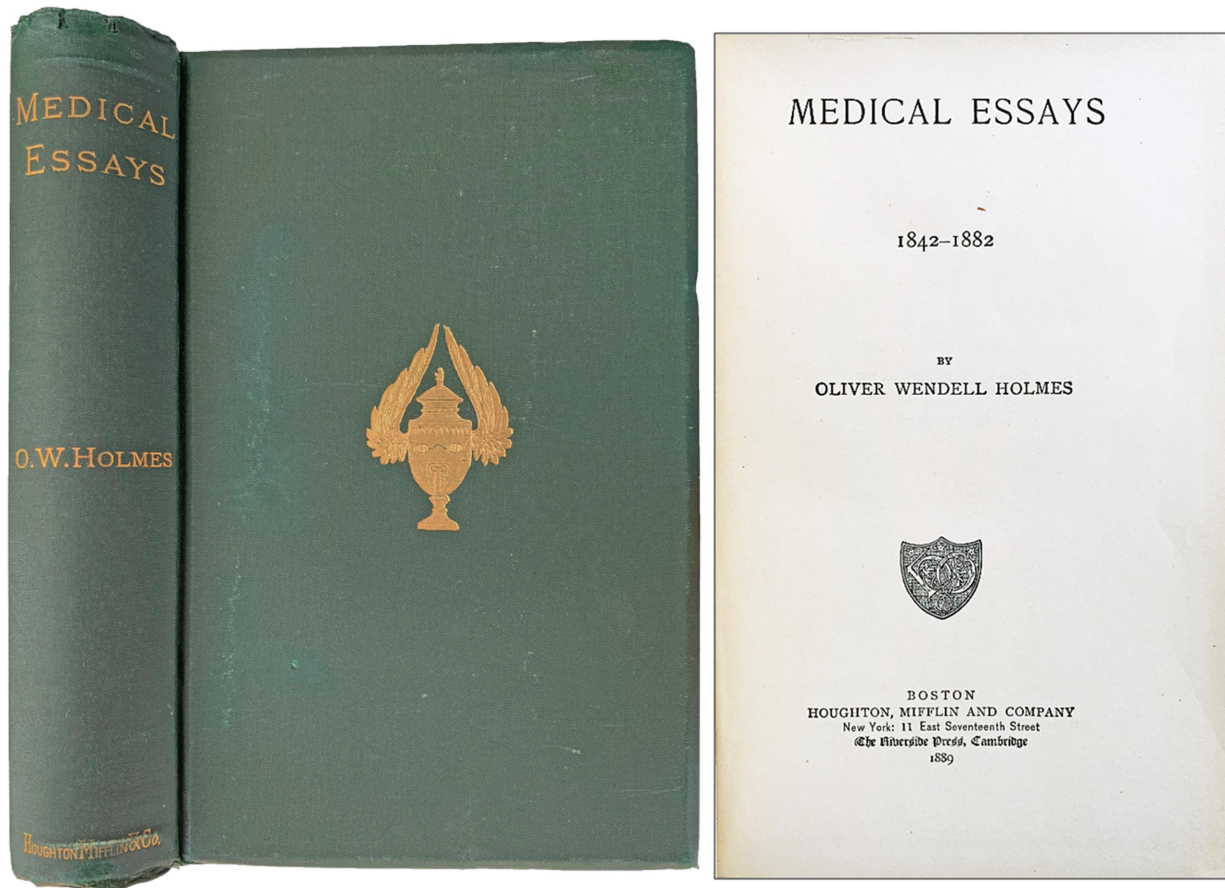
Henoeh was a student of Johann Lukas Schönlein (1793-1864), and a nephew of Moritz Heinrich Romberg (1795-1873), taught at the Berlin University (1868-1894). Garrison writes of his "masterly series of essays on children's diseases (1861-68) and his lectures on pediatrics (1881, this work). The Schönlein-Henoeh purpura is named for him ("The eponym Schönlein's is sometimes used in place of the term Schönlein-Henoeh when the rheumatoid pain and cutaneous lesions are predominant.").

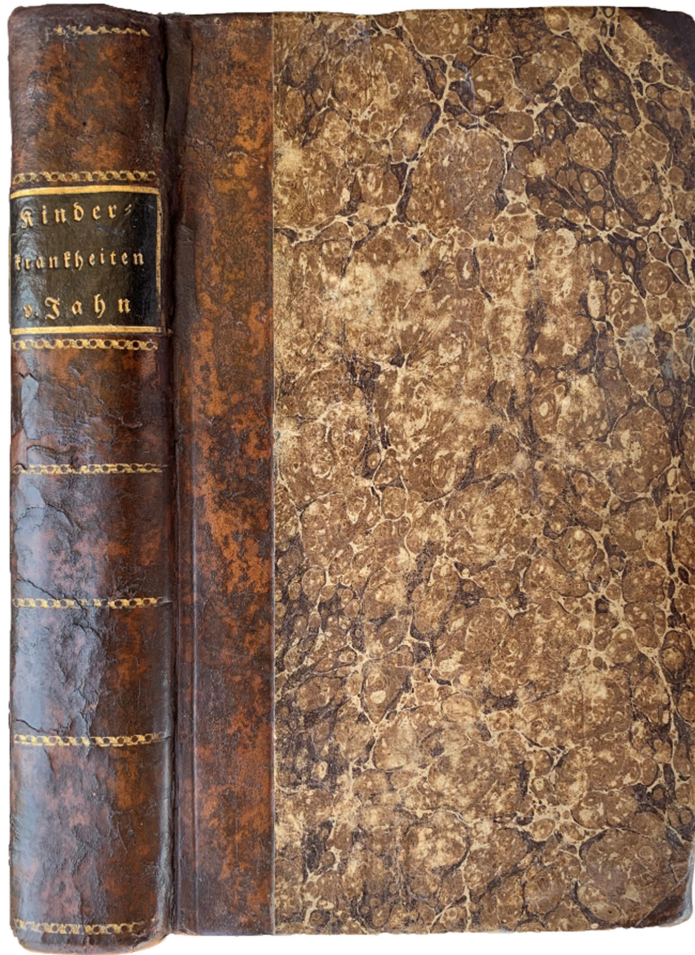

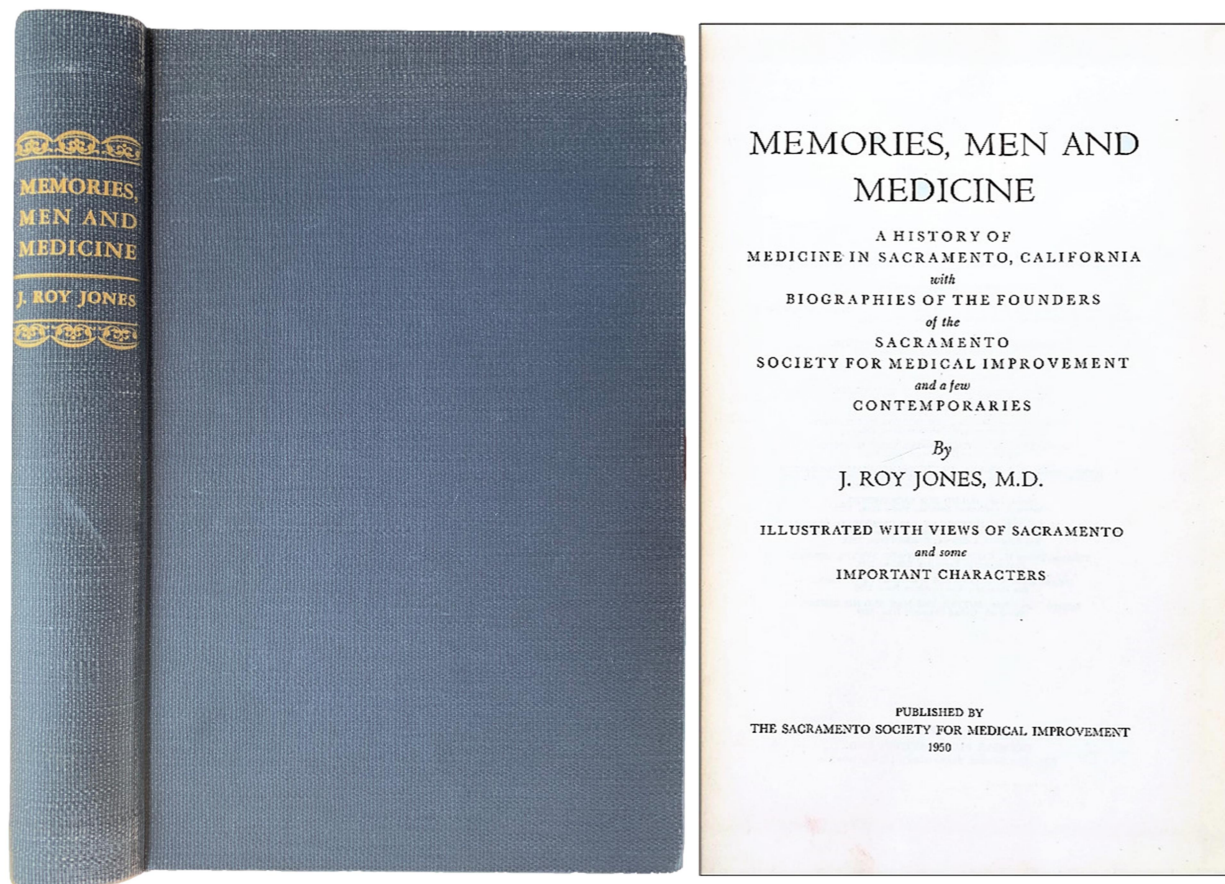
First edition. The present book deals in particular with the birth, nutrition and education of children as well as various childhood diseases, all based on Brownian medicine. John Brown, of Scotland, developed the Brunonian system of medicine (1780), a theoretical approach of medical diagnosis and treatment that regards disorders as caused by defective or excessive excitation.

Nicolaus Friedrich Jahn (1766-1813), son of a pharmacist, was born and worked in Meinigen as a general practitioner and court physician to the Duchy



of Saxe-Meiningen. He earned his medical degree from the University of Jena (1787). His focus was on practical medicine, obstetrics and paediatrics. Jahn fell victim to a typhoid epidemic that was rampant in 1813.

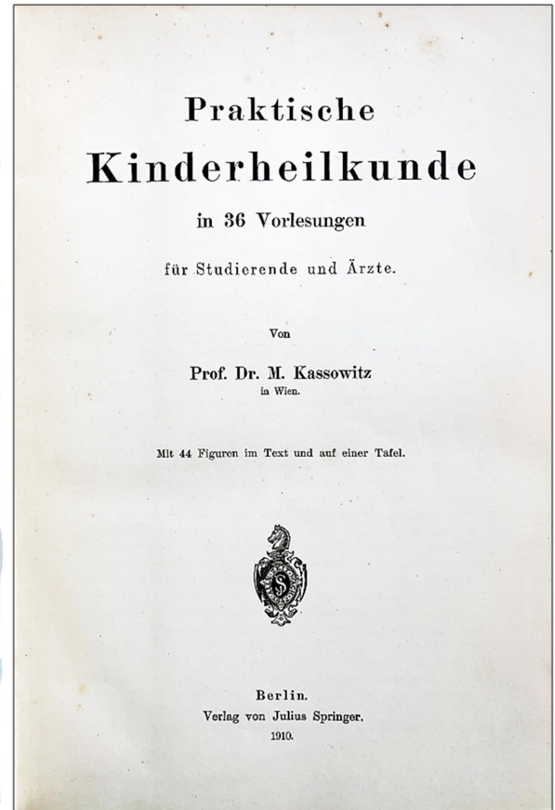
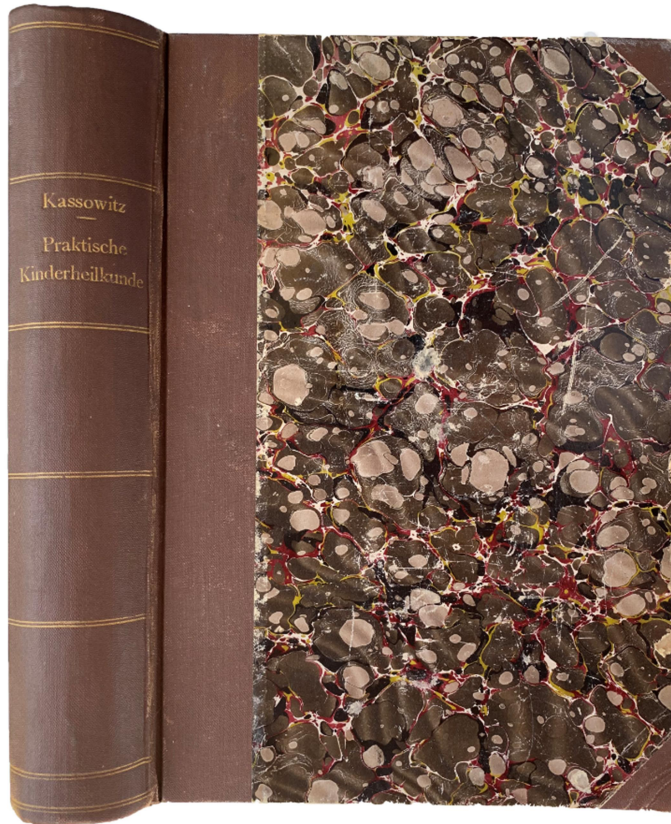

First edition. Kassowitz dealt with the study of hereditary syphilis and the pathophysiology of rickets. To treat this, he first gave the children phosphorus in oil, and later doses of cod liver oil. He described the healing effect of his medicine in the phosphorus treatment of rickets. The fact that cod-liver oil contained vitamin D, and healing power, wasn't discovered until 1919 by Kurt Huldschinsky.

Max Kassowitz, Austrian pediatrician, was born in Bratislava, Slovakia. He took his doctorate at the University of Vienna in 1863. In 1872 Kassowitz began work at the First Public Children's Institute, Vienna, and from 1869 worked as a physician. By 1881 he was the successor to his mentor, and former director, Leopold Max Politzer. In 1891 Kassowitz was appointed University of Vienna professor of pediatrics, where he remained until his retirement in 1906.



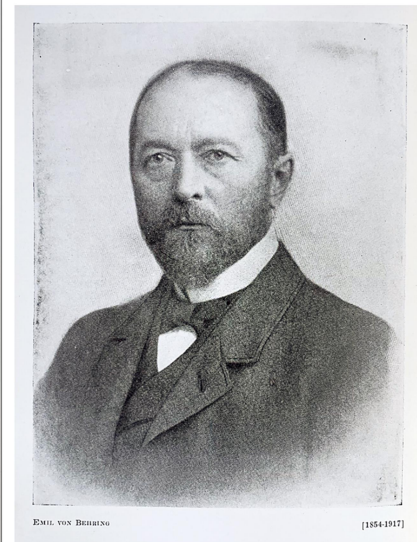
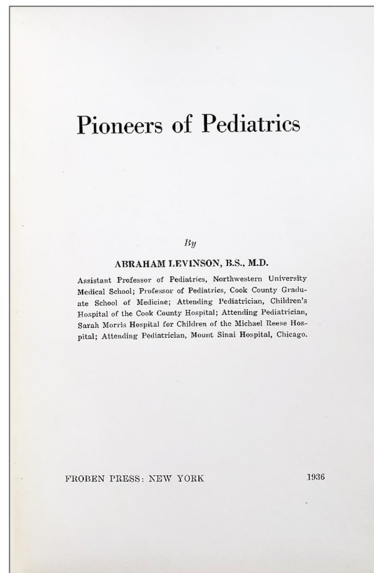
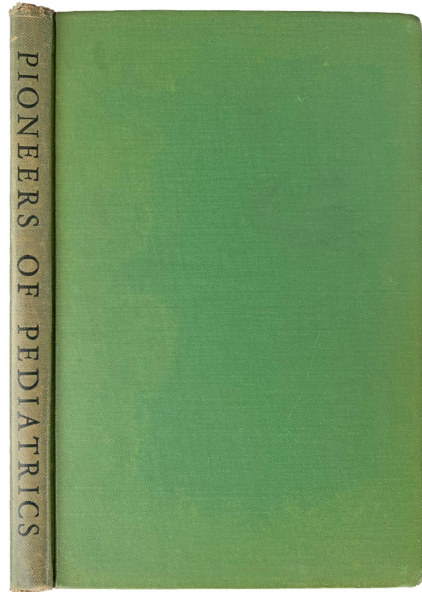

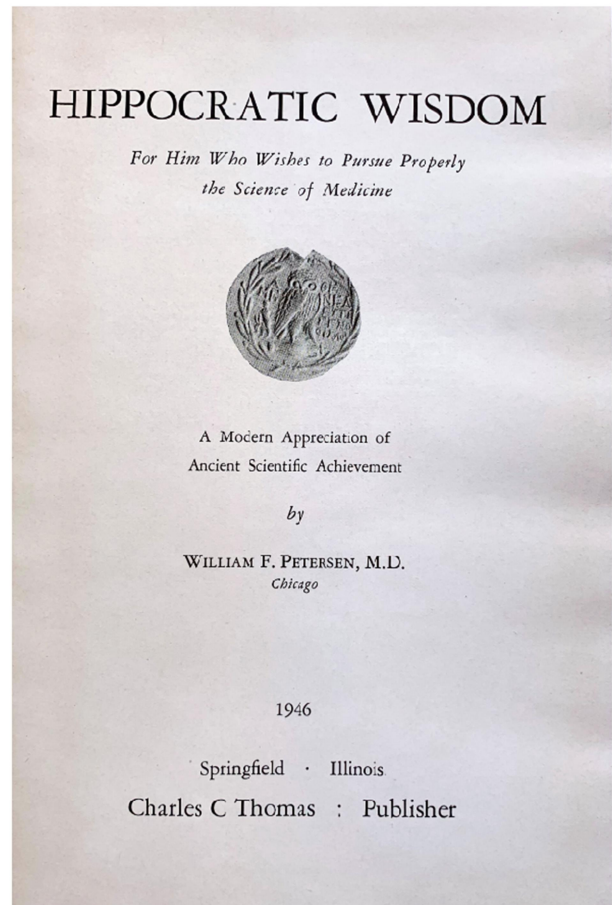
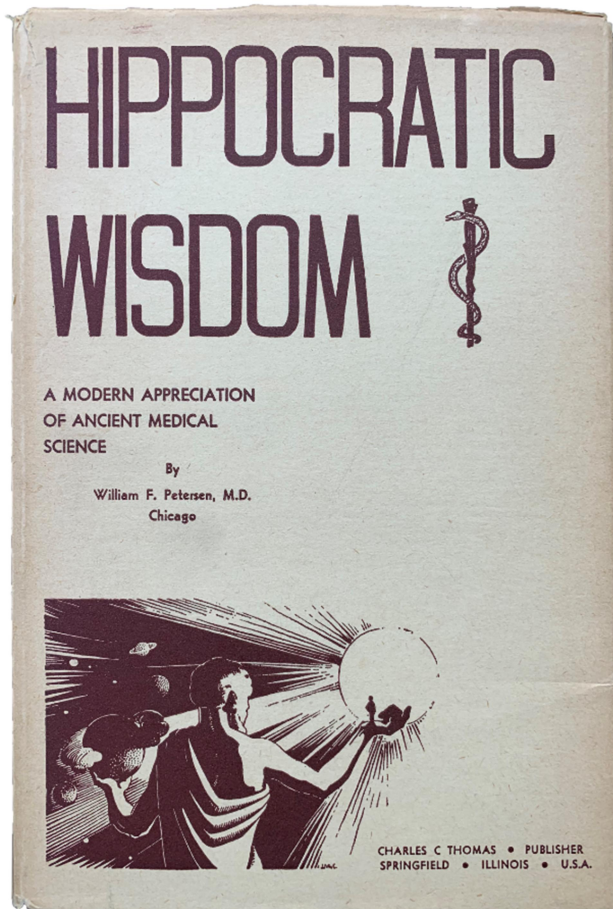
Albrecht Peiper was a son of the dermatologist, pioneer pediatrician and director of the University Children's Hospital Greifswald Erich Peiper (1856-1938). Albrecht Peiper studied at Greifswald, Freiburg i. Br. and Munich Medicine. After graduation in 1914, and serving in the World War I, Peiper received his pediatric training at the Children's Hospital of the University of Berlin. From 1924 he was working at this clinic as a senior physician. In 1937 he joined the NSDAP. In 1943 he became the chair of paediatrics at the University of Greifswald and Deputy Director of the University Children's Hospital. His text on sexology was considered the first written in the west. He dealt with aspects of sex as related to anatomy, reproduction, desire, and impotence or infertility. He describes hermaphrodites. Some of his text deals with the birth of weak or strong children as well their education.
