Intended specially for Bowling Greens and Putting Greens, to act as a turf smoothing iron, and where the use of a heavy roller is not needed or advisable.

The iron Roller is also a very valuable attachment for use on soft, spongy, mossy, or uneven lawns, and does not appreciably add to the labour of driving the Machine.

This illustration shows the Machine as it appears when **OUT OF GEAR** and in the proper position for running it over gravel walks or rough and uneven ground. When moving it in this way, there is no unnecessary wear of the driving pinions, all risk of damaging the cutting knives is avoided, and the Machine can be pushed over the ground with very little labour—a great advantage, especially on **GOLF LINKS**.



**II. BYE-LAWS , By order of the Magistrates of the Royal Burgh of Selkirk, From and after the date of publication hereof, the following Regulations and orders, shall be strictly observed, as bye-laws, within said Burgh. Selkirk 13<sup>th</sup> January 1820. £55**

BY ORDER of the MAGISTRATES of the  
**ROYAL BURGH OF SELKIRK,**

From and after the Date of the Publication hereof, the following  
**REGULATIONS, AND ORDERS,**  
Shall be strictly observed, as BYE-LAWS, within the said Burgh.

I. That no Carpets shall be beat, or dusted on the streets, or over any Window, or stair, in any street, or lane, within the Burgh, after nine o'clock in the morning, under the penalty of One Shilling.

II.— That no person shall throw foul water, or filth of any kind, from any window, or stair, in any street, lane, or close whatever, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Six pence.

III.— That no person shall place Flower-pots, or other articles of that nature, on the outside of upper-windows without being properly railed in to prevent the same falling into the street; to the danger of passengers, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence.

IV.— That no dung, or filth shall be lodged in any public street, or lane on any account whatever, nor by the side of any public street, or lane, under the penalty of Five Shillings.

V.— That all dung, filth, or other nuisance, brought into the public streets, for the purpose of being carried to the fields, shall, if possible, be removed therefrom the same day, and at all events, on the day following; and that none shall be allowed to lie on the streets on a Sunday, nor on a Fair day, on any account whatever, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence.

VI.— That no Swine shall be allowed to go at large in any Street, or Lane, under the penalty of Two Shillings.

VII.— That in times of Frost, no Slides shall be allowed on any of the Streets, Lanes, or Closes, of the Burgh, or sides of the same, and those offending shall be liable to a fine of Two Shillings and Sixpence, or Imprisonment, as shall be awarded by the Magistrates.

VIII.— That no Bone Fires, or fires of any kind, shall be allowed to be made at the Cross, or on any part of the Public Streets, at any time, under a penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence, or Imprisonment, as shall be awarded by the Magistrates.

IX.— That no Carts, whether loaded or unloaded, shall be allowed to stand on the Streets, or on the sides thereof, except when loading or unloading, and if standing yoked, there shall be some person at the Horse's heads to prevent them running off; or otherwise endangering the Inhabitants all under the pains of the Act of Parliament,—or under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence, as the Magistrates shall award.

X.— That no Horses shall be drove through the Streets to water, but shall be rode or led quietly to and from the same, by persons able to manage them properly; and having sufficient Bridles, or Halters, for that purpose on each Horse,—

— it being expressly prohibited to set Boys on them, unable to command them, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence, or Imprisonment.

XI.— That no article of any kind shall be washed or cleaned in the trough of any of the public wells, under the penalty of One Shilling.

XII.— That no Cattle brought into the Town for Slaughter, shall be driven through any Street or Lane, without being under proper management, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence.

XIII.— That no Stones, Wood, or other Materials for Building, shall be laid upon the Streets, or in any Lane, or Close, without the special leave of the Dean of Guild, and subject to be removed at their pleasure, and if the Dean of Guild shall require it, the space occupied by such materials shall be railed in; and that no materials, or rubbish, shall be allowed to remain on the Streets, after the building is finished, under the penalty of Five Shillings.

XIV.— That all Persons allowing their Chimney-vents to get dirty, and thereby to take fire, so as to incur the risk of damage to themselves, and neighbours, shall be subject to a penalty of Five Shillings, unless they are able to instruct, that the vent has been swept within Six Weeks preceeding.

XV.— That all Ruinous Chimneys, or other buildings, shall be repaired by the proprietors, so as not to endanger the inhabitants; and any proprietor, after being required by orders from the Dean of Guild, to repair the same, failing so to do, within a given time, shall be subject to a penalty of Ten Shillings and Sixpence.

XVI.— That no persons, not being lawful owners, or occupiers of property, shall put Horses, or other Bestial out to pasture in the night-time, without the leave of some such owner or occupier; and no person shall put any Horses, or other Bestial out to pasture either by night or day on the open and uninclosed lands within the Burgh-roads, without either properly herding or tethering the same, —all under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence, besides the Lawful reward, and damages to those on whose property they may trespass, and all expences.

XVII.— That no persons shall fire Guns, Pistols, or other Fire arms on or near to the Streets, Lanes, Closes, or Roads, or in any Garden, Stackyard, or other place within the Burgh, or within the Burgh-roads, unless for the destroying of birds &c. in the necessary protection of their property, and in this case they shall not entrust the doing this to Boys, or Persons who may not proceed with proper Caution, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence, or Imprisonment, as shall be awarded by the Magistrates.

XVIII.— That any person failing to pay the above fines, on an order by the Magistrates, shall, over and above, be liable in the expence of any prosecution, which may be raised for the recovery thereof.

The MAGISTRATES appoint these BYE-LAWS, and REGULATIONS to be printed, and posted in the most public places of the Town, that none may pretend Ignorance thereof; and the Dean of Guild, Procurator Fiscal, Burgh Officers, and Constables, are specially charged to see that the same be strictly observed.

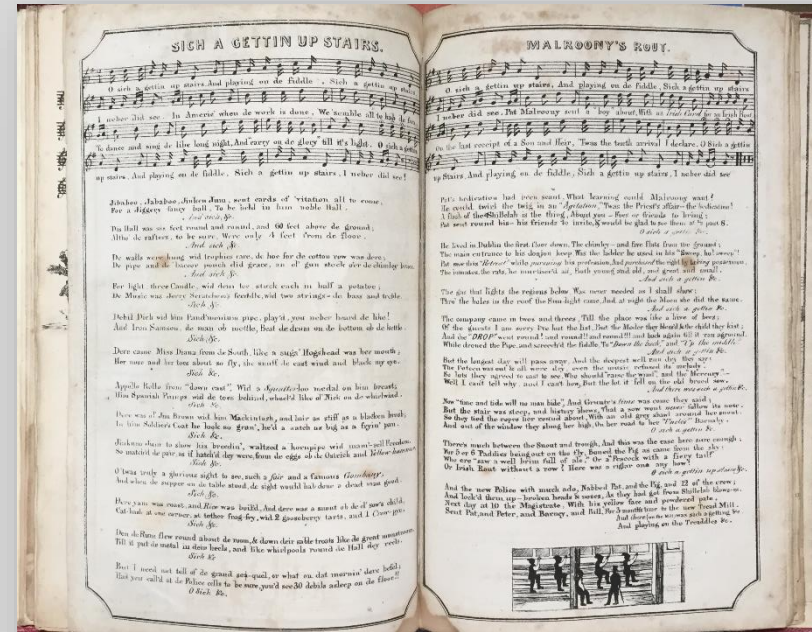

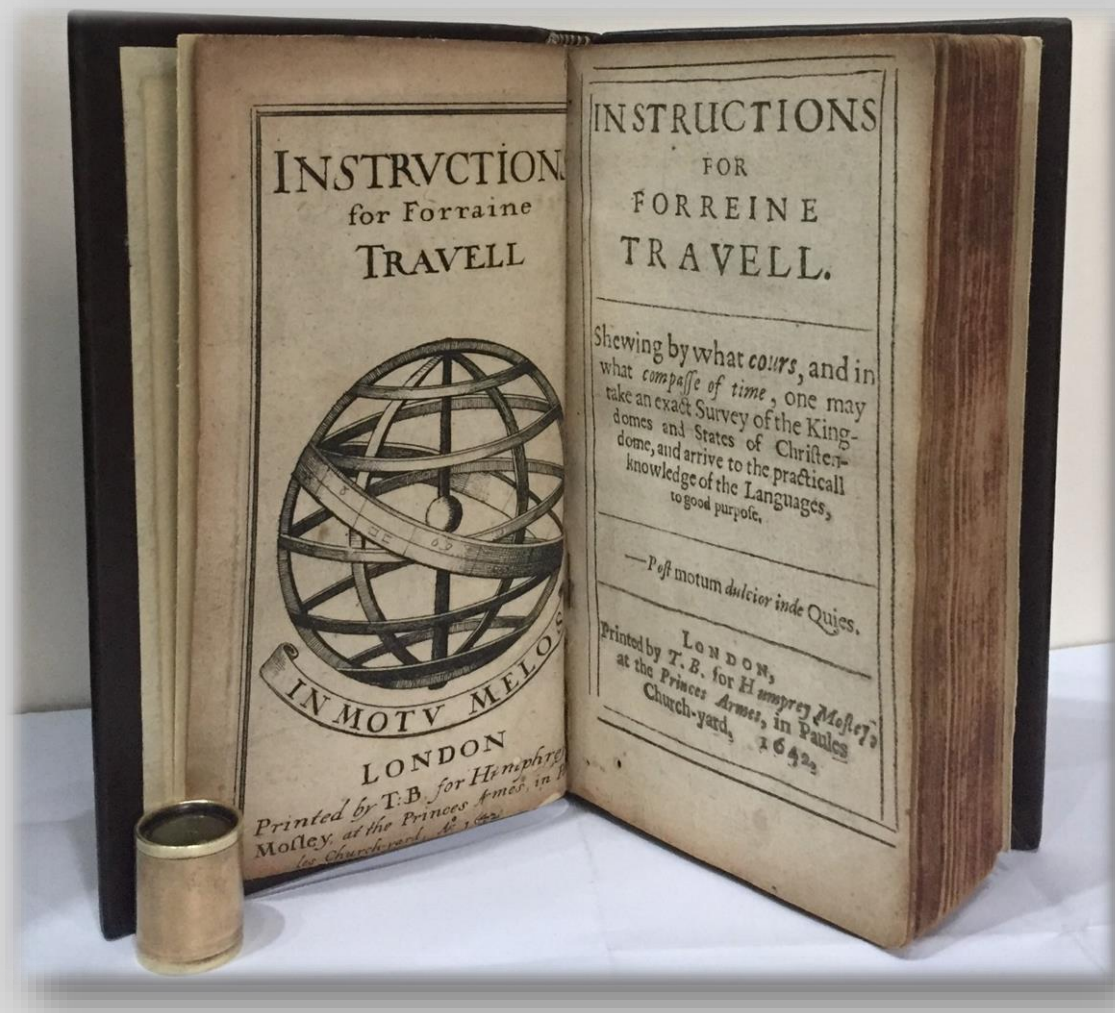

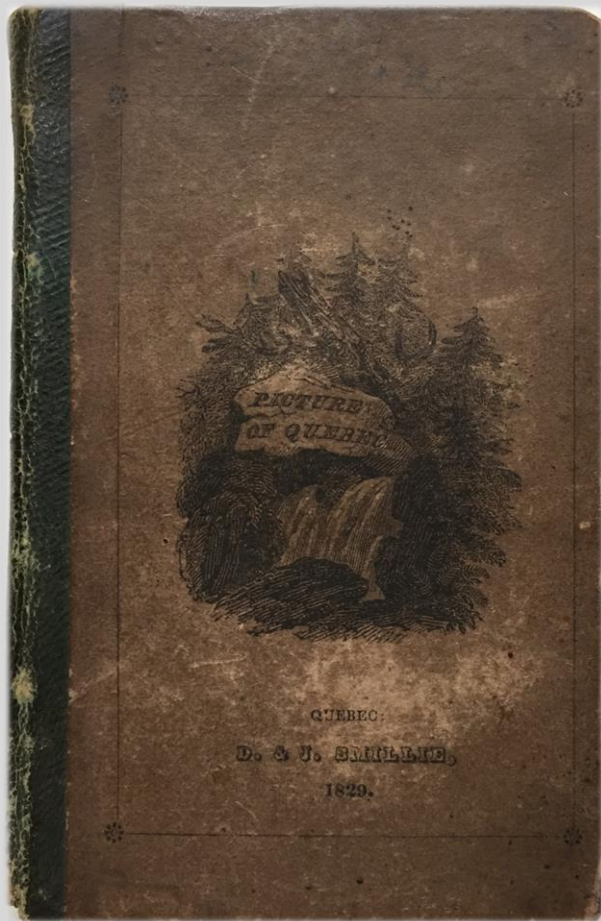
