

- 3. The auctioneer may, without giving any reason therefore, refuse to accept the bidding of any person or persons.
- 4. Each bid shall be an advance determined by the auctioneer.
- 5. The auctioneer may require the successful bidder to pay forthwith the whole or any part of the purchase price.
- 6. Lots are in all respects at the risk of the buyer at the fall of the hammer.
- 7. The successful bidder shall be deemed to be the buyer and be personally liable unless it has been agreed in writing at the time of registration and prior to the sale that a bidder is acting as agent on behalf of a third party and that such third party is acceptable to Peter Arnold Pty Ltd.



Quarto, frontispiece portrait, 4 folding charts, 2 folding plans and a plate of the breadfruit; finely bound in period-style half russia, spine richly gilt, over original marbled boards. Frontispiece lightly foxed.


Important squatting memoir, including an account of an exploratory expedition Brodribb led into Gippsland in 1841, which reached and named Port Albert, the La Trobe River and Lake Wellington. \$400-500

15 BURKE, Keast, editor. With horse and Morse in Mesopotamia. The story of Anzacs in Asia. Sydney, 1927. Quarto, with numerous photographic plates and text illustrations, map on endpapers; original cloth-backed labelled boards (slightly marked). With, loosely enclosed, a pencilled letter presenting the book from 'Mick', who identifies himself in four of the photographs and notes that he has marked on the endpaper map (very neatly) his inward and outward routes. \$400-500

16 BURNEY, James. A chronological history of the discoveries in the South Pacific Ocean, from the year 1579 [to the year 1764]. London, 1803-17. [With, in the second volume] An account of a voyage performed by Captain Flinders and Mr Bass by which the existence of a strait separating Van Dieman's [sic] Land from the continent of New Holland was ascertained. Together 9 volumes quarto, in contemporary calf with uniform rebacking, the spines fully gilt in period style, and 2 large folio atlases in contemporary calf rebacked retaining the original and similar triple labels (endpapers of third voyage atlas stained). Some scattered foxing and browning, a few slight marginal stains.


A desirable set of the official accounts of Cook's momentous three voyages, attractively bound, with Kippis's *Life*, the 'Death of Cook' plate in the third voyage atlas, and with the second voyage plates and maps bound as a separate atlas, the plates all unfolded and fine, dark impressions.

Large inscription on verso of title of the first volume by the original owner, Captain John Morgan Fortescue, R.N., dated January 1785, bleeding through to recto, the text volumes very good otherwise; atlas plates waterstained (the 2 charts unaffected) and a few with a little marginal worming. Manuscript compass dial contemporary and probably by Fortescue loosely enclosed. \$3000–4000

**29** DALRYMPLE, Sir John. Memoirs of Great Britain and Ireland . . . A new edition. London, 1790. Three volumes octavo; contemporary tree calf.

An attractive set, each volume signed at the head of the title by Alexander Fraser Tytler, Dalrymple's fellow Scottish advocate and man of letters, with his occasional marginal notes in a minute hand. An appendix contains 'An account of an intended expedition into the South Seas by private persons in the late war', which narrates the author's attempt in 1779 to persuade some merchants of Glasgow to organize a privateering expedition against Spain into the Pacific – including several references to New Holland and the discoveries of Cook. Ferguson 78.

30 DAMPIER, William. A collection of voyages. London, 1729. Four volumes octavo, with 63 maps and plates; contemporary calf (skilfully repaired, one label lacking, two others a little deficient). Map of the East Indies in the first volume laid down to repair a tear, occasional browning and light foxing, but a good set.

The scarce collected edition of Dampier's voyages, which adds William Funnell's highly critical account of the last voyage in the *St George*, the voyage of Lionel Wafer, and William Hacke's edition of the privateering voyages of Cowley, Sharp, Wood and Roberts. \$5000-6000

- 31 DAMPIER, William, A collection of voyages, 1729, another set, in contemporary mottled calf (spines worn, but original labels still present except one numbering piece, one board detached). Some browning, margins of second title-leaf darkened, a good complete set, well worthy of restoration. Armorial shelf label in each volume of Sir Gilbert Elliot, Lord Minto (1722-1777), Scottish statesman and poet, Treasurer of the Navy from 1770 to 1777. \$3000-3500

New South Wales land grant by purchase to Henry Dangar, dated 23 April 1841, the estate in the Hunter Valley to be known as Brycefield: a printed document on vellum completed in manuscript, folio, signed by Governor George Gipps and Colonial Secretary E.Deas Thomson (and the poet Henry Halloran, a clerk in the Survey Department); folded to agenda format, with paper seal and attached receipt. With a similar document granting land in the town of Eden, Twofold Bay, to James Rixon, a pioneer of the district, dated 9 June 1849 and signed by Governor Charles Fitzroy, Colonial Secretary Thomson and Henry Halloran. With a document on paper, granting land on Pitt St., Sydney to the businessman Charles Appleton, dated 6 June 1835 and signed by Governor Richard Bourke and Colonial Secretary Alexander Macleay. \$800-1000
- 34 DE CASTELLA, Hubert. John Bull's vineyard. Australian sketches. Melbourne, 1886. Octavo, with 4 plates; contemporary black calf retaining the printed front wrapper, spine gilt-decorated, gilt edges. A fine copy.

One of the small number of books on wine-making in colonial Victoria, rare in this condition. \$1000-1500

**35** DIEFFENBACH, Ernest. Travels in New Zealand. London, 1843. Two volumes octavo, with 5 lithographed plates, 4 of them tinted; contemporary calf, spines fully gilt with red and green labels. The plates foxed, but an attractive set. \$400-500



Two volumes large quarto, with 9 steel-engraved views after William Westall, complete with half-titles, and elephant folio atlas with 11 double-page and 5 full-page charts, 4 plates of coastal views and 10 botanical plates after Ferdinand Bauer; well bound in uniform period-style calf, spines fully gilt. A little foxing on the text plates, with offsetting, some of the charts a little creased and one slightly shaved, light tidemark on the coastal views and the first botanical plate, inconspicuous stamped initials at foot of each chart and plate.

A good set, the text volumes cleaner than usual, the atlas in its most desirable form with the charts unfolded and all in the original Nicol issue of 1814.





The finely engraved charts recording the discoveries of Flinders and Bass, in 1798-99, on their coastal surveys of New South Wales, including present-day Victoria, and famously, their circumnavigation of Tasmania, which finally established its insularity. Flinders's Observations on the coasts of Van Diemen's Land, on Bass Strait and its islands and on part of the coasts of New South Wales, intended to accompany the charts of the late discoveries in those countries, was published concurrently. As Wantrup remarks, 'the three separately issued charts are, without doubt, an essential adjunct to the book. No collector who was so fortunate as to obtain a copy of this most rare book could rest satisfied until he had also acquired the three charts it was designed to accompany'. The set is no less rare on the market than the book.







Signed on the blank preliminary 'Arthur William Young, May 4,1881' and with a pencilled note, probably also in his hand, 'from John Gould's library.' It was on this day in May 1881 that Puttick & Simpson auctioned the library of the recently deceased Gould and Buller's work was lot 204, described as bound in half morocco gilt; the original circular lotting label inscribed with this number is still present at the top of the spine. The purchaser, A. W. Young, a London lawyer, formed a magnificent library, including a Gutenberg Bible, which was one of the books he gave to Cambridge University Library in 1933 – a benefaction described by the librarian as 'probably the most valuable that has been received from any private individual in the long course of the Library's history'.

Gould's great illustrated bird books were Buller's principal models for his book and the two were well-acquainted: Gould was amongst the Fellows of the Royal Society who nominated Buller for the coveted Fellowship and he offered him the last set in stock of his *Birds of Australia* on liberal terms.





The panoramas, formed from up to 6 joined photographs, include two measuring 32 x 182 cm., another 30 x 200 cm., two of 26 x 173 cm., five of 36 x 130 cm. and one 38 x 75 cm. Five are views of the city and harbour (two dated 1892), one is of the Royal Easter Show, two are of test matches between England and Australia at the Sydney Cricket Ground in 1894 and 1895, and the other is of the Zig Zag Railway. All are uncredited but most if not all are the work of talented photographers employed by the Government Printer.

A few photographs are slightly faded and there is a little foxing on some mounts or backing, but overall the condition is fine. Both in content and presentation these are remarkable albums. \$50,000-60,000






