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



I. AGARDH, C. A. Synopsis algarum Scandinaviæ, adjecta dispositione universali algarum. Lund, ex officina Berlingiana, 1817. 8:0. XL,135 pp. Late 20th-century black half morocco with gilt lettering and two wave-shaped gilt fillets on spine. Top edge sprinkled red. Outer margin of title leaf somewhat browned. A nice copy. 4800 Krok Bibliotheca botanica suecana 28. Carl Adolph Agardh is widely held as the founder of scientific algology and his classification system for algae is presented for the first time in this work. Shortly thereafter he started to develop a more comprehensive system for algae, but only two volumes of that work (1820 and 1828) were published, and it was never

completed. The printed dedication in the book is addressed to Agardh's patron and friend, the Swedish foreign minister Lars von Engeström.

2. (ALMQUIST, C. J. L.) Parjumouf. Saga ifrån Nya Holland. Stockholm, A. Gadelius, 1817. 12:0. 98 pp. Elegant green varnished half calf with raised bands and gilt spine (Hedberg). Top edge sprinkled blue. Spine somewhat faded. Several leaves with smaller paper reinforcements close to spine. Occasional spotting and faint dampstains. Amelie Holmström's somewhat cut signature on title page.



Almquistiana 202. Ferguson Bibliography of Australia Addenda 691a. "Parjumouf. A story from New Holland" is probably the first Swedish work of fiction in which the story takes place in Australia, written by one of the most distinguished among Swedish 19th-century authors. Apart from New Holland the new continent is also called "Ulimaroa", a name Almquist probably had found in the writings of the Swedish geographer Daniel Djurberg. Both Cook and Banks had heard the word being used on New Zeeland as a term for Australia.

3. Alphabeth des sourds-muets de naissance. Paris, 1815. 8:0. Engraved title leaf, engraved portrait,4 engraved plates,(I blank) leaf. Sewn as issued in contemporary grey paper wrappers. Front cover with coffee stains which are also somewhat visible on the title leaf. Title leaf and portrait partly browned from dampstaining.

The first two plates are found already in "Alphabet, manuel-figure des sourds-muets de Naissance" (1799-1800), but the figures for the letters s-z, &c and the numbers 1-10, 100 and 1000 are differently made here. With an engraved potrait of Jean Massieu (1772-1846). Massieu was born deaf and dumb but was taught to read and write French by the Abbé Sicard, who was "répétiteur" at the institute for the deaf and dumb in Paris at the time and also developed the first French sign language. His portrait is also known in a variant signed L. A. Bouteloup.

Printed cover with the year 1810 and Landon stated as the publisher, while the title page states Treuttel och Würtz. The title leaf is however a cancel and it seems as if another title leaf dated 1810 has been reused as waste paper, pasted onto the insides of the covers. Pages V-VI in "Avis de l'editeur" is also a cancel. Jean-Baptiste Barjaud (1785-1813) was an author who died at the battle of Leipzig. Charles-Paul Landon (1760-1826) was an artist, art critic and publicist who founded "Journal des arts" in 1799. He was among the exhibitors at the Salon in 1791-1812 and ended his career as a curator at the Louvre. As a journalist and author he made considerable contributions to the fields of art criticism and art history.





Dunn, H. B. Wheatley and Thore Virgin. Signature of the latter, dated 17 May 1918. Adams Catalogue of books printed on the continent of Europe, 1500-1600 B 2264. The German humanist Johannes Boemus (1485-1535) was active in Ulm. E. W. Dahlgren describes his "Omnium gentium mores" - first printed in 1520 - as a geographical compendium which was reprinted numerous times. According to Dahlgren it was a favourite lecture for many readers around Europe for a century. "Omnium gentium mores" is to a large extent a description of the various peoples of the world, and it has therefore been called the first ethnographical work of the early modern age. Virgin collected a large number of editions of this work. The volume is no. 194 in the catalogue of the exhibition "Rariteter ur Virgin-Wistrands boksamling" at Kungliga biblioteket in Stockholm, 1968, and the binding is Spanish according to the Swedish book historian Sten G. Lindberg.

Small stain on front cover, rear cover partly yellowed from sun exposure. Slightly foxed. A more intense rust stain on pp. 69-70. Inscription on front cover: "Kjöbt til militair bibliotheket 1833". A Fine copy.

7500 Sabin A dictionary of books relating to America 4581. First edition of the travels and sojourn of the danish officer Belmann in Brazil 1825-31, when he was active in the Brazilian

army. Back in Denmark he worked as a Portuguese inter-


preter and later became Spanish consul in Helsingör.

Densely panelled boards with three borders containing pilaster motifs. Spine and corners finely repaired. Title "Gentium ritus" nicely written in contemporary block letters on the fore edge. Occasional minor spotting. Title leaf with minimal wormhole in margin, small hole with loss of a letter in pp. 21-22. The closing index with faint dampstain at the top. Old owner's inscription in Spanish on title page for an unidentified Jesuit college, occasional notes. Bookplates of G.

Norstedt & söner, 1851. 8:0. (8),199 pp. & 1 folded printed table. Near contemporary black half calf with gilt-ruled spine. Brown sprinkled edges. Spine and joints worn and scratched. Corners bumped. Inkstain in upper outer corner on pp. 185-90. Stamp of Uno H. Lindfors on front flyleaf. Carl Olof Brink (1812-63) was a clerk at the Swedish board of correctional treatment. He also published "Till kongl. maj:t underdånigst afgifven berättelse om Englands straffanstalter och fångvård" [A report on the prison establishments and correctional treatment in England ...] (1853) and "Historisk öfversigt af fängelse-systemerna samt svenska lagstiftningen rörande fängelserna" [A historical outline of the prison systems and the swedish prison legislation] (1848).

(6),17,(1) pp. Sewn as issued in contemporary beautiful red paste paper wrappers. Contemporary handsome handwritten title on front cover. Title leaf soiled in upper corner. Soil stains in upper margin on the third page. Occasional minor spotting. Date of disputation is not filled in. A nice copy from Ericsberg castle.

Marklin Catalogus disputationum 192. A facsimile edition with a translation into Swedish and commentaries by Harald Elovsson was published in 1958. According to Elovsson, the celebratory poem signed "T. T." at the end is written by Ekebom's friend, the poet and philosopher Thomas Thorild. Johan Simmingsköld has also contributed a verse. Dedicated to Carl Fredric Scheffer and with a celebratory poem directed to him. With an english motto taken from Pope's "Iliad". Treats "the political-historical problems of the eternal peace" (our translation). Ekebom was librarian in Gothenburg.



Bibliotheca danica supplement 401. In this pamphlet, Marie Engelbrecht Stokkenbeck claims that she was born in Hamburg in 1759 and that she came to Copenhagen at the

age of 15. After a rash marriage she soon left Copenhagen to escape her husband. Since she had been married, employment was hard to find, a situation which gave her the idea to pose and dress as a man. She made several tours on the continent as a tailor's apprentice before returning to Copenhagen, where her true identity eventually was revealed. Christian VII then gave her a charter, which is reprinted here, to work as a tailor in the city and also to keep an apprentice. In her foreword, Engelbrecht writes that she would not recommend following her example, and adds that she hopes that her biography will not encourage anyone to do so.

Small dampstain in lower corner on last two leaves. A good copy. 4800 Lidén Catalogus disputationum 6. With a printed dedication to Bengt Oxenstierna the younger. An early swedish treatise on the Quran and "Muhammeds bedrägeri" [the delusions of Mohammed]. Johan Esberg (1665-1734) was, among other things, professor in oriental languages at Uppsala University and eventually became superintendent on Gotland in 1711. In a letter to the pope in 1692, he offers to publically declare himself a catholic, a declaration he later explains to have made "in delirio".



defects, faint inkstains on inside of rear cover. Minor chipping. Browning throughout with insignificant faint soiling. A good copy. Last page with a woodcut of the garden maze, preceded by the poem "Reflections on walking in the maze in Hampton-Court gardens". The poem had reportedly been previously published in "The British magazine" 1747.

Foreword by Hughes dated London 1798. The original, "Treatise on the Brewing of Beer and Porter and on the Drying and Qualities of Malt", was printed this year. The translator, Carolina Weltzin (1754-1812) is best known for her cookbooks, but was also one of the more prolific translators of the time. Wilhelm Bogislaus von Platen (1786-1852) was a chamberlain and owner of Övrabyborg manor in Skåne.

First volume with some unpleasant soil stains and a small hole in pp. 127-29. Long tear at bottom of pp. 81-82 in the third volume. Engraved bookplate of Axel Gabriel Oxenstierna, printed in brown with his monogram "AGO". From Eka and Säbylund manors. Fiske Icelandic collection pp. 261-62 for other editions and translations. One of Victor Hugo's first novels. A second edition printed by Lecointe et Durey was published the same year and a revised edition in 1833. Axel Gabriel Oxenstierna af Eka och Lindö (1799-1839) was cabinet chamberlain and eventually a lieutenant colonel in the Swedish army. His widow brought parts of the library at Eka to Säbylund.

The first edition was published in 1659 and a new one in 1672. The work was later reprinted as a supplement to Chetwood's "The voyages dangerous adventures and imminent escapes of Capt. Rich. Falconer", which was published in several editions from 1734 to -69. The preface is dated April 6, 1659 and the printing licence January 9 1663.

A sermon about the shipwreck of "William and John of Ipswich" at Hvaler in Norway in 1648, when many lives were lost. The relation of the accident begins, with its own title page, on p. 53. This title page carries the information: "The second edition corrected and enlarg'd". There is a variant of this edition with some cancelled leaves; for example, the main title leaf in that variant carries the information that it is the second edition.

Occasional minor spotting. Date of disputation 22 (January 1748) added in ink at the time. A very good copy. Lidén Catalogus disputationum 81. Löwendahl China illustrata nova 447. With a printed versified dedication to a number of directors of the Swedish East India Company, Theodor Ankarcrona, Colin Campbell, Thomas Plomgren, Magnus Lagerström, Abraham Grill and Nicolaus Sahlgren, among others, and with a verse to the respondent by the signature "H. G. B.". On the alleged advantages of the chinese culture. The respondent had travelled to China twice as a chaplain on ships belonging to the Swedish East India Company. In his treatise, he argues against the opinion that the Chinese culture has any advantages whatsoever over the European, as Leibnitz, among others, is said to have claimed. Svenonius is especially thorough in his examination of the Chinese language, and one of his claims is that it unuseful for scientific purposes. A few Chinese characters are printed in the text, about which the famous Swedish author and amateur sinologist August Strindberg

writes: "de kinesiska typerna, troligen de första i Sverige, äro dåliga" [the chinese characters, probably the first in

Sweden, are inferior].

A nice copy. Hebbe Den svenska lantbrukslitteraturen 1679. With a celebratory poem by N. Alin. A new edition, with the title "Bikungen" [The king of bees], was published in 1858. Samuel Linnæus (1718-97) was the brother of Carl Linnaeus and succeeded their father as vicar of Stenbrohult. In the foreword, the author wonders at the fact that "a whole community of 10 to 30000 bees are governed by a single small creature, the Wise One, and they all obey him, with such immense fidelity, so that each one willingly sacrifices its life for him; they also starve to death in large numbers, so

that their king or queen the Wise One, on whose life the prosperity of the whole community depends, may survive" (our rough translation).



Sgard Dictionnaire des journaux 904 (pp. 829-35). The publication was started in 1777 and several of the volumes were reprinted several times. The work, which is most likely based on older manuscript journals, is an incredibly rich and detailed description of French literary life between 1762 and 1787: "Au centre des débats les plus brûlants durant un quart de siècle, qu'il s'agisse de la lutte contre les Jésuites, de l'opposition parlementaire, de procès retentissants comme celui de l'Affaire du Collier de la Reine, ou de l'émergence de nouvelles esthétiques: celle du drame bourgeois, de l'Opéra Gluckiste, du Théâtre de Shakespeare, ils rendent compte, presque au jour le jour, de manière engagée ou

distanciée, indignée ou sarcastique, des mouvements éphémères ou profonds d'une opinion publique en train de se constituer". The work has been ascribed to Louis Petit de Bachaumont (1690-1771), but is now attributed to his secretary Mathieu-François Pidansat de Mairobert (1727-79) and Barthélemy Moufle d'Angerville (1728-95), who however must have been assisted by a number of other authors. The Celsing family library at Biby had as its base the collections of the diplomat Ulric Celsing (1731-1805) who was Swedish envoy to Constantinople, and later to Dresden and Vienna.



Translated by Jac. Gabr. Rothman. The English original, "Reflections on the rise and fall of the ancient republics, adapted to the present state of Great-Britain", was published in 1759 and translated into French in 1769. According to the foreword, the Swedish translation is made from the second English edition. The ancient societies which Montagu (1713-76) describes are Sparta, Athens, Thebe, Carthage and Rome.

[Nelson & Trafalgar] A form of prayer and thanksgiving to almighty god; to be used in all churches and chapels throughout those parts of the United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Thursday the fifth day of December 1805, being the day appointed by his majesty's royal proclamation for a general thanksgiving to almighty god, for the late signal and important victory obtained by his majesty's ships of war, under the command of the late vice admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, over the combined fleets of France and Spain. 

Spine with a few small tears. Small stain on rear wrapper, which also has made a small impression on the last page. Occasional minor spotting and some discreet markings. A good copy. From Olivehult manor.

A total of 212 models of machines and other devices for agriculture, mining, manufacturing, lockage etc are listed in this inventory. 58 of these originate from Polhem's activities as an inventor. The tiled stove of C. J. Cronstedt and several other of his inventions are also listed. Some of the models and their functions are described in detail with references to papers published in "Vetenskapsakademiens handlingar". A separate sequel was printed in 1801. Jonas Norberg (1711-83) was made director of the Royal Model Chamber in 1773. It had been founded in 1754 with objects taken from the collections of the late Christopher Polhem and enlarged with the collection of models belonging to the Swedish Academy of Sciences. It was used as a school for education in applied mechanics. This pamphlet functioned as a guide of sorts to the collections and those who were interested in obtaining more information about a specific model could apply to the author for this. Large parts of the collection are still preserved at the Tekniska museet in Stockholm.

Endpapers made of old material, which at least partially is secondary. Occasional spotting, ink spatter and faint dampstains. Small repair on verso of title leaf. Old crossing-outs and additions on p. 177. Last leaf with repairs in lower margin. Plates somewhat browned in parts, many of them professionally reinforced with japan paper on versos in foldings and tears. Plate 5 dampstained. Initials "P. F." stamped on front board and the year "1744" on rear. 
The plates are mainly made to be instructional drawings. In "Then adelige/ och lärde swenske siö-man" (1734), C. N. Bechstadius establishes the year of printing to 1732. Thomas Rajalin, raised to the nobility as von Rajalin (1673-1741), was born in Finland and had a long and successful career in the Swedish Navy. He started as a boatswain and eventually became vice admiral after having served, among other things, in the Great Northern War. When the War of the Hats started in 1741, Rajalin was named supreme commander of the forces at sea, but he soon fell ill and died aboard his flagship Ulrika Eleonora. He also wrote a work




on the art of navigation, which was published in 1728, and prepared the proposal for sea rules for the Swedish Navy, which was sanctioned by Frederic I.



"Parvum theatrum" however, is a description of the cities and countries of the world - the old as well as the new one - with a large number of woodcut city plans. The Latin verses on pp. (7-8) are written by the English poet Thomas Edwards, about whom little is known. The previous owner Thore Virgin has left a note on a loosely inserted ticket: "1500-talets Bædeker" [The Bædeker of the 16th century].



His funeral was paid for by Elizabeth I. Snakenborg had arrived in England in 1565 as a lady-inwaiting for Cecilia Vasa, but stayed behind when the princess left the country in 1566, and instead became lady-inwaiting for Elizabeth I. She later married Thomas Gorges, with whom she had eight children. At Elizabeth's funeral she belonged to those who walked closest to the coffin in the funeral procession.

Stephens describes the play scene by scene and supplies short analyses of the characters. The pamphlet however received pungent criticism in a review in "Swenska litteratur-föreningens tidning" where the signature "L-M" found it unnecessary and argued for a good Swedish translation of the play instead.









Olof Swartz (1760-1818) was secretary of the Swedish Academy of Sciences and a botanist. As such, he travelled frequently to collect plants, both in Sweden and abroad. His longest journey was to North America and the West Indies, where he travelled for several years. Swartz' many published works mainly concern botany, but he also contributed to "Vetenskapsakademiens handlingar" with some zoological texts. The present work was published by Johan Emanuel Wikström, and contains biographical notes by himself, Kurt Sprengel and Carl Adolph Agardh. A bibliography of Swartz' published works can be found on pp. LXII-LXXIV.




Translated into German in 1811 and English in 1973 with the subtitle "The travel diary of an industrial spy". Eric Thomas Svedenstierna (1765-1825) was a mining scientist and director of the production of pig and bar iron in Sweden. For a time, he also was involved with the building of the canal locks in Trollhättan. He was the first editor of "Jernkontorets annaler" and also published "Samlingar i bergsvettenskapen" (1806-12) and "Några underrättelser om engelska jernhanteringen" (1813). Swedenstierna owned a valuable collection of minerals which was acquired by Crown Prince Oscar after his death and then donated to Uppsala University. The tour in 1802-03 was made with a grant from Brukssocieteten [the Society of foundry owners] to study the iron industry of Britain. Apart from the visits at iron foundries, mines and industries, the book also presents many on-the-spot accounts of the society and living conditions in Britain. The major-general Paul Schröderstierna (1769-1838) was the son of mining counselor Samuel Schröderstierna. At the time of publishing he was commandant at the Karlsten fortress in Marstrand. It is not impossible that Svedenstierna may have been allowed to use Samuel Schröderstierna's notes from his study tour in Britain 1748-49.









physician and bee-keeper. His "The true amazons" was the standard work on bee-keeping in England until the publication of Thorley's "Melisselogia or The female monarchy" in 1744. Warder claims that the country has suffered because of the ignorance of many bee-keepers. In that way, England has failed to secure a considerable domestic production of wine and mead, which would make the import of wine unnecessary. Warder dedicates his work to Queen Anne and makes comparisons in the foreword between the organisation of the bee-hive and that of the society.

VD17 12:656001V only lists a copy in Munich. A long verse by Varmeier in Latin hexameter, on the part of old venerable Saxony, now called Westphalia, mentioning many names. With a large number of printed marginal notes, with references to the Aeneid, among other sources. Foreword by Lindemann dated Rostock 16 February 1616. Jacob Varmeier (-1631) began his university studies in Helmstedt



1612 and continued in Rostock 1614, where he studied law, astronomy and mathematics. He is known for having murdered, on the 22nd of January 1631, the colonel Heinrich Ludwig von Hatzfeld, who belonged to the imperial occupation forces in Rostock. Varmeier believed himself to be chosen by God and made references to Judith and Holofernes, in whose initials he saw his forename and the colonels surname, which he interpreteted as an instruction to carry out the murder. He was taken prisoner and died under torture on March 25, after which his his corpse was dismembered and put on display in four different places in the city. Only when the Swedes conquered Rostock on October 6 his remains were taken down and buried in the church at Kessin in Rostock.

Her famous "The memoirs of Harriette Wilson, written by herself" was also published in 1825! In the French translation, "Les lions de Paris et les tigres de Londres" is included as the last part of the memoirs. Harriette Wilson (1786-1845) was a famous courtesan and mistress of a number of prominent persons in English society and politics. Since she did not receive the economic support she had anticipated from earlier lovers, she turned to writing to earn a living.
