#### How a Gentleman Should Not Behave

FIRST EDITION of this extended diatribe against ill-mannered and ill-bred common folk, demonstrating by reverse example the qualities that gentlemen should display. Aldana later revised this work and translated it into Spanish, publishing it in 1591 under the title *Invectiva contra el vulgo y su maledicencia*.

Born in Valencia, Aldana first entered the service of the Medici family, later moving to Milan to serve the Grand Constable Velasco. Although Aldana published two volumes of his own sonnets, he is perhaps better known for posthumously editing the poems of his brother, Francisco de Aldana.

Third edition. The *Consigli cavallereschi* is bound with, as issued, the *Pareri in materia d' onor, e di paci of Alessandro Guarini* (first published Ferrara, 1611), with separate titlepage bearing the imprint: In Ferrara, et in Parma: Per Giuseppe dall' Oglio, & Ippolito Rosati, 1686. The first part of the *Consigli* appeared in Milan, 1623, with a second part in 1624; both parts were printed together in 1637. It contains series of 30 counsels to various Italian noblemen on points of etiquette, advising when an honorable peace may be made and when they must resort to a duel for the sake of their honor. Pages 210-30 contain the "Apologia del Signor Francesco Birago a favor del Sig. Torquato Tasso contro il Sig. Gio. Battista Olevano." Birago (b. 1562, d. 1640 or after 1647), a native of Milan, was greatly respected in his own time for his writings on the peaceful resolution of disputes among the quarreling Italian nobility. Manzoni, however, attacked him in *I promessi sposi* as the prototype of the idle and awkward negotiator of the "punto d'onore."

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of a work that is rare, and seldom appears with the portrait: Innocêncio had not seen the portrait in any of the copies he examined. This exposition on the perfect soldier covers such matters as the qualifications of a general, the ethics of keeping or not keeping terms with the enemy, the virtues of cavalry vs. infantry and an army vs. a navy, and the duties, rights, pay and discipline of common soldiers. The author's views are supported by examples from ancient history and from modern wars in Europe and the East. Innocêncio notes that the author's opinions are usually sound, with a few exceptions. For example, on p. 21 he derives the Roman word *castra* (military camp) from *castrados* or *castos*: "porque devem estar livres de todo o appettite e sensualidade: que a castidade é may do esforço ...."


The poems in the preliminary leaves were written by some of the most noted authors of the time, including Antonio Barbosa Bacellar, Antonio da Fonseca Soares, and Miguel Botelho de Carvalho.

Medeiros Correa, as Auditor Geral do Exercito in the province of Alentejo, was responsible for trying soldiers accused of any crimes short of treason and lèse-majesté. At the end of the *Perfeito soldado* (pp. 173-91), he has included a translation of the Duke of Parma's regulations for the Auditor Geral.

Medeiros Correa served in the Alentejo under Jerónimo de Ataíde, Conde de Atouguia, who was Captain-General of Brazil from 1654 to 1657. The work is dedicated to Ataíde, and the portrait (signed by R. Reedolf) shows him dressed in armor, with his coat of arms and motto at the upper left. This, the only known portrait of Ataíde, makes the work highly desirable as Braziliana.

Medeiros Correa (d. 1671), a native of Lisbon, studied canon law at Coimbra and served in various magistracies in Portugal. He published two works on the Dutch in Brazil: Relação verdadeira de todo o succedido na restauração da Bahia ... (Lisbon, 1625), and Breve relação dos ultimos successos da guerra do Brasil ... (Lisbon, 1654).

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this dialogue between a "Baccharel" and a "Theologo" preceded by a letter by the [fictitious?] Fr. Paulo do Dezengano, with a reply by the [equally fictitious?] Fr. Francisco da Caridade at the end, on the qualities required of a minister, filled with extensive relations of juridical assertions.

The author, a native of Lisbon, born in 1683, was still alive in 1761. The precise date of his death is not known. Something of a prodigy, he knew Latin at age nine, and entered Coimbra University to study canon law at age thirteen. At nineteen years of age he was serving as Juiz da Fóra at Seisimbra, continuing to hold various judicial and administrative appointments for the next eighteen years, after which he began to practice as a lawyer, establishing himself in Lisbon during the next forty years. He was a member of the Academia Real de História Portuguesa. Innocêncio lists the titles of 24 published works under his name.



FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this volume dealing with how princes should rule, dedicated to D. Pedro, Prince Regent of Portugal (reigned as D. Pedro II, 1683-1706). A rare earlier issue is cited by Arouca and Porbase, with the title page dated 1671. D. Pedro staged a coup d'etat in 1667 that led to the imprisonment of his wild, mentally unstable brother, D. Afonso VI, and the signing of a peace treaty with Spain in 1668 which recognized Portuguese independence. The book is liberally strewn with anecdotes from the classics and from recent Spanish history, with frequent footnotes providing Latin citations. The author uses throughout the comparison of a man to a tree.

Henriques de Vilhegas, a native of Lisbon, rose to the rank of captain in the Spanish army, and was esteemed at the Spanish court for his urbanity and erudition. He wrote exclusively in Castilian, mostly on the military arts. This was his last published work.

*Provenance*: The library of Victor Marat d'Avila Perez was one of the most important ever sold at auction in Portugal. A total of 8,962 lots went under the hammer from October 1939 through April 1940 from a six-part catalogue, each part lasting an unspecified number of nights (our guess is five nights for each part).

Some critics consider this the author's best work, apparently first published in Valladolid, 1539, and frequently reprinted. A series of essays usually in epistolary form, with title and style taken from Cicero, it was translated into Italian, French, English, Dutch and German. There are multiple sixteenth- and seventeenth-century editions in these languages. Among the subjects are the ancient art of writing and its characteristics, qualifications of a warrior, instructions to knights, benefits and disadvantages of medical care, privileges of old age, the proper attitude of husbands and wives towards one another, disputes with the Jews of Naples on the mystery of the Trinity, Plutarch's epistle to Trajan, whores, and much more. The letters express the author's views on society, morality, theology, politics, love and fidelity, history and Scripture.

The final 10 preliminary leaves, ¶-¶¶4, ¶¶¶2, contain a "Resumen de la genealogia de las ilustres Casas de Saavedra, y Guevara." Of the 31 copies mentioned in the online Spanish CCPBE, only one at Toledo (Biblioteca de Castilla-La Mancha / Biblioteca Pública del Estado) appears to have these leaves. REBIUN refers to a copy in the Biblioteca de Catalunya which contains them. Palau includes them in his collation, but they are not mentioned in any other source we have consulted.

The printer's device is the same as that used by Juan de la Cuesta, and which had belonged to P. Madrigal.

A didactic, ascetic, and learned writer of distinguished ancestry brought up at the court of Ferdinand and Isabella, Fray Antonio de Guevara (1480?-1545) exercised considerable influence on Spanish prose of the sixteenth century, and is acknowledged as one of the leading prose stylists before Cervantes. He entered the Franciscan Order in 1504, returned as Court Preacher in 1521, and was appointed Royal Chronicler to Charles V in 1526. He accompanied the king on trips to Italy and other parts of Europe, as well as to Tunis in 1535. Much influenced by Cicero's rhetoric and biblical imagery, Guevara attained a European reputation, especially in France and Italy, for his *Libro áureo de Marco Aurelio*. Printed anonymously and without permission in Seville in 1528, it received at least 25 editions within the next 100 years, and was translated into French, Italian, English and Latin. It was augmented as *Libro llamado relox de príncipes*, printed in Valladolid, 1529. This authorized version had 16 editions.

Second edition (or third?), nicely printed by Ibarra, of this work inspired by the *Moralia* of Plutarch. The first edition was published in Brussels, 1680, and there is an edition (probably a variant issue) of Brussels, 1686. There are also editions of Madrid, 1779 and 1787 (apparently two different editions or issues of this year) and an edition of Cordoba, 2000.

Sousa de Macedo, a politician and diplomat, believed that the most important quality for a ruler was justice. Drawing his examples from past kings of Portugal, he describes how the ruler should apply justice to himself and his relations with God and his subjects. The work was written and published while the author was on a ticklish diplomatic mission to Holland in 1650-52, to negotiate the status of Pernambuco.

Sousa de Macedo (1606-1682), a native of Porto who studied law at Coimbra, reached the highest echelons of the magistracy and the diplomatic service. He was Secretary to the





Renascença Portuguesa was a cultural and civic group founded in 1911 by Teixeira de Pascoaes, Jaime Cortesão, Raúl Proença, António Sérgio, Leonardo Coimbra, Álvaro Pinto, Augusto Casimiro, and others. The group's literary review, Á Aguia, continued publication until 1932. Pascoaes, Proença, and Sérgio soon disagreed on the long-term goals of Renascença Portuguesa, and the movement became the mouthpiece of Saudosismo. First Edition in Spanish, rare, of one of the best and most important works of Portuguese prose ever written. The Portuguese text of this superbly written courtesy book first appeared in 1651, with many subsequent editions in Portuguese. Immediately recognized as a classic of Portuguese prose, it was the author's first publication in the Portuguese language: he had already established himself as one of the greatest *Spanish* writers. The "unrivalled *Carta de Guia de Casados*" brought "freshness and originality to the theme"—Bell, *Portuguese Literature*, p. 253. A second edition in Spanish appeared in 1786, and a Spanish translation by Ana Díaz Aguilar was published in 1922. An English edition appeared in 1697. According to Bell, "No literary figure in Portugal of the seventeenth century, few in the Peninsula, can rank with Francisco Manuel de Mello (1608-66), the leading lyric poet and prose writer of his time." Dom Francisco not only led a romantic and adventurous life but established himself as a major figure in Portuguese and Spanish literature, ranking with Quevedo among seventeenth-century Iberian writers.

Born into the highest Portuguese nobility, Dom Francisco Manuel de Mello began his career as a man of action, as well as an author, at the age of 17. Shipwrecked near St. Jean de Luz in 1627 while sailing with a Hispano-Portuguese armada protecting an American treasure fleet (he was forced to supervise the burial of more than 2,000 who perished), he fought in the battle of the Downs in 1639, was sent with the Conde de Linhares to quell the Évora insurrection in 1637, and took part in the campaign against rebellious Catalunya (1640). In 1640, suspected of favoring an independent Portugal, he was thrown into a Spanish jail. Only a few years later (1644), when he returned to Portugal, he was imprisoned in turn by D. João IV, some said on a charge of murder, others said because he was D. João's rival for a lady's affections. The year 1655 saw him deported to Bahia, but in 1658 he was pardoned, recalled from exile, and sent on the first of several important diplomatic missions.

On p. [183] is a divisional title for what we believe to be the first and only edition in Spanish of Luis de Aureu [sic] de Mello's Avisos para palacio, which occupies the remainder of the volume. Originally published as Avizos pera o paço in Lisbon, 1659 (rare), this important and interesting courtesy book appears never to have been published again in

Portuguese, and we do not think that it was published in any other language with the exception of Spanish. This Spanish edition is very little known. Luís de Abreu de Mello, a native of Vila Viçosa, died at Lisbon, 1663.

An early edition of this enormously popular work, with over a hundred nearly full-page, nicely engraved emblems, present in fine impressions. First published in Munich, 1640, the *Idea* went through more than twenty editions in the original Spanish, and was translated into French, Italian, English and German as well as Latin. After Quevedo's *Política de Dios* and the works of Gracián, it is the finest Golden Age treatise on statecraft, covering the education of a prince, his relations with ministers and subjects, his duties as head of state, and his duties to himself in old age and in preparation for death. The emblems at the beginning of each chapter are pictorial statements of the chapter's lessons. Saavedra wrote it as a Christian reply to Machiavelli's cynicism, for the benefit of Balthasar, son of Philip IV, who died too young to profit by its advice. "It is written in a compact, sententious style, with much quaint and curious knowledge of history, and with a large and not always judicious display of learning. But in many points it reminds us of Sir Walter Raleigh's 'Cabinet Council' and Owen Feltham's 'Resolves' ..." (Ticknor III, 185).

Saavedra Fajardo (1584-1648), a native of Algezares in Murcia, spent 40 of his 64 years in diplomatic service.

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

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this curious work, part travel advice, part courtesy book—a compilation of notes jotted down by the author on his trips to the interior of Brazil in the 1830s. In the Advertencia, he states that those who travel should do so for the sake of improving humanity, and should visit alms-houses and prisons. Early recommendations include avoiding fancy dinners, because often they result in being drunk, having indigestion—or worse. ("Deve o viajante izentar-se muito de jantares pompozos, e premeditados, porque pela maior parte destes sobre muito vinho, ha indigestões, e algumas vezes ciladas, e salta a razão," p. 10.) Other advice: don't be vengeful, be humble, be tolerant. Then he moves on to recommendations that are specific to the interior of Brazil: Don't promise to transport contraband such as brazilwood, currency, or slaves (pp. 29-30). Don't listen to malcontents who malign the government, propose revolution, or advocate separatism (pp. 30-50, nearly a third of the book).

The author was a farmer born in Sergipe, 1790; he died after 1840. Besides this work he wrote *Viagem e observações de um brazileiro*, Rio de Janeiro, 1834 (probably the *Peregrinações* referred to in the *Prefácio* of this volume). Sacramento Blake mentions a manuscript dated 1824, "Descobertas curiosas que nos reinos vegetal, animal e mineral por sitios e sertões varios das brazilicas provincias de Bahia, Sergipe e Alagôas fez o capitão Antonio Moniz de Souza e Oliveira," which was donated to the Instituto Histórico e Geographico Brazileiro in 1846 by Colonel Ignacio Accioli de Cerqueira e Silva.

First Edition in Portuguese of the second separate edition of two works by the noted Portuguese humanist: "um dos mais celebres professores de letras humanas, que floreceo neste Reyno" (Barbosa Machado). The first section is a collection of maxims; the second, beginning on p. 90, is on the education of princes: *Instituto Sebastiani Primi Felicissimi Lusitaniae Regis*. Both these works first appeared in Lisbon, 1565 (*Epodon sive Jambichorum carminum libri tres*), along with translations of only the first book of the *Epodon* (attributed either to Teive himself or to Francisco de Andrada) and of the *Institutio*, by Andrada. This 1786 edition was done under the supervision of Francisco de Sousa Pinto de Massuelos. Both works were printed again in Lisbon, 1803, and had appeared (in Latin only) in a 1762 edition of *Opuscula*.

Diogo de Teive was born in Braga, received a doctor's degree from the University of Paris, and held a chair at the University of Bordeaux before D. João III requested in 1547 that he teach at the University of Coimbra. Teive resigned his post in 1555, when the college was given over to the Jesuits.
