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## "The most important edition of Ptolemy's Geographiae" (Stevens)

Two parts in one volume with 27 woodcut Ptolemaic "ancient" maps (26 double-page) and 20 woodcut "modern" maps by Martin Waldseemuller (19 double-page) including the first map devoted to America.

The most important edition of Ptolemy's Geographiae, extended for the first time by the modern maps of Martin Waldseemüller (Stevens). It is considered as the first modern atlas: a true modern atlas is juxtaposed with that of Ptolemy, offering easy comparison between ancient and new maps.

Complete copy illustrated with 47 beautiful woodcut maps (all but 2 double-page), the last map (Lothraringia) printed in three colors, 4 woodcut diagrams in text, one full-page woodcut of an armillary sphere.

Among the maps of interest, the two beautiful world maps *Generale Ptholemei* (trapezoid, with wind heads) and *Orbis Typus universalis*, the map of the New World *Tabula terre nove* known as the "Map of the Admiral" (in reference to Christoph Columbus) which is the first map dedicated exclusively to America, the first printed map of Switzerland *Tabula nova Heremi Helvetiorum* and the full-page representation of Lorraine printed in black, red and green with numerous coats of arms, one of the earliest examples of colour printing.

Overall a fine and clean copy with strong printing and unusually wide margins on strong laid paper and in a contemporary pigskin binding.

A few text sheets and maps slightly browned, occasional light dampstaining. A few small defects , stamp trace on the title page, some small restorations, missing the front flyleaf. Binding slightly soiled and rubbed, wormholes throughout, missing clasps.



Considered the first practical treatise on navigation, and the first to give reliable information on the navigation in American waters, this second edition in French (the first published in 1554) was translated by Nicolas de Nicolay and includes his famous map. The original edition was published in Valladolid in 1545 under the title *Arte de Navegar*. Its appearance changed the course of navigation and redefined it in the century of discoveries.

It is illustrated with more than 80 woodcuts in text, including the folding map of the North Atlantic: "The French edition is now considered valuable on account of its map, on which are shown names of places on the coast of North America for the first time on any published map." (Murphy, 1654a). It is one of the first maps to show the North Atlantic, Gulf Stream, and the trade routes to and from Spain.


First edition first issue of de Bry's *Great Voyages*. The text of this edition is the Latin translation of Thomas Harriot's "A briefe and true report of the newfound land of Virginia" first published in London in 1588.

A complete copy including the double page engraved map of Virginia in the excessive scarce first state.

Theodore de Bry's map of Virginia, after John White, is one of the most significant cartographical milestones in colonial North American History. It was the most accurate map drawn in the sixteenth century of any part of that continent. This is the first map to focus on Virginia (now largely North Carolina) and records the first English attempt at colonization in the New World (Burden).

Water damage, wormholes, numerous old repairs in the margins with loss of text and image, title restored, lack of paper and handwritten signature at the bottom of the title page.

First latin edition of this highly influential work by Jan Huygen Linschoten (1563-1611) containing all the knowledge and learning relating to the East and West Indies at the end of the sixteenth century.

Translated from Spanish and Portuguese documents on navigation and geography, it served as a direct stimulus to the building of the vast English and Dutch overseas empires. As a navigational aid, it was so highly esteemed that a copy was given to each ship sailing for the Indies.


First published in Dutch in 1596 (Amsterdam, Corn. Clasz), Linschoten's *Navigatio ac Itinerarium* is one of the most important accounts of journeys to the Indies, the East, Portuguese Africa...

Two works bound in one volume 4to (280 by 180 mm); contemporary German blind stamped pig skin, spine with raised bands, central coat-of-arms of the Dukes of Wurttemberg on upper cover, blue edges.

The book contains 82 double-page maps and 20 full-page maps with text on the reverse. Letters, headbands and tailbands engraved on wood. Text in Gothic script. A fine example of Matthias Quad's geographical work here bound with the rare first complete German edition of the classical study of the New World by José de Acosta.

Matthias Quad's *Geographisch Handtbuch* published in 1600, is the first world atlas published in German. It was mostly an extension of his earlier *Europae totius orbis terrarum* of 1592. The most important additions are the five maps covering the New World, which Quad based on the work of de Jode, Mercator and Ortelius. The map of the Strait of Magellan is from Wytfliet's *Descriptionis Ptolemaicae augmentum* of 1597.


Acosta's work was first published in 1590 in Seville under the title *Historia natural y moral de las Indias* and has long been considered the first intellectually rigorous study of Latin America. The text is based on Acosta's personal observation over almost two decades in Peru and Mexico and covers the geography, metallurgy, natural history and the laws, customs and history of the Inca and Aztec peoples.

The text of Acosta is here completed by the re-engravings by Johannes Matalius Metellus of the eighteen maps of the New World from Wytfliet's *Descriptionis Ptolemaicae augmentum*. They were first published in Cologne in 1598 in *Geographische und historische Beschreibung der uberauss grossen Landschafft America*, an unattributed translation of Acosta's *De natura Novi Orbis* (Salamanca, 1588); Burden notes that "all issues [of Metellus's maps] are extremely rare."

First French Edition of this important work by Jean Hugues Linschoten (1563-1611) gathering all the knowledge on East and West Indies at the end of the 16th century. It is illustrated with 58 engraved illustrations within text and seven engraved plates and maps of which five folding, including the "Charte hydrographique de la navigation des Hollandois es Isles Orientales" and the city of Goa.

This account, annotated by Bernard Paludanus, is full of details on the geography, customs, habits, production, flora and fauna... of the countries visited.

This work is one of the most important accounts of travels in India, the East, the Portuguese Africa... First published in Dutch in 1596 (Amsterdam, Corn. Clasz) it was then translated into Latin in 1599.

German edition of de Bry's Great Voyages (abridgement of the first 9 parts of America) illustrated with 4 double-page engraved maps and 134 copperplate engravings in the text. The exact number of maps is not clear and our copy contains four. "America stye novus orbis" 1596 (Burden 91, largely based on P. Plancius). Shows the hemisphere with North and South America. "Occidentatis Americae partis tabula" 1594 (Burden 83, after G. Benzoni). Shows Florida and the West Indies). "Hispaniae novae ... descriptio" 1595. Shows Mexico. "Americae pars, nunc Virginia" (Burden 76). Second state. This map was the most accurate map drawn in the sixteenth century of any part of that continent. This is the first map to focus on Virginia (now largely North Carolina) and records the first English attempt at colonisation in the New World.

Engraved title, frontispiece-title (dated 1629), (2) pp., 3 portraits (Louis XIII, Pluvinel, and René de Menou), (1) p. *Privilège*, 207 pp., 58 beautiful double-page copperplates including 6 of bits by Crispin de Pas.

Antoine de Pluvinel (1555-1620) was trained very young by the riding master Giovanni Battista Pignatelli (C.1525-C.1600). Appointed first squire of the King's brother, the future Henry III, he established his own riding academy in 1594. He died in 1620 before publishing his work. A first version was published in 1623 under the title "Le Maneige royal" on the initiative of Crispian de Pas.

A second version, with a text by René de Menou written in the form of dialogues between the young King Louis XIII, and his riding master, was published in 1625 under the title "L'Instruction du Roy en l'exercice de monter à cheval".

Some plates and leaves restored (p. 191 with slight impairment of text), some plates with shorter margins,, stain plate 108.

Second edition and increased edition, the first in 1631, of Gottfried's *Historia Antipodum*, his one-volume condensed version of the monumental America series issued by Theodor De Bry and his two sons. Gottfried, who had worked on the volumes and inherited the de Bry's original copperplates used many of them, supplementing them with new ones of more recent voyages. "In many ways, the modifications Merian and Gottfried made to both texts and illustrations surpassed the changes made for the original volumes of America." Michiel van Groesen.

Folio (450 by 290 mm), vellum over cardboards, ties (cut). 55 maps, mostly on double-page, engraved on copper including the largest map (in 4 parts) of the North Atlantic as well as numerous woodcuts in the text.

Rare French edition of Colom's famous Sea Atlas of Europe, without the Mediterranean Sea part published later, and recorded separately by Koeman. For the present edition, Koeman does not give a detailed collation. The atlas contains splendid nautical charts of the coasts of Scandinavia, the British Isles, the North Sea and the Baltic Sea with its coastal countries, the Netherlands, France, and the Iberian Peninsula.

The present copy contains the extremely rare map of the North Atlantic "Der Groote Noord Zee wassende grade pas caart nieulijcks beschreven", Amsterdam, Jacob Aertsz Colom, (1662), in four parts, which together measures about 865 by 1090 mm. It is one of the largest map produced in Mercator's projection. The map is in second state with the coasts of Europe, Groenland, and North America.

Some sheets age-toned, some offsetting, some small tears, maps with narrow margins. Title and the North Atlantic map restored.

First edition of this work sought-after for its many copper-engraved plates enhanced by a beautiful contemporary morocco gilt binding. French mathematician, cartographer and military engineer active during the second half of the 17th century, Allain MANESSON MALLET (1630-1706) was one of Vauban's favourite engineers.

With the exception of the portrait of Peter Paul Rubens by Van Dick, the following 24 plates were drawn after Rubens' paintings, long exhibited at the Palais du Luxembourg, and currently in the Louvre.



Alfonso Lasor a Varea was the pen name of Raffaello Savonarola (d. 1748). His *Universus terrarum orbis scriptorum* ... is a historiographical and religious dictionary of the world, extensively illustrated. It is interesting and remarkable that the maps, plans and perspectives contained in it were printed from engraved plates at least one hundred years earlier, and some even earlier.

Original plates in pale grey paper, plates and spine darkened and discoloured by inlaid dust, joints beginning to crack in places but still very firm.



Very interesting untitled collection of 14 double-page beautiful nautical charts in contemporary colour drawn up by Michelot and Brémond between 1715 and 1726. They show mainly the coasts of the Mediterranean including the Mediterranean islands of which three large charts of Corsica, Sardinia and Malta.

All the maps bear the name and address of Laurent Bremond in Marseille and are finely engraved on copper, mostly by one of the most sought-after map engravers of the time, Peter Starckman (one engraved by Authement, one by Coelémans in Aix). Useful for navigation, they also include many topographical details and are embellished with very large decorative title cartouches with the coat of arms of the dedicatee Jean-Philippe d'Orléans (1702-48) known as the Chevalier d'Orléans (natural son legitimized of Philippe II, Duke of Orléans).

Some maps slightly browned, some soiling, the folding map strenghtened on the back.

Illustrated with 6 frontispieces and 288 maps and plates mostly engraved on double-page or folding, and engraved vignettes within text. Volumes 2, 5, 6 and 7 in second edition, 3 and 4 in third edition, volume 1 in final edition. The volume VI contains the very large map of America « *Carte très curieuse de la Mer du Sud...*». This spectacular map is one of the masterpieces of decorative cartography. It illustrates the discoveries of the Western Hemisphere, from Christopher Columbus to the end of the 17th century.

The *Atlas historique* was intended for the general public who was fascinated by new discoveries and distant countries.

First edition of the most important celestial atlas of the 18th century. It is illustrated with the portrait of the author engraved by G. Vertue after T. Gibson, and 27 double-page celestial maps engraved by James Mynde and Abraham Sharp, including 2 hemispheres and 25 constellations visible from Greenwich described with unprecedented precision.

In 1675, John Flamsteed (1646 -1719) an English astronomer appointed Britain's first royal astronomer by King Charles II, began to work at the newly built Royal Observatory of Greenwich. One of Flamsteed's main objectives was to correct Bayer's figures' representation. Scientists Isaac Newton and Edmond Halley pushed him to publish his observations, but he refused, preferring to complete them before disclosing them.

His splendid star atlas, *Atlas Coelestis*, was published in 1729, ten years after his death.

# BRETEZ, Louis / TURGOT, Michel Etienne

Plan de Paris

Folio, 21 sheets. First edition of the so-called Turgot plan, surveyed and drawn by Louis Bretez, engraved by the engraver of the Royal Academy of Sciences Claude Lucas, and written by Aubin. Copy on large paper.

The plan consists of an overview map showing the layout of the sectional maps, and 20 bird's-eye view maps copper-engraved on double-page. Title engraved in a large decorated cartouche surmounted by an allegory of the City of Paris and located at the bottom of plates 18 and 19.

The Turgot map of Paris is a highly accurate and detailed map of the city, made in isometric perspective. Bretez's plan matches Turgot's objective: a true propaganda operation aimed at the elites (Parisian, provincial and foreign) to promote the image of Paris.

Subsequent edition of Doppelmayer's *Atlas Coelestis* published on the same date by the Homann heirs. Only the title is slightly altered in *Atlas Novus Coelestis*.

The work includes a frontispiece engraved by J.C. Reinsperger after J.J. Preisler showing a solar system, a celestial globe and the astronomers Claude Ptolemy, Nicolas Copernic, Johann Kepler and Tycho Brahé, an engraved title, a German index cut out and pasted on a blank sheet with handwritten note dated August 1862, and 30 double page copper engraved plates, all mounted on tabs (printed) and heightened in color. The representation of the constellation figures is based on that of the Polish astronomer Johannes Hevelius in his *Firmamentum Sobiescianum sive Uranographia* (Danzig, 1687).

A fine and attractive world atlas published in Venice in 1740 (volume 1) and 1750 (volume 2) by Giambattista Albrizzi, gathering Guillaume Delisle's maps from his *Atlas de Géographie* (Paris, 1700-1718 and later), reissued in a smaller format from 1730.

Some stains, separation to the lower centrefold to some maps, small wormhole to lower centrefold of map [22]. Some old handwritten annotation in ink on the dedication of volume 2.

## A wonderful collection of optical theatres with their contemporary optical apparatus

Hundred theatres, each with 6 leaves (approx. 92 by 140 mm), engraved on copper, cut out and coloured by a contemporary hand; with its contemporary optical apparatus (155 xy 145 x 475 mm) made of oak wood with an engraving mounted around the optic hole, inside set with 6 compartments to insert the engravings.

A wonderful collection of 100 optical theatres, each complete with the 6 plates necessary to create a perfect perspective. These theatres were very popular in the 18th century and the publisher Engelmann from Augsburg was certainly the most famous supplier of these fragile toys. The theatres are all (except for 3) stored in contemporary folders with a title in Dutch and a serial number.

The beautiful views depict biblical scenes (36), hunting and fishing (fox-hunting, wild-boar hunting, ibex, whaling, pearl, lion, etc.), entertainment, crafts, past-times including carnival and joisting, city views, the months of February to October, the four seasons, etc. Added are 5 incomplete theatres.



# BUFFON, Georges Louis, comte de

First edition of this 18th century masterpiece of natural history in a nice contemporary binding by Derome.

Buffon's *Histoire naturelle, générale et particulière* was an immense success, almost as important as the *Encyclopédie* of Diderot and d'Alembert which was published simultaneously. It is nowadays considered one of the most successful achievements of the Enlightenment.

The present set is bound by Derome, as mentioned on the label at the bottom of the title page *"bound by J. A. De Rome rue S. Jaque"*. The last 6 volumes were published between 1798 and 1804, after Derome's death. The series was never completed.

It is illustrated with an engraved title, a frontispiece, a large folding map of the city of Reims by Don Coutans with medallions all around, 9 beautiful double-page copperplates depicting the ceremony, from the King's rise to the royal feast attended by Marie-Antoinette from her balcony, a double plate of coat-of-arms, 39 plates of costumes representing the King's clothes as well as those of the notables invited to the ceremony, and 14 vignettes, all engraved on copper by Jean-Baptiste Patas. The text is due to Father Thomas Pichon.

Good copy with all the plates carefully watercoloured by a contemporary hand, including the plan of Reims which is missing in most copies..


The English Pilot was started by John Seller and completed by William Fisher and John Thornton. It was published from 1671 to 1794 and consisted of five separate books. The English Pilot Fourth Book was first published in 1689. It is one of the most important British atlases ever published, the first wholly English sea-atlas of American waters.

The English cartography at that time was superseding the Dutch cartography. *The Fourth Book* was a success and altogether thirty-seven editions were published. After Fisher's death in 1682, his interest passed to Richard Mount. Thomas Page joined the business sometime between 1698 and 1702.

The 1778 edition includes the map of the English cartographer Emmanuel Bowen "New and Accurate Chart of the vast Atlantic or Western Ocean..." which covers from, the Arctic Circle to the Equator and from western Florida and Cuba to Sardinia and Denmark.

Ink marks inside front covers. Some dampstaining and foxing. Some handwritten annotation on the back of some maps.

# **DELAMARCHE, Charles- François**

Miniature terrestrial globe of Delamarche at his first address, « rue du foin St Jacq[ues] », circa 1790.

Diameter of the sphere 6 cm; height 19,5 cm

The sphere is covered with 12 full gores copper-engraved, coloured and varnished. The sphere is mounted in a wooden stand with a wooden meridian wing covered with a paper scale.

Charles-François Delamarche (1740-1817) is one of the leading French cartographers at the end of the 18th century and the beginning of the 19th century, publisher and globe-maker. In 1786, he bought the stock of Didier Robert de Vaugondy from Jean Fortin, and the one of Lattré. His first globes date from about 1770, with the address « Rue du Foin St Jacques» in Paris until 1804. After his death in 1817, his publishing house was taken over by his son Félix. The publishing activity continued throughout the 19th century.



A thorough survey of the various species of animals in the zoo of the National Museum of Natural History.

This scholarly work consists of 36 articles devoted to one animal species, each with its own pagination. Each description is accompanied by an engraved plate, sometimes two. Thirty-one of these descriptions are due to Georges Cuvier, three to Etienne Geoffroy Saint-Hilaire and two to Bernard Germain-Etienne de la Ville, Count of Lacépède. In total, the illustration of the work includes 40 prints.

Small dampstaining, small tear to the first leaves, some small worm galleries, the plate of the elephant badly restored.



Morel-Macler) of which 49 were made in ink (25 on tracing paper, sometimes in sanguine, and 24 on paper) and 14 in graphite (5 on tracing paper and 9 on paper). Of the 32 drawings signed by Chenavard, one is dated 1816, 23 are dated 1817, one is dated 1841, one is dated 1843 and six are undated.

In this set, 43 drawings refer to Italy: plans, elevations, perspectives and architectural details of various ancient monuments and 15 drawings depict the East or South of France (Besançon, Mandeure, near Montbéliard, Belley, Taluyers, Alba, Saint-Andéol, Orange and Marseille. The last five drawings are not located.

These plates, drawn by Achille Devéria and lithographied by Lemercier, Motte and Cattier, represent characters in historical theater or traditional costumes...: Italian, Arab, Spanish, Swiss, Chinese, English, Russian, Belgian, French, Indian, German, Persian, Greek, Turkish... costumes from different periods.

The plates [122] to [125] are not numbered and are often missing. They represent the full-lenght portraits of the ballerinas Fanny Elssler, Marie Taglioni, and singer Cornélie Falcon and Rachel.

In total, 40 etchings signed and dated in the plate, representing cats and kittens in various attitudes.

Foujita's most beloved work, "certainly one of the rarest and most desired books on cats in existence" (Kalda). No.326 of 500 copies, signed by the artist.

With a dedicace on the first page: "Christmas1930 / Lots of love / Yaya / from Babes".

"The reason why I so much enjoy being friends with cats is that they have two different characters: a wild side and a domestic side. This is what makes them interesting. If you keep a young lion, or a young tiger, in your house, it's fine as long as they're small, but after a while you don't know what to do with them. A cat's a wild animal, and I like that." (Foujita in *Nager sur la Terre*, 1926).

In 1930 in New York, Covici Friede published Foujita's Book of Cats with 20 etched plate drawings. This is one of the top 500 (in price) rare books ever sold and is ranked by rare book dealers as "the most popular and desirable book on cats ever published".

Born and educated in Tokyo, Foujita emigrated to Paris where he became a leading member of the French avant-garde; a friend of Picasso and Modigliani, he counted Kiki de Montparnasse among his models. The languid etchings of felines in this work, accompanied by the prose-poetry of Michael Joseph, exemplify the signature hybrid Japanese-European style which earned him great acclaim.
