Boxer's First Separately Published Work

FIRST EDITION of BOXER'S FIRST SEPARATELY PUBLISHED WORK. On July 26 1647 two Portuguese galleons under the command of Captain Gonçalo de Siqueira de Sousa anchored off Nagasaki and word was sent to the Shogun that they were hoping to re-establish trading relations which had been broken off seven years earlier.




FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this novena to the Virgin Mary for the use of female religious.

D. Fernando da Cruz (1629-1710), a native of Lisbon, was Conego Regrante de Santo Agostinho, receiving his habit age 18 at Sancta Cruz de Coimbra in 1647. He wrote a number of devotional works.


FIRST and ONLY EDITION in Portuguese. An apparently somewhat different version appeared in English in 2014.

Ana Hatherly (Porto, 1929-2015) was an important Concrete poet, author of fiction, literary historian, critic, and painter. Melo e Castro (born Covilhã, 1932), textile engineer, poet, critic and essayist, has collaborated with various newspapers and reviews in Portugal, Brazil, Spain, and France since the 1960s. He was one of the leaders of the literary vanguard in Portugal during the second half of the twentieth century, especially during the 1960s, and was awarded the Grande Prémio de Poesia INASET/INAPA in 1990.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION—A COMPLETE RUN. Directed by Mário de Albuquerque, editorial committee consisting of António José Brandão, Fernando Seabra, Luís C.P. Coelho, Luís C. Pina, Ulisses Cortês and Mário de Albuquerque. According to Nuno Teotónio Pereira, this review had monarchist tendencies. Among the most representative

texts included are Delfim Santos' "Meditação sobre a cultura," poems of Afonso Lopes Vieira, Almeida Garrett and the Conde de Ficalho, works by Heidegger, João Ameal, and João de Castro Osório, Jacinto de Prado Coelho, "Realistas e parnasianos", and Mário de Albuquerque, "O 'humano' na obra de Eça de Queirós". There are also texts by Afonso Botelho, Adolfo Cabral, Amadeu Cunha, António José Brandão, Artur Moreira de Sá, Carlos Lobo de Oliveira, Costa Brochado, Délio Nobre dos Santos, Durval Pires de Lima, Eduardo Dias, Eudoro de Sousa, Eugénio Montes, Fernando de Pamplona, Ferreira de Almeida, João de Castro Osório, José Osório de Oliveira, Raul Lino, and others. 

FIRST EDITION of the proposal for Proudhon's Banque du Peuple. In the aftermath of the Revolution of 1848, attempts were made by Pierre-Joseph Proudhon (1809-1865, famous for his 1840 assertion that "property is theft!") and Ramon de la Sagra (1798-1871, founder of the first anarchist journal, *El Porvenir*) to establish a popular bank. Despite several publications by both authors, including Proudhon's more polemical *La banque du peuple doit régénérer le monde: transition de la vieille société au socialisme* alongside the present practical description, and considerable popularity among workers, the Banque du Peuple did not garner sufficient support and was soon disbanded. The present text not republished until 2001.

Ramón Dionisio José de la Sagra y Peris (A Coruña, 1798-Neuchâtel, 1871) was a Spanish anarchist, politician, author and botanist. In 1821 he migrated to Cuba as an assistant to Agustin Rodriguez. The next year later he was appointed to the position of Professor of Natural History of Cuba. He traveled to the United States from April 20th to September 23rd 1835 and the following year published in Paris *Cinco meses en los Estados-Unidos de la América del Norte*. In Paris he became a disciple of Pierre-Joseph Proudhon. He returned to Spain in 1837 and was elected to parliament four times (1838, 1840, 1845, 1854) as a representative of the Liberal Party. At the same time he began publishing a thirteen volume history on the political and natural history of Cuba which he would complete in 1857. In Brussels he met Heinrich Ahrens, disciple of Krause, whose doctrines he proclaimed in Spain before Julian Sanz del Rio. He continued to publish economic, geographic, political, social, and prison reform studies. In 1849 he was expelled from France, because he was spreading Socialist ideas. In 1856 he was expelled from Spain to France by Ramón María Narváez, because he was spreading radical ideas. In Paris he met Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels. There he worked as the consul of Uruguay. He

returned to Cuba between 1859 and 1860 and published numerous studies and essays there. At the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War in 1870 he went to Switzerland, where he died at the age of seventy-three.



FIRST and ONLY EDITION of the author's first and apparently his only novel. His only earlier book was the verse *Canto à Independência do Brasil*, 1868. He went on to publish at least a dozen more books, mostly poetry and works of a didactic nature.

José Maria Velho da Silva (1811-1901), a native of Rio de Janeiro, was classified by José Verissimo as belonging to the first wave of Brazilian romantics. He was a graduate of the Escola Medico-Cirurgica of Rio de Janeiro, teacher of rhetoric, poetry and literature, butler to the Imperial household, and a member of several learned societies.
