First edition. Fitzgibbon was a friend of his fellow Irishman the tackle maker William Blacker, and was an ambitious angling writer. This was the first comprehensive guide to the salmon to be written and is rightly prized for the quality of the plates, printed by the Adlards, as well as for the clear, authoritative text. *Westwood & Satchell p. 86.*


This colourful book is a study of the influence of falconry through the ages, and its influence on our media and literature.

Intended not as a practical guide to the sport, but a cultural analysis, this book provides a gripping commentary on the life and chronology of an ancient sport of which little is now generally known.

First edition. Scarce, A comprehensive guide by the Nottingham tackle maker William Bailey. He deals with all fish except salmon, being very much a man of the Midlands: "I have never had opportunities of fishing for the Kng of fresh-water" (p. v). He recommends the works of "Ephemera" for the salmon fisher.



9. BAINBRIDGE, George Cole. The Fly Fisher's Guide, illustrated by coloured plates, representing upwards of forty of the most useful flies, accurately copied from nature. *Liverpool: G. Cruickshank.* 1828. £300

Second edition. Bainbridge's book, first published in 1816, paved the way for later angler-entomologists, especially in his analysis of changing flies through the seasons.



Provenance: 'Reginald Gurney, tenant of Earlham Hall, near Norwich, and later of Spixworth Park, Norwich, was the second, but eldest surviving, son of Francis Hay Gurney and Margaret Charlotte, daughter of Sir William Browne ffolkes, 2nd Baronet of Hillington, Norfolk. He was educated at Eton College and Trinity College Cambridge, where he was admitted a pensioner 25 September 1868, and took his B.A. in 1872. He became Manager of Gurney's Bank, Bury St Edmunds. He married Margaret Alice Maud, daughter of W. W. Robertson of the Bombay Civil Service 31 October 1889' (British Armorial Bindings, University of Toronto Libraries, online).





First Safari Press edition, initally published in 1923. A classic text of African big game hunting, Czech: "Bell's first book, detailing his early elephant hunting days in the Karamojo region where the Karamojo elephants are distinguished for their bodily size, the quality and size of their ivory and

for the quantity of fat on them.' He also narrates his hunting expeditions through The Sudd into The Lado Enclave, and the interior of Liberia in the decade preceding World War I. The work is further distinguished by the author's sketches of hunting elephant, and their vital areas. He was of course, a great proponent of small bore rifle shooting for elephant, killing them with carefully placed shots at close range." Bell claimed to have shot over 500 elephants during his hunting career. However, one of the nuggets of information that the author imparts is that one of the finest methods for bringing down an elephant, is a specially constructed "falling spear" (cf. pp. 1-4).

First Edition Fleshed out from a column that first appeared in the *Field* and *Graphic*, telling of life in a Hebridean shooting lodge. Contains photographs, and the occasional

illustration of a tied fly with captions ('something specially diabolical'). The author is witty, even going so far as to pen a bit of doggerel on what he dubs the "Salmo Irritans", namely a fish with the audacity to remain uncaught.

No. 16 of limited deluxe edition of 50. The publisher included in this package a copy of Henrik Strandgaard's book *The Amazing Mr Blacker* in a uniform binding, also in fine condition.

First published in 1855, this was the first illustrated edition of the work first isued as *The Art of Angling* in 1842. This book by the Irish-born, London-based tackle dealer William Blacker was a revolutionary work and a landmark in the history of fly fishing: "For a start, he gave totally different methods for tying trout and salmon flies, and much of his writing was taken up by a manual devoted to the details of how to dress individual flies [...] Where the salmon fly is concerned, Blacker was the torch that illuminated the night and the pattern he created suddenly lifted the sights of many of his contemporaries. His fame spread so far and wide that is wasn't long before he could afford to charge three pounds for a month's tuition of four hours each day at trout and salmon fly tying." (Andrew Herd, *The Fly* (2001). pp. 208–209).







First edition of one of the best-known eighteenth century English books on angling. The book was "improved with additions" in 1766 and then often reprinted. In his preface, the author acknowledges his debt to Willughby's *Historia Piscium*.

Mendelssohn: "This magnificent volume is the most complete work on the wild mammalia of Africa that has been published up to this period. Nearly all the celebrated hunters of the Dark Continent of the day contributed to its pages, and the valuable information, which is practically perfect, has been conveyed in a reasonable popular form ... Many of the contributors to the book [Lord Delamere, Harry Johnston, Richard Lydekker, F.C. Selous, and others] sent their articles from the depths of the interior of Africa ... " Czech: "A sumptuous Victorian-era work that details scientific knowledge of African big game and is highlighted by numerous hunting adventures from its host of contributors ... The hand-coloured plates of game heads are especially lovely".



version of the book was extensively revised and edited by R.B. Marston to take into account major changes in the angling world, not least of which the invention of 'dry fly' technique. The illustrations and tables have been similarly updated, whilst keeping the core of Burgess' original classic.



First edition. With the exception of one or two who presented some of the symptoms of incipient asphyxia, induced by an overdose of soda-water and corned beef on the previous evening, all were ready for the muster-call as the sun rose and shot its first rays on the tall summit of Kirigalpota. The day's proceedings were initiated by the presentation of a handsome hunting-knife to the Prince, by the gentlemen of the Dick Oya Hunt, headied by Messrs. Fetherstonehaugh and Kelly. No sooner was this done than hte entire camp m oved forward towards the hunting-ground, the Prince and his party leading the way ... ' (pp. 77-8).

'John Capper was born in England in 1814. He started his journalistic career early in life, helping to edit an English weekly called The Mining and Steam Navigation Gazette before he came out to Ceylon in 1837. He took up a position in the firm of Acland and Boyd, an agency house primarily involved in coffee. After a few years he became manager of the firm's cinnamon properties. Then in 1846 he was promoted as a junior partner in charge of the entire export business. Besides his regular job, Capper had edited the Ceylon Magazine, a periodical for Orientalists and antiquarians, between 1840 and 1842. Though short-lived, it demonstrated the need for such a forum - a need that was to be satisfied in 1845 when Capper and 33 others formed the Ceylon Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society. Capper was appointed as Treasurer and Librarian ... The coffee crash of 1847 resulted in Acland and Boyd suspending business, and a year later Capper returned to England and contributed articles on Ceylon life to Charles Dickens' popular periodical, Household Words ... Ten years after he left Ceylon, he returned to become the manager and editor of the Times of Ceylon, and also edited the short-lived Muniandi (The Ceylon Punch), which offered a more acute analysis of the weaknesses of colonial society than the Ceylon Magazine, which he had edited earlier. Muniandi was illustrated by J.L.K. Van Dort, who was probably the best-known painter and illustrator working in Ceylon at that time. "From 1850 up to his death in 1896," art historian Ismeth Raheem declares, "he recorded almost every event of importance with his

deft, quick sketches." Van Dort was to make an important contribution to Capper's book on the royal visit' (*The Sunday Times*, 13th September 1998, on-line).

Similarly entertaining (and delightfully groan-inducing) entertainment is found throughout, with the occasional addition of lyrical verse and varied illustrations from drypoint accompanied by a pleasing typeset and spacious layout.





Those mural precipices that he sees are but the walls of vast table-lands stretching for twenty, thirty, it may be fifty miles, and even more, before another deep valley breaks their continuity. It is up here, on these glorious highlands, that the Norway of the hunter and stalker, of the sportsman, naturalist, and mountaineer is to be found. The people, it is true (*and* the salmon!), live down below in the valleys; but to see Norway, to realize what the word means, you must get on top - *out on the roof!*

Burrard (author of *Big Game Hunting in the Himalayas and Tibet*, London, 1926) for instance does not even mention the matter, though Haughton in *Sport and Folklore in the Himalayas*, says that he met three men who told him convincing stories, had at first hand from their fathers, of having seen a markhor in the very act of trampling on and devouring a snake ... ' (pp. 162-163). According to Haughton, the snake poison creates a cyst or 'stone' in the stomach of the animal which, if applied to a snake bite, rapidly 'absorbs the poison from the bloodstream and the cure of the patient is rapid.' Facts such as these compound the already exciting tales of *shikar* revealed here. A good book on Gilgit, Baltistan, Kashmir, all along the North-West Frontier and not only on wild goats. - Due to demand and rarity, this title was reprinted in 1994.







After the Lanak and Lungnak passes, due to extremely bad weather conditions, unfortunately they had to turn back. 'One of the handful of Edwardian-era women who embarked on her own hunting expeditions, Lady Jenkins departed from Srinagar, traveled through Leh and Miroo and into the high country of Changchenmo' (Czech).

Skilled Shot Certificate awarded to Mr G.B Barrett, South West District Post Office Rifle Club, for making a score of 282 points out of 300 over 25 yards with a service rifle at Chelsea Post Office Range.

The National Rifle Association was established in 1860, 'to give permanence to Volunteer Corps, and to encourage rifle shooting throughout Great Britain', and in reaction to fears of invasion by Napoleon III. Its first prize meeting, to enable Volunteers from around the country to compete against one another, was held in the year of its formation at Wimbledon Common on land belonging to John, fifth Earl Spencer. Ranges were constructed to the south and east of the windmill at distances up to 1000 yards. The meeting was opened by Queen Victoria, who fired the first shot, and the award ceremony took place at Crystal Palace, in front of some 20,000 spectators. The National Rifle Association Meetings at Wimbledon flourished but as the area developed due to the expansion of the London suburbs there was increasing pressure to find an alternative site and the last Meeting at Wimbledon was in 1889. After much debate the members of Council voted to move to Bisley, near Brookwood in Woking.

Preparation of the site began in autumn 1889, executed entirely by soldiers, and included the construction of a new railway. A branch line from Brookwood station was built to carry passengers into the camp during annual prize meetings, along with two stations, one at the entrance and one near the refreshment pavilion. The refreshment pavilion, first used at Wimbledon in 1871, was also transferred. It was rebuilt in 1924 at a cost of £25,000. A clock tower was located centrally at the highest point in the camp, some 226' above sea level, and the new butts and ranges, established on land belonging to the War Department, were named Stickledown, Shorts, Century and Long and Short Siberia. 15 months after they began, the Princess of Wales, later Queen Alexandra, fired the first shot. The clock tower was rebuilt in 1934, which may explain the discrepancy in appearance between the current tower and its depiction on the picture by I Burton Witson.


The certificate has been signed by Liet-Col. Charles Robert Crosse CMG, MVO (?1851-1921) in his role as Secretary of the National Rifle Association. Crosse saw service with the Royal West Kent Regiment until his retirement in 1890. He worked with the War Office during World War One and was appointed CMG in 1917 in recognition of 'valuable services in connection with the war'. He served as Secretary of the N.R.A. for 22 years, and was so associated with shooting that he was caricatured in Vanity Fair by WH (Wallace Hester) in 1912 for the 'Men of the Day' series. His gravestone was erected by the National Rifle Association in recognition of his years of service. 

Hawker, as with so many figures from our past, has come under criticism for his casual attitude towards the dispensation of guns sources have likened him to a parody of himself, particularly given his inability to comprehend why a young child probably shouldn't be trusted with a revolver.



the Amazon. Traversing some of the most dangerous territory of Amazonia, the party was successful and the river was renamed Rio Roosevelt, sometimes Rio Teodoro, in his honour. The travellers observed wildlife, report on various indigenous tribes and their societies, as well some big game hunting. 'Almost from the start, the expedition was fraught with problems. Insects and disease such as malaria weighed heavily on just about every member of the expedition, leaving them in a constant state of sickness, festering wounds and high fevers. The heavy dug-out canoes were unsuitable to the constant rapids and were often lost, requiring days to build new ones. The food provisions were ill-conceived forcing the team on starvation diets. Natives (the Cinta Larga) shadowed the expedition and were a constant source of concern - the Indians could have at any time wiped out the expedition and taken their valuable metal tools but they chose to let them pass (future expeditions in the 1920s were not so lucky). One of the camaradas murdered another, while a third was killed in a rapid .. By the time the expedition had made it only about one-quarter of the way down the river, they were physically exhausted and sick from starvation, disease and the constant labour of hauling canoes around rapids. Roosevelt himself was near death as a wounded leg had become infected and the party feared for his life each day. Luckily they came upon "rubber men" or "seringueiros", impoverished rubber-tappers who earned a marginal living from the forest trees driven by the new demand for rubber tires in the United States. The seringueiros helped the team down the rest of the river (less rapid-prone than the upper reaches) and Roosevelt made it home alive to live five more years. 

He supervised the production of the beautiful plates by Smit and Wolf but died of pneumonia, aged only 48, before the book could be completed. The writing of the text was taken over by Sclater, then Secretary of the Zoological Society of London, who wrote the main text, and Thomas, curator at the British Museum of Natural History, who provided the scientific descriptions. The result was a triumph both artistically and scientifically: "The book of Antelopes is a timely work and it is matter for congratulation that the colored plates prepared under the supervision of the late Sir Victor Brook more than twenty years ago are finally given to the public accompanied by such authoritative letter press" (Science, New Series, Vol 3, No. 67, April 10 1896, p. 566). The work's value partly resides in its recording of species now lost to us, hence the reviewer's appreciation of its timeliness: "...it is sad to feel that many species are on the road to rapid extinction" (*Ibid.*).

He even has a rather risky encounter with a rogue hyena, in which he is armed only with a hunting knife and his will to survive. In the preface, written by the author for this second edition, he laments the loss of the Somalian hunting grounds, 'prices have risen, lions have been reduced in number, and elephants have been driven away', something which it seems he had not anticipated during his adventures, but which is even more so the case in the 21st century.

In addition to the hunting anecdotes, *Seventeen Trips* includes chapters on Somali ethnology, the British Mission to King Menelik [the treaty with whom would result in the aforementioned restrictions on hunting grounds] and the Webbe Shabeleh River, amongst others.





The 8 page illustrated pamphlet lists their wares including roulette tables, billiard tables, backgammon tables, card presses, sabots, bagatelle tables etc Other games include mascotte, petite boules, petits chevaux, nicholas, castouillet and the rabbit hunt.

The catalogue was designed to be customised to particular games through the insertion of a set of rules for a chosen game, in this example Roulette. The inserted "Roulette. Rules of the Game" is a 4 page insert printed on pink paper. The designation of the particular game for the catalogue is marked by an applied paper label "Roulette" pasted onto the upper wrapper.

A fascinating insight into the games and pastimes of the late Victorian/ early Edwardian.period "Who has not been at a loss, on occasion. to find or offer a suitable game with which to entertain one's children or friends. The games offered by us, among which are some of the most original and most novel, will easily solve the difficulty of making a choice."

In the box are contained 10 stiff cards of 19 x 14,5 cm. printed in four colours. Each card has in the centre the image of one of the main figures of the Allied forces in World War II, surronded by 8 images (each numbered with a different number from 1 to 80) illustrating different key events of World War II (60) or flags (20) of Allied countries.

Also included are 80 numbered cork hexagonal disks (one repaired) in original cloth bag. With original rules and answers printed in French.

In essence a game of bingo with the caller reading out the number picked out of the bag. The player with that number on his card then needs to correctly identify the event or flag associated with the number to win the disk to place on his card. When a player has covered all his numbers he is then required to name the central character to win the game.

Not quite as easy as it sounds. Although the central characters can largely be easily identified (perhaps with the exceptions of Generals Catroux and Koenig) some of the wartime events are more elusive, "Debarquement Algerie" or the vague "Bataille".

The dating ot the game to late 1944 stems from the inclusion of various events as numbers on the cards The liberations of Paris (25 August) and Bordeaux (29 August) are included as are the Finland armistice (19 September 1944) and the armistice with Bulgaria (28 October 1944).

The 10 major figures of World War II illustrated are:

- United Kingdom Prime Minister Winston Churchill (card with 10 as first number)
- President of United States of America Franklin Delano Roosevelt (38)
- Supreme Allied Forces Commander General Dwight David Eisenhower (72)
- Provisional Government of the French Republic Chairman General Charles De Gaulle (1)

- Marshal of the Soviet Union and General Secretary of the Communist Party Joseph Stalin (7)

- Chairman of the National Government of China and of the National Military Council of China Chiang Kai-shek (20)

- United Kingdom General Bernard Montgomery (14)

- United Kingdom Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs Anthony Eden (32)

- General Georges Catroux (35), Minister in the Provisional Government of France

- General Marie-Pierre Koenig (48), Commander of the French Forces of the Interi or (French Resistance) and Commander of Free French Forces in the battle of Bir Hakeim (n. 27 on the cards) against the German Afrika Korps led by General Erwin Rommel.

Among the 60 key events of World War II illustrated on the cards, we find: – Declaration of war in 1939 (n. 42), – Appel of Resistance by De Gaulle at BBC in London (51), – Bombardment of London (5), – Soviet Union entry into war (21), – Japanese declaration of war (12), – Stalingrad battle (13), – Armistice in Italy (18), – Allied invasion of Italy (23), – Invasion of Normandy (46), – Meeting Churchill-Roosevelt (57), – Destruction of Warsaw (40), – Liberation of Paris (3), – Bombardment of Berlin (31), – Entry of Allied Forces in Germany (28).

A rare survival.

Lieutenant General Sir Michael Frederic Rimington, KCB, CVO (23 May 1858 – 19 December 1928) was a British Army officer who commanded cavalry forces in the Second Boer War and First World War. After early service with the 6th (Inniskilling) Dragoons, "Mike" Rimington was given command of an irregular cavalry force in South Africa, known as "Rimington's Guides". He commanded them for a year before taking command of his regular regiment, and later a cavalry brigade. In 1914, with the outbreak of the First World War, he commanded the 1st Indian Cavalry Division and then the Indian Cavalry Corps on the Western Front, before retiring to home-service duties in 1916. He had one son, Reginald, who followed his father into the 6th Dragoons; he rose to command an armoured brigade in 1941, and was killed in North Africa.

Frederick Barne (1805 – 1 March 1886) was an English landowner and politician who sat in the House of Commons from 1830 to 1832.

Barne was the only son of Lieutenant-Colonel Michael Barne and Mary Boucherett, daughter of Ayscoghe Boucherett. He served as a captain in the 12th Royal Lancers. In 1830 he was elected Member of Parliament for the rotten borough of Dunwich, the previous MP being his father. He held the seat until 1832 when it was abolished under the 1832 Reform Act. He lived at Sotterley Hall and was High Sheriff of Suffolk in 1851.

In 1834, Barne married Mary Anne Elizabeth Honywood, eldest daughter of Sir John Courtenay Honywood, 5th Baronet. Their son Frederick St John Barne was later Member of Parliament for East Suffolk.

Richard John Lloyd Price DL, JP (17 April 1843 – 9 January 1923), was squire of Rhiwlas Estate (about 64,000 acres in North Wales). He was a journalist, author, and judge at field trials and dog shows — best known as the organizer of the first sheepdog trials held in the U.K.

Walter was born to Americans William Louis Winans and Maria Ann de la Rue on April 5, 1852, at the Nikolaevsky Railway Works at St. Petersburg, Russian Empire. His father was engaged in construction work and Walter lived in St. Petersburg until the age of 18, taking the oath of allegiance at the US Embassy before leaving for Kent, England, to take up residence.

He held hunting, and held shooting rights over nearly 250,000 acres (1,000 km2) in Glen Strathfarrar, Glen Cannich and Glen Affric in the Highlands of Scotland. In the 1901 edition of his book The Art of Revolver Shooting he favoured the Webley-Fosbery above other 'automatic pistols', but it is not mentioned in the 1911 edition nor in the subsequent Automatic Pistol Shooting or The Modern Pistol and How to Shoot it.

In 1884 he prosecuted a Scotsman, Muirdoch Macrae, for grazing a lamb on land owned by Winans. The failure of Winans's prosecution established the right to roam which was a key element in opening British parklands to the public.

Winans died in Parsloes Park, Dagenham, Essex, on 12 August 1920.
