# Presidents' Welcome

Welcome to the sixth Melbourne Rare Book Week (MRBW) and the  $45^{th}$  Australian Antiquarian Book Fair, presented by the Australian and New Zealand Association of Antiquarian Booksellers (ANZAAB).


Starting from humble beginnings in 2012, when ten partners presented a program of eighteen events, MRBW has grown considerably, with the 2017 program having twenty-eight partners offering over fifty lectures, presentations, exhibitions, readings, tours and other book and print-on-paper related events, with free admission to all. This year's program also sees the inclusion of three workshops specially designed for children. The annual Melbourne Rare Book Fair has attracted antiquarian booksellers from throughout Australia and from Japan, the United Kingdom and the United States of America.

To date, MRBW has been organised by ANZAAB under the watchful eye of the main Convenor, Kay Craddock AM. In 2016, Professor Chris Browne joined the Committee as Honorary Program Director, contributing greatly to the ongoing success of the program. However, it has become clear that this success is now outstripping Kay and her Committee's ability to meet the demands of organising this large and complex event.

At the suggestion of ANZAAB, a new organisation has been formed, with a Committee whose members include representatives from ANZAAB, State Library Victoria, The University of Melbourne and others. Rare Books Melbourne (RBM) was incorporated as an Association in Victoria on 16 September 2016. Its purposes include running MRBW, promoting the value of books and the written word, educating the public on the value and place of books and other printed material in our society, and contributing to the preservation of the culture of the written and printed word. RBM will seek sponsorship and support to promote these aims. In addition to having several of its members on the RBM Committee, ANZAAB will continue to be a partner of MRBW through its annual Rare Book Fair at Wilson Hall, The University of Melbourne.

Bibliophiles, established collectors and newcomers to book collecting—whether for an individual item's history, provenance or, perhaps, intrigue—will find something of interest in this year's program, which covers subjects as diverse as 15th century manuscripts, modern comics and cartoons, sporting books, contemporary book design, and the world of Jane Austen. So, *For the Love of Books*, we invite you to join us once again at this year's Melbourne Rare Book Week.
